Beds decision due in March

The past two months have seen intense scrutiny of local healthcare options as the consultation over beds in the Ellen Badger Hospital got underway, including an event in town. Feedback on the consultation is now expected around 6th March, with a decision on the issue at the board meeting of the Integrated Care Board on 19th March. This will be keenly awaited by many in town, not least the Beds for Badger campaign, who brought along Baxter the camel to make their point outside the January meeting of the adult care and health overview and scrutiny committee at the Warwick Shire Hall. The striking appearance of the two-humped ship(ston?) of the desert helped attract coverage in local press and television.



Local Plan consultation

Consultation is now ongoing on the emerging Local Plan for South Warwickshire that is being prepared jointly by Stratford-on-Avon and Warwick District Councils. The Local Plan sets out the strategic vision, objectives and spatial strategy for the South Warwickshire area as well as the planning policies that will determine the future location, scale, type and design of new development up to 2050.

It will, according to the online consultation document, 'set out the overall strategy for the pattern, scale and design quality of places within South Warwickshire, and make sufficient provision for housing, employment, retail, leisure and other commercial development, along with infrastructure, community facilities, conservation and enhancement of the natural, built and historic environment and planning measures to address climate change mitigation and adaptation.'

A group called SOS! Save Our Shipston! has been set up and is encouraging as many people as possible to take part in the consultation. The group has set out more details, including the five main policies underpinning the plan, and how to respond, on page 8. The deadline for responses is Friday 7th March.

Fun run reward

Even more reason to make sure that our local organisation remains effective in looking after the interests of the town.

I was pleased to attend the inaugural meeting of the Chapel View Residents' Association and to see another group of residents coming together to support each other in improving their own area. Groups like this in different parts of the town are starting to be successful in getting developers to resolve issues and finish off their sites.

I thoroughly enjoyed the charity pantomime performance of Peter Pan at the Townsend Hall.

I am looking forward to civic events in Whitnash, Alcester and Leamington later in March.

The next SCAN meeting at 10am on 11th March in the Townsend Hall promises to be interesting as we seek to unravel exactly who does what between the Town, District and County Councils.

Lastly, I am looking forward to meeting many of you on Sunday 23rd March at 3pm for my Civic Service in St Edmund's Church. I would like this to be a celebration of the Spirit of Shipston by involving as many of the town's organisations as possible. The accent will be on young people and service. News from Shipston Town Council's February meeting

Community and events

Councillors had attended the Independent Care Board's consultations about hospital beds. Other events attended included People, Planet, Pint, the presentation by SHWP at SCAN, and the District Council display at the Leisure Centre. Cllr Dinnie went to a meeting of the Warwickshire and West Midlands Association of Local Councils (WALC). Councillors who attended the panto wished to congratulate cast and crew for the performance.

Buildings and assets

The contract for the repair of the twin chapel's roof has been agreed and work is to start shortly. The finance working group has drafted heads of terms for the lease of the ex-bowling green site to be a multiuse games area (MUGA). Solar streetlights on the road to the sports club were approved. The Town Council is to help the Youth Club to source a modular building.

Traffic and roads

Concerns were raised about parking on verges at Queens Avenue and Callaways Road, which will be taken up with Highways, along with issue of water flowing down Darlingscote Road from a broken drain which is eroding the road surface. The appearance of an InPost locker on Tilemans Lane has been referred to the planning committee to investigate.

Cllr Corless has been investigating options for further EV charging points in town. Atter contacting several operators, discussions are being held with Evie Life which can offer equipment at no capital cost to the council

Lloyds bank closure

With the closure of the Lloyds bank branch due in November 2025, Cllr Williams has been hearing the concerns of local businesses about the likely impact, with potential loss of business that comes from those people who come into town to do their banking. The capability of the proposed alternative via the post office in the Co-op is unclear. This to be explored further in discussion with the manager of the Co-op. Cllr Williams has liaised with Link to obtain a review of cash access assessment, and is helping to organise a survey to assess views of the public and businesses.

District Council update

Stratford District Council held an extraordinary meeting to discuss devolution and options for working with other district councils to form a unitary authority smaller than the whole of Warwickshire. It took the view that a 650,000 population is too big for one authority, a view shared by the representative of the WALC who attended. The District Council's overview and scrutiny committee passed a resolution supporting beds at the Ellen Badger.

Town Council agreed to request a meeting with Izzy Seccombe, leader of Warwickshire County Council, to discuss the implications of a unitary authority.

County Council update

Cllr Barker said that the issue of unitary authority had come up three times in her career and that she had looked into all the options. There

can be some good things, for example in dealing with issues which currently fall between the two stools of district and county council. The County Council debated local government

reform on 18th Feb. In her role on the health and social care committee, Cllr Barker said she was satisfied that the ICB were well-informed.

ICB consultation response

Town Council news

Council agreed with the response to the consultation which will be sent from the town clerk. It contains views collected from the town during the consultation process and is sent as objectively representing the opinions of the town.

Stour Health and Wellbeing Partnership

SHWP has secured around £180,000 of National Lottery funding which will help with staff costs.

High School

Work on the sports hall will recommence in the summer, following some internal refurbishment in the school.

Environment

Two new hedges have been planted at Cornmill Meadows thanks to volunteers, at no cost to the Council. Flood action group SAFAG will continue to maintain its current interventions. There have been four three-metre-plus events this winter so far. Discussions have been held with Andy Crump, WCC councillor for Community Safety, about linking with the regional flood and coastal committee established by the Environment Agency to influence local priorities for flood risk management.

Planning

Views of councillors on the South Warwickshire Local Plan are to be aggregated by the planning committee. A draft response to be circulated by the planning committee to the council, with a time-limited request for comments. All planning requests returned with no rep.

Communications

Council is to go ahead with a new IT contract, and new website operated via the district council, both of which will save money.

Remembering Shipston's fallen

5190753 Trooper Francis Albert Burnell

Frank Burnell was born on 28th March 1919, the son of William H (Bert) and Ellen C Burnell of Watery Lane, Shipston. The 1921 census records Bert as a fitter's labourer working at the Shipston Gas Works. Frank was enrolled in the Infants School and then in 1926 he moved up to the Boys School, which he left in 1928 to join Lydney School. At this time, the family was living in Anderton's Yard.

Frank served in the 1st Royal Tank Regiment, which in the Northwest European campaign was in the 22nd Armoured Brigade, part of 7th Armoured Division - the famous Desert Rats. In mid-August 1944 the 1st RTR was part of the force that managed to break out of the Normandy bridgehead. Through the rest of August and into September, rapid progress was made as the Division made its way over the Somme, through the Lille/Lens area and into Belgium. The autumn was, on the whole, relatively guiet and it was 1945 before C Squadron 1st RTR, in support of the Devonshire's, moved to take Ophoven. They did meet resistance from well dug-in anti-tank guns and Panzerfaust teams, but by dawn on 18th January, the Devonshire's and 1st RTR occupied Echt and Hingen.

The 7th Armoured Division crossed the Rhine at Xanten and Wesel on the morning of 27th March. On 28th they began to systematically clear woods and villages in the area. The next day they took Heidon, where the Germans knocked out three tanks with bazookas. On the 30th, the 1st RTR and the 1/5th Queens crossed a very weak bridge at Stadtlohn and pushed on to Ahaus, which they entered after an Artillery bombardment. The following day C Squadron were ordered to discover whether the bridges at Heek were intact. They were, and orders were then received to capture Heek where they engaged two much more powerful Tiger tanks, losing one Sherman tank and one Cromwell.

Frank Burnell was killed in this action, although it is not known which of the two tanks he was in. He is buried in the Reichswald Forest War Cemetery, Kleve, Germany and is commemorated on the Lydney War Memorial and Town War Memorial.



Beds for Badger campaign

Thank you all for your continued support and all the effort you have put in throughout the consultation exercise. The consultation is over now. We expect some feedback of results around 6th March and a decision from

the ICB at their board meeting on 19th March. Whatever that result is, we have some movement towards a dialogue.

At the first online meeting on 13th of January, we started to see a small relaxation in the ICB resolve. Under prompting from a supportive Chris Bain, chief executive of Healthwatch, there was agreement to examining wider issues. On 22nd January, at the adult care and health overview and scrutiny committee at Shire Hall in Warwick, with the help of Baxter the camel, we managed to make an impact with local press and television. Again, the ICB offered further discussion of wider issues.

Later that day, at the face-to-face drop-in event, 150 people turned up to the Townsend Hall in Shipston and registered their concerns with the ICB staff present. Some further discussions led to the offer of a meeting on 10th February. This online meeting was supported by Healthwatch and Community and Voluntary Action (CAVA) and included Bob Armstrong from the Health and Wellbeing Partnership. The aim is to run a series of workshop-style events to understand the health needs of our rural area and the best fit for the inpatient and outpatient services required. Our work with the Community Hospital Association has also yielded a few approaches that could result in the accommodation of beds.

So, do not be downhearted. There are ways that we could return beds to Shipston. The people of Shipston and the surrounding countryside have succeeded before. They built the Princess Diana wing, they supported a frailty nurse, they support the First Responders and replaced their car. They support the Shipston Home Nurses and all the activities of the Health and Wellbeing Partnership. There is nothing that cannot be achieved by this community when it works together. We just need the various branches of the NHS to work with us to deliver our vision of optimised medical services valued by the community.

Meals on wheels back on the road

Chris Cowcher has recently taken up post as CEO at Warwickshire Rural Community Council, a countywide charity that operates community transport, affordable housing support, oil buying syndicates and offers village hall advice. It also supports the county's Warm Hubs, like the one that runs at Shipston Scout Hut on a Thursday morning.

He contacted the Forum to talk about meals on wheels, another service that WRCC runs, taking over responsibility once the former service had closed following Warwickshire County Council's withdrawal of its subsidy.

'The Community Food Fleet delivers meals on wheels 365 days a year and is run as a not-for-profit service,' says Chris. 'Our aim is to support people to live independently countywide and we have a small but growing customer base in Shipston. All our delivery drivers are enhanced-DBS checked and are trained to carry out basic wellbeing and safety checks when they deliver meals, giving customers, their carers and next of kin peace of mind.

Stratford and Warwickshire Councils have developed the South Warwickshire Local Plan (SWLP) to help guide sustainable growth across the area. The long term vision is to meet South Warwickshire's sustainable development needs and strengthen local communities, while responding to the climate emergency. The plan will provide homes and jobs, boost and diversify the local economy, and provide appropriate infrastructure, in suitable locations, at the right time. By 2050 South Warwickshire will be a flourishing, healthy and vibrant place where people will want to live, work and visit.

SWLP is at the consultation stage and has identified Shipston as a potential area of strategic growth with three separate developments surrounding the town.

As residents we need to review the plans and the policies and feed our comments back to the Councils by 7th March.

You need to take into account the five main policies that support these developments and comment on whether Shipston delivers the requirements.

- A climate resilient and Net Zero Carbon South Warwickshire adapting to the effects of climate change and mitigating against its causes, while avoiding any further damage that might arise from development, and driving towards net zero carbon
- A well-designed and beautiful South Warwickshire creating spaces where people want to be, which respect and reflect the existing beauty and heritage of the area
- A healthy, safe and inclusive South Warwickshire enabling everyone to enjoy safe and healthy lifestyles with a good quality of life and addressing health inequalities
- A well-connected South Warwickshire ensuring that development is physically and digitally connected, provided in accessible locations, and promotes active travel
- A biodiverse and environmentally resilient South Warwickshire strengthening green and blue infrastructure and achieving a net increase in biodiversity across South Warwickshire.

We will all have a view on whether Shipston has the necessary infrastructure, green spaces, health services, education, local work to avoid unnecessary travel, safe roads and bridges and flood resistant land to support the sustainable delivery of the SWLP ambitions and whether we are currently capable of supporting the required levels of growth.

Shipston has grown by approximately 20% over recent years, with little if any investment in our infrastructure and services. Are we in deficit or ready to add up to 3,000 additional houses to our market town?

Nature needs our help

Many years of development, habitat loss and persecution has resulted in the UK being one of the most nature-depleted countries on Earth. One in six species are threatened with extinction in Britain. Insects of all kinds, especially those which pollinate important food supplies such as bees, are in decline.


Changes in farming methods and recent climate change are the biggest causes of wildlife decline. So, what can we do about it in Shipston? How can you help?

Gardeners can help in several ways: by leaving a patch of garden to be a bit wild; letting grass grow a bit longer by mowing less often and allowing lawn weeds to flower (the much-abused dandelion and clover provide pollen for our bees Around town

and other insects). Try planting garden flowers that provide forage for a wide variety of pollinating insects eg foxglove, aster, nasturtium, and putting a shallow dish of water out for garden visitors such as birds, hedgehogs and many more. Please avoid using deadly chemical sprays!

Even if you don't have a garden, tubs, hanging baskets and window boxes can still create homes for wildlife. Many flowering herbs are loved by pollinators – chives, sage, lavender; even cherry tomatoes will grow in a small container so you can have some home-grown food from a tub!

What lies beneath Shipston's past

Planning applications can be the start of the uncovering of fascinating archaeological remains. This is especially true in our area close to the Roman Fosse Way and the Anglo-Saxon origins of Shipston. In our next Museum talk, Archaeology Warwickshire's archaeobotanist Bekky Hillman explains how archaeology is an integral part of the planning and development process.

'The first stage is to assess the site of any proposed development for archaeological potential,' she says. 'This is done by looking at what previous investigations nearby have uncovered. Where there have been no investigations, trial trenches may be dug so that we can see what there is in the ground.'

If initial investigations indicate this may have been a site of interest, the archaeologists take over to excavate the site. It is very rare that their finds will actually prevent development, but

this is an opportunity to record the past, as Bekky has found in several local sites. These range from medieval ridge and furrow that had been masked by modern ploughs, to Roman farmsteads on Shipston's outskirts, to a prehistoric henge from 6,000 years ago near Newbold on Stour.

Books brighten young Ukrainian lives

Many local folk came to our Shipston Literary Society event last year to listen to Ukrainian poetry and music and raise funds for books for children in Ukraine. It took some time to find the right causes for the £675 raised. We made contact with a charity run by two librarians who shared pictures of children trying to read by candles in basements both in the cities and near the frontline. They explained the social value of reading in such dark times.

Now librarian Kateryna Suchorebska has written to tell us that books have been bought for four children's libraries in Ukraine: two close to the front line and two in the remote villages in the west. These were delivered as loving gifts on 14th of February. Each has a book plate thanking Shipston Literary Society. 'We are very grateful not to feel alone,' says Kateryna. 'The gift from the people of Shipston is very symbolic for us.'

During a Zoom meeting Kateryna asked if we could also send children's books in English, saying they feel it is important for their children to learn our language too. The challenge of where to get such books and how to get them over to Ukraine was solved by two local groups. Stour Valley Lions stepped in to help by providing some children's books donated for charity. They packed up a consignment and, as requested by our Ukrainian contacts, added notes to show the support from Shipston. The next step was actually getting the books to this war-torn country.

NOXAIDUK, a charity supporting Ukraine, had the answer. Its founder, James Clarke, MD Hook Norton Brewery agreed to take the English books on the next delivery drive to Lviv. Ever since 2022, they have been driving vehicles over, mainly with medical supplies like bandages, first aid kits and



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stretchers for use in the field. NOXAIDUK has delivered over 70 trucks and three ambulances with 50-plus tonnes of aid so far.

'We have an amazing team of people supporting this initiative,' says James, 'and we are very lucky to have drivers who also cover their own travel costs.'

Four vehicles and their consignment of humanitarian aid set off on 7th February on the 26-hour journey with eight local volunteer drivers, and our books safely on board heading for the children's library in Lviv.

Khrystyna and Kateryna from the NGO Social Health team sent this message to the people of Shipston, with great love and gratitude:

'Thank you for your support and for providing such important assistance to our children.



During these times of war, loss, and destruction, in a period of immense educational and cultural setbacks, you bring us a ray of happiness and faith in a better tomorrow.'



As part of our Thrive work, we have recently appointed some children to be our first 'Thrive Ambassadors'. These are children who have worked with Mrs Faulkner to gain a deeper understanding of how to recognise others who need support and to be able to be someone who may be able to offer help to other children before they speak to an adult. This may involve helping two children to resolve an argument, guiding someone who is upset to find an appropriate adult to talk to, or simply offering to play with someone who is feeling lonely at break time. We are very proud of these children for volunteering to take on this valuable role.

First bus driver

Jessica Rose Nash gave a fascinating talk about her career as this country's first female bus driver.

Jess joined London Country buses as a 'clippie', but she dearly wanted to drive the bus - this was strictly reserved for men. She did become an ambulance driver in London, then one day saw that the local bus garage was recruiting drivers, both male and female. She applied and was rejected – too short, had to be 5'4". However, she persisted and in November 1970 she passed her test in Shepherds Bush and was given the long coveted badge, now in the London Transport Museum.

With the closure of London Country, she opted to go with London Transport and a posting to Hendon driving the world famous Routemaster buses. This was still a strictly segregated workplace - and it was the women who refused to work with a

woman driver.

Jess later became a Revenue Inspector covering the underground system for 17 years, a tough job dealing with offenders, all at the time of IRA bombings and unrest. Eventually, Jess's knees told her to take early retirement. She now volunteers driving mini buses at Daventry Area Community Transport and has become a trustee of this invaluable organisation.

There are nearly 200 toys to be borrowed, all of them thoroughly researched. It is impossible to detail all SHWP's activities here – suffice to say that there is something for everyone provided locally.



Anyway, on a different note, we have been handed a plan for Shipston which if carried out could double our size. Now, I for one won't be supporting this, and like all of you I shall put my comments in on the South Warwickshire Local plan shortly. We all need to do this. I am aghast that the Local Plan - led by Liberal Stratford District Council and Green/Labour Warwick District Council – is threatening our communities, which have already been stretched to breaking point. If we have more development without infrastructure, then we will truly become Shipston in Sewer - a new name suggested to me at the photocall for the Herald. I think we did a good job, but we need to keep up the pressure! I hope most of you have had my County Cllr information sheet? If not, I will get it onto the Shipston noticeboard!

Another potential problem is the inclusion of the tip in the plan, owned by WCC! I had already been assured that our tip will remain, and I am confident it will. The officer responsible for the inclusion of the site has heard from me in rather strong terms...and has said I can blame him. That will only work when we get it removed. The leader of the Conservatives on Warwickshire County Council, Cllr Seccombe, and I are all over it.

Other villages locally are also included in the plan (planning is District level, remember) and I am answering queries across our patch. I also have the benefit (as a county councillor) of serving on the Cotswolds Natural Landscape (formerly AONB) and some of the villages and many areas are within the 3km distance of impact on a sensitive landscape guidance. I shall ensure their robust response.

Now, some really good news. I have got the plans being worked on for two zebra crossings in Shipston. We have identified two potential places to cross on the Darlingscote Road and two more for another crossing on Stratford Road. When these have been assessed the work is able to be funded mostly from my delegated budget. I suspect it will be in the new financial year. Result! Dropped kerbs are also on the way, as ever!

As I write we are going into half term, which I hope our young people enjoy. If there's any sun, get out and enjoy it for a bit! Happy Spring.

District Council

What a great turnout last month to demonstrate what Shipston thought of the proposed new developments. Great work by the SOS (Save Our Shipston) team in spreading the word about the South Warwickshire Local Plan

(SWLP). I suppose we must be grateful that we have been consulted before any decisions have been made, and we have been able to point out the unsustainability of many of the proposals. If you read this column before 7th March, you will still have time to object to the new developments at www.southwarwickshire.org.uk/swlp

But it would be even better if the town designed its own version of community development. I have been contacted by a few people in the last month, asking for a more positive debate about the future of Shipston. Frome in Somerset is a prime example of where residents of the town have come together to combine residential, business, and community development. To this end, a new Neighbourhood Plan for Shipston will have to be developed once the new SWLP is approved. This must be done with the full consultation of residents and stakeholders of Shipston. The new Neighbourhood Plan will then have to be taken into account for all planning decisions up until 2050.

County Council elections have now got the go-ahead for 1st May, which gives Warwickshire more time to work out what shape our new local government will take. England is one of the most centralised developed countries, and having two levels of councils (district and council) definitely has its disadvantages, so this restructure could be positive. At the moment, District Councillors represent around 1,400 households each. For real 'localism', the area that councillors represent should keep roughly to these numbers.

IndieGo Bus is now operating in Stratford District and replaces the old Ubus service. It is designed for areas and times that are not catered for by our bus service. You can request your pick-up and drop-off points when making your booking, but a short walk may be required to complete most trips. Anyone travelling within the Stratford district can book via the IndieGo PLUS mobile app or by phoning 01926 895559. Fares are from £2 for a single trip and there are discounts for children. Bookings can be made as early as two weeks before your trip, and as late as an hour before you want to travel. They are subject to availability so the earlier you book, the better. It operates from 8.20am-2.30pm and 4-7pm Monday to Friday in school term time, and 7.30am-7pm during school holidays. Buses are rampaccessible and have wheelchair spaces on board. Do let us know how you get on using this service.
