Shipston Town Council agrees rise in precept

Shipston Town Council has voted unanimously to raise its share of the council tax precept to £243,000 in 2019/20 – an increase of £11,000 compared with the current year's precept. However, the increase will be covered by the additional number of households now paying council tax, meaning residents will effectively pay the same as this year. As such, an average Band D home will continue to pay approximately £107.88.

Mayor and Chair of the Finance Working Group, Ian Cooper, said: "The Town Council has been working hard to develop a budget that will enable us to support many of Shipston's community groups and voluntary services, while also putting money aside to progress some of our 'wish list' projects. These projects are designed to enhance the town and include some of the community-led schemes identified in the Neighbourhood Plan.

"l'm particularly that pleased we have been able to reach solution which doesn't additional put financial pressure on residents, but the most makes of the income to be received from additional homes in the town. I would like to thank Deputy Clerk, Jayne Potter, for all her efforts in helping the Finance

Working Group pull together and analyse the figures, and my fellow councillors for their considerable input."

Shipston Town Council's precept is just one element of the Council Tax bill which also covers costs for the district



and county councils and the Police and Crime Commissioner. Indications are that modest increases in these other elements of the Council Tax are likely.

Community Grants awarded to support local projects in 2019/20

Shipston Town Council has voted to award grants to support a wide range of local projects, with the total contribution being $\mathfrak{L}20,500$ for the year. This is an increase of over $\mathfrak{L}3,000$ compared with last year.

The recipients of grants for the 2019/20 year are:

- Shipston in Bloom to fund flower displays in the town
- Shipston Wool Fair to help fund new, innovative attractions
- Drugs Action Shipston (DASH) to provide help for vulnerable people
- Shipston Community First Responders to purchase kit for new volunteers and maintain the response vehicle
- Townsend Hall to contribute towards ongoing maintenance
- · Shipston Sports Bowls Green to contribute to maintaining the green
- Shipston Link to maintain and continue the Tuesday afternoon service in Shipston, linking the town and Medical Centre
- Shipston Proms to contribute towards the cost of staging the Proms
- Shipston Youth Club to support work to reach young people not currently attending the club and to help with costs for X-Fest.
- VASA to help with the provision of volunteer drivers
- Town Band for repair work at the Band Hall
- London Road Sports Club to contribute towards grounds maintenance
- Hockey Club to fund first aid and training
- Norgren Bowling Club for mowing equipment

Citizens' Advice South Warwickshire - to contribute towards the Outreach service.

Mayor, Ian Cooper, said: "The range of grants awarded is indicative of the variety of events, clubs and voluntary services in Shipston. We are always keen to support these activities wherever possible and I'm delighted that the town council is in a position to increase its overall grant contribution, thanks in part to the council's careful financial management."

Don't miss your chance to vote - register now

The next town and district council elections are due to take place in May 2019. To have your say, you need to be registered to vote.

If you've registered previously, you should have received a form asking you to confirm your details a few months ago. If you haven't voted previously, you can register online at gov.uk/register-to-vote. You must be 18 or over and will need to input your date of birth and National Insurance number (which can be found on your National Insurance card, or on official paperwork such as payslips, or letters about benefits or tax credits).

Registering to vote not only means you can have your say in elections, but can also help should you need to apply for credit since the register is also used by credit reference agencies to verify the residency of people applying for credit.

Did you know it is an offence not to complete and return the annual household enquiry form, or if you provide inaccurate or false information? Fines can be up to £1,000 so it's definitely paperwork worth prioritising.

I joined the town council six years ago,



mainly because I wanted to help the council adopt a more constructive approach to working with developers.

I have been heavily involved in the Planning Working Group which has been both fulfilling and challenging, requiring the development of lots of new skills. In recent years I have learned a great deal about flooding, planning regulations, district and county council processes and working with developers.

Planning takes up a considerable amount of the council's time, although recent changes should see that reducing as we now have specialist input from a planning consultant. Nevertheless, patience, attention to detail, a willingness to learn new things and the ability to keep detailed records are all very useful skills for planning.

News from Shipston Town Council's January meeting

Hot topics:

Meaningful street names: Having been shown an example from another area, the town council will request that, where appropriate, a statement is added to new street name signs to explain that the road is named after a fallen soldier from the town

A Royal invitation: Ronnie Murphy has been nominated by councillors to represent Shipston Town Council at a forthcoming Royal Garden Party.

Pettiphers Garage update: Stratford District Council has been waiting for a flood risk assessment in relation to the application for a Tesco Metro store with flats above. The council has indicated that if the assessment is not received within the next month, the application will be closed. The agent would then need to reapply for planning permission.

Sheelagh Saunders requested that a risk assessment be conducted on the current site as there are signs of decay. The Clerk will raise this with the district council with a view to ensuring the site remains safe.

Condolences for Polish Mayor: Sheelagh Saunders expressed condolences to the family of the Mayor of Gdansk who was murdered at a public event recently.

Oldbutt Road issues: Brian Cooper is following up with the developer regarding work undertaken at Oldbutt Road which hasn't been fully completed yet.

Christmas Day congratulations: Jackie led the congratulations to the Community Christmas Lunch team. Councillors commented on how lovely it was to see so many giving up their time on Christmas Day for the benefit of others. Shipston Town Band was also thanked for spreading Christmas cheer when they visited Rainbow Fields, Low Furlong and the Ellen Badger Hospital before finishing up at the Christmas Day Lunch. Thanks were expressed to Shipston Rotary for helping Father Christmas tour the town in the run up to Christmas Day.

Mud hazard: Ian Cooper alerted councillors to continuing problems with mud on the Campden Road which has become quite slippery. The Town Clerk will write to the developers to suggest the sites employ a wheel washing policy to prevent mud getting onto the roads.

Parking standards under review: Stratford District Council has reviewed its parking standards which are now out for consultation. These standards include rules relating to the number of parking spaces required for new developments.

Office conversion: The town council has not objected to proposals to convert offices at 13-15 High Street to one apartment but has requested that any changes comply with emerging parking standards.

Campaigning for Shipston:

Foul problem on the rise: Councillors are concerned about increasing reports of dog fouling affecting residential streets,

especially around Tilemans Lane, Berry Avenue and Queen's Avenue. The council will seek action from the CCTV group for evidence to prosecute offenders.

Playground improvements: Peter White echoed concerns raised by local residents about the state of playground equipment, particularly at the Sports and Social Club. The General Purposes Working Group has been trying for some time to find a local company that can provide a repair service. This is now the group's number one priority and the aim is to have all the playground repairs completed this year.

Portabello crossroads: Jo Barker confirmed that Highways is due to be starting the tendering process at the end of January to enable the works to go ahead. In addition to the traffic lights, discussions are also being had regarding potential for a protected area for cyclists and a reduced speed limit.

South Lynn House Appeal: The outcome of the appeal against the first planning application on the South Lynn site for a residential home is expected on or before 1 February.

Adopting open space at The Ridgeway: Shipston Town Council has received details of the proposed Section 106 agreement covering the open space due to be transferred to the town council as part of the application. The town council will need to agree to the terms in the agreement and understand the ramifications, including related covenants affecting the land and costs associated with installing fencing and planting. Martin Ferrier has been through the document and pulled together a list of questions to discuss with the town council's planning advisor before seeking formal legal advice. The town council's legal costs are to be met by the developer.

The Planning Working Group will also clarify the timescales for responding to the s106 proposals.

Town Council business:

Cemetery changes: Councillors have accepted changes to the cemetery rules and fees following a review. Fees are being increased and the rules clarified. Councillors also plan to install a tranquillity garden at the cemetery, subject to funding. A bid has been put forward to the Finance Working Group.

Wall repair: A contractor is now ready to fix the church wall once permission to go ahead has been received from the diocese.

Heritage funding: The Heritage and Leisure Projects working group has sought advice from the heritage development officer for Warwickshire re applying for Heritage Lottery funding. HALP has applied to the Finance Working Group for money to pay for a professional bid writer/consultant to support with the riverside project bid.

Shipston Rotary to 'paint' St Edmund's purple to raise awareness of polio

Shipston Rotary has a special awareness-raising event planned to highlight its Purple4 Polio Campaign on Rotary Day, Saturday 23rd February. The group will be lighting St. Edmund's Church in a purple glow throughout the weekend, while visitors and residents will be invited for coffee and refreshments in Church between 10am and 12noon to find out more about the campaign.

When a child receives their life saving polio drops on mass polio immunisation days their little finger is painted purple so that it is clear that they have received their life saving vaccine. In recognition Shipston Rotary will be offering to paint children's little fingernails with purple nail varnish during the event.

Rotarians Bob and Cath Armstrong will be on hand to show pictures and talk about their experiences administering the vital Polio vaccine to children in India on immunisation day (pictured below).

Polio was eradicated in the UK in the 1980s but there was a time when it presented a real threat. In 1957, approximately 100 people were infected during an outbreak in Coventry. Some Shipston residents can still recall cases of polio affecting people in our Town. Although preventable, there is no cure for polio and it can have devastating consequences.

For over 30 years Rotary has been committed to fighting to eradicate polio across the world – and Shipston Rotary has been actively involved over the years.

Rotary's pledge for a polio free world was made in 1985 when there were 125 polio endemic countries and hundreds of new cases every single day. Rotary and it's partners have helped to reduce the number of cases of polio from 350, 000 cases annually down to 31 cases in 2018. There are now just three countries still classed as endemic: Pakistan, Nigeria

and Afghanistan. To finish the job, over two billion doses of oral polio vaccine have to be administered every year in over 60 Countries until the world is finally polio free.

Rotary has committed to continue raising over

£39.2 million each year until 2020 and has contributed £1.3 billion in total to date, the including generous pledge bν Bill and the Melinda Gates



Foundation to match fund all money raised by two to one until 2020.

Rotarian, Fay Ivens, said,"Purple4Polio is one of Rotary's most important campaigns, which will be recognised by 35,000 Clubs worldwide over the weekend of the 23/24 February. We will be selling Purple Crocus brooches in the town centre on Saturday morning and look forward to seeing the crocus beds in town in flower during the coming weeks to further highlight the campaign".

Shipston Scouts do their bit for the homeless

During the winter months, Shipston on Stour Scout group has been doing its bit for local charities, especially for homeless children in and around Banbury.

The Friday Scout pack took it upon themselves to find out about the sort of hardships that some unfortunate children go through at this time of year, here on our own doorstep. Many



children, some very young, are sleeping rough on the streets of Banbury. So Shipston's Scouts chose two worthwhile charities support that know will make a difference: CentrePoint and the Banbury Young Homeless Project.

Firstly, the Scouts ran a soup kitchen

in their hut on New Street. where all were invited to go in purchase soup and warm up. In addition, they also hosted information centre explaining why they were running this activity. with



Scouts and information boards around the room.

Later in the year, when the temperatures dropped, a group of Scouts slept rough in cardboard boxes. The two events together raised just under £700 for the chosen charities.

Scout leader Ian Fairbourn said that he is extremely proud and humbled by what his Scouts have achieved, and in true scouting fashion, they highlighted a problem local to us and did something about it.

Women's rugby is on the rise in Shipston

There is no denying that girls' and women's rugby has enjoyed a huge surge in popularity in recent years, and is open to those who simply want to enjoy a team sport, through to those who want to play competitively at the highest level.

In September 2017 Shipston on Stour RFC took the decision to offer contact rugby for girls in school years 7 to 13 following the successful introduction of the sport within the local high school. In the club's first season they had 25 players register across the age range of under 13s (yrs 7 & 8), under 15s (yrs 9 & 10) and under 18s (yrs 11,12 & 13). This season, 30 players have already signed up and the club is keen to extend that

further.

The team meets at the Rugby Club every Wednesday evening 6-7pm and Sunday morning 10am - 12pm. Matches and festivals are regularly played on Sunday morning or afternoon at clubs around Warwickshire and are supported by a RFU community development coach.

Playing locally has already led to wider success for many players. In its first season the club had three players make it into the first ever Warwickshire U15s county team, six players were accepted into the Worcester Centre of Excellence and one player joined Worcester Valkyries. So far this

season one player has been accepted into the Centre of Excellence and several players are awaiting attendance

at county trials for U15s and a newly formed U18s later in January.

The club offers a friendly, welcoming and relaxed approach with the emphasis on engagement and fun rather than ability. However, training

sessions can be tailored for those wishing to progress further in the sport.



Club Manager, Leanne Leahy, said: "Not only are we looking for players but also anyone interested in coaching on a casual level or anyone wishing to support with the growth of our developing players.



The club and the RFU offer full support and training for coaches on all levels. All you need is passion and between one and four hours a week available."


can be extremely proud of progressing so far in the competition. Our students consistently shine in such national contests, showing real commitment and resilience. Well done to the team.

District Council Update

The District Budget: At this time of year, it is time to set our budget and decide our precept for 2019/20. The final decision will be made on 25 February, but a draft budget was agreed and approved for consultation on 14 January. Final budget proposals are due to be published on 15 Feb.



Changes to Council Tax levels are restricted by HM Treasury, acting on behalf of the Government and the District Council Tax will rise by 1.5%. Your overall bill might differ from this as the District Council collects everybody's precept including the much larger County demand and the Council Tax for the police, all on one bill. The District Council keeps its little bit but the lion's share is sent on to others.

With more housing, the income from Council Tax is rising. Some of this will pay for extending basic services, like refuse collection, but other changes are proposed. The planning and housing services will be strengthened.

Planning Policy: The consultation last year on sections of the Development Requirements SPG has given rise to new proposals for off street parking standards. In Shipston, we get planning applications with inadequate off street parking. Case officers often dismiss this problem citing that residents are free to use SDC car parks in the town! The Town Council parking survey roundly disputes such an argument, showing just how little space is free for residents after workers and shoppers have parked their cars.

In future we will now have a policy position which means that prospective residents must have their own car parking provision on all new planning applications. About time too!

County Council update

This week has been very full and busy! I started the week at Shipston Town Council where I gained a nice shopping list of queries to look into.



The Budget is going through at all levels of local government at the moment - I am sorry to say there will be rises - particularly for the police and adult social care. I think the time is coming when we will have to consider how much we expect from the state and how much from ourselves and our communities.

What's happening now? Portabello traffic lights - out to tender at the end of January; potholes - being filled; Stagecoach being taken to task by colleagues over their (lack of) service; lorries - enquiry made as to length of time we will have 18 wheelers belting through Shipston; Children's Centre - slow progress I am afraid - but meeting providers in the next 2 weeks; grit bins being filled - if you find an empty one let me know!; Hanson Track - having seen photos of the bridleway from previous summers - I think it may well be time for a work party / local farmer to help / serious effort to be made. If anyone wants to help then we can put a team together - and I will ask for some WCC help (better still they might just do it!)

To end my week I visited the MASH (Multi Agency Safeguarding Hub) where social workers, police officers, family support workers and health workers work together in a call centre dealing with people who suffer from all kinds of abuse in the home or where there are safeguarding concerns elsewhere. I am fairly critical of some of our services (as you know) but I was really impressed with the group of professionals we have to wrap round people in trouble.

The message I take from this week is that we can all do something for those around us - whether you serve as a councillor as I do (and we are always looking for recruits) or in myriad other ways with your friends and family.

Why it's good to move

Doing regular physical activity has a number of benefits for your health. It reduces the risk of developing heart disease or of having a stroke; it can lower your blood pressure and also reduces the risk of many cancers.

Additionally, exercise can help people with diabetes manage their condition or reduce the risk of getting type 2 diabetes. Exercise can also strengthen our bones and muscles.

All physical activity helps. Ideally we should be aiming for 30 minutes a day, but this can be a difficult goal for many of us to achieve, so aim to start with what you can do and build it up over time.

This might be walking a little further each day, walking upstairs more often, or making time to do some gentle

exercises whilst sitting in a chair (see https://www.nhs.uk/live-well/exercise/ sitting-exercises/ for suggestions).

Of course if you are more ambitious there are plenty of sports clubs, events and groups in the local area. Parkrun initiative is now in Moreton in Marsh Fire College and Stratford's recreational ground. These are weekly timed 5k events every Saturday at 9am. The groups are friendly and it doesn't matter if you walk the whole way round at your own pace - there is always a 'tailwalker' so you are never the last person to finish!.
