Shipston remembers fallen on Remembrance Sunday

Shipston's Remembrance Sunday service was able to reach far more people than ever before thanks to a big screen showing it live in the town centre. An online livestream of the service was also made available for people to watch, including residents within Shipston Residential Care Homes, the Ellen Badger Hospital, Royal Hospital Chelsea.

The big screen was hired by the Town Council to broadcast the service from inside St Edmund's, which can only fit a few hundred people inside. It meant those wishing to pay their respects but who could not enter the church due to its limited capacity could watch the parade make its way through the centre of town and

watch the service safely.

The use of the big screen coincided with the 100th anniversary of the Royal British Legion.

The funding the big screen was provided through the

Welcome Back Fund, from the European Regional Development Fund money through the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government.

The programme is managed by Shakespeare's England on behalf of Stratford District Council.

Grants are given to projects that help to attract local residents and visitors alike into high streets or town centres post-Covid.

Mayor Shipston, Cooper lan thought the big screen was a areat addition to the service and meant turnout was a lot higher than in previous vears. "We were so happy with



what the screen brought to our Remembrance Sunday service this year," said Ian. "Turnout in Shipston is usually very good for Remembrance Sunday, but in the past we often had people waiting around outside St Edmund's as they were not able to get inside. They had no way of knowing what was happening or when the service would finish. The big screen changed all that. It allowed residents to gather safely in High Street, watch the service and pay their respects in a much more inclusive way than what was possible before. We would definitely consider using the screen again in subsequent years - it worked really well."

Mike Wells, chairman of the Shipston branch of the Royal British Legion, added: "Anyone wishing to quietly reflect during Remembrance Sunday should be able to do so, and the big screen allowed more people than ever in Shipston to watch the service. St Edmund's is a lovely church, but its size means we cannot fit everyone in. But this year, having the big screen allowed more people than ever before to view the service. I think it was a great addition to the day."

Armistice remembered

The High Street fell silent at 11am on 11th November in memory of those who fell during the First World War. Bob Pitts from the Town Band played the Last Post preceding the silence and sounded Reveille following its conclusion.

20 is plenty campaign gaining speed

Jacey Jackson, Shipston Community Speedwatch Coordinator, addressed the Town Council meeting on 8th November, urging members to support the campaign for a 20mph speed limit on residential roads in the town. Over 500 local people have already signed a petition calling on Warwickshire County Council to implement a scheme to improve public safety and reduce vehicle emissions.



Live bookings made available for recycling centre

Recycling larger amounts of garden waste, wood, metal and cardboard will become much easier, thanks to the introduction of live bookings at refuse centres, including Shipston. Numbers on site are still being managed carefully to allow for safe practices and avoid queuing, so booking on the day will of course depend on availability. This increased flexibility to book should mean it is much easier to visit at a time that suits.

Visits can be booked online via www.warwickshire.gov.uk/hwrc and there is also an Eventbrite App that can be downloaded onto a smartphone or tablet.

Recycling centre winter opening hours are in operation. Shipston recycling centre is open 8.30am to noon at weekends and 9.30am to 3.15pm on weekdays. Slots are released a week in advance of the day in question.

West Midlands Virtual Forest

With the 2021/22 tree planting season underway, Warwickshire County Council has committed to planting a tree for every resident in the county as part of the West Midlands Virtual Forest initiative. Planting has been strategically planned to restore parts of forests and wooded areas that have been long lost to time, such as the ancient Forest of Arden, which once covered most of the county and beyond into Staffordshire and Worcestershire.

Trees are valuable for many reasons: they capture carbon from the atmosphere and harmful particulates from the air we breathe. They create shade when it's very hot, and they help reduce the risk of flooding. They also create habitats for wildlife from the moment they are planted, until long after they have died. Studies have also shown that planting them, and getting out amongst them, is also great for physical and mental wellbeing.

To keep track of trees being planted across the county, each of them will be plotted on the West Midlands Combined Authority's Virtual Forest Platform. This is an online mapping tool that is designed to allow anyone who has planted a tree to register it with the virtual forest and it is hoped that all new tree plantings across the county, and wider region, will be registered there.

The West Midlands Virtual Forest is not just for local authorities, it is also an opportunity for Warwickshire residents to get involved in making the region a greener, happier and healthier place to live, work and play. The platform is open to everyone, whether they are a resident, a community group, a business, a landowner or a school. News from Shipston Town Council's November meeting

Co-option of Councillors Tony Booth and Shirley Madams were unanimously co-opted as members of the Town Council.

Dementia Friendly Town Fay Ivens provided an update to Councillors on efforts to re-establish the Dementia Friendly Town committee which had lapsed due to the impact of the pandemic and the passing of Dr Sue Pritchard, who spearheaded the creation of the initiative eight years ago. A group will be meeting soon to discuss how to take things forward and Mrs Browns Tea Rooms has already been approached and agreed to function as a "Dementia-friendly space".

Shipston High School Tim Wilson, Chair of Governors, was invited by the Mayor to provide an update about the school. He highlighted the recent excellent exam results and the very high demand for places. The school currently has an agreed intake size of 120 (130 were admitted this year through an agreement with the county council) and there are plans to expand facilities to enable this to be increased to 150 in the future. Mention was also made of ongoing efforts to monitor the mental wellbeing of staff and students.

Sports Ground An update was provided on the installation of height barriers to prevent unauthorised access.

Hanson Track Bridleway A new bridge has been installed, however, this will be submerged in the event of heavy rainfall. Councillors will investigate whether the adjoining pathways can be reinforced.

Warwickshire Wildlife Trust Councillors were keen to accept the offer of a briefing from the Trust, explaining how the council could help support local wildlife.

South Warwickshire Council Consultation There had been over 1,100 responses to the consultation, which was deemed to be suspiciously high. Checks are being carried out to remove duplicate submissions prior to the results being published.

Shipston Area Flood Action Group The group has been featured in an Environment Agency publication as an example of excellent natural flood management schemes. Plans for 2022 are still being prepared for approval. Councillors approved changes to the 2021 budgets.

Housing Needs Survey An executive summary of the housing needs survey will be published on the Town Council website.

2022 Precept A draft precept proposal will be presented to the December meeting of the Town Council ready for approval and submission to Stratford District Council.

Street Cleaning Contract Councillors approved a resolution to continue the existing street cleaning contract with Stratford District Council.

Remembrance Knitting Councillors expressed their thanks to Linda Cornock for coordinating the beautiful knitted displays around the town.

Introducing Town Councillor Shirley Madams



Shipston Area U3A October Open Meeting

The Townsend Hall was crowded on 26th October to hear a very topical lecture entitled "Global Warming – Fact or Scaremongering?"



presented by Mr Kenneth Ingermells, a retired long-range Met Office Forecaster. Our Speaker had spent about two years on Antarctica during his long career and spoke in support of the efforts of Greta Thunberg to bring the risks of global warming to the world's attention. He then set about the task of convincing his rapt audience, who needed little persuasion, that the world is warming up due to continual gaseous attacks on the protective ozone layer. Your humble scribe did his best to understand the science as summarised below:-

The ozone layer is about 40,000 miles above the earth and absorbs much of the short wave radiation from the sun, while allowing sufficient to get through to warm the earth. Many years ago a scientist in Antarctica found the ozone layer was being damaged by a wide variety of man-made gases and raised an alarm to the fact that the whole earth was becoming warmer as a consequence.

Subsequently, there was a worldwide ban on the use of CSC gas and more attention aimed to reduce the amounts of carbon dioxide, methane, nitrous oxide and other greenhouse gases released into the atmosphere. We were reminded that all of these facts had led to a worldwide harmful gases reduction effort to be considered at the COP-26 conference.

Mr Ingermells expressed some personal opinions – solar panels only last for 15 years and are eyesores, wind farms are fine except in a calm period, nuclear fusion would be his preference as the process byproduct is water. On that note, he ended his lecture leaving his audience in a contemplative mood and full of questions.



Shipston on Stour WI

Shipston WI held its Annual + General Meeting on 3rd November when Carole Turner INSPIRING WOMEN kindly agreed to remain as President for the next twelve



months. The Committee was elected with Angie Weaver remaining as Treasurer for the next year and Jane Hanks will continue as Secretary. Shipston has a membership of 39 members including several new members so the future looks rosy!

But before the business was enacted, Emma Turner, the Local Community Police Officer, gave wise advice on counteracting fraud, especially online fraud. It is a sad fact that we must all be suspicious of callers be they online, telephone, or at the door. Police advice is to say 'No'. If in doubt, put down the phone. A genuine caller will never ask for bank details, PIN numbers or card numbers. If a caller asks for any personal details - put down the phone, slam the door - do not be afraid of giving offence - these people are trying to do you harm - your welfare is the last thing on their minds. Always remember if it seems too good to be true, in 99.9% of cases, it is.

Scammers target those living alone and the vulnerable. They are clever and capable of eliciting personal circumstances very quickly. If you receive a suspicious call, put down the phone, call 1471 to locate the number (and what might seem like a local call often comes from the other side of the world), and then get that number blocked. The Police also operate Action Fraud - 03300 1232040 - to report suspicious activity. Emma stressed that the Police are anxious the public report everything so that they can take the necessary action. Luckily, Shipston is a law-abiding and safe town: there are very few cases of fraud, but theft from sheds is increasing as is the theft of catalytic converters!

Shipston WI will take part in the Remembrance Sunday Parade on 14th November, they will have a stall at the Victorian Evening on 3rd December selling cakes, preserves and crafts, and a Christmas Lunch is planned. 2022 will mark 100 Years of Shipston WI and there are plans to replace the decrepit bench in the High Street to mark the centenary.

Shipston Proms

Now for something completely different..... article on Portuguese music inspired by a recent trip to Madeira. In October in Funchal, the city celebrates their flower festival. In the marquee amongst the floral displays and the pots of honey and honey cake where you might expect to hear some mellifluous Portuguese



folk music we unexpectedly heard the twang of some rootsy rhythm and blues artists. They were called Black Dog so probably not Madeiran, but blues is blues in any language. The previous night in the tent, a sultry chanteuse sang her way through well-known ballads in English giving them a more exotic southern European flavour and wistful appeal.

On a trip out from Funchal, along the towering cliff coastline, we came across the local Pomegranate festival in Riberio de Brava. A crowd who was enjoying the delights of eating the traditional flatbread bolo de caco and drinking the signature drink of pomegranate were being entertained by a Madeiran Barney Porter look-a-like playing the guitar and singing some Portuguese pop songs. At that point, we did not feel too far away from Shipston!

To hear some truly traditional Portuguese music, we went back to a club in the old part of Funchal to listen to some fado with its roots going back to early 19th century Portugal. It is voice and guitar music, often mournful and melancholic with songs describing poverty, loss and longing and life at sea. An evening of fado feels like an intimate affair and stays with you all the way home.

Back in Shipston, it did make me think about the language in which our songs are sung during the Proms Festival. We did have an Italian couple Veronica Sbergia and Max de Bernardi sing at Cherington Arms in 2019, but a song sung in Portuguese is still yet to be heard!

The Proms 2022 runs from 10th to 25th June.




The students in the picture are Year 11s relaxing at break during their studies.

BLOOD HEART

Hooray for our Hedgehogs!

The clock change of a few weeks ago means our hedgehogs are now coming for their 'breakfast' earlier than before.

As we prepare our garden for the Winter, I watch the

evidence from our night cam of who has come into our garden the night before. We've seen various cats and mice, but it's the hedgehogs I watch most avidly. I love observing their antics as they snuffle around, eat, drink, have a

good scratch and run surprisingly quickly. When two at the same time try to get into the feeding shelter, they can sometimes have a prickly head-to-head! But mostly they are solitary and harmless little creatures.





I'm anxious at the moment because we have three young ones visiting regularly, and if they can't build up enough weight before Winter, they won't be able to survive hibernation. An endangered species, now on the **Red List** in Britain, what a privilege it is to have them in our garden. They need all the help we can give them and here are a few ideas of things we can all do to help build up Shipston's hedgehog population:

- Avoid using slug pellets in the garden.
- Create access points through your fences hedgehogs can travel up to 2km per night in search of food and need safe hedgehog highways through our urban gardens.
- Pile up the leaves and twigs of your Autumn raking in quiet corners of your garden hedgehogs need safe spaces where they can hibernate undisturbed.
- Provide them regularly with appropriate food and water (in a shelter if possible). I buy hedgehog food and mix dried nibbles with semi-moist pellets. They love raw meat scraps too.
- · Drive gently on our residential roads in the dark (and that includes the main roads) hedgehogs are so vulnerable when crossing roads at night.

If you have or suspect you have, hedgehogs in your garden, please get in touch and let me know. It will help us in the Stour Valley Wildlife Action Group to build up a picture of the population of hedgehogs in Shipston. Get in touch too if you would like more information.

I would like to personally thank the team on behalf of myself & the residents here for getting so actively involved.



Dear Sir,

May I take this opportunity to update your readers on the fate of Shipston's Youth Club?

Shipston Youth Club has been asked to remove all its equipment from its long-standing home on the Shipston High School Site. The Club has been informed that the school requires the building for storage and changing room facilities for its growing number of students.

It was back in 2012, after 48 years of funding youth work on the school site, that the County Council cut its youth service budget. Most existing club buildings, such as ours in Shipston, had all their funding withdrawn. Local interested parties were invited to submit expressions of interest in continuing to run the clubs and buildings. I am so proud that Shipston rose to the challenge of not just forming a new charity to run the club but that we collaborated with the High School to submit a unique joint bid which secured the building for the school and our free use of it for club activities. At the time it was heralded as a shining example of the Shipston Spirit and the latest big political idea of 'The Big Society'. Our MP, Nadhim Zahawi, the current Secretary of State for Education, opened the newly refurbished building.

The club then enjoyed great success in engaging with the young people of the town. Some club evenings were attended by over 50 young people. Many young people took the opportunity to share important issues with our staff team and volunteers. It was a safe place to go, with something to do and someone to talk to.

Sadly, it has been clear that changes at the High School have had repercussions for our relationship with it. Obviously, all of us with a concern for young people wish to cheer on the High School in its academic success. But it has become apparent that the High School no longer puts such a value on serving and engaging with the community. It was over two years ago that we learnt that the building was apparently not safe for use till various repairs had been done. We have fought hard to retain the building and even secured funding to have the repairs done. We fought to keep the building because no like for like facilities exist in Shipston. We accepted the building would not last forever and the school would, in time, need the land for its own redevelopment. But the building had potentially a few more years to offer. Furthermore, the space and scope to create a new one is very limited and far more costly than retaining the existing building. We believe Shipston has been a big loser here – and especially Shipston's young people.

The Club has lobbied both Town, District and County Councillors who have all been very supportive. Indeed, several have been part of our Management Committee. But the school would seem to have the authority to make this decision regardless of what locally elected councillors think. Whilst we feel forced to accept it, given the spirit of collaboration and partnership back in 2012, we are very disappointed by the school's decision. It would seem, that at the end of the day, the Big Society was neither very big nor long lasting.

We are currently exploring options for the club to happen on a much smaller scale elsewhere in the town. It has been difficult to secure a venue that meets our safeguarding requirements and is covid safe. Indeed, the impact of covid on our young people's mental health has made us even more determined to find a safe space for the club to meet again. It is ironic that, at a time of unprecedented mental health issues amongst young people, a school should seemingly prioritise changing rooms and storage over a youth club with a 57 year track record of helping young people.

On behalf of the Club I would like to thank all who have sought to support us over recent months. I am so sorry for our town's young people. We tried very hard to save the Club building but at the end of the day they have lost out and the town is the poorer for it. As soon as we have news of a new venue I will write again.

We received the following statement from Shipston High School in response to the letter from Daniel Pulham

Shipston High School is a popular and growing academy with an estate of land, buildings and facilities which belong to the school for the primary purpose of the education of our local community. Shipston Youth Club previously hired a space from the school. This hire has now concluded, with the conclusion of the hire handled formally and over a reasonable time frame; the youth club organisation was first made aware of the need for change nearly two years prior to the final conclusion so that they could arrange an alternative location in good time.

Shipston High School is growing, with more students than ever before. Year groups have grown significantly in recent years, with demand for local school places continuing to rise, and we need to maximise our utilisation of functional space in order to maintain educational activities for existing and future students. The school does not have spare space, and is seeking further development to benefit our students, development that may provide improved opportunities for community hire in the future. The school has communicated with the club over a sustained period of time, outlining the reasons and process in a professional and respectfully private correspondence.

Shipston High School wish the youth club well, and have offered to store some of their equipment whilst they explore future locations. Whilst change can be difficult to accept, it is the responsibility of Shipston High School to prioritise the use of the school's facilities and buildings for the 600 students with whom we work every day, utilising the school estate for the education of the children of the community.

Keeping well over Christmas

In the period leading up to Christmas please make sure you have enough regular medication to see you through when the surgery is closed. Do order your medications a few days earlier than normal if you need to. We often receive requests for two or three months' worth of medications over the Christmas period. Unless there is a particular reason why you need to have more than one month's medication at a time and do tell us if there is, we will routinely issue just one months' worth, in line with NHS policy.

It is also worth making sure your first aid box is stocked with things you might need over the period, such as plasters, paracetamol, indigestion tablets, antiseptic cream and a thermometer.

As usual, the GP practice will be shut on

the bank holidays (27th/28th December 2021 and 3rd January 2022). If you find yourself unwell over the Christmas period consider speaking to a local pharmacist who will be able to offer advice on healthy lifestyles and common ailments. Details of the pharmacies open over the Christmas period will be on display in local pharmacies.

Information and advice about managing common ailments can be found on the NHS website at https://www.nhs. uk/ or you can contact 111 for health advice who will also help you access the Out of Hours GP service if you need to. Alternatively, evening and weekend appointments with the extended access service can be booked via the practice.

Minor Injuries Units are open daily at North Cotswold Hospital in Moreton in Marsh between 8am and 8pm. Please call their triage line prior to attending on 0300 421 7777 Minor injuries can see

sprains, simple fractures, minor burns, emergency contraceptives, minor head injuries with no loss of consciousness and minor illness, such as earache, chest infections, skin conditions and eye conditions such as foreign bodies and conjunctivitis.

If you have urgent medical symptoms, such as crushing chest pain or symptoms of stroke then call 999 for an ambulance or attend A&E.





District Council update

As the end of the year approaches, it's a time for reflection. On the broader national front, 2021 has been the year of the Covid-19 vaccine. It is the roll-out of the vaccine across the generations that has limited the number of patients who have needed to be admitted to hospitals. It has reduced the number of deaths due to the pandemic. It is the availability of the vaccine that enabled the lockdown and its restrictions



to be ended and for life to return to something that, prior to March 2020, was then normal. We all have a lot for which we need to thank the staff of the NHS and the volunteers who supported the vaccination programme.

For the District Council the underlying issue of the year, apart from the work of is staff in supporting the District to deal with and recover from the pandemic, has been the move towards joining forces with Warwick District Council. At one level, the operational level, much progress has been made. For example, the responsibilities of portfolio holders in both Councils' Cabinets have been aligned. There is a single management structure in place and staff teams are beginning to be integrated. A joint contract for the future waste collection service has been tendered, negotiated and awarded to Biffa to start in 2022. Operationally, the delivery of services to residents by a single organization is beginning to take shape.

At the political level, whether the whole of South Warwickshire should be administered by a new, single district council has been the subject of consultation in various ways. Everyone has had the opportunity to participate through an online questionnaire. Other elements of the process have been a telephone survey of a sample of residents from both districts, focus groups of residents, again drawn from both districts, together with contact with businesses, town and parish councils, plus voluntary and community groups. The results of this process are being analysed as I write by Opinion Research Services, an independent social research company. Their objective report will be presented to all Stratford and Warwick District Councillors in late November before each Council will then individually decide at their respective meetings on 13 December whether to seek the agreement of the relevant Secretary of State to the creation of a new council for the whole of South Warwickshire. This will be the most important decision to be taken by both District Councils since their formation in 1974.

One way and another, therefore, 2021 has been a year when local government has been at the forefront in delivering services and support as residents of the District have coped with and adjusted to the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic. As we look towards 2022, local government in South Warwickshire will inevitably change. The challenge will be to ensure that it changes and develops in ways that best serve the interests of the District in general and Shipston in particular. I hope all the residents of Shipston have an enjoyable Christmas and that you can look forward with optimism to the opportunities of the New Year.

County Council update

As I write I am conscious that we are extremely close to Christmas – I only realised how close when Darren at Cotswold



Butchers reminded me to get my Christmas food ordered!

Loads going on as ever for me!

I am just sitting in a meeting talking about the Outdoor Education Strategy. Probably the most meaningful thing I have ever done was the Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme and I want to encourage anyone who wants to – have a go via school or Scouts.

Speaking of Scouts – we really need more people to step up as leaders for our young people. I do a few skills with them – sewing, foraging and produce making. It's fun – and if more of us do it – the more we pass on to the next generations. Youth Club is now getting back up and running too. Maybe we can do just that bit more for our young people to make up for the last 20 months?

My other extra work recently has been on the improvement of our bus services. £1.473m has been budgeted to improve and expand the subsidised bus network to include new (or extended routes) to include small rural settlements, £3.710m to extend 'Demand Responsive Transport services' across Warwickshire including feeder services providing residents in small rural settlements with access to more frequent conventional bus services, and £0.150m to deliver enhanced 'Integration' across the Warwickshire bus network.

So, I am feeling as though we have achieved quite a lot pre-Christmas.
