# No beds at the Badger

The NHS Coventry and Warwickshire Integrated Care Board (ICB) has announced that there will be no beds at the Ellen Badger hospital in Shipston.



Following a decision made at an ICB Board meeting on 19th March, the 35 community rehabilitation beds in South Warwickshire will be permanently located at two sites. Leamington Spa Hospital and



Stratford Hospital – a continuation of current arrangements, which have been in place since works began at the Ellen Badger in January 2022.

This went against the very clear preference of the town and surrounding area. Responses to the six-week consultation process showed 82% in favour of having beds in three hospitals including Shipston's Ellen Badger.

The ICB has recognised the need for a wider consideration of health services for rural communities and will now adopt a "whole system approach to engagement with communities, prioritising rural communities initially."

The Beds for Badger organising committee has responded by saying: "We must now use this opportunity to get the focus on patient-centred care in our rural community."

The ICB Board and NHS provider SWFT will now work in partnership to develop a full implementation plan.

## What's next for the Local Plan?

The deadline for responses to the South Warwickshire Local Plan has now passed, after Stratford District Council and Warwick District Council completed their public consultation of Part 1 of the plan on 7th



March. Within the plan, 14 sites around Shipston have been identified as potential development areas for approximately 3,000 houses.

The Town Council has objected strongly to the level of landowner/developer proposed development, mainly on the grounds of inadequate existing infrastructure.

Meanwhile, the Save Our Shipston campaign has been working hard to help residents understand the potential impacts of the proposed development plan and encouraging people to submit their personal responses.

"We now await a decision at the end of the year to determine whether Stratford and Warwickshire District Councils will be persuaded that Shipston is not an appropriate site for such a large-scale development," said a spokesperson.

#### Mayor's column



Dear Shipston,

How great to see the ending of winter and the arrival of spring with the Shipston in Bloom planters and pots displaying bright yellow native daffodils and delicate anemones thanks to the expanded group of volunteers and businesses who have stepped forward to continue planting up the containers with bulbs and perennials that I am sure will delight us throughout the summer. Please do reward the team members with some kind words of thanks when you see them planting, weeding or watering the pots.

The feedback from the Integrated Care Board Consultation on the return of beds to The Ellen Badger Hospital certainly demonstrated that Shipston and the surrounding area can mobilise support for local causes. The 82% response in favour of Option A, the 3-hospital option with beds in Shipston, was exceptionally strong. The decision of the Integrated Care Board on 19th March has unfortunately supported its preferred option with no beds in Shipston. However, the strength of the feedback has led the ICB to initiate a study forum on the health needs of our rural community. The ICB have made it clear that they expect patient care in our 'virtual ward' to take place in patient's homes, not in a hospital setting. I will now be asking them to make clear how this will be achieved.

The consultation on the South Warwickshire Local Plan closed on 7th March. The strong submissions from many individuals will have strengthened the town council planning committee response in favour of the policies and improved infrastructure but not the proposed sites.

The town council is looking forward to hearing more about local government reorganisation into unitary and combined authorities from Cllr Isobel Seccombe, leader of Warwickshire County Council, just before the April town council meeting.

I am looking forward to civic events in Warwick and Southam, our own town pub walk on 24th April, and the chairman's dinner.

Thank you all for taking part in my Civic Service. It was good to see such a wholehearted celebration of the connectedness and the spirit of Shipston. I hope to repeat this by asking all town organisations to come to the Annual Town Meeting on 23rd April. This should be a good opportunity for networking and a showcase of the vast range of town activities.

Looking forward to 8th of May when we will be celebrating the 80th anniversary of VE day, the end of WWII in Europe. The events are advertised elsewhere in this issue. Rotary are organising a shop window display competition, and I hope you will all enjoy coming to town to see the displays and reaching your own conclusions as to which you prefer.

# News from Shipston Town Council's March meeting

#### Various - reports from councillors

A tree has been planted in the churchyard in memory of Ed Jackson, treasurer of the Food Bank. Quotes are being obtained for the repair of the church wall. Stratford District Council has given an award of £1,600 for hedge-laying and bird and bat boxes at Cornmill Meadows.

Record numbers attended the recent Holiday at Home.

Repairs to the Hub are continuing, with the removal of a water tank.

Liaison continues with Evie Life on EV charging points.

The rocking manhole cover on Queens Avenue/Campden Road has been reported to Warwickshire County Council Highways. Councillor Barker will follow up on this and also on the large pothole on Darlingscote Road.

Council is looking for funding opportunities for proposal to create more permanent home for the youth club.

#### Lloyds Bank

In light of the planned closure of Lloyds Bank in town on 9 November, Cllr Williams has sent in a letter with a supporting letter from the local MP Manuela Perteghella to the Link organisation, which typically takes 12 weeks to respond. A questionnaire about banking provision has been circulated around town. Cllr Williams is meeting councillors from nearby towns with a similar lack of banking provision. Further investigations into the 'banking desert' that this may leave are taking place, along with representations for support to WCC to ensure the town has a banking hub or some provision.

#### **Local Plan**

The council has submitted its response to the South Warwickshire Local Plan. The next stage will be a Part 2 consultation, dealing with individual requested development sites, which will be a further opportunity to object to overdevelopment.

#### **Stratford District Council report**

Solar panels are now being put up on the Leisure Centre. The District Council is having an extraordinary meeting to discuss the plans for the proposed unitary authority. The timescale for the Local Plan will be shortened to two years due to proposed devolution.

#### **County Council report**

Cllr Barker reported the health contract has been renewed and is working better. WCC has agreed to fund SEND mediation. There is a new highways enforcement policy and a new health protection policy. The household support fund, which offers energy support, will end on 28th March.

#### Ellen Badger Hospital

A decision by the Integrated Care Board was expected to be made on 19th March at the Coventry Rugby Club. The Mayor reported that there had been a good response from Shipston. Of the respondents to the consultation within Shipston, 82% had voted for option A (beds distributed across three sites, including the return of 12 beds to the Ellen Badger), 13% had voted for option B, and 5% for neither. Over

1,240 people responded to the consultation via the survey, mostly aged 45 and over, with many over-eighties responding online. There were 72 written responses and 189 via the drop-in consultations.

Council has additionally been asked to respond on possible uses for the grounds of the hospital for health and wellbeing.

#### **High School**

The sports centre application is still going forward, with a result expected at the end of March.

#### **Environment and flood action**

SAFAG will send a monthly written report to council. The group will purchase rebar for natural flood management interventions.

#### **Planning**

Council agreed no representation on extension at 1 Greenway Road.

#### General purposes

Work is now underway on the twin chapel roof repair. Council agreed to follow insurer's advice on the removal of trees, whilst asking for reservations to be checked.

#### **Finance**

Council will cover costs of CCTV, with an ongoing service level agreement.

#### **Local Nature Action Plan**

Cllr Walters has compiled a list of the town's green assets, which will be photographed.

# What's next for the South Warwickshire Local Plan?

#### Paul Tesh explains the process.

As you may be aware, Stratford District Council and Warwick District Council completed their public consultation of Part 1 of the proposed South Warwickshire Local Plan on 7th March. This proposed Local Plan is due to come into force circa 2028 and will run until 2050. Part 1 comprises the policies that both local authorities propose to impose on future development planning within the two districts.

Of particular interest to Shipston residents is the proposed Strategic Growth Location SG17. This identifies 14 sites that ring Shipston as potential development areas, mainly for housing. The total potential of these 14 sites is approximately 3,000 houses, of which 1,600 are to the east of the River Stour. It must be noted that these sites have been proposed by landowners/developers only and are therefore a 'wishlist' at present. We have been advised by the District Council that the landowner/developer proposed sites will undergo further assessment by the District Council before being incorporated into the next stage consultation, which will be later this year, with the likelihood that the number of sites will be reduced.

As part of their formal response to the consultation, the Town Council objected strongly to the potential level of landowner/ developer proposed development mainly on the grounds of inadequate existing infrastructure (schools, health care, drainage, retail, public transport and the River Stour crossing etc), the impact that such development would have on the setting of Shipston in the local landscape, and the lack of local employment, which would force new residents to commute to other towns.

What happens next? Both Stratford and Warwick District Councils will consider the responses to the public consultation and then revise their proposals before carrying out a further public consultation later this year so hopefully there will be further opportunity to comment again. The Town Council's Planning Committee will be monitoring the situation closely.




# Beds for Badger campaign

General news

The result of our town's feedback on the ICB consultation about hospital beds exceeded what we hoped for. The chart below shows the results from Option A and Option B.

In spite of the overwhelming survey result in favour of Option A - having beds at the Ellen Badger - it was made very clear that this is only one piece of information being considered by the ICB and that other factors could outweigh the views expressed in the survey.



The decision made by the Integrated Care Board on 19th of March did indeed favour Option B with no rehabilitation beds returning to the Ellen Badger hospital.

However, the strength of opinion expressed in the feedback from the survey and the other inputs to the consultation was such that the ICB Board have agreed:

"To support a whole system approach to engagement with our communities, prioritising rural communities initially, aligned with the Neighbourhood Health Guidelines 2025/26, using Shipston and surrounding areas as a blueprint for future Integrated Care System engagement."

We had requested a strengthening of this statement to commit the ICB to action in our area. Unfortunately the statement was not amended. Philip Johns (Chief Executive) even asked for the engagement to include Coventry, rather missing the point.

We must now use this opportunity to use the current mood for change in the NHS to get them to focus on patient centred care in our rural community. This will require us to draw attention to the lack of local inpatient care at every opportunity, patient by patient, as concerns arise. Not just relying on remote acute hospitals with little community backup. This may be uncomfortable for the patients concerned and their friends and family, but if we do not complain, we will not get improvement. This may feel very different to what we were hoping for, but it will have to work for us to achieve the community care we

# Remembering Shipston's fallen

4919920 Lance Sergeant Cecil Frederick Hibberd

Born on 6th October 1916, Cecil was the son of Frederick and Agnes Lambert Hibberd who, in the years immediately after their marriage, lived in High Street, Brailes, Fred working locally as a farm labourer. By the time of the Second World War, the family were living in Sheep Street, Brailes. Cecil had two sisters, Kate and Win, and two brothers, Reg and Harold and like them he went to Brailes School, attending from 1920 to 1930.



On leaving school Cecil initially worked as a milkman but by the time he joined the army on 16th March 1940, he was working as a roadman and is recorded as such in the 1939 register.

Initially serving with the 1st South Staffordshires, he saw service in Egypt from August 1940. On 13th September 1940. a 250,000-strong Italian force crossed the border from their colony of Libya into Egypt, where a British force of 30,000 was protecting the Suez Canal. On reaching Sidi Barrani, the Italians dug in. On 8th December 1940 the British counter-attacked, broke through a gap in the Italian defences and overwhelmed them. Over the next 10 weeks, the British and Commonwealth forces advanced 800 km west, destroyed about 400 tanks and 1,292 artillery pieces, and captured 130,000 prisoners.

By the end of the summer of 1941, Cecil was back in England and on 1st June 1942 he married Jane Mary Stanley of West Street, Shipston-on-Stour. During this time Cecil was promoted to Lance Sergeant, and the Hibberds had a baby boy, David. Sadly, David was killed in a motorbike accident in 1962.

In late June 1944 Cecil was serving with 6th North Staffords as part of the 59th Division. They entered France and in early July were fighting the Germans out of Caen. On 18th August, the Division was disbanded and redistributed across the 2nd Army to make up for the number of casualties that recruitment alone could not support. Cecil joined the 8th Battalion Royal Scots Regiment, 44th Infantry brigade, 15th (Scottish) Division.

On 29th April 1945, the 8th Royal Scots made an assault crossing of the River Elbe from the Artlenburg area, southeast of Hamburg. This they achieved, but the Germans put down effective cover from both mortars and artillery. Cecil was killed during this crossing and is buried in Hamburg Cemetery, Hamburg, Germany. He is remembered on both the Town War Memorial and the Brailes Memorial.

# Have we saved our Shipston?

In early January, a small group of us met at The George and were deeply concerned by the proposals on the



table. This concern led us to form a planning group with members from Barcheston, Willington, and Honington. We met with local councillors, planners, and other experts to gain a clearer understanding of both the planning process and the proposals for Shipston. What became evident was that many local residents, as well as

those in neighbouring villages, were largely unaware of the

potential for up to 3,000 new homes in our area.

Recognising that we needed additional support, we reached out to the community. Over 30 dedicated and skilled volunteers joined our efforts, helping to develop and deliver clear information so residents could navigate the complexities of the consultation process. Although we haven't named individuals, every volunteer's contribution of personal time and their skills has been invaluable. Many are pictured by the bridge in the accompanying photo, symbolising our commitment to protecting the character of our small, historic, rural market town—a town already under strain from recent housing developments that have not been matched by corresponding investments in infrastructure, public services, or road networks.

The SOS Save Our Shipston campaign has played a crucial role in informing local residents about the consultation process, and we have received numerous positive comments in support of our efforts. By using Facebook, Instagram, local Parish meetings, posters, and drop-in events, we have reached a broad audience—ensuring that as many as possible, including our elderly residents, have been well informed.

Thanks to the support of this campaign, hundreds of residents have submitted their responses, ensuring that their voices are heard. This would likely not have been possible without the collective effort of our volunteers.

We extend our heartfelt thanks to everyone who generously contributed their time to this campaign. Your support is a powerful reminder of the positive impact that can be achieved when we work together on such a valuable campaign.

We also send huge thanks to The White Bear for providing their premises and function room for our Shipston drop-in meetings. Their kind support, including refreshments for our volunteers, has been greatly appreciated.

It is worth adding that we fully support the overall principles and objectives of the SWLP for sustainable growth, and to provide an environment where people can enjoy living, working, educating their families and with good access to the public services they need. However, we hope that Stratford and Warwickshire District Councils have listened to the comments made by Shipston residents and local parishes and that they understand the existing residents are already suffering from a lack of investment in the services that are necessary to deliver the SWLP requirements. Amongst many other things, we need better medical health support, a larger school offering

sixth form education, protection for our heritage buildings and bridges, better transport facilities, maintenance of the Cotswold National Landscape and recognition that the Fell Mill Lane site is bisected by level 2 and 3 flood zones.

The consultation process included more sites than were necessary, and this process and further research will remove many locations from the plans. We hope they realise that Shipston does not deliver the required criteria to add to their very valid ambition for sustainable growth, and that we are removed from the process by Christmas.

# Museum opens at Easter

Opening its doors for its third year on Saturday 19th April, our Museum once more gives us the opportunity to step back in time by bringing the local past to life. It will be open for two days over the Easter weekend, Saturday 19th and Monday 21st April, from 12-4pm.

Our three new displays take us from prehistoric times to 80 years ago, all featuring fascinating artefacts and stories for an unforgettable visit.

The Shipston Remembers display includes items of different conflicts, from the Crimean through to the Korean war, Medals are on show along with plagues for those who died in WW1. But life back home is not forgotten, particularly WW2 with rationing and hotel registration forms for visitors to keep an eye on potential spies.

There are three special uniforms from the observer corps. home guard and a rare uniform from the Royal Flying Corp from before 1918 when the RAF was formed. But it's not just objects on display, there are also stories, including the history of the local prisoner of war camp.

"It's important in this 80th anniversary year of the end of WW2 to acknowledge the sacrifice of people at times of conflict," explains trustee Michaela Davis who curated the display. "We also show how those at home stepped up to support the country by joining the Home Guard and Women's Land Army. The museum is grateful to those who have donated items for the display."

Under the Hammer: Shipston auctioneers from 1800. Covering one wall is an amazing array of auctioneering posters, with sales of home, land and estates. will recognise many places in the original posters and handbills about properties across the district, from Long Compton, Ilmington, Cherington

and Whichford as well as Shipston itself. There are valuation records and auction books dating back to the 1850s loaned by Warwickshire County Record office plus the original ledger from Edward Sheldon wine merchants.

"It provides an overview of the history of auctioneering in Shipston and the surrounding area." says trustee Stefan Lang. "We've focused on the key auctioneers hereabouts but also the historical development of auctions across the UK."

The Iron Age in the Stour Valley. Step back even further in time to meet the Dobunni, the Iron Age tribe living in the Severn/ Cotswold region 2,500 years ago. The display, curated by Brian Meredith, brings the tribe back to life with items like a decorated weaving comb, spindle whorls and a loom weight once used by women to spin and weave clothes.

Keep an eye out for some of the fascinating smaller objects like the belt made of carefully folded sweet papers made by an Italian prisoner of war. Or the beautiful ivory auctioneers gavel presented in 1842 to William Bull, proprietor of the George.

And the handheld mirror of bronze found in a burial site in Birdlip in 1879: one of the finest items of Celtic art to survive.

The Museum opens from Saturday 19th April until September

at weekends and (usually) bank holidays, 12-4pm. Please note we are closed Sunday 20th April. We're at Old Clark House, West Street near the Council offices. And the good news - entry is free! Donations are always welcome to help

# Don't let pets get their paws on Easter treats



Shipston Vets has some top tips to help people enjoy a happy Easter with their pets and avoid an emergency trip to the vets.

The West Street practice wants to share the message that chocolate eggs, sweets and hot cross buns can all be potentially fatal if eaten by dogs. Clinical director Dr April Wall has compiled eight tips to help keep pets safe:

- 1. Keep Easter eggs out of reach of your dog as chocolate can cause tummy upsets, hyperactivity, an elevated heart rate and
- 2. Don't let dogs eat hot cross buns or Easter cake because the grapes, raisins, currants and sultanas they contain can be
- 3. Flowers are popular Easter gifts, but can make pets very ill. Daffodils, tulips and crocuses are toxic, especially if dogs dig up and eat the bulbs, and lilies can cause kidney failure in
- 4. Keep stuffed or plastic toy bunnies and chicks away from dogs because they can be chewed or swallowed, causing choking or blockages.
- 5. Do not give your dog lamb, turkey or chicken bones, as cooked meat bones can cause choking, a blockage or perforate the intestine.
- 6. Avoid feeding scraps from the table. Rich, fatty foods can result in vomiting or diarrhoea and lead to an increased risk of pancreatitis, a painful and serious condition.
- 7. Keep onions and garlic powdered, raw, cooked, or dehydrated – away from your dog. They can cause vomiting, diarrhoea and anaemia.
- 8. Make a note of your vets' Easter opening hours and emergency contact information, just in case you need to seek help quickly.

April adds: "The safest option is to keep all chocolate and sweets and anything containing dried fruit locked away and well out of reach, but if you suspect your pet has eaten anything toxic, call your veterinary practice straightaway. Even the most well-behaved pets can be tempted to steal food, so make sure they can't reach the tops of cookers or kitchen worktops and that bins containing leftovers aren't accessible."

#### The challenge of translation

Probably for the first time ever, a Shipston society's meeting was interrupted by a vote in the House of Commons. Stratford MP Manuela Perteghella was the guest speaker and very close to the date, she was asked to stay in London for voting. The Society quickly set up a live video link so she was still able to deliver her talk from Parliament. She had to leave to vote when the division bell sounded, returning 10 minutes later to carry

on where she had left off.

Before she was elected as our MP, Manuela was a lecturer in translation and has always been passionate about literature. Often when you pick up a work in English but originally written in another language – All Quiet On The Western Front, A Hundred Years Of Solitude, The Name Of The Rose – you give little thought to the translator.

# **Shipston-on-Stour Women's Institute**

After listening to Jan Warner's talk, a brief history of childrearing about bringing up

babies in the 18th and 19th centuries, Shipston Women's Institute thanked their lucky stars they had been born into the 20th century! And some were also thankful that they came of good agricultural rural stock.

Babies born into the middle and upper classes in the past really did need to be fit to survive the rigours of child rearing. Until the 1850s, roughly half of babies born to better-off mothers died in infancy. Babies born into poor agricultural families had a markedly better survival rate. An expectant mother would be secluded in a 'lying-in chamber' kept heated with windows sealed against draughts until the birth and for some weeks after. Babies were swaddled in yards of linen cloth, principally to prevent rickets, and seldom unwrapped for changing or washing. The upper-class mother did not nurse her baby. instead employing a strong healthy woman as a wetnurse, whose own children she would have been nursed and not swaddled and who could therefore exercise their limbs and breathe fresh air. They may have been born outdoors whilst their mother was working. She would continue with her baby in a sling, breastfeeding the baby until it was two years old.

The greatest scandal of the 19th century was the drugging of babies, especially in industrial towns. Mothers, who had to work, would leave their baby with a child minder who fed her charges with milk laced with opiates. Laudanum was used virtually by the whole nation. The babies slept and became little drug addicts, receiving hardly any food during the day. Eventually, patent opiate-containing medicines were banned.

The next meeting is on Wednesday, 2nd April in the Catholic Church Hall, Darlingscote Road at 7pm, when the speaker will be talking about his time as a footman. Visitors are always welcome



#### **District Council**

Thanks must go to the Save Our Shipston campaign for all their work in helping people to object to the new housing sites around Shipston proposed in the draft South Warwickshire Local Plan. The consultation portal was a nightmare to navigate for most people, so SOS were assisting folk to respond by email or handwritten letter. Like most of



Despite the strength of feeling in Shipston, the NHS Integrated Care Board has decided not to restore the beds at the Ellen Badger hospital. An enormous amount of time and effort has gone into the consultation, which was restricted to the number of community rehabilitation beds instead of restoration of all the beds and facilities that the Ellen Badger used to provide.

The Beds for Badger campaign has not given up and has called on the ICB to work with the local community and general practices to develop a 'neighbourhood services model' with a specific focus on agreed priorities such as care for frail older people, dementia care, and end of life care. The ICB has agreed to a recommendation to continue with the 'rural health' work. The ICB is setting up a Community Health Forum for Shipston and inviting stakeholders such as the Medical Centre and Shipston Home Nursing. There is still much work to be done to ensure that the Shipston area is not disadvantaged by this decision and I'm keen to be involved in improving rural health provision.

The District Council is considering the reopening of the Stratford to Honeybourne rail link in partnership with Gloucestershire, Worcestershire and other interested parties. This would enable up to 10,000 houses to be built at a new settlement at Long Marston Airfield, taking much of the pressure away from building new housing around Shipston. At the meeting to discuss the proposed rail link, the MD of a company developing electric 'tram-trains' gave a talk about their advantages. They cost around one third of normal rail, have rechargeable batteries and can use the existing train track, making construction quicker and less disruptive. They can run on ordinary rail as well as light rail and the same train could travel from Leamington via Stratford to Worcester calling at Long Marston and other proposed new settlements. A tram-train could provide an easy first step to a more sustainable transport network for the district.

# **Medications safety**



We often hear comments from patients like "Why do I need to have a blood test? I'm going to be on this medicine for the rest of my life..."

This is an understandable question. Medications are often prescribed to treat the symptoms of a long term condition, for example, by reducing blood pressure. Evidence tells us that our bodies can react to medicines differently over time, and as such a medication that has been prescribed for many years may start to have a different impact. There is not always a reason why things change, we just know they can, and therefore we ask our patients to come and have checks regularly so we are aware if there are any changes and can react before any harm occurs.

The most common types of checks we ask people to have are blood tests, for example checking kidney or liver function; and blood pressure readings. We might also ask about your pulse rate, and height and weight (the latter is usually used to calculate the risk of harm from a medicine as opposed to the medicine having a direct impact on your height!). The majority of medicines need only be monitored on an annual basis, although some do need more frequent monitoring.

When a medicine is prescribed, the prescriber has a duty of care to ensure that the medicine is still the right one for you, and that it is doing the job we expect it to do.
