Policing takes centre stage in Shipston following Co-Op raid

Shipston Town Council invited Police and Crime Commissioner, Philip Seccombe, to its March meeting, following the theft of the cashpoint from the Co-Op store. Councillors and members of the public were given the opportunity to put questions to the Commissioner, Inspector Dave Kettle and PC Craig Purcell.

Philip Seccombe explained that he had raised the police element of the council tax precept to its maximum level to fund 100 additional officers and police staff in Warwickshire, to be recruited over the next 12 months. The additional funding and resources will support a wide range of policing activities including safer neighbourhood teams, road and motorway officers, crime investigation and patrols.

Warwickshire Police is also setting up a new Rural Crime Team dedicated to tackling issues such as hare coursing,

theft and other crimes, with a focus on prevention. More funding is also being put into tackling domestic violence, modern slavery and child sexual exploitation.

Warwickshire Police has been working as part of a comprehensive alliance with West Mercia Police, which will end in October. Warwickshire Police is now in the process of looking at new ways of delivering services, including on a standalone basis, working with other forces and external organisations, a new collaboration with West Mercia, or a combination of these options. Mr Seccombe said: "We are rebuilding how we deliver services from the bottom up. This is likely to mean we become more responsive to Warwickshire residents and deliver a strengthened service overall."

Inspector Dave Kettle, who is responsible for 14 safer neighbourhood teams in South Warwickshire, provided a snapshot of the

demands facing the force. In the 48 hours prior to the council meeting, the force had received over 800 calls, made nearly 60 arrests and recorded over 200 crimes across the county.

Officers work closely with neighbouring police authorities to share information and track criminals.

When asked whether we should expect more crimes of the type experienced by the Co-Op store, the Inspector's view was that these

sorts of crimes would most likely remain rare but that we can all help the police by sharing information, letting officers know when something doesn't look right and by keeping each other informed to help prevent crime happening. Particular mention was made of the valuable role Neighbourhood Watch schemes can play in reducing the risk of crime.

Town Clerk, Georgina Beaumont, said: "The Town Council would like to thank Philip Seccombe and his officers for taking the time to talk to the town council and local residents. We are keen to work with the police to do what we can to reduce the risk of our residents becoming victims of crime."

Watch your speed, warns community team

Shipston's Community Speedwatch team has been out monitoring the speed of vehicles coming in and out of the town, using a speed gun which is shared with neighbouring villages.

The team has been monitoring speeds on Stratford Road and London Road, with a number of vehicles recorded travelling at speeds well over 40 miles per hour (62 mph in one case). Although the team cannot issue penalties, the number plates of all those exceeding the limit are provided to the Traffic Police, who take the necessary follow up action.



The community team is seeking to educate drivers about the importance of observing speed limits, and the data collected will provide evidence to press for other speed reduction measures.

Residents warned of Council Tax scams

Stratford-on-Avon District Council has issued a fraud warning after receiving reports from residents getting cold calls or texts about a Council Tax rebate from individuals who appear to work for the District Council. The text often contains phishing links, which direct the recipient to a website where they will be asked to provide personal data.

Cold callers claim to be from the District Council and try to gain bank details by saying residents are due a Council Tax refund as their account is showing a credit.

The District Council will never telephone, email or message to ask for a payment to release a Council Tax overpayment.

If you do receive an unsolicited call from someone claiming to be from the District Council, do not divulge bank or credit card details.

If you think your Council Tax account is in credit and/or that you are due a refund, please call the district council's Council Tax Team on 01789 260990.

News from Shipston Town Council's March meeting

Hot topics:

Asset library: It was suggested that the council creates a photographic record of assets which are important to the town, including items such as the stone trough on Telegraph Street and certain trees and other visually striking elements.

Gritty opportunity: Warwickshire Highways department has given the town council the opportunity to request additional routes which should be gritted.

Blooming marvellous: Councillors congratulated Shipston in Bloom on the amazing daffodil displays throughout the town.

Tackling Ioneliness and isolation: The council's representative on Shipston Medical Centre's Patient Participation Group updated councillors on efforts by the health service to build a better understanding of ways to tackle loneliness and isolation.

Band success: Councillors congratulated Shipston Town Band on reaching national final of the Brass Band Championships which will take place in Cheltenham.

Unsightly drainage: A resident has complained about the unattractive drainage system installed by Oldbutt Road. The council confirmed the site manager is looking into turfing the area and has suggested that shrubs be planted to hide the culverts.

Dying trees: A local resident pointed out that a number of the trees planted by Cala Homes to replace the hedges they removed have since died. The Town Clerk will raise this with the developer to request replacement trees.

Campaigning for Shipston:

Ridgeway open space: Council representatives recently met with law firm, Lodders, to discuss the implications for the council of taking on the Ridgeway open space from developers looking to build on part of the land. This is expected to be a detailed and complex issue and it will be important to keep track of all the queries along the way.



Planning: The town council is continuing to look at new ways to manage the number and complexity of planning applications which need to be reviewed by councillors.

Protecting the town boundary: Councillors voted to object to an extension on a property at Spring Hill, Stratford Road, as it would encroach existing agricultural land and cross the established town boundary as set out in the Neighbourhood Plan.

Town Council business:

Election packs: Election packs for those wishing to stand for election are now available from New Clark House. The deadline for completing and returning the forms to the Town Clerk is 26th March or they can be returned directly to the district council by 1st April. Those wishing to stand can choose to do so either in the Shipston North or South wards, regardless of where in Shipston they live. However, their nominations must come from people living in the ward they intend to represent.

Replacing equipment: The General Purposes Working Group will seek three quotes to replace the water bowser used by the town gardeners and Shipston in Bloom to water the town's borders and pots. The group will also look into whether hiring one would be more cost efficient.

Litter picking group still going strong eight years on

This year is the eighth anniversary of the Shipston Litter Picking group, which launched in March 2011 as part of the town council's 'Proud of My Town' campaign. Since then, the group has met monthly to give the town an extra tidy up, enhancing the cleansing work done by the town council's contractors on weekdays.

The core group is still going strong and meets on the first Saturday each month at New Clark House (subject to weather conditions), often joined by other residents all keen to help keep Shipston looking its best. Over the years the



group has noticed a real reduction in litter and by enhancing the

existing street cleaning services by the council contractors, they provide a valuable but often overlooked service to the town.

The group's organiser, Fay Ivens, said, "we are a friendly bunch and have met some lovely people during our litter picking mornings. Equipment and refreshments are provided and it is a fun and rewarding way to do something for the community. We welcome anyone who would like to come along and join us at our next litter pick on Saturday 6th April at 10am".


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Calling all musical maestros – the Proms Fame Contest is open for entries

I've been attending the Youth Club for a few years now and I am still really enjoying it. Time out of the weekly grind to kick back, socialise and have fun. There's so much to do! No danger of being bored. Youth Club is beneficial to me as it helps to widen my contacts – we meet young people and adults all of whom are different.



The Shipston Youth Club workers are fantastic – so much energy and enthusiasm. Always ready to help, guide and advise, with a friendly face and a listening ear – we know that we will never be judged on what is discussed, no matter how small the problem may be.

Guests are often invited to show off their skills, for example a lady comes in to knit. Shows members what to do, teaches and has an unbelievable amount of patience as the wool falls off the needles for the 50th time – not joking. The people from the community who come in, bridge the generation gap. The young will listen to their elders, which allows them to show a lot of consideration and respect, and the older generation can see that teens are not all as portrayed in the media.

Youth club is self-funding so members are invited to think of fundraising ideas, some are very out there - but still fun to hear. A car wash in the summer can be a good choice; bring your parents, grandparents, next door neighbours - chuck in a cake and you'll be inundated. Money raised is ploughed back into the club for essentials. The biggest event is XFEST, a day of activities for children/adolescents, which is completely free! XFEST allows everyone to take part in the activities, some of which some children may otherwise never have the chance to experience.

The youth club encourages teens to think for themselves, overcome challenges while increasing their confidence, shapes their personal and interpersonal skills and inspires a 'have a go' attitude. It even gets you out of the house from under your mum's feet – what's not to like? Rated out of 10? An 11.

All youth clubs need good leaders-who knows one day you may even become one yourself.... I can recommend a fab youth club.

X-fest is back

Run every 2nd year, XFest 2019 will be the Youth Club's fifth festival. Taking place on Saturday 15th June, the event is free to attend and relies entirely on donations and grants to take place.

Providing activities and events for Shipston's young people is vital and the Youth Club Committee is keen to ensure today's young people feel as much a part of Shipston as us older folks do! The XFest is one way of giving something to young people and their families, and promoting the activities available at the club.


Shipston's Calendar – key dates for your diary





Shipston Primary School

Marathon kids

Shipston Primary School is unlocking our children's potential with Marathon Kids by enjoying all the benefits of physical activity through running on a regular basis. Marathon Kids aims to give school children the opportunity to complete a marathon (26 miles or 42.2km) throughout the course of the school year by running laps of a course once or twice a week at playtimes and lunchtimes. The concept is based on personal achievement rather than competition - this encourages all children from Reception to Year 6, regardless of fitness ability, to take part by running as much or as little as they choose.

Our Year 5 Marathon Kids Ambassadors support the programme by handing out elastic bands, recording the number of laps and passing the information onto Miss Mann, who enters the information into our digital tracking system which converts laps into distance. Certificates are presented



in Achievement Assembly when children have reached 10km, 20km, 30km and a full marathon.

Milestones - Finding The Way

The Townsend Hall was packed for an illustrated presentation by Mike Buxton and Robert Coldicott.



In 1555 Shipston and the country in general had very poor roads and goods were moved mainly by packhorses. Each parish had sketchy responsibility for road maintenance. The 1706 Turnpike Act led to an improved situation but with tolls for travellers.

By 1729 we had a Stratford-upon-Avon to Shipstonon-Stour to Hockcliffe turnpike road in operation and we still see the evidence of toll houses as we approach the town. There is evidence that Sir George Philips became incensed at seeing more local "hoi polloi" on the popular turnpike from his mansion windows and ordered the immediate diversion of the improved road into the valley to remove it from his sight, without needing planning approval.

With ever more movement, came the need for directions and simple milestones. These worked well to direct people on horseback or simple carts as they bumped over the potholes from village to village. (No adverse comments please). Around 1845 some cast iron, 8 feet tall mileposts were installed between Long Compton and Newbold. Six have survived to this day, having been recently restored by Lottery Funds and carefully re-installed along the main road as far as possible in their original positions. In Shipston we have a milepost ironically directly opposite the computer shop to combine past and present. By the mid-19th Century the journey of 125 miles from Marble Arch in London to Henley- in-Arden took 12 hours at an average speed of 11mph!

A Badger's Eye View by Bryan Stoten

Last month the League's Board were discussing how to strengthen the Ellen Badger as more than just an inpatient service. In our "affluent" county a quarter of our schoolchildren eat no breakfast, overall measures of health and life expectancy show Warwickshire as only marginally better than the UK average while in national measures of "happiness" the county comes 128/142 across England. Why, I wonder?

Fifteen years ago a study on funding the NHS identified that a "fully engaged" population - where life expectancy was 81.6 years for men and 85.5 years for women – would by 2023 require 2% less of GDP. That is a lot of money!

In practice, current life expectancy is 79.2% for men and 82.9% for women, and the "fully engaged" future remains a long way off. But the good news is that we do now know what makes a difference: fewer smokers (and we have achieved that), more exercise, better diets, responsible drinking and safer, healthier environments. A lot of that depends on better, available, health information, taxes to encourage better health choices and positive health offers such as exercise on prescription, nutrition "coaching" - see Weight Watchers - and peer support such as Shipston's visual impairment group, dementia cafes and diabetes UK support services.

We think we can put the 'Badger' at the heart of those developments, and suggestions from all who use and know the 'Badger' would be really welcome - we want to get as many ideas as possible. The band was awarded first prize and Darran Wheeler on Flugel Horn was awarded the outstanding Soloist award. This achievement was made even more special by the fact that a motion sensor in the hall switched off all the lights as the band was approaching the climax of the final movement. Unperturbed the band played on and the lights were reactivated for the final chord.

Building on that success, the band, under their conductor Howard Gibbs, travelled to Kenilworth for the Midland Area Brass Band Championships. Following an excellent performance the band was placed third out of the 21 competing bands. The adjudicators complimented the band on their excellent tuneful sound and the attention to detail in their performance This qualified the band to compete in the National Finals in September at Cheltenham.

This is the first time for six years that the band has qualified and it is a great honour and opportunity to compete at such a prestigious event.




