There will be a D-Day 80 service of commemoration on Thursday 6th June 2024, 1pm at the gyratory.

A beacon to commemorate the 80th anniversary of D-Day will be lit on the evening of Thursday 6th June at Whaddon Farm, Darlingscote Road.

Gates open 7.30pm. The beacon will be lit at 9.15pm. Come along for 1940s music and Royal British Legion merchandise stall. There will be a collection for the First Responders. Please bring some cash - and a torch! All welcome.


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Dear Shipston,

A word with our new Mayor, John Dinnie

How long have you been part of the Town Council?

About five years. I initially joined the planning working group after the completion of the Neighbourhood Plan and am very interested in ensuring its implementation. I have also been on the finance, staffing and heritage and leisure working groups.


What brought you to Shipston?

We needed a home large enough for our family: four children and my father. We moved here 22 years ago, and my children went to Kineton High School. I trained as a production engineer and worked in the area for the Society of Motor Manufacturers and Traders, also offering consultancy in continuous improvement.

What would you like to achieve in your year as Mayor?

I'd like to see in-patient beds at the Ellen Badger Hospital. Finally we are getting meetings with the health trust and there will be a public meeting on 18th June. I would also like to see the Badger Valley children's centre on Tileman's Lane be revived to its full potential, in order to offer support during the vital early years. Did you know 17 per cent of children in Shipston Central and West are living in poverty? I also would love to see provision of education for young people past the age of 16 in the town, in the form of a community college. Those are the big aims. I'm also going to encourage those living on the town's new estates to form residents' associations - they can be an effective way of sorting problems and making things happen.

Meet the new town councillors **Ethan Liddell**



At 23, Ethan is definitely one of our youngest-ever councillors! He put himself forward only a few weeks after arriving in the town to become the assistant manager of The Lazy Pug. He is no stranger to the county, having lived and worked in Kenilworth and Leamington Spa. A former member of the Youth Parliament and a politics graduate, Ethan has previously worked with Warwickshire County Council,

Previously a resident of the town, he moved back to Shipston three years ago and very much feels part of the community. 'There are lots of great events here, but I think there are opportunities to bring even more buzz, for example by marketing the town to improve tourism.' He is interested in

building stronger links between the Council and the town's businesses.

Thanks to SAFAG

New Mayor John Dinnie is the co-chair of the town council's environment and flood action working group and wanted to set out his gratitude for the work that has gone in to preventing flooding in



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town. The Town Council would like to record its thanks for the work of the SAFAG volunteers, with a special thanks to all the landowners and farmers who agree to multiple interventions on their land and in some cases contribute to the costs of the works for the benefit of downstream communities.

The Shipston Area Flood Action Group is a group of volunteers who have been responsible for the installation of nearly a thousand Natural Flood Management Measures. These measures consist of leaky barriers, ponds, wetlands, and tree planting throughout the Upper Stour Catchment Area. They hold back water in the streams and brooks and slow the flow, alleviating flooding. Flooding this winter has been held at or just above three metres at the Shipston gauge. There have been five three-metre events this winter. At three metres we have flooding in the riverside car parks and The Mill and No1 Mill Street are pumping their basements. But no water is flowing down Church Street. The power of the water has, however, damaged some of the interventions. They will need repair and maintenance. SAFAG is actively seeking volunteers to help with the inspection and maintenance of this infrastructure.

So, if you can help by occasionally visiting a section of stream or helping a team with a maintenance task then please let John know.

As well as your prescription medication, we encourage you to think about first aid basics, such as paracetamol, indigestion tablets and antihistamines.

Travel vaccinations

Please think ahead to any vaccinations you may need. Some vaccines require a number of doses at least a month apart. The practice offers a travel health service. We ask that you complete a travel risk assessment form (available from reception or on our website) 12 weeks before you travel. When you return this, we will book you a slot for it to be assessed. Our nurse will then be able to advise you on vaccinations and book you in for these.

Beds for the Badger - Public Meeting

18th June 7pm - Townsend Hall

On 26th May 2023, South Warwickshire University NHS Foundation Trust (SWUFT) issued a press statement to say that the inpatient beds that had been temporarily removed from the Ellen Badger Hospital would not return to Shipston. They would remain located in Leamington Spa.

A mass meeting in Townsend Hall and two protest marches made the residents' position clear. Both Warwickshire County Council and Stratford District Councils' overview and scrutiny committees insisted on public consultation.

On 19th July 2023, the Coventry and Warwickshire Integrated Care Board (CWICB) allowed nine months to prepare a business case for Public Consultation.

That time is now up.

The residents of Shipston and the surrounding area now request an explanation of progress towards that public consultation at a public meeting in the Townsend Hall to which both SWUFT and CWICB are invited.

Sharing knowledge

The Mayor and town councillors, together with the chair and trustees of the League of Friends of Shipstonon-Stour Hospitals, met on 27 April to hear how the community of Bishops Castle and surrounding area had campaigned successfully



to obtain agreement to reopen their Community Hospital inpatient beds from their area Hospital Trust, writes John Dinnie.

Josh Dickin, the Mayor of the Shropshire town, above, left with John Dinnie, explained how the residents of Bishops Castle, like us, were starting to believe that nothing could be done about the removal of inpatient beds from their local hospital. They, like us, held a public meeting. They, like us, were promised public consultation. Their community then took the decisive step to take control of that public consultation and make sure it was fair. The community formed a powerful local committee, endorsed by, but independent of, the town council. Two councillors were on the steering group. This became the 'Save Our Beds' campaign.

The committee then organised fundraising events, including an 18mile bed push, to provide a fighting fund and commenced serious negotiations with the area Hospital Trust. They, like us, initially met with a hostile and dismissive response from the Trust. They, like us, were suspicious that there were ulterior motives in play. The Trust came to recognise that the community were not going to settle for second best and were determined to work constructively with the Trust to achieve community goals. The Committee and Trust worked together on progressively resolving each of the objections that were raised. This resulted in the agreement to re-open inpatient beds.

There is sufficient strength of local feeling in Shipston on Stour and the surrounding area to achieve what Bishops Castle did. There is clear injustice in South Warwickshire University Foundation Trust's proposal. Both the Stratford District Council Overview and Scrutiny Committee and the Warwickshire County Council Adult Social Care and Health Overview and Scrutiny Committee have insisted on full public consultation. And, we have a promise by the Coventry and Warwickshire Integrated Care Board to hold an independent public consultation. However, that consultation will not be fair unless our community makes it so.

Leslie John Sutton

Continuing our series commemorating the lives of the Shipston fallen on the anniversaries of their deaths.

Born on 26th November 1924, Leslie was the son of Charles and Nellie Elizabeth Sutton of Shipston-on-Stour.

Leslie was enrolled into the Infants School on 28th November 1927, just after his

third birthday. At the time the family were living in Station Road. On 30th August 1932 Leslie moved up to the Boys School, leaving for full time employment on 22nd December 1938. The 1939 census records Charles as a timber carter.

In Leslie's class, both in the Infants and the Boys School, was Gus Clifford who also served in the Fleet Air Arm and died in April 1943. Joining the FAA in December 1942, Leslie underwent his training in Canada and on his return was posted to RNAS Fearn in Easter Ross, Scotland. HMS Owl, based at RNAS Fearn, was home to 828 Squadron, which flew the submarine-hunting Fairey Barracuda Torpedo Bombers.

Leslie was killed in a flying accident on 7th June 1944. He was acting as a TAG (Telegraphist-Air Gunner) in Barracuda DP985 of 828 Squadron when it collided in mid-air with another plane from the same Squadron. At the time of the accident, the planes were getting back into formation ten miles out into the Moray Firth, after completing a torpedo-dropping exercise. Being so far out to sea, Leslie's body, along with those of the other men. was never recovered.

FAA/FX 96096 Leading Airman Leslie Sutton is commemorated on the Fleet Air Arm Memorial at Lee-on-Solent, Hampshire, which lists the 1,400 men killed during WW2 who have no known grave. He is also remembered on the town war memorial.

Boxing clever

Rowena Webb writes: Thanks to the Police and Crime Commissioner's funding scheme, Stour Health and Wellbeing Partnership (SHWP) is able to offer a new activity aimed solely at the younger members of Shipston and the surrounding villages. We will be hosting a free weekly boxercise class in the Townsend Hall. The SHWP have been able to trial this in the High School for a number of weeks now and will continue to until the summer holidays. If you have a young person in Year 9, ask them about it.

Boxercise is a fun, non-combative form of exercise that is great for fitness, coordination and combatting stress. It's based on the principles of boxing training, but you won't come home with a black eye! It really is suitable for all. No prior training or level of fitness

We will provide simple refreshments after the class and once a month will follow the session with a workshop on topics relevant to young people such as How to navigate the Modern World, a mental health approach, Exam Anxiety and Road Safety Awareness. We will also have a MIND Practitioner on hand once a month to help with any issues facing young people. This will be in an informal setting, not one-to-one counselling.

We are open to all 14-18-year-olds but are separating the groups to allow the most people to benefit from this initiative. The 14-16-year-old classes will run every two weeks starting on 6th June, and 16-18-year-old classes start from 13th June. Boxercise is from 5-6pm and there will be a monthly workshop from 6-7pm, also in the Townsend Hall.

Classes are free to all, but spaces are limited so need to be booked in advance. We have an online booking system https:// bookwhen.com/shwp88

What inspired Martin to bring the battles of the Roman invasion back to life? 'This seemed the perfect place,' he explained, 'We're near Meon Hill, the northern outpost of the Dubunni tribe and also close to the Fosse Way, built by

The crossed weapons look quite perilous, especially the Roman heavy-duty javelin for close combat. Are there many injuries during re-enactment battles? 'Well,' admits Martin, 'there is the occasional mishap, but remember we have much training before entering the fray and know how to avoid injury.'




Hockey Tournament, the South Warwickshire Tennis Slams and the English Schools County Athletics Tournament. We are proud of how they have all represented our school.




Singing at Shipston Lodge

Probus enjoys rubbish

Simon Randall, a retired solicitor, takes an interest in other people's rubbish! Passing a skip filled with material thrown out from some local offices, incredibly



he rescued 40 letters dated 1660 to 1664, written by people who had lived through the period of the English Civil War (1642-1651), including one from one of the most famous combatants on the King's side, Prince Rupert. Stimulated by this fortuitous find, Simon has collected a fascinating range of original books and documents relating to the English Civil War.

This was the result of a clash of power between King Charles I and his Parliament. Like most wars, the causes were deep rooted and far from simple; basically, the King needed money. He believed that he was the representative of God on earth and as such could rule as he wished. Added to this his wife, Henrietta Maria, was a Catholic, at a time when Puritan England was deeply suspicious of Catholicism. Parliament, on the other hand, increasingly felt it had the right to share power. Charles' refusal to make concessions and the rise of Oliver Cromwell eventually led to the first pitched battle at nearby Edge Hill in which the Parliamentarians attempted to prevent the Royalists from getting to Oxford and on to London. Neither side gained a clear victory, partly because of the indiscipline of the Royalist cavalry under the command of Prince Rupert who chased a baggage train, taking him away from the main action.

As one might expect, hostilities were conducted by the written word as well as the sword. One such local word warrior was Peter Helyn, born in Burford. He was an outspoken Royalist and supporter of the Church of England, condemning the Puritans. As a result, he lost his property and had to go into hiding. Marchmont Needham, also born in Burford, wrote propaganda for both sides, first Charles I, then Cromwell, then Charles II, gaining praise as the 'world's first great journalist.'

Strategically the Cotswold Hills span a line dominating transport routes between London and the north; they provided fertile land not only for food for troops but materials such as wood and wool. Large prosperous houses with their associated workers were a source of troop recruitment.

By 1644, Oliver Cromwell had reorganised the parliamentary army and engaged in sieges at Gloucester and Bristol with a skirmish at Cirencester. In 1646 the last major battle was fought just outside Stow on the Wold, ending in a desperate running retreat of Royalists through the streets of the town. St Edward's Church, Stow-on-the-Wold, has a monument to Sir Hastings Keyte, who was a Royalist captain killed in the battle, aged just twenty-three. In the aftermath of the war, the King was captured and beheaded.

It is estimated that one in four English fought in the civil war and 4.5% of the population died (the same proportion as in World War One). Many of the great estates such as Charlecote House had to pay reparations for supporting the losing side. Cromwell and Parliament ruled until Charles II was eventually restored to the throne of England in 1660.

Astronomical Society News

The Stratford upon Avon Astronomical Society meets every first and third Tuesdays at 8pm at Alderminster Village Hall. The speaker on 18th June 2024 will be Adam McMaster from the Open University, with a talk entitled 'Weird Stars – a round up of some of the more unusual types of stars.'

Adrian Wakeham, writes about safe solar observing.

There are ways of observing the sun, without expensive filters, by projecting the image on to a white background. One way is to mount binoculars onto a tripod, block off one eyepiece, and point them to the sun (Please NEVER be tempted to look at the sun through binoculars!) When correctly aligned an image will appear on the white background. Sunspots and filaments should be visible. (This method should also work on a full moon).

Another method is to make a pinhole camera, using a cereal packet, some white card and tin foil. The foil is kept taut with a pinhole in it, which projects the image of the sun onto the other end of the cereal packet. For more details, come to club night and I'll show you one.

My favourite is a colander! Especially during an eclipse. Just focus the beams of light onto a background. All the circles will appear as crescents during the eclipse. Again, with both the tinfoil or colander methods, do not look through the holes with your eye as you can seriously damage your eyesight, but use the holes to project the image.

One of the pleasures of being a long-term member of the Music Society is that from time to time you see returning musicians. When that musician is a child who comes back several times as they grow up, you see their progression and maturity developing. It is a delight.

Finally, we heard Ernest Bloch's three pieces which make up his From Jewish Life movements. These were played in the order Prayer, Supplication, Jewish Song. The cello reflects so well the emotions contained in these pieces and the audience could not fail to have been moved by the melancholy of the music which resonates so much in these troubled times. After some prolonged applause, the audience were treated to Vocalise by Rachmaninov, again a deeply emotional piece for cello and piano.

It was a pleasure to welcome George Wilkes back to Shipston, so ably supported by Charles Matthews on the piano. We look forward to reprising the evening in the future and of course to watching the career of this brilliant young musician.

Unidentified objects found surrounding town!

Residents of Shipston have reported sightings of unusual hanging objects appearing in local hedges

and trees, frequently along popular local walks in the Shipston

'We were walking recently along the Hanson Track, just to enjoy the blossom and birdsong, when my youngest daughter Roseberry asked me about a strange fruit hanging from an overhanging blackthorn bush,' explained Mrs Daisy Cutter. 'On inspection it appeared to be large and semi-translucent, may be a fruit of some kind. I immediately thought this might be moth cocoon, perhaps that of the largest moth known in the UK, the Blue Underwing?'

Local ecologist (retired) Sir Sandy Heath commented, 'Similar objects have been found in Cornmill Meadows and reports are widespread from many parts of the UK. One theory is that trees and bushes are showing signs of stress due to climate change. The recent increase in rainfall and temperature has so disrupted

years they won.

It was encouraging to hear that the Town Council met with the mayor of Bishops Castle, a market town similar to Shipston, to discuss how they saved the community beds at their hospital. I regard myself as always available - but busy - and I I spent some of a lovely spring afternoon last month with the Friends of Cornmill Meadow Nature Reserve, helping to weed and care for the 50 fruit trees that were planted for the community orchard. Looking around the meadow, you appreciate what a wonderful asset it is for the town. For those that have not ventured there yet, you can make it the start of a circular walk:

> To enter Cornmill Meadows, take the kissing gate just after the last house on London Road and walk through the meadows and along a beautiful section of the River Stour. Then take a permissive path through a kissing gate along the Stour to the footbridge at Barcheston. There is a footpath along the other side of the Stour back to Shipston.

Following Shipston Great Big Green Week which starts on 8th June, Stratford District Council is hosting a Climate Assembly on July 9th at the SDC Council Chambers to mark five years since Stratford declared I am holding regular surgeries – come and have a a Climate Emergency. There will be workshops in all areas the council has influence over: energy, business, biodiversity (including river health), waste, community action, food, adaptation, and transport (including active travel). More details to come.

> > the normal fruiting season that unusually large and deformed fruit is forming on our native bushes. We have sent samples for analysis. Until we get results it advisable not to try to eat them, especially by young children!'

> > Another view has been expressed by local historian Old Tom, also known as 'Tom Tell Truth.' 'We know that walks such as Hanson Hill and Cornmill Meadows are ancient, dating back to Saxon times and beyond, when history and myth became intertwined. It may be no coincidence that these objects seem to occur along ancient tracks and a clue may be found in old unwritten tales of Shipston, handed down by father to son. They tell of ancient times when God-fearing yeomen hurried home after a hard day in the field, for fear of meeting the wandering bands known as the 'Faecal Dog People' or FDP for short. The FDP were a furtive folk, frequently aggressive, spreading disease and pestilence throughout the land. They hung their filthy poison as a gift to ancient Gods but only succeeded in contaminating many a yeoman's furlong. Maybe the descendants of the FDP secretly continue to practise their ancient fetid ways.'

> > Old Tom then issued a stern warning, 'if you are a follower of the primitive cast of Faecal Dog People then take care! Revoke your ways! Your neighbours are watching!'
