Remember Remembrance Day

Ahead of Remembrance Day Shipston Brownies invited the Royal British Legion members to talk about its meaning and origins. Richard Adams, supported by Chairman Alex Black, and Secretary Alistair Watkins, guided the pack through the history and significance of Remembrance. 'Their participation is a touching tribute to the values we hold dear as a community: respect, gratitude, and remembrance,' says Alistair Watkins. 'It ensures that the sacrifices of the past are never forgotten and that the lessons of history continue to resonate across generations.'



The Remembrance Sunday parade and service will take place on Sunday 9th November. Gathering on the High Street from 10am, the parade, led by the Town Band, will step off promptly at 10:45am to the War Memorial in Church Street, where wreaths will be laid, the names of the fallen will be read and the two-minute silence observed in remembrance of those who lost their lives in the service of their country. The service will continue at St Edmund's Church. It will not be live-streamed this year. After the formalities, all are warmly welcomed to join the RBL at The Horseshoe for a time of fellowship and reflection.

The occasion is coordinated by the Shipston branch of the Royal British Legion, working with the Town Council, local police, the Lions, St Edmund's Church, the Town Band and our dedicated bellringers. Look out for further details on social media as well as on the SRBL noticeboard in The Bury.

Note that temporary road closures will be in place from 9am-12.30pm. Please plan ahead and show appreciation to those marshalling the event and providing the logistics for the road closures.

Armistice Day on Tuesday 11th November will be marked with a ceremony at the Gyratory Memorial Garden. The community is invited to gather for a two-minute silence at 11am.

Poppy Appeal 2025

The Poppy Appeal's dedicated collectors will once again be out and about with a pop-up poppy shop in central Shipston, as well as door-



to-door collections in the surrounding villages, helping to raise vital funds that enable the RBL to continue its important work supporting veterans and their families. 'If you see one of our fabulous collectors, please greet them with a warm welcome,' says Rebecca Walters, the local organiser. 'And if you've already purchased your poppy, thank you! It really does make that difference.'

New developments at EBH



September was a relatively quiet month for mayoral events, but we attended the Evesham Mayor's Ball and while I was away walking the Welsh valleys, Jane was excited to have the opportunity to meet and greet Ben Miller at his Bookfest event. The High Sheriff of Warwickshire held an inspiring event at St Marys Church Warwick where a service was held to celebrate community diversity and volunteering. More recently, in October, I was invited to attend the 33rd Diwali festival of lights in Leamington where we watched some spectacular singing, dancing and musical acts perform for a huge crowd amassed in the parade. The Diwali lights were turned on, and it was a very inspiring night to be a part of.

I also had the pleasure of a meeting and tour of Shipston High School with headmaster Gavin Saunders. The investment in the school over recent years was evident to see and I was very impressed with how well-equipped the science labs and classrooms were. The students were particularly polite and keen to talk about their current studies. I was asked to visit to the school again to officially open the new MUGA pitch which looks stunning and will provide the school and the community with a valuable sporting resource for many years to come. Yes, I did ask about a sixth form, but it is not yet part of the school's longer term plans. I hope this may change, since our young adults currently need to leave our town in search of suitable further education and are at the mercy of growing transport costs.

Of course, not all news has been cheerful. The looming prospect of 3,000 new homes around our town continues to cast a shadow over Shipston. The Town Council has been meeting with developers to understand their plans, and we remain united in our opposition to such large-scale development. We are deeply concerned about the impact on our infrastructure, environment, and the unique character of our town. Unfortunately, we are also at the mercy of shifting government policies that increasingly favour developers. Rest assured, we will continue to advocate fiercely for our community: to the death if necessary!

On a brighter note, I'm thrilled to share progress on one of my chosen charities, Shipston Youth Club. The Council has been working closely with the club to secure a new building, and at our October meeting, councillors unanimously approved the procurement of a new modular facility to be located at the Hub. While planning approval is being finalised, preparations for groundworks are underway, and we hope to see the new building ready early next year. I'll be sharing updates on this project via my Mayor of Shipston Facebook page, so do follow along if you'd like to see the transformation unfold.

As I look ahead to the second half of my Mayoral year, I remain inspired by the spirit of Shipston. Our community is

what makes this town extraordinary. Thank you for your continued support, your good humour, and I look forward to writing to you again next month with more topical news and updates.

Town Council news

News from Shipston Town Council's October meeting

Environment and Flood Action

A quote from Shipston Flood Action Group to repair dams at Sutton Brook in Brailes was approved. It was agreed that should urgent work be required, Council can approve invoices once the work has been completed. Cllr Benjamin-Smith will now chair SAFAG and Cllr Barker will also join the group. The main focus for Cornmill Meadows in the coming season will be on making the entrance path accessible with the use of a new surface, costs for which are expected shortly and will be planned into next year's budget.

Planning

Tree work (crown lifting) at South Lynn House: no representation. Felling of a hawthorn at 7 Redwood Park was given no objection, with a 'two for one' condition to ensure new trees are planted. A side extension to 112 Hanson Avenue, and an upper floor on a single storey side extension at 11 Station Road were both deemed no representation. Cllr Howarth reported that the planning for the MUGA at the Hub has gone through, which, along with the school's new facility, will ensure that more Shipston teams can play in the town instead of having to go elsewhere. Amid discussions on likely raft of development applications, Cllr Booth will ask for a District planning officer to attend a Town Council meeting.

General purposes

The expenditure of £19,000 for guttering work on the Twin Chapels was approved and can be paid out of reserves. The next step will be to get the building into a position to be put into use.

Local Nature Action Plan

All streets have been surveyed and those without trees noted. The hedge surveying is continuing. Developers' obligations to provide and maintain green space for at least a year post-development were noted, and Cllr Passingham is helping ensure that dead trees are replaced. Cllr Booth is to meet with EBH and offer support for them to maintain the grounds.

Neighbourhood plan working group

Cllr Tesh reported that two residents have offered to join this working group. Cllr Hatch said some District Council funds will be made available to support such groups.

Councillors' reports

Councillors who attended the Food Festival and the Bookfest praised the organisers for these well-attended and successful events. Cllr Tesh met the neighbouring parish councils to discuss the possible Fell Mill development. Cllr Williams is trying to obtain cash counting machines from Lloyd's before it closes. Cllr H Kelly met the regional energy mitigation officer to explore energy-saving measures in New Clark House.

County Council

A full County Council meeting on 14th October is to discuss plans for the Unitary Authority, which is being supported by Reform and the Conservatives.

Open Forum

Members of the public making contributions included John Dinnie, who stated that the request that the Ellen Badger Hospital's 1992 building be made part of the town's retained estate has been turned down by Stratford District Council on the basis that it is now being used for purpose. Alice Free highlighted the SOS Shipston public meeting being held on 19th October and invited councillors to attend this non-political meeting. Richard Taylor from the Shipston Educational Charity, which was set up in 1825, reported that it had awarded £2,900 in grants to 25 applicants. It was noted that there were no applicants this year from Shipston High School. Tony Joint, representing Shipston Youth Club, came to emphasise that time was of the essence in terms of making decisions about the building.



A new Warm Hub has been started specifically for the winter months, following the success of the original Warm Hub. The new hub will be open every Monday morning 10am-12pm at the Ellen Badger Health and Wellbeing Hub. This group will be a welcoming space for anyone seeking companionship and support during the colder months. Visitors can look forward to a warm cuppa and friendly conversation. No need to book ahead, just drop in and enjoy the community atmosphere.

Toy Library

The Stour Toy Library will now also be based at the Ellen Badger Hub on Mondays from 11am-12pm, alongside its usual Thursday sessions at the same time. This move comes after a long period of volunteers transporting toys to and from the Scout Hut each week, a task that's now made easier with the permanent location at the Ellen Badger Hub. A huge thank you to the Shipston Toddler Stay and Play group for their assistance in getting to this point. For families with young children, the Stour Toy Library offers a great selection of toys, all available for borrowing. You can explore the full range of toys online at borrow.shwp.org.uk. From 6th November, HomeStart will be running a six-week PEEP (Parents Early Education Partnership) session for pre-school children at the Toy Library. Parents or guardians interested in securing a place should contact HomeStart directly for more information.

Bereavement cafe

In response to feedback from the community, Stour Health and Wellbeing Partnership, in collaboration with SWFT and Shipston Home Nursing (SHN), is launching a Bereavement cafe. This monthly group, starting on Tuesday, 4th November, will provide a safe space for those navigating grief and loss. The group will be facilitated by Shipston Home Nursing, whose team of experienced bereavement counsellors will

offer expert guidance. This is also a peer support group, where attendees will have the opportunity to share their experiences and offer support to one another.

We understand the importance of supporting each other through difficult times, and we hope this new group will provide comfort and connection for those in need. We've also received inquiries about a potential enquires group focused on palliative care and end-of-life preparation. If you're

Shipston Music Society

The first recital of the 2025/2026 season should have featured a harp and flute duo but unfortunately, they had to withdraw having been in an accident the previous day. Miraculously, Manon Browning, a young harpist, happened to be free and agreed to play.

Manon, originally from Cardiff, was principal harpist of South Wales Youth Orchestra, then studied at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama in London and gained First Class Honours, B. Mus. in 2017. She later gained Distinction in M.Music Performance the following year.

Her programme began with La Source, a famous piece for advanced flautists by Belgian virtuoso Hasselmans featuring lots of glissando passages to emulate the rippling water. Then followed Sonata in F# minor by Scarlatti and two Welsh folk songs. Next was Sarabande by Nino Rota, then Granada by Carlos Salzedo (1885-1961), a renowned French harpist, pianist, conductor and composer.

After refreshments, we stayed in Spain for the lively Fantasie No. 10 by Mudarra (1510-1580), then a complete contrast in Flow my Tears by John Dowland (1563-1626). Pearl Chertok's compositions often use jazz idioms – as in Around the Clock Suite from which we heard two very lively movements. The final piece was Impromptu by Gliere, a piece to send us home feeling extremely fortunate to have spent the evening in the company of Manon Browning – a delightful young lady of exceptional talent. We do hope she will come again!

Elgar birthplace visit

Shipston Music Society members and friends set off for a visit to the birthplace of the composer Sir Edward Elgar at Broadheath, near Malvern, where there is a new Visitor Centre and café. An introductory talk provided an insight into Elgar's love of the local area. There were instruments and many other artefacts on display and pianists were invited to play Elgar's piano! After a stroll around the garden, we were free to explore the small cottage where Elgar was born on 2nd June 1857 and imagine him sitting at his desk with his pen poised. There was much enthusiastic discussion during the return trip.

Magnificent autumn colours at Leasow Farm

It is just over 99 years since Henry Francis Harper, a Shipston auctioneer, acquired the land which fronts Brailes Road and Fell Mill Lane and runs down to the River Stour east of Mill Street and Church Street. Since then, it has been passed down through the generations to the present day. Before 1926 it was owned by the Hince family.

All the trees on the land were planted in the late 1980s and early 1990s to replace the wonderful 60 feet high elm trees that graced all the hedgerows but were devastated by Dutch elm disease. The land is now the responsibility of the younger and future generations of the Harper family, and long may it remain so.

What a pleasure to see these beautiful colours and what an asset to the environment and the locality. These many trees will enable the view to and from Brailes Hill to be seen clearly for numerous years to come.

Hedge care at Cornmill Meadows

In January 2023, one of the first tasks Cornmill Meadows volunteers got involved in was planting 900 small hedge shrubs and trees in a zigzag double row along the path from the London Road entrance towards the river. Over the years we hope this will grow into a dense hedgerow which will act as a natural green corridor for insects and small mammals such as the dormouse and brown hair-streak butterfly to move around in comparative safety.



New Hedge

Maintenance of the hedge is very important so that it can flourish in a healthy way. A few of the trees will be allowed to grow to normal height, but many will be pruned or laid in order to increase the density of the hedge at a low level. A good hedge should be shaped like a ^ so the base is the widest part, and have a border of other vegetation like nettles, cleavers and docks. Our new hedge will be carefully trimmed in a particular way to encourage a dense, bushy growth and then left for a few years before regular trimming is done.

One of the very old hedges at Cornmill Meadows has not been regularly maintained for many years and this year we are going to have it laid. This means that some trees and tall shrubs will have their stems or trunks partially cut through and then bent over to encourage new growth from the base and create a healthier hedge. Hedge-laying is an old skill practised originally to create a living stock-proof fence. Julius Caesar's army had a problem when their way was blocked by a laid hedge, so the skill goes back many centuries!



Fire prevention

Wayne Cooke, a retired Detective Inspector and now a Fire Prevention Officer, gave an informative and sometimes surprising talk at our September meeting.

Warwickshire Fire and Rescue Service (WFRS) have 17 fire stations, with 85% of firefighters being full time. They have mutual aid arrangements with other local fire services. WFRS's Safe and Well service provides home visits to eligible Warwickshire residents to advise on safety in the home. Topics covered include smoke alarms, evacuation procedures in an emergency, potential hazards and ways to reduce risk. If necessary, they will supply and fit smoke alarms with long lasting (10 years) batteries free of charge. To plug more than one item into a single socket, always use a fused extension bar rather than block adaptors which present more of a fire risk. In the event of a fire, if you are unable to get out of the building, stand by a front window, ideally in a lit room. Selected fire stations carry out electric blanket safety checks.


WFRS have two double-crewed vehicles providing hospital to home transport in core hours. This service is available from Warwick Hospital on referral by NHS staff. The vehicle will arrive within an hour and the crew will carry out a Safe and Well check in the home. WFRS give fire safety training in schools with the sessions tailored in accordance with the age of the students involved.

Full details of all services can be found on the Warwickshire County Council website or by telephoning 01926 466282.

Our meetings are completely free of charge. All will be welcome at 10am on Tuesday, 4th November for tea, coffee, biscuits. The formal meeting will begin with a short AGM followed by a talk on crime prevention. Clubs and societies Timothy considers RVW to be this country's greatest symphonist; he composed more symphonies (nine) than his friend Elgar

(two). From an early age he wanted to build a distinctive form of music, especially in the English choral tradition.

In 1893 RVW published his first set of intuitively 'English' songs and he was asked to compile a new English Hymnal. The result was popular favourites O Little Town of Bethlehem and He Who Would Valiant Be. On a visit to Paris he met Ravel, who influenced his setting of Houseman's poem On Wenlock Edge. Other attributes included Parlour Songs, to be performed in people's homes, including setting the words of Linden Lea to music.

RVW had married Adeline Fisher, but by the 1930s his wife had become ill and a recluse. He met Ursula Wood, a poet, who became his muse and they later married. The fifth and sixth symphonies followed, and with the outbreak of the second world war he composed film music for the war drama 49th Parallel, music for an opera Pilgrim's Progress, and later for the film Scott of the Antarctic. The coronation of Queen Elizabeth Il included his music, followed by the 8th and 9th symphonies and four last songs.

RVW refused all official recognition in the form of medals or knighthood. He died in 1958 leaving an undeniable legacy on English music. In Timothy's considered opinion he was our greatest composer.

Donations of good-quality books are always welcome. Unsold books are responsibly recycled, with some supporting literacy initiatives overseas.



In mid-October, I spent a genuinely lovely evening with the Shipston Business Group in The White Horse. The mood was upbeat and hopeful, these town centre retailers value being in Shipston. I quote: 'you only have to go to

other market towns to realise what we have in Shipston is unique'. I agree. Within 100 metres, you can get your watch mended, sell your Pokemon cards, buy some vinyl, and a birthday card, a curtain hook, refurbished garden tools, a preloved party outfit, dinner from the butcher's, vegetables from Evesham Vale, and even organise a funeral. Not to mention the lovely cafes, pubs, and amazing festivals that call Shipston their home. We must use these brilliant businesses or lose them.

By the time you read this, we will have had the public meeting about the influx of housing developers champing at the bit, having been given the green light by recent government changes in planning laws. They have the fields surrounding Shipston in their sights, and four planning applications have been submitted since June. It's still too early to guess whether any of them will be passed, but the planning officers are under financial pressure (due to possible claims from developers whose applications have been turned down) to up the rate of housebuilding in the district. Luckily Shipston, galvanised by the SOS campaign, has a very high rate of engagement in this process. Councillors on all levels are working hard to scrutinise and question all applications.

In stark contradiction to housebuilding on greenfield sites, we are being asked to contribute to the Local Nature Recovery Strategy: https://www.wcslnp.co.uk/Inrs. Local Nature Recovery Strategies (LNRS) are locally-led plans mandated by the Environment Act 2021. They aim to recover nature and improve the environment by focusing on actions with the greatest impact on nature recovery. The Warwickshire LNRS, in collaboration with the other 48 LNRS, will cover the whole of England to become a Nature Recovery Network across the country. This is even more important now, with all the housebuilding that is going to happen countrywide. Let's hope the land around Fell Mill can contribute to nature recovery into the future, rather than add to its decline.
