Shipston Neighbourhood Plan to proceed to referendum

Shipston's draft Neighbourhood Plan has been given the green light to proceed to a public referendum. Following close inspection by an independent examiner, and a six week consultation period, the plan is on course for a public vote in the early summer.

The inspector raised a number of points which the Neighbourhood Plan team is working through. As a result, some policies and graphics in the plan are being amended or removed to ensure the considerations are taken on board.

Following completion of the updates, Stratford District Council will begin the process of organising a public referendum. The referendum is a simple yes or no vote regarding whether the town should adopt the Neighbourhood Plan. All adults registered to vote within the town will have the opportunity to have their say.

If adopted, the Neighbourhood Plan will become a material consideration in any new development proposed for the town. In addition, the town will receive 25% of the new Community Infrastructure Levy funds sourced from future new developments of over ten houses built in the town.

Look out for a more detailed insight into the key policies in the Neighbourhood Plan which will be published in the Forum prior to the referendum.

services and key projects completed across the financial year, from April 2017 to March 2018. Many of the town's clubs and societies produce annual reports, and Shipston's district and county councillors will also be on hand to share a review from the wider area.

Residents are given the opportunity to ask questions and share their views on the services and decisions of the council.

Mayor, Dan Scobie, said: "All councils are required to hold an Annual Town Meeting. It's an important opportunity for residents to hold us to account and share their ideas, suggestions and views. I hope to see as many people in attendance as possible."

Mayor's column

Just when you think we've seen the worst of winter past, nature has its way of catching us out. In March we saw two significant weather events in Shipston, and as I write this there are warnings of another.

When the snow hit Shipston it really demonstrated how well the town pulls together. There were some fantastic stories circulating at the time. I understand that a nurse at the Ellen Badger stayed at the hospital overnight to ensure that there was nursing cover the following morning, an act that's both generous and shows huge commitment to patients. There were numerous reports of people clearing snow from the pathways of neighbours, and of shopping being done for those who are less mobile.

The thaw and rain that followed brought about a sharp increase in water levels. This shows how we need to continue to work to reduce the risks of flooding.

In amongst the snow I also learnt an important lesson. One of our neighbours is an older person who lives alone. She's still very active and has good friends so I presumed she would already have been asked about anything she needed. My wife called as we were in town anyway, and she did need a few things. It made me realise how important it is to ask if someone needs help.

Finally, I want to thank all the staff, workers, carers, and people of Shipston who work so well at these times. I know there are an awful lot of people that are very grateful for everything that's done.

Applications invited to help fund healthcare projects and equipment

Shipston residents battling ill health or injury are being urged to apply for financial assistance.

The call comes from the WPH Charitable Trust – a body of trustees made up of medical and non-medical professionals – which distributes some £250,000 of financial aid every year.



Individuals and organisations who work towards preventing, relieving and curing ill health are also among those urged to apply. Grants are also given to community and private projects in the area which aim to improve the lives or quality of life of people battling ill health or injury.

Recent grants include $\mathfrak{L}1,500$ for a mobility scooter for a 51-year-old mother who would otherwise find it difficult to get out and about, and $\mathfrak{L}1,500$ towards a project teaching people with mental health issues how to cook and eat healthily. Shipston residents are among those who have previously benefited from WPH Charitable Trust.

David Holt, Chairman of the WPH Charitable Trust trustees, said: "If you think you may qualify for assistance, the WPH Charitable Trust actively encourages you to get in touch."

News from Shipston Town Council's March meeting

Hot topics:

Floral display: Following concerns raised last month about the changes made to a flower bed on the Stratford Road, Shipston in Bloom has explained that the tubs are more appropriate for that area as water hadn't been reaching the plants properly in the past due to the bed's position. This will be discussed further at the next General Purposes Working Group meeting.

Lorry frustration: Marianne Westwood reported that lorries have been accessing the new Orbit site via Angela's Meadow despite promising not to do so. The Town Clerk will contact the developer and housing association.

Flooding: Councillors raised concerns about flooding caused by recent rainfall and melting snow which may have been exacerbated by work on development sites on the Campden Road. The council will seek advice from Stratford District Council as to the appropriate next steps.

No parking: Alison Henderson raised the no parking signs that have been put up around the Pettifer's Garage site. The signs don't look official and have alarmed people with threats to tow vehicles away. It is unclear who has put the signs up. The Town Clerk will check who owns the land and try to contact them.

Pothole reporting: A number of new potholes have appeared following recent bad weather. Residents are reminded that these can be reported online on the county council's fault reporting system. Once reported, repairs to the most serious potholes often take place within 24 hours. For details, visit https://www.warwickshire.gov.uk/potholes

Late buses: County councillor, Jo Barker, will look into reports of the late running of the 906 bus following a complaint raised by Jackie Warner.

Campaigning for Shipston:

Neighbourhood Plan: The Inspector has recommended that the Neighbourhood Plan proceeds to referendum (see page 1). The council has set aside up to £1500 to cover all remaining costs to take the plan to referendum stage.

Progress on the Crest Nicholson site: The Town Council will decline ownership of open space on the Crest Nicholson

site (Campden Road South, adjacent to Oldbutt Road) as it would be an additional cost to the council to maintain. Councillors have recommended that a path be installed to link the new site to existing developments and will look into ways to ensure boundaries are maintained.



Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) wish list: Marianne Westwood has begun to put together a wish list of projects the CIL money could be used to fund. CIL replaces s106 as the system used to secure money from developers to mitigate the impact of new housing on a local area. The CIL wish list is designed to capture large scale projects the town may wish to pursue in the long term. No decisions will be made about individual projects until funds become available.

Car park report: Shipston Town Council has formally adopted the parking survey. In the absence of specific parking provision, councillors will look to object to applications in the town centre, although each will be judged on a case by case basis.

Support for SAFAG: Following the comprehensive report provided at last month's meeting, councillors have approved a grant of £5,000 to Shipston Area Flood Action Group to help fund some of the group's flood prevention work.

Town Council business:

Civic Service date announced: This year's Civic Service will take place at 3pm on 13th May 2018 at St Edmund's Church. All welcome.

Community Speedwatch update: The team is expecting to have access to the speedwatch equipment in July and will report results to the September town council meeting.

Churchyard repair: The Town Clerk is looking into costs to repair the Churchyard wall.

Shipston Award Guidelines: The Communications Working Group has updated the guidance for the Shipston Award which states that the award is intended to be awarded to an individual or organisation for exceptional services to the community of Shipston. These are likely to be of a voluntary, not-for-profit, or charitable nature.

Heritage Centre funding application considered

In her role as temporary chair of the Heritage, Amenities and Leisure Projects working Group, Marianne Westwood has begun looking into a possible application for European funding to pay for a new heritage centre in Shipston. The centre could be based at the former council offices and would house the artefacts from the current Shipston Museum (such as those pictured), as well as providing additional activities and heritage assets for the town and visitors.

Although there was a huge amount of support for the proposed scheme, concerns have been raised about its long term viability and the role of the town council in maintaining any new facility.

In recognition of the tight deadline set to apply for European funding, the HALP working group will continue to work on the application and associated proposals with a view to presenting a robust plan at an extra meeting of Shipston Town Council on 23 April.

Shipston Wool Fair celebrates its 10th Anniversary with an extra dose of farming fun

This year marks the 10th Anniversary of the Shipston Wool Fair. For those of you who don't know, this historic event was resurrected in 2009 after a lapse of around 150 years.

To mark the 10th Anniversary, a special Wool Fair Farm Day at Lower Clopton Farm, Lower Quinton, will be held on the 5th of May as a prelude to the Wool Fair itself (occurring as normal on Bank Holiday Monday 28th May).

Shipston WI

The March meeting of Shipston Women's Institute was well attended to hear Alan Godfrey talk on the history of the postal service in Great INSPIRING WOMEN Britain with particular reference to Warwickshire.



LEGION

A postal service was set up under Henry VIII but this was for royal use only. Elizabeth I refined her father's system by establishing postal stations on major roads and this was available to the populace (if they could afford it). Charles I organised a public post with self-charges, and the Commonwealth carried on this system but all income went to the State. It was left to Charles II to establish the General Post Office and introduce postmarks giving the date of despatch.

As roads improved in the 17th century, the postal service expanded and became more efficient. Mail coaches carried passengers as well as post and were exempt from toll charges. In 1720 Shipston had its own Post Office. Post Offices tended to be in inns because they had the necessary stabling and accommodation.

In 1839 Rowland Hill introduced a 4d uniform cost, and one year later, a 1d payment when postage stamps were introduced and the cost of postage was born by the sender. This was the beginning of the Royal Mail as we know it today.

The introduction of railways led to radical changes and in 1846 coaches ceased to be used. Anthony Trollope introduced pillar boxes and WWI saw the introduction of women in the Post Office. Today the Post Office seems to have come full circle - dedicated Post Offices are closing and being moved into shops as once they were in inns. The internet is usurping the letter but the meeting agreed that there is nothing nicer than receiving a handwritten letter!

The next Branch meeting will be on 4th April at the Catholic Church Hall at 7pm when Paul Betterton will be talking about the History of Needlemaking in Redditch. This will be followed by a visit to the Redditch needle museum. New members welcome.

Farewell to Malcolm Temple, Townsend Hall Trustee

The Trustees at the Townsend Hall were saddened to learn of the untimely death of their Treasurer Malcolm Temple. Malcolm joined the board of Trustees in 2015, and quickly made his mark. His contribution was always positive.



The 'experience of life' is an expression you could use in describing Malcolm. Born and educated in Newport, Malcolm from an early age showed a great interest in football and music. His long and varied career took in a spell as a 'roadie' for Jerry Lee Lewis in America, testament to his great interest in music of that era, and he was also an excellent drummer.

Malcolm became Financial Director and later Chairman of the Gloucester Warwickshire Steam Railway. With the help of volunteer colleagues, the enthusiast-run railway raised over £1m to help restore the railway line following two major embankment collapses, together with the renovation of the spectacular Stanway Viaduct which was re-opened for the first time since 1976 to coincide with the 175th Anniversary of the Great Western Railway.

Football was another of Malcolm's interests. He was a Newport County AFC fan from the 1960's throughout the non-league and league days. Malcolm first joined the Newport AFC board in 1994 and became Chairman in August 2016. He shall be missed by all his friends and colleagues at the Townsend Hall.

No outsiders in our school

We are teaching children at Shipston Primary School to recognise and celebrate difference and diversity through our Personal, Social and Health Education (PSHE) curriculum. This supports our work on

All ages are welcome. We have two categories - solo or group - but all the acts are scored on a number of categories so all ages and experience levels have a fair chance of winning.


The prize is to perform on the main stage on the Last Night of the Proms plus £100 for the Group winner and £50 for the solo winner.

Readers' Letters

Letter from David Gunn

Our family gives a fair bit to charities of our choice each year and my wife works particularly enthusiastically for a local charity.

This morning, in Shipston's small High Street, there were no less than three collectors for charities in addition to the seller of The Big Issue who seems to be an almost permanent fixture.

This does not concern me on a personal basis but I worry for the more timid members of our community who may feel menaced into giving money that they can possibly ill afford. I wonder what other people's point of view about this situation might be?

59207 Private GEORGE PERRINS ADAMS

Born on the 22nd April 1889, George was the eldest son of Thomas Henry and Sarah Martha Adams, of Church Street, Shipston-on-Stour. In 1891 the census shows that the family were still living in Church Street and that Thomas was working for himself as a Grocer.

On the 5th March 1894, George was enrolled into Class 3 of the Infants School and on the 1st July 1896 George moved up to the Senior School. In the 1901 census the family are shown as living on the corner of Sheep Street and Church Street.

On joining the Army in Birmingham, George was posted to the 25th (Service) Battalion (2nd Tyneside Irish) Northumberland Fusiliers who arrived in France during January 1916. Later that year they fought on the Somme where they suffered casualties so heavy that the whole brigade was pulled out of the line. In 1917 they fought at Arras and in the Spring of 1918 were back on the Somme.

On 21st March 1918 the Germans launched their Spring Offensive and, outnumbering the British by nearly three-to-one, punched a hole right through the British front line. Unusually they also concentrated their artillery on the British rear areas, stopping reinforcements coming forward and wrecking communications. For four hours they rained down a mixture of gas and high explosive shells and the British were in disarray along most of their front. The 34th Division however, of which George's Battalion was a part, had made plans for their own attack and they executed these and held on. At 11:50am patrols were being sent from the 25th Northumberland Fusiliers, who had been in reserve, to find out

what was going on in the chaos.

They found that the Division's right flank was completely exposed with the 22nd Northumberlands out on their own and a company of the 25th Battalion was sent up to support their Regimental colleagues by forming a defensive flank. The three remaining companies of the 25th Northumberlands were moved to the south and formed a line facing southwest. As soon as they crested a ridge of land known as the Hog's Back they came under heavy fire from a huge number of enemy troops who were



outflanking them forcing them to retire rapidly. In doing so they incurred many casualties.

The following morning in very misty conditions the Germans continued their attack and the 25th Northumberlands lost several men as they withdrew further to avoid being surrounded. Over the two days the Division was pushed back nearly 5,000 yards and lost 212 men killed, 1,061 wounded and 1,906 missing, a total of 3,179 men. The Evesham Journal of the 11th May 1918 reported that Mr and Mrs Adams had been informed George was missing after the fighting.

George was killed on either the 21st or 22nd March 1918. His body was not recovered and he is commemorated on the Arras Memorial in the Faubourg d'Amiens Cemetery, Arras. He is remembered on both the Town and Adult School Memorials.

210085 Lance Corporal HAROLD EDGAR BRADLEY

Born on the 5th May 1892, Harold was the fourth son of Frederick and Harriet Bradley, Shipston-on-Stour. The records showing Harold entering the Infants School are missing, but it is assumed to be in 1897 as the Senior School register shows him moving up on the 12th July 1899.

The 1901 census lists the family as living in Station Road and just before his thirteenth birthday the School Registers show Harold leaving school on 20th April 1905.

Harold emigrated to Canada and, according to his Attestation Papers, lived at 43 Port Street, Brantford, Ontario. They also show that he was employed as a Clerk at the time of attesting on the 1st February 1916 at St Catherine's, Ontario. He is noted as being 5 ft 7 inches and to have had light brown hair and blue eyes. The Attestation Papers also show that he was in the 44th Regiment of the local Militia and had previously served in both the 38th and 19th Regiments. It was presumably in these units that he attained the rank of Company Serjeant Major as recorded on the Shipston-on-Stour War Memorial. Harold was posted to the 75th (Mississauga) Btn, Canadian Infantry (Central Ontario Regiment) of the Canadian Expeditionary Force who sailed for Liverpool in March 1916. After four months in England they moved to France, arriving on the 12th August and within a couple of days they were at the front.

Harold was killed at Arras, and whilst not named is thought to be one of two men killed on the night of the 29th/30th March 1918. The Battalion war diary simply reported:

The threatened Hun attack did not materialise this morning. We had two men killed and five wounded during the night.....

The Brantford Expositor of the 30th July 1918 ran the following report:

Company Sergt.-Major Harold Edgar Bradley has been reported killed in action on the



Western Front on March 30. Sergt.-Major Bradley enlisted October 1915, having tried four times to get into the service, and having his persistence finally rewarded. He was employed here for three years by the William Davies Company. In going over to France he reverted to the rank of private and was promoted to lance-corporal on the field. He left Canada with the 75th Battalion.

Harold is buried in Roclincourt Military Cemetery and is remembered on both the Town and Council School Memorials. He is also remembered in the Canadian Book of Remembrance held in the Memorial Chamber in the Peace Tower at the Canadian Houses of Parliament in Ottawa, Canada.

District Council update

Council Tax

It's that time of year. By the time you read this column, the annual Council Tax bills will have dropped through your letter box. The District Council has kept its promise to limit its small element of the Council Tax increase to 1%. Larger increases from the County Council and the Police and Crime Commissioner may dwarf our real attempt to serve



you efficiently, but please presume that all those included in the single bill have tried to keep down the charges levied on you, the general public.

Take time to read the small pamphlet that is included in the envelope. It contains a lot of useful information and replaces several explanatory leaflets that used to be sent out. It has been carefully put together by the communications office at Stratford and provides the background to our various budgets as well as important details of our refuse and recycling services.

Planning Policy

Our Supplementary Planning Guidance (SPG) for development at Long Marston Airfield has now been adopted, so developers now have clear guidance when preparing their planning applications.

Two other consultations now being assessed are the Development Requirements SPG that closes on 20 April and the Reserve Sites Allocations SPG that closed on 9 March. Both will be of interest to Shipston residents.

In the development requirements DPD, the Council is removing the automatic right for developers to presume that public car parks are available to make up for any deficiency in off street car parks in their planning applications. I believe public car parks should be there for shoppers and those who work in the town.

With the increasing Government demand for new housing, the Site Allocations SPD could well include a greater volume of new housing in Shipston. Don't shoot the messenger, but watch this space.

At the moment I am working on the bus service - I probably ought to learn to drive one as a shortage of drivers is blamed for the lax adherence to the timetable. I have had a lot of worrying calls about the length of time Orbit tenants are waiting for repairs - to loos, heating and water. I am also trying to help with the proposed Heritage Centre - as Marianne and others said at STC - people moving here as well as younger generations need to know where the town has come from. I suppose that is only fitting because we won't know where we are going otherwise.

When to use Urgent Care

The majority of our patients try hard to utilise NHS services appropriately. We encourage self-care for minor illnesses. There is information about common conditions on the NHS Choices website (https://www.nhs.uk/Conditions/Pages/hub. aspx), via the self-care forum, who provide a series of helpful fact sheets at http://www.selfcareforum.org/fact-sheets/ and local pharmacists are also a good source of advice.

When you need a bit more help our telephone triage service is available. During opening hours, a GP will aim to call you back within an hour to offer advice or assistance or offer you a same day appointment. When we are closed please call NHS 111.

On occasion, it is better to call 999 for an ambulance rather than us. Examples of emergencies are:

- Symptoms of a stroke
- Loss of consciousness
- Symptoms of a fit that are not stopping
- Persistent, severe chest pain
