The British Legion and the representatives of local government and voluntary organisations laid their wreaths at the memorial before the service concluded in St Edmund's Church. The parade reformed after the Service to process back to the High Street where the Town Band performed a period march Erimus in standing formation after the parade had been dismissed.

Armistice Day in Shipston

At 11.00 a.m. on Friday 11th November the centre of Shipston fell silent as the people of Shipston and the British Legion gathered to remember the fallen from both World Wars and conflicts since. The Last Post and Reveille was sounded by cornet player Bob Pitts of Shipston Town Band.



El Alamein

"With Remembrance just passed, not long prior, on 23rd October was the 80th Anniversary of the start of the Battle of El Alamein in 1942. A turning point in WW2 when the British Eighth Army defeated the German Afrika Corps. The Warwickshire Yeomanry participated, an armoured regiment in the 9th Armoured Brigade, 2nd New Zealand Division.

There were commemoration ceremonies in Egypt to mark the occasion and the British Army Band Catterick took part. The Band's Sergeant Major WO 2 Alastair Smith is the son of John Smith well known in Shipston today as a leading member of the Town Band. John's father Bert was in the Warwickshire Yeomanry in the battle in which 19 troopers from the regiment were killed. Quite a few Shipston men served in the Warwickshire Yeomanry during WW2. Those men whose names are known are in addition to Bert, Ben Bland, Harry Parry, Pete Drinkwater, John Vokins and Monty Sumners. The Shipston troopers were not among those killed in action. Sadly, Ben Bland's younger brother Ronald was a casualty of the war killed when the merchant ship he was serving on was torpedoed in 1942. He is named on the Town War memorial.

There is no doubt that the Warwickshire Yeomanry had a strong association with Shipston due to the town's men who served in its ranks. Alastair Smith visited the Commonwealth War Graves Commission's cemetery where the fallen in the El Alamein battle are buried. He found the grave of one of the 19 Warwickshire Yeomanry troopers who fell and as can be seen in the photograph placed upon it his medals and those of his grandfather Bert. A fitting touch."

News from Shipston Town Council's November meeting

Rememberance

The councillors acknowledged the excellent turnout at Remembrance events in the town, especially among younger people and the terrific efforts of RBL and the town band. The colourful displays of woven poppies created by the yarn bombers were also highlighted.

Christmas Lights

The Shipston Christmas lights will be switched on during the Victorian Evening on 2nd December. Councillors agreed to explore whether they could conserve energy by altering the times that the lights are illuminated each evening.

Voter ID

Several Councillors expressed concern over the incoming Government requirement for photographic ID to be produced when voting. Following a discussion, the Council resolved to send a letter to the relevant ministers requesting that poll cards should be accepted instead of photographic identification for voters who do not have these documents.

District Council Budget - CCTV

District Councillor Trevor Harvey informed the meeting that the District Council is partway through budget discussions and has identified the high costs of CCTV operations as an area which may need to be examined in future years, with localities asked to make further contributions to pay for the system.

Defibrillator

There has been a new public access defibrillator installed at the Fire Station, with open training sessions to come.

Ellen Badger Hospital

The Council resolved that the Integrated Care Board should be invited to meet with the Council in Shipston so that board members can gain a greater understanding of the local situation.

Shipston Area Flood Action Group (SAFAG)

A productive meeting with Stratford District Council has ensured that funding for previously agreed schemes will be released. The remaining funds will be used by Severn Trent Rivers Trust and the Environment Agency to fund additional schemes in the Stour catchment area. The group's work has now concluded for the year. Concerning the recent threat of flooding; soil management and tree planting have been instrumental as preventative measures, however, as the fields reach capacity over winter, the damsconstructed by SAFAG will kick in to halt the flow of water.

General Purposes Working Group

The previous meeting was cancelled due to leave and illness, however the next meeting will go ahead as planned. There have been requests to place a memorial plaque on the bench just inside the churchyard entrance to honour Micky & Linda Cornock. To agree with the wording for this plaque, engagement with the family is being sought.

Cornmill Meadows

The proposed vehicular access area will be reinforced with a geotextile membrane following consultation with Linfoot-McLean. Councillors also approved expenditure on posts to repair some fencing – work to be completed for free by the Cotswold Volunteer Wardens.

Sports and Social Club

Councillors formally agreed on expenditure of £500 towards the cost of a stairlift at the Sports and Social Club.

Staffing Working Group

The council unanimously approved the recommendation for updated terms of reference. Attracting new councillors to fill vacancies and supporting new councillors was also discussed.

Councillor Code of Conduct

Councillors were reminded of the code of conduct, and setting an example within the community was discussed.

Sports and Social Club Working Group

The council discussed making this group a sub working group of the finance working group.

Shipston-On-Stour Women's Institute

The Shipston Branch of the WI met on 2nd November for the AGM to elect a new President, Officers and Committee. But before getting down to business the meeting heard Wendy Nursall (a Shipston WI member) talk about her experiences as a Life Coach.

Wendy trained as a nurse and was working as a practice nurse but wanted a more flexible working pattern. Wendy had found that patients often said the chat they had with her was more valuable than the treatment! So a job talking to people about their lives and helping them surmount their problems seemed the right course. Wendy stressed that a Life Coach is a conduit through whom people can come to their own conclusions and make their own decisions. The Coach encourages the person to identify their goal and break this down into smaller achievable goals. It's a process of small steps to achieve the greater goal. Each small achievement increases the client's feeling of self-worth and positively affects all aspects of their life. The Coach's role is one of encouragement and letting the client make their own decisions: the Coach can only ask the right questions; they cannot tell the client what to do.

The AGM continued after tea and cake. The Centenary Lunch had been a great success. Shipston WI is presenting a bench to the Town to commemorate their Centenary: this will be installed on 15th November on the Campden



Road. The WI will be having a stall at the Victorian Evening on 2nd December selling crafts, cakes, biscuits, preserves etc. and donations are welcome.

Is Winter on its way?

If our garden is anything to go by, the seasons don't seem to know quite what they're doing nowadays.

Following a scorching period in the Summer, the Autumn seemed reluctant to come in. Suddenly cold, it then arrived with its beautiful colours. Now, following the clock change, we appear to be in an unsettled spell of grey/wet weather. But the temperatures are still (in mid-November) higher than is usual for this time of year.

Summer bedding plants like ageratum and nemesia are putting on new growth again and are still flowering happily alongside the cyclamen. Winter jasmine has already been blooming prettily next to the last of our foxgloves and gladioli. Even the aubretia think it's Spring already!

This all has an impact on the wider eco-system and our fragile wildlife. Hedgehogs are still very active and may not



bother to hibernate much at all if their food source also remains lively at night.

There have been sightings of pallid swifts (the Mediterranean cousins of our own common swift) arriving in the UK in the past month or so, instead of migrating to Africa, and swallows are being seen year round.

This disruption to the pattern of the seasons is very alarming because it's happening too quickly for the natural world to be able, safely, to adapt. The importance of positive

outcomes from the COP27 Climate Conference cannot be overestimated and we will have to wait and see what the next season brings.

We humans might well be glad of a mild Winter, but our precious wildlife may not be so grateful!

Not only were we treated to recordings of so many examples by these composers but Mr Lingard had recorded them all himself. To finish he chose "The Floral Dance", not an art song but a popular ballad which encouraged some enthusiastic foot-tapping and was familiar to most of those present. As he explained, years ago there was a piano standing in most "front rooms" and trying to pick out the tune of a ballad heard on the radio would have been a normal pastime for members of the family. A simpler life!

We meet again on Friday, 18th November at 7.30pm in the Methodist Church, New Street for a concert by Charles Matthews and Lynn Arnold entitled "Four Hands on One Piano". This is always a popular occasion, and we look forward to welcoming all members and their friends.

Shipston Probus Club

There is a long-established tradition in Shipston Probus of inviting our own membership to provide entertaining and



informative talks. Graham Nottingham lived up to every expectation with a fascinating piece of local history of a small area of South Warwickshire. Graham, a retired geography teacher, some years ago was looking for teaching material in a resource centre in Banbury. In his own words he "opened a cupboard and found a pile of old film reels" One of these turned out to be a remarkable film made by a research team from Oxford University, which examined the detailed nature of rural post war life in South Warwickshire and North Oxfordshire. The film concentrated on an area of just 24 square miles, including Bloxham, Tysoe and Hook Norton with sixteen smaller hamlets; interviews with local residents, interspersed with scenes of farming and domestic life, brought to life a rural lifestyle long gone, but refreshed some childhood memories by some of our members!

Immediately after WW2, rural life in the area remained very basic by modern standards. Houses were primitive, largely built of local stone with thatched roofs, in many cases lacking piped water, sewage disposal and electricity.

The population was declining and mainly worked in agriculture. Farming was based on traditional mixed crop rotation with animals, but they were small in size, inefficient and in need of modernisation. Little remained of earlier quarrying and mining industries. The traditional village economy – saddlers, wheelwrights etc were dying out, but brewing at Hook Norton was important and thrives today. Some residents travelled for work to larger market towns, but rural transport was limited – buses infrequent (has this changed?), however, Bloxham still had a railway station with at least 4 trains a day!

Social life revolved around the pub, dances, whist drives, women institutes, produce associations etc. The Parish and Rural District Councils provided the basis for rural administration. There were eleven elementary schools, all church schools. but secondary schools necessitated travel out of the area.

Probus members remarked, not only on the extraordinary, detailed insight into a long-gone lifestyle, but the familiar voice of the film's commentator - one John Arlott, who was to become a much-loved cricket commentator so familiar to many of us in Test Match Special! A big 'Thank You' to Graham for sharing with us a vivid bit of the history of our local area.

Shipston Rotary – World Polio Day

October 2022 saw World Polio Day when countries from across the world joined Rotary and the World Health Organisation to discuss how to finally eradicate this dreadful disease.

Polio is a highly infectious disease that most commonly affects children under the age of 5. It is spread from person to person, typically through contaminated water. It can attack the nervous system, and in some instances, lead to muscular paralysis leaving victims permanently disabled or worse, dead. Although there is no cure, there is a safe and effective vaccine – one which Rotary and our partners use to immunize over 2.5 billion children worldwide.

Rotary has been driving the campaign since 1988 and cases have been reduced by 99.9%. Indeed, today polio is endemic in only two countries: Pakistan and Afghanistan.

Shipston Rotary Club has supported the campaign since its inception and you may have seen street collections taking place recently. The purple crocus has come to symbolise the campaign as the purple colour matches the dye painted on children's fingers after they have been immunised. Over the years millions of corms have been planted across the globe.

When the campaign is successfully completed, Polio will be only the second human disease to be eradicated (Smallpox being the first).

What Has Happened to 20mph?

It's a year now since the 20mph Campaign Team were collecting signatures on a petition to Warwickshire County Council to reduce the speed of traffic in Shipston to 20mph, so any fears of it being "rushed through" were groundless!

But just because a scheme hasn't yet materialised on the ground, it doesn't mean that nothing has been happening behind the scenes.

Having presented 1080+ signatures to the County Council, a meeting was held in the Spring with Highways officers and proposals were put on the table. Discussions have since ensued and a further meeting held with the Principal Transport Planner, Transport and Highways. But at the end of the day, it all comes down to money and who is prepared to fund the proposed measures, especially in these times of hardship.

You may have read recently in the Stratford Herald that Henley have managed to gain funding for their 20mph limit with a combination of private and commercial donations match-funded by Warwickshire County Council. They also gained the support of the Stratford MP.

As we wrestle with the complexities of obtaining funding for a scheme for Shipston, it's worth reminding ourselves of the benefits of reduced traffic speeds and I quote from an article of 7th November 22 by the **Public Sector Executive**, recently sent to all Town Councillors:

"In September 2023, the Welsh Government are set to introduce a default speed limit of 20 miles per hour on restricted roads. The research that has been published shows that a reduction in deaths and injuries thanks to the new lower speed limit can save around £100 million in the first year alone.

Lee Water, Deputy Minister for Climate Change, said: "The evidence from around the world is very clear – reducing speed limits reduces collisions and saves lives. Slow speeds also create a safer and more welcoming environment, giving people the confidence to walk and cycle more, which will help to improve our health and wellbeing and help to improve the environment.

"As with any change we know it will take time for people to adapt. But I'm pleased to see the early indications show a majority of people are in favour of 20mph ..."

Fifteen Year Old Attempts to Purchase Vapes in Council 'Mystery Shopper' Operation

Warwickshire County Council Trading Standards has carried out undercover 'mystery shopper' visits to shops that sell vapes. Trading Standards Officers asked a 15 year old Warwickshire Police cadet volunteer to attempt to purchase nicotine vapes from thirteen premises located across all five districts and boroughs. Twelve stores asked for age identification and the sale was refused to the 15-year-old. At the thirteenth a sale was nearly made and this premise remains under investigation.

Warwickshire County Councillor Andy Crump, Portfolio Holder for Community Safety said:

"Warwickshire Trading Standards has received increasing numbers of complaints about the sale of nicotine inhaling devices such as e-cigarettes and vapes to under 18's and to school children in particular."

"This is why we are both educating our sellers and carrying out undercover test purchase exercises with child volunteers. I would encourage all our retailers to 'Challenge 25' whenever they sell these products and ask for age identification."

"I'm pleased that on this occasion the vast majority of vape sellers asked for age identification and refused the sale. We will be carrying out similar enforcement exercises in the future."

If found guilty of selling nicotine-inhaling products to a young person under 18 years, an individual may be fined up to £2,500 in the Magistrates' Court. Retailers are encouraged to operate a Challenge 25 policy and ask for age identification of anyone who appears under 25 years of age. For more advice, visit https://www.businesscompanion.info



Shipston Probus Alerted to the Dangers of Fire!

Successive recent meetings of Shipston Probus Club have brought home to members the potential seriousness of accidental fire and the key role the fire service plays in protecting all our lives and property. Our very own Probus member, Chris Skeath, retired after 25 years of service as a retained fire fighter, gave us a fascinating insight into the work of a retained firefighter in our own town.

Shipston fire service deals with an average of two calls per week per year, mainly responding to faulty fire alarms, with both fatalities and malicious calls thankfully declining in frequency. The greatest threat from fire lies in buildings with no working alarm and in multi-occupancy buildings. Attendance at buildings on fire is only part of the firefighters work; they also organise community fire safety in schools and homes with vulnerable residents, and electric blanket checks; they can be called on to assist the police, ambulance service and first responders, for hospital transport and road accidents, especially cars on fire. In one case the fire service helped extract a twenty-two stone patient from an upstairs bedroom, first having to remove a window and carry him down on a ladder!

Worryingly the fire service both locally and nationally is very short of volunteers. Shipston Fire engine is frequently not available due to lack of staff. When Chris started he was one of a crew of 13, now it is a struggle to reach a compliment of half that. Anyone interested in joining this vital service can find more information on Shipston Town Council website.

By coincidence, two weeks later Probus had a first-hand account of the famous fire in Windsor Castle. Fraser Gunn, a retired full-time firefighter with 30 years' experience, attended

the fire that broke out at 11am at the castle on 20th November 1992.

This fire was not the first in the castle's long history and emergency plans were already in place to extract the most valuable and irreplaceable objects. Only one painting



was completely destroyed, thanks to an army of volunteers removing objects, including the largest single woven carpet in the world which needed 40 soldiers to carry it to safety. The fire destroyed nine principal rooms and an organ and over 100 other rooms were severely damaged.

The fire started when halogen spotlights behind a large curtain were mistakenly turned on and the heat set the upper part of the curtains alight, which spread to the ceiling and roof. An alarm call was made to Reading Fire Centre at 11.36am and three engines were sent, with subsequent reinforcements from surrounding areas to a maximum of 39 engines and appliances and some 225 firefighters working in shifts. Remarkably, only five people were injured. While all this was happening the fire service received over 60 calls to other incidents, including motorway accidents, requiring crews from a wide area to be pulled in to assist.

Restoration cost £36m, paid in part by opening Buckingham Palace to the public and at no cost to the taxpayer. The opportunity was taken to modernise some parts, e.g. the Queen's private chapel, whilst preserving the castle's historic character. Completed six months ahead of schedule and under budget, well deserved awards were given to key workers, including the deputy and chief fire officers.

Keeping well over Christmas

Ensure you have enough medication to cover the **Christmas period**

In the period leading up to Christmas please make sure you have enough regular medication to see you through when the surgery is closed. Do order your medications a few days earlier than normal if you need to. We often receive requests for two or three months' worth of medications over the Christmas period. Unless there is a particular reason why you need to have more than one month's medication at a time, and do tell us if there is, we will routinely issue just one months' worth, in line with NHS policy.

It is also worth making sure your first aid box is stocked with things you might need over the period, such as plasters, paracetamol, indigestion tablets, antiseptic cream and a thermometer.

As usual, the GP practice will be shut on bank holidays. If you find yourself unwell over the Christmas period consider

District Council update

I am writing this column on Remembrance Sunday, the one day of the year when we all mark the personal sacrifice made by members of our armed forces, particularly from 1914 onwards. These were all people who were prepared to step up to the plate when the call came and, if necessary, were prepared to lose their lives in the service of their country. We all do well to remember them, and the cause and freedoms for which they were prepared to risk their lives.

Whilst in reflective mood, I look back on 2022 and try to recall, from a District Council perspective, what were the most striking events of the year. From the view of most residents this might well have been the introduction of the changed refuse collection service in August. The introduction of the weekly collection of food waste and its use as a source of fuel marks a significant change, and a contribution to increasing the supply of energy from a renewable source.

From the Council's point of view, I think the most significant decision was the decision in April not to proceed with the merger with Warwick DC. The proposed merger made strategic sense in that it could have led to economies of scale in the merged Council's finances. That's why all parties represented on the Council voted for the principle of the merger.

What was not known at the outset of our discussions with Warwick, and only became evident over time was, amongst other factors, the very different risks the two Councils were prepared to accept over their finances. Stratford is currently debt free – it has not borrowed to finance projects. Warwick has its own housing stock, has a housing development company and has an appetite for borrowing money. In the year to the end of March 2022 it increased its borrowings by some £100m to a total of some £400m.

Based on the information Warwick was prepared to make available, Stratford District Council decided that, in spite of the potential upsides, it was not in the interests of the residents of Stratford District to expose them to the downside risks of the financial consequences that could arise in a world of changing financial markets, most notably inflation and rising interest rates.

This brings me on to my second striking event of the year – the political upheavals of the Government over the summer and autumn and the consequences for the District Council. For the vast majority of Shipston residents, their expectations of their District Council are in the main that it should provide an efficient refuse collection service, provide adequate off-street parking (preferable free of charge) and it should deal with local planning

applications, both efficiently and in the interests of the community in general. Party politics, particularly national party politics, has little relevance to these local bread and butter responsibilities. But whether the national Government makes a pig's ear of the



country's finances and economic prospects or not really does matter to us all locally.

I wrote at some length in the October Issue of the impact of inflation on the District's finances, the uncertainty of this year's Financial Settlement from the Government and the implications for next year's District Budget. A Government that displays at least some degree of both honesty and integrity, coupled with a realistic understanding of the British economy and how it works, or doesn't work, is preferable to one that demonstrably didn't.

My third striking event of the year was the death of HM The Queen and the end of an era. As with those who lost their lives in two World Wars and other conflicts, HM The Queen was the epitome of someone who lived a life of service.

In this vein, it is regrettable that Shipston Town Council currently has four vacancies for residents willing and able to serve. With the election of a new Council in prospect next May, I hope that a number of you with the enthusiasm, community spirit and time available will consider standing for the Town Council. As Lord Kitchener famously advertised 'Your Country Needs You'.

If you are experiencing a problem, please contact me. I am always keen to hear from the people I represent.
