The other act that grabbed the judge's attention was Shipston-based Teresa Brooks with her strong confident Taiko drumming. Her interest in drumming originated from her love of sport and music and Japanese drumming combined the two. She played a modern piece that she had written herself, then performed a traditional Miyake Island drumming style with audience participation. For her final piece, Teresa moved to the 'Odaiko' a large Japanese barrel-shaped drum to give a very energetic loud last number. Wow!

The youngest entrant was 10-year-old Sam Connisbee, a protegee of local singer-songwriter Greg Brice (who has an album out this year), who played a note-perfect rendition of Link Wray's Rumble. It was great to see him again later in the week at the Open Mic Night at the Black Horse and it emphasised what a competent player he is.

On that night, there was an array of local talent on stage, expertly organised by Barney Porter. 19-year-old Toby King impressed the audience with his rendition of a Kaleo song and his sister Lizzie gave listeners in the pub garden a fine finale with her gutsy cover of 'Let's do it' by Victoria Wood. A visibly nervous Mike Powell left the audience staggering with his amazing Spanish guitar playing, an art which he picked up during lockdown

It was good to have the support of Townsend Hall, who organise their own varied programme of music throughout the year. During the Proms, they put on a very well-attended evening of lively jazz music with 'Baby' Jools and the Jazzaholics.

On stage for the Last Night of the Proms, the Shipston Introducing Acts produced two confident performances with Teresa Brookes and Taiko drumming on first and the Weekend Warriors performing some Stevie Wonder – they really helped to get the party started in the High Street. Dusk Til Dawn stomped their way through some heavy rock numbers while the Shapes delivered some alternative indie songs they had written themselves. Rick Parfitt Junior came on to tumultuous applause and he and his band bowled the audience over with their sheer professionalism as they delivered hit after hit. Rick commented that the Last Night for him had been 'joyous' after what had been a brutal tour. Obviously responding to the 'Shipston spirit' in the crowd he expressed his admiration that the town had come together to provide such a great show.

### **News from Shipston Town Council's July meeting**

### Shipston Health and Wellbeing Partnership (SHWP)

Representatives from SHWP were invited to make a short presentation to the Council about the organisation, following the group being selected as the Mayor's charity for the year. With a mission to encourage people to pro-actively take care of their bodies to ensure a healthier and longer life, SHWP is delivering a range of free activities throughout 2022. After being alerted to local needs, the group is exploring offering mental health support to people who became parents during the pandemic.

#### **Severn Trent Issues**

Councillors Cox, Dinnie and Tesh recently attended a virtual meeting with Severn Trent Water to discuss the ongoing issues with flooding along Campden Road, and other sewerage challenges across the town. Councillor Barker is requesting a map from Warwickshire County Council that shows the full extent of the drainage and sewerage pipe network.

### **Churchyard Beehives**

Councillor H Kelly reported that bees had successfully been introduced to the new hives in the churchyard and that the keepers were confident that they would flourish in this location.

### **Shipston Area Flood Action Group (SAFAG)**

Representatives from SAFAG informed Councillors that due to a breakdown in their relationship with the Environment Agency (EA), the group had withdrawn from the delivery partnership which has helped facilitate their delivery of more than 900 natural flood prevention schemes in the local area. Consequently, no new schemes will be able to progress as the EA was the body dispensing the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) funds allocated by Stratford District Council (SDC) for flood prevention measures in Shipston. Councillors resolved to apply pressure on SDC to recover the CIL money from the EA so that it could

be reallocated to SAFAG through another mechanism. In the interim, SAFAG will continue to deliver previously approved projects and deliver upgrades and maintenance to schemes as this work is funded through other means.

### **Ellen Badger Hospital Works**

South Warwickshire NHS Foundation Trust has informed the council that they hope to be able to discuss progress by August. A briefing session will then be organised for Councillors.

### **Shipston Action For the Environment (SAFE)**

Members of the group gave a short presentation during the Open Forum session of the meeting, outlining how the group aims to provide support for projects focused on decarbonisation, active travel, biodiversity, and energy conservation.

### **Site Allocations Plan Preferred Options**

Councillors were informed that Phil Sykes was preparing a draft response to the consultation currently being conducted by Stratford District Council. The revised list of reserve development sites does not include any locations with the parish.

### **Museum Building**

Heads of terms for the museum lease were approved by Councillors and a solicitor will be appointed to act on the Council's behalf. Quotes are being sought for the repairs to the building structure.

### **Town Signage**

Councillors approved a report and proposed designs for the new gateway and brown signs.

### **Deputy Clerk**

Interviews with candidates have been conducted and an appointment is expected soon.



### Warwickshire Fire and Rescue Service wants to hear your views

Following the publication of Warwickshire Fire and Rescue Service's Prevention, Protection and Response Strategy (2022-2027), members of the public are being asked to contribute to a consultation about the plans.

### Applications open for the next generation of firefighters

Warwickshire Fire and Rescue Service are recruiting full-time firefighters who have a range of duties aimed at preventing incidents alongside responding to emergencies.

No previous experience is required and full on-the-job training will be provided. Applicants must be over 18 and possess a UK driving licence. People from all backgrounds are being asked to consider this role, to support the service's aim of creating a diverse, representative fire service that combines a range of perspectives and strengths.

"There are lots of reasons why I wanted to become a firefighter – it's an active job that keeps you on your toes, and I've never been able to see myself working in an office behind a desk for five days a week," said Morgan Amed, a 23-year-old firefighter who became operational one month ago at Nuneaton Fire Station. "Also, I'm born and raised in Warwickshire, so it feels good to be able to give back to the area where I've spent my whole life.

"My advice to anyone thinking about becoming a firefighter is to go for it and get stuck in! Find out as much information as you can about the job because it'll help you out a lot through the recruitment process. Warwickshire holds a lot of 'have a go' days and has lots of information online about the job, which is definitely worth looking at because it'll help you decide if it's the right job for you."

### Stour Singers: "Community music-making at its best"

Stratford Herald described the choir as "community music-making at its best", and this May's concert of



music by Dvorak and Mozart once again proved this to be true. Having had to cancel several concerts over the past two years because of the pandemic, the choir was full of enthusiasm and enjoyment in being able to share a concert performance once more in St. Edmund's Church, communicating the beauty of the music to an appreciative audience.

Singing is not for the rarefied few; rather it is something that many can enjoy, especially in Richard Emms' friendly choir - Stour Singers. The choir's history goes back 46 years to 1976 when Richard first got together an adult education group. Over the years, a full-strength choir has flourished, always under Richard's inspirational leadership, presenting two major concerts per year. Some singers are experienced musicians, others are new to singing in a choir, and all work together to enjoy learning and sharing wonderful choral works. This autumn, the choir will be rehearsing Telemann's Magnificat, and Haydn's Nikolai Mass, to be performed in St. Edmund's Church on 10th December. Rehearsals take place at Shipston Primary School on Thursday evenings, from 7.30pm to 9.30.p.m., starting on 8th September. Looking forward, the season will culminate in May 2023 with a concert performance of Handel's Messiah.

One of the joys that members experience is when they sing with professional soloists and an orchestra at the final rehearsal before the concert. It is evident how much the professional musicians enjoy working with the choir, too, as soloists like to return for subsequent concerts.

### **Shipston Rotary**

### Tour d'Ilmington

The annual Rotary Tour d'Ilmington is now a fixture in Midlands cyclists' calendars. Ilmington is the focus of the 30-mile ride. Cyclists climb Ilmington Hill four times, each from a different direction.

The event is not a race, it allows cyclists of all abilities and families to enjoy a ride around the Cotswolds escarpment and the Vale of Evesham. The 10-mile route is aimed at families; the 30mile (hilly) route is for the more competent cyclists. and the 100km Classic Route for experienced Some 150 cyclists. riders also enjoyed "butties and cakes" as part of their Club Sunday rides.

The weather, scattered

cloud and a light breeze, was ideal. One Classic Route cyclist needed medical attention from the Cotswold First Aiders, but fortunately no serious harm was done. The photo is of 11-year-old Thomas Gray, from Wellesbourne, with his grandmother Rotarian Patricia Gilliam. Thomas is the youngest cyclist to complete the 100km route in the event's history.

Feedback can be summed up as: 'excellent organisation and refreshments and lovely scenery'. The event raised about £5,500 for Rotary charities.

### Churchill's Secret Army by Tony Butler



Many Probus members have served in the forces, and some have memories of the second world war and its aftermath; although none of us was willing to admit involvement with the very secretive Special Operations Executive (SOE), we enjoyed some fascinating insights into their work told by Tony Butler.

When Churchill became PM in 1940 Britain was threatened by a German invasion. Desperate times meant desperate measures; Churchill realised there was a need for a secret army operating behind enemy lines and established the SOE. Nicknamed the 'Bureau of Ungentlemanly Conduct', the SOE went against the Geneva Convention; if caught members were to deny any connection.

Training was intense and very professional. Initial training included stalking stags, if they could get within a few yards of a stag and kill it, then the same could be done to Germans!

SOE operations were established throughout Europe, especially in France and the Low Countries. Despite initial opposition to membership by women, they played an important part as spies and activists. Nancy Wake, a nurse and journalist, lived in Austria and witnessed the Nazi treatment of Jews. Married to a French industrialist, Henri Fiocca, she helped allied airmen escape to Spain. Known as the 'White Mouse' she was forced to escape herself and after six attempts reached Britain via Portugal. The SOE recruited her and with six months of training sent her back to the Central Massif area of France where she organised the Resistance in preparation for the Allied Invasion. Local resistance groups were brought together, supplied via parachute drops, and wrought havoc destroying key factories and transport hubs. In response, the Germans surrounded the area with 22 000 troops and closed in. Nancy escaped disguised as an innocent peasant girl and cycled 300km to radio a report back to London. Her husband was executed by the Nazis, but Nancy survived to live an active post-war life with many medals.

Tony Brooks was one of the youngest to serve in the SOE. As a teenager, he helped British servicemen escape from France until forced to escape himself via a route established by Nancy Wake. In Britain he was trained by the SOE and parachuted back into France to liaise with resistance groups; famously he succeeded in blowing up railway lines, slowing the movement of a German Panzer Division on its way to confront the Allies in Normandy. Brooks was captured by the Germans with a large amount of money, but they accepted his story that he was to buy a bike and released him! At the end of the war, Brooks was awarded the DSO medal, Military Cross and Croix de Guerre for his service.

A total of 506 SOE agents were dropped into war zones and 133 failed to return. In 1944 the Germans shot 48 SOE agents. By D Day 4,700 well-armed resistant fighters operated behind German lines.

In 1940 the SOE had 120 people, today MI5/6, Government Communication Head Quarters (GCHQ) and the National Fraud Intelligence Bureau (NFIB) employ around 16,000.



### **Shipston Medical Centre**

#### Statement from Shipston Medical Centre regarding development of new premises


The development of a new medical centre was identified as part of the wider development of an integrated care facility at Ellen Badger Hospital in 2018. The new Medical Centre cost was originally estimated at £4.5m. A steep increase in the cost of construction, materials and associated expenses of the build, caused by factors outside of the control of the practice, has resulted in these costs increasing by almost 50%, and they are continuing to rise.

This increase in costs means that the new medical centre project is no longer financially viable in its current design. This is extremely disappointing to the Partners of the Practice\* who

### **District Council update**

Most residents evidently have a limited interest in local government politics. This is demonstrated in the relatively low level of turnout of voters at local elections. At the last election in May 2019 the turnout in Shipston North was 33.9% and in Shipston South it was 38.7%.



This contrasts with the turnout at the last General Election in December 2019 when 74.4% of the electorate in the Stratford upon Avon constituency went to the polling stations. Choosing your MP is seemingly more important to the majority of the electorate than choosing your District Councillor.

There is one service for which the District Council is responsible, however, that touches the entire electorate. It's a service provided to every household of the 60,000 or so households in the District. It is, of course, the collection and disposal of your refuse. The District Council has the responsibility for providing the refuse collection system; the County Council has the responsibility for its disposal. If the refuse collection system doesn't work for you, there is an issue.

The current system of your bins being collected on a two-week cycle has been in place for years. From 1 August the system is being changed. Why? In short, this is because circumstances have changed. After the normal competitive procurement process, a new contract for eight years has been awarded to Biffa. In recent years two significant changes have happened. First, the cost of providing waste collection and disposal services has increased significantly. There was a need to find the best value for money system. Collecting waste every three weeks will save collection vehicles travelling 102,796 miles per year – the equivalent of  $4\frac{1}{2}$  times around the earth! That's also a saving of c2,650 tonnes of CO2 per year. This is all reflected in the cost of providing the service.

Second, the District Council, in common with many other councils, has declared a climate emergency. UK households, for example, waste 6.5 million tonnes of food each year, 4.5 million of which is edible. That's enough to fill 38 million wheeled bins! As a District Council and as residents, we need to find ways to reduce the environmental impact of dealing with our domestic waste.

The new system will introduce a three-week collection cycle. Residents are asked to separate their food waste into their new food caddies rather than collecting it in their green bins. Food caddies will be collected every week and the food waste will go to an anaerobic digester, a renewable processor to produce biogas. Green and blue bins will be collected every second week so that their contents can either be composted or recycled. Grey bins containing those items that cannot be recycled will be collected every third week. They will go to landfill.

The new system has significant advantages for both Council Tax payers and the District Council, financial and environmental. The cost of the collection contract is lower than it would have been without making this change. Food waste will in future generate energy. The trucks collecting the food waste will generate less pollution.

Further details of the new system are set out on pages 10 and 11 of the Summer Issue of Stratford View, a copy of which has been distributed to every house in the District. With an exercise on this scale, there are bound to be some teething problems. If you do experience a problem, please contact me. I am always keen to hear from the people I represent.
