


They particularly loved the cute little sheep.


They also really liked William Harvey's use of modern technology in his picture. His text was funny and made the judges laugh! They hope the readers enjoy the pictures as much as they did!



### **Census 2021**

Households across England and Wales will soon be asked to take part in a once-in-a-decade survey of housing and population. Census2021, run by the Office for National Statistics (ONS), aims to give the most accurate estimate of people and households. The information will help decide how everyone, from local authorities to charities, spends funds and puts services in place. This could mean things like doctors' surgeries, housing or new bus routes.



The census has been carried out every ten years since 1801 with the exception of 1941 due to the Second World War.

Early in the new year, households will receive a letter about the census with a unique access allowing them to complete the questionnaire online on their computers, phones or tablets. Paper questionnaires are available on request. Census day is March 21 but households with access codes can take part from early March.

The census will include questions about your sex, age, work, health, education, household size and ethnicity. And for the first time, there will be a question asking people whether they have served in the armed forces, as well voluntary questions for those aged 16 and over on sexual orientation and gender identity.

Results will be available within 12 months although all personal records and any detail that would identify an individual will be locked away for 100 years and kept safe for future generations.

# Safer Neighbourhood Team

The Safer Neighbourhood Team (SNT) reports that it has attended 27 Covid-related incidents across the Shipston Beat area, with three fines being issued.

With a spike in residential burglaries experienced by most areas of the country in the darker evenings, and the attraction of more gifts in homes at this time of year, the team says vigilance is key. During November there was one attempted residential burglary, three business burglaries – two from building sites – three motor vehicle burglaries and seven thefts targeting local shops.

The Rural Crime team has been doubled in size. PC Simms, formerly of Southam Safer Neighbourhoods Team, along with PC Kate Taylor, will be allocated the Shipston, Wellesbourne and Southam area to cover.

# **Rotary Victorian Christmas**

Shipston Rotary is delighted to report that the virtual Victorian Christmas evening and further donations over the Christmas period raised over £2,500, thanks to generous sponsorship from local businesses and wonderful support from the people of the town. Proceeds will go to local charities including Shipston Home Nursing.

The Tree of Life in the town centre, put up by RL Thompson Building Services and sponsored by the Royal British Legion, also raised several hundred pounds with proceeds to Acorn Children's Hospice.



# **News from Shipston Town Council's December meeting**

**Affordable housing:** Cllr Trevor Harvey highlighted that 491 new dwellings designated as affordable homes were built in the Stratford District in the past year – a figure not only the highest in Warwickshire, but also higher than any of the 37 other councils in the West Midlands.

Ellen Badger: Sophie Gilkes, director of development for the South Warwickshire NHS Foundation Trust, reported to the meeting that the planning application for the redevelopment scheme and creation of an integrated healthcare hub was due to be submitted on 21 December. Phase 1 of the development will create a new GP surgery, a health and wellbeing centre with clinic facilities, integrated shared spaces for community nursing teams and Shipston Home Nursing, as well as a new car park and landscaping. A survey is being carried out by Healthwatch to assess the town's needs. People can take part in the survey on www.healthwatchwarwickshire.co.uk.

Planning: Consultation for the Site Allocations Plan Preferred Options (SAP), an update of the planning policies and site proposals that set out Stratford District Council's approach to managing development across the district, was due to close on 18 December. The council agreed to endorse the SAP as it stands but to ask for consideration to be given to infrastructure needed for Shipston. The SAP identifies the minimum requirement for Shipston for 510 dwellings between 2011 and 2031 and this number has already been exceeded by around 140. The next review date of the SAP is April 2021.

Kickstart: The mayor reported that the Staffing Working Group is looking into employing somebody under the Kickstart scheme, which creates new job placements for 16 to 24 year olds on Universal Credit who are at risk of long term unemployment. The intention is to undertake data entry tasks such as mapping and burial records.

**Time Bank:** The Time Bank will remain available via Zoom over the Christmas period and beyond, offering support to anyone who needs it.

**Virtual Victorian Evening:** This went ahead on the scheduled date of 4 December as a virtual event live on Facebook. The Shipston Rotary Club ensured the Tree of Life was shining brightly in the town and made a video with reminders of past years.

**Hanson Track:** The track, cleared by Warwickshire County Council and a voluntary group, is being used for walking, running and cycling but was noted as being very muddy. Consideration will be given to requesting further gravel from WCC to make the start of the track more accessible. Other paths in the area are also suffering similarly from mud.

# **Shipston Area Flood Action Group**

Phil Wragg and Geoff Smith reported on a busy year for the Shipston Area Flood Action Group, which had continued its work in slowing river flow, managing to implement 270 measures in areas upstream of the town – and a total of 694 altogether in the past three years. Interventions have included dams, ponds and tree planting, and installing monitoring equipment at Ditchford Farm. With funding from DEFRA and the Environment Agency, and involvement in three academic studies, the group is seen as a key contributor to natural water management. The team of around 12 will be continuing their monitoring throughout this winter across the 198km² catchment to see how the schemes are working,

and has a full programme of works planned throughout 2021.

Below are two of the 600+ dams in action, slowing the water's passage downstream. These are on Sutton Brook, upstream of Brailes. On the right is the attenuation pond at Ditchford Farm which will fill up in flood conditions and hold back over one million litres of water for several hours before slowly releasing it back into a stream feeding Pig Brook.











# **Obituary - Jim Kench**

I have some sad news that Jim Kench passed away on Sunday 22 November in Warwick Hospital. He had not been well for some time, and with breathing problems was on full oxygen prior to his death. Jim joined the band in the



1950s, together with many other local youngsters, as Bert Smith the band's conductor and father of John sought to train numbers of local youngsters to secure the future of the band.



These players were to form the nucleus of the band for the next 20 years when the band was very successful. Jim remained a committed member of the band right up until he had to retire in the late 1990s after a serious heart attack made playing very difficult. Starting on cornet, Jim moved to flugel and then first baritone. Throughout his adult time in the band he was a member of the band committee and in charge of the hall maintenance and repair.

In 1973 Alan, myself, Jim and Andy Smith started raising money through carol playing which has over the years developed into the programme we operate at Christmas now




and on Christmas Eve we always finished at Jim's for a party yet still made it on Christmas morning for our regular calls to Low Furlong and the Ellen Badger.

Away from the band, Jim was also an accomplished sportsman playing football as a goalkeeper for Alveston – who were at the time the Stratford area's top team – and also cricket for Shipston.

We have included a couple of pictures of Jim from different eras. In 1961 the band qualified for the National Finals for the first time and before going on stage the two youngest players – Jim and myself – had our picture taken. In 2012 Jim came out of retirement and took part in the 2012 Centenary march. In his own words he said he didn't think he would be able to play much but wanted to be there. He is pictured with another of our contemporaries Roger Hine who travelled down from Yorkshire for the event.

# Pre-School fundraising for eye charity





This is a cause close to their hearts as one of the children attending the Pre-School has recently been diagnosed with eye cancer. Malachi Collins has retinoblastoma, a rare form of cancer which is most commonly found in young children. Malachi's mum, Stacey-Lou Collins, noticed a very faint cloud in Malachi's eye and a cancer diagnosis followed. Malachi is now undergoing chemotherapy and laser therapy at Birmingham Children's Hospital but is still able to attend Pre-School between sessions when he is feeling well enough. The whole family have received invaluable support from the Childhood Eye Cancer Trust.



Daisy Langford of Shipston Pre-School said: "We wanted to do something to show our support and also raise awareness about this condition, so we have been fundraising for the charity. Among other things we held a raffle and the response from our parents and the wider Shipston community has been absolutely amazing! We have had lovely prizes donated by local businesses including Richard Harvey, Midcounties Co-op, the Cotswold Distillery and the Cotswold Butcher and ticket sales have raised over £1000!"

"I have been quite overwhelmed by how generous everyone has been – especially during these difficult times. I just want to thank everyone who has supported us," said Stacey-Lou.

Stacey-Lou and Daisy were very proud to make their donation to CHECT. Patrick Tonks, Chief Executive of the Childhood Eye Cancer Trust said: "This is an absolutely wonderful effort by Shipston Pre-School. We are so grateful for the generosity of everyone involved, which will enable us to support more families affected by retinoblastoma."

We have now collected all of the stand-alone donations, counted the contents of all the boxes and totted up the money donated for wreaths and we are delighted to say that the total amount raised in Shipston-on-Stour and the surrounding villages for the Poppy Appeal 2020 is  $\mathfrak{L}6.195.02$ .



We have enjoyed sterling support from local traders and businesses and we are very grateful for this in what has been a very challenging period for them. I know that the organisers of the Poppy Appeal hoped to raise between 10 -15% of the sum raised in a 'normal' year. Due to the generosity of the traders and residents of Shipston and the surrounding villages, almost 40% of a 'normal' year has been raised. Considering the restrictions imposed by the Covid-19 pandemic, no house-to-house or street collections and the new central arrangements for people to donate online, this is a really fantastic amount.



### **Christmas celebrations**

Due to Covid-19 restrictions in and out of school, the countdown to Christmas was very different to normal: no choir at the Victorian Evening, no Christmas church service and no Christmas performances in school. However, the staff have worked their hardest to ensure it feels festive in school. Each class was able to have Christmas dinner, but this was spread out over a week, rather than on one day. Children recorded Christmas performance poetry instead of the Stour Federation Partnership choir and all 405 children received a Christmas present (book) on the last day of term. It's a rite of passage for

our youngest children to perform a Christmas Nativity and a pandemic wasn't going to stop the Reception teachers putting on a from show. 'A Very Special Baby' was performed in small groups in front of a green screen and then edited together so that parents could watch their children tell the Christmas story, albeit via video at home rather than packed in the school hall.





#### Virtual history expert

On Friday 13 November the classes in Year 6 had a wonderful time learning about Shipston-on-Stour during World War II, as part of their Remembrance work and for their curriculum topic for this half term, 'A Child's War'.

Doctor Willis, who is an expert on the Second World War, talked to each class virtually through Google Meet. He taught us lots of facts, like how some evacuees came to live in Shipston and how there was a Prisoner of War (POW) camp here



Shipston held a huge street party in the Town Square to celebrate the end of the war



on the Darlingscote Road. There were two sides in World War II; the axis powers (the main countries were Japan, Italy and Germany) and the allied powers, mainly consisting of England,

USA, France and the Soviet Union. The ambitious classes also found out that VE day stands for Victory in Europe Day. Doctor Willis showed us photographs of the main square in Shipston on this day. He also told us that a Spitfire, which was launched in Moreton-in-Marsh, crash-landed in Shipston.

It was so interesting to know what it was like here during the war. The Year 6 classes (Flamingos and Pelicans) had an awesome time learning virtually, all thanks to Doctor Willis. We are hoping to chat with him again very soon to find out even more!
