News from Shipston Town Council's December meeting

Pre-Christmas events

Councillors commented they had between them attended and enjoyed the wide range of well-supported events around the town during December, including the Victorian Evening, Stour Singers, Shipston Proms fundraising concerts, the Town Band Christmas Concert and Holiday at Home.

Drainage

Taylor Wimpey are looking into drainage in Clifford Place where houses have had to rely on sandbags in recent heavy rain.

Town maps and bench

The final town map has now been installed at the Black Horse pub. A bench has been positioned at the Pound.

Traffic lights and streetlights

Council noted that it had not been notified about a number of recent street works involving traffic lights. Cllr Cooper to ask Highways to ensure the Council is always notified so that it can spread awareness, eg via Facebook. Cllr Cooper also noted streetlights on the Ridgeway development appear to be permanently on.

River testing

River testing for water quality is now ongoing at some downstream and mid-town points.

Blue light report

Cllr Passingham noted that the plan for fire stations, including Shipston's own, to be downgraded to surge stations is a matter of urgent discussion at the district council. The portfolio holder and fire chief are meeting the council in January and a public meeting is also planned. Council is to collect information on the number of call-outs the town's fire teams have attended in the past year. It was noted that the town, which has grown to a population of 10,000 and is still growing, has neither a police nor ambulance station. Cllr Dinnie requested that the Emergency Plan Working Group be reconvened.

Cornmill Meadows

Cllr Barker requested that the signage be amended to reflect that the area is owned by the Town Council as a result of a gift. Council approved the management plan for the Meadows as well as costs of $\mathfrak{L}4,711$ for a community orchard and tree planting. A request for funds for picnic/study tables will be submitted in January. A quote is also to be obtained for signage to make clearer the route of the permissive path that leads across farmland from the Meadows.

Ellen Badger Hospital

The Integrated Care Board continues to say it will hold a consultation, but no date has been set.

Town Council News

Planning

The planning inspectorate has agreed to an appeal for the replacement of an existing house with a block of flats on South Lynn Gardens. Council has opposed the plan for being out of scale with the surroundings. It was also noted that the Neighbourhood Plan may have to be updated before 2025 in advance of the Local Plan update in 2027.

Shaping Travel

The Shaping Travel report for Shipston is due to be published shortly.

Cecil Sandford memorial

Council learned with regret that Shipston's motorcycle racing legend Cecil Sandford had passed away. The plan for a memorial to him will go ahead, subject to costings which are being sought.

Thermal imaging camera

A camera which can be used to monitor energy efficiency in buildings is available to be loaned by the Council. A volunteer is putting together guidance on how to use it.

Hub survey

Cllr Dinnie made recommendations for a dilapidation survey at the Hub to be carried out. Any further surveys needed will be carried out by the football club which plans to use the building.

Town tourism

An organisation called Trail Tale is interested in running an online smartphone-guided free heritage trail around the town – this proposal will be taken to the Heritage, Amenities and Leisure Projects (HALP) working group. Cllr Howarth also attended the first VisitLocal meeting.

Great Big Green Week

Cllr H Kelly attended a planning meeting for Great Big Green Week, a national celebration of action on climate change, taking place across the UK from 8th to 16th June 2024.

Finance

Council will approve the overall precept in January.

First Responders

Three new defibrillators have been installed. There are now nine First Responders in town and they hope to finance a second vehicle.

Medical Centre News



New triage system

Shipston Medical Centre will shortly be changing the way patients contact it about medical and administration requests as it launches a new online triage form to replace eConsults.

Why is it changing?

The change will streamline the way patients/relatives and carers can contact the practice and make it easier to submit requests. Requests will be triaged by a clinician to ensure that you are seen by the most appropriate member of staff and dealt with in an appropriate timeframe. Appointments will be prioritised according to need.

Some benefits of this new system:

- Easy to access it will only take a couple of minutes
- · No waiting on hold on the phone
- Your request will be quickly seen by a GP
- Convenience send your request whenever you need it, rather than when you can get through on the phone
- Your GP will be able to help more quickly and easily, for example with a phone call, or by referring you directly to the service you need, such as physiotherapy.

What should I use this new form for?

You can use the form for anything you would usually contact the surgery for such as medical issues that you want to discuss with a doctor or nurse, repeat prescriptions, or admin such as getting a sick (fit) note or test results. Please DO NOT use this form for anything you need a response for within 24 hours. If you think you need help before then, call the surgery. For urgent help or if the centre is closed, call 111 or 999.

What questions will I be asked?

If you have a medical query, you'll be asked to describe it, how long it's been going on for, and what you're worried about. For admin queries, you can choose from asking about test results, repeat prescriptions, fit/sick notes, referrals, a doctor's letter, or something else.

How long will the form take to complete?

The form should only take a few minutes to complete. If you have any issues or can't fill out the form, please contact the surgery and you will get help to complete your request.

Shipston Probus — a history of bagpipes

Most of us will be familiar with the highly distinctive sound of bagpipes, but few will have much idea of the long history of this iconic instrument, or indeed how the sound is produced. Step in Hugh Gillies, a friend of one of our long-standing Probus members, to educate and demonstrate!

It is possible that a basic form of bagpipe goes back to around a thousand years BC in Sumer (Mesopotamia, now southern Iraq) and different varieties can be found throughout the world. Notably the bagpipe has military connections. It was used in World War One to lead the troops 'over the top' with many inevitable casualties. Last used to order troops forward at the second battle of El Alamein, each company was led by a piper playing tunes to identify their regiment in the darkness. Although the attack was successful, losses among pipers were again high and subsequently pipers led from the back. However, this was ignored at D Day June 1944, when 21-year-old piper Bill Millin led from his landing craft onto the Normandy beaches.

To play, the basics may seem simple: blow air through a pipe into a bag which is controlled by pressure from the player's arm. Sound is created by reeds in a chanter and by several other reeds located in drone pipes. But bagpipes are one of the most difficult musical instruments to master, not least the tuning, recently aided by using a computer app. Practice makes perfect, but due to the volume of sound, practice is recommended to be limited to 15 minutes to avoid damage to hearing.

Hugh rounded off his talk with a rousing rendition of 'Scotland the Brave' and 'Highland Cathedral' to the delight of members. Fortunately, Shipston Sports Club is located well away from neighbouring residential premises!

Energetic – and sociable!

The Strictly Fitsteps in Newbold on Stour and the Townsend Hall are particularly popular with the more energetic members of the community. The seated and standing Tai Chi at the Townsend Hall, are both hugely successful, with over 30 people attending each week. There are also Pilates classes on a Friday along with many more. If you haven't tried a class yet, please do. They are all currently free to you and are a great way of helping your mental and physical health as well as being really fun and a great sociable activity.

Indoor curling

The Townsend Hall is also where we hold our weekly indoor curling sessions. These have been so popular that we also host a group in Ilmington, and there is some healthy rivalry between the two. Could we start a third group and have a league?

Surrounding villages

We are very pleased that due to funding secured through the Government's UK Shared Prosperity Fund with Stratford-on-Avon District Council as the lead authority, we can not only continue to hold the classes for free, but also offer activities in the surrounding villages. 
Museum's successful first season

Nearly 500 visitors took the opportunity to see the story of Shipston and surrounding area, with a host of fascinating items and special display of the town's former 29 pubs. Our young visitors especially found the chance to hold history in their hands in the Handling Room both fun and informative.

Echoing the praise from many, Mayor Gerry Kelly said: "The museum is a must for the people of Shipston to find out the history of the place in which they live."

Officially open!

Many months, indeed years, had gone into its planning and preparation before the official opening on 5th August 2023 when Dick Burge, who together with the late Mike Ashley had dreamed of this day, cut the ribbon to Old Clark House, top of West Street car park. The occasion was marked by a

Our furthest guest was from Australia visiting Shipston family who was surprised and delighted with its history. Further praise came from other visitors:

The end of the first season was an opportunity to review progress and recognise all those involved. "This was only possible due to the hard work and dedication of our trustees and other helpers", said Trustee President Bekky Hillman, "And I would also thank our many visitors and all those involved for this historic achievement including Shipston Council for providing the premises."

The museum has taken a first step of three on the path towards Museum Accreditation, the benchmark which aims for well-run museums to be 'sustainable, focused and trusted organisations, which offer their visitors a great experience.'

Looking forward

Despite the closed doors for winter, work is still progressing towards the Easter opening. And fascinating finds are being made from items emerging from the unexplored collection, such as the old glass photographic plates showing Shipston people from the turn of the last century. A mysterious red diary – we don't know who wrote it - reports "14 February 1900 deep snow about 12" deep," while two days later "Thomas Harris, Tredington and Ernest Wise, Shipston – ice broke while skating on the river – very nearly drowned!"



The Shipston Archers

From its early days in 2015, the club has been slowly building up its membership, from our initial total of four! Though we struggled to find suitable spaces that met the strict safety criteria required by Archery GB,



we eventually reached an agreement with Brailes village hall, giving us a superb outdoor range area that eventually allowed us to host the County Championships, not bad for one of the smallest archery clubs in Warwickshire! We increased our membership, reaching over 25 active members. Then in 2020, along with many other sports

clubs, Covid hit us hard, and with the loss of the High School gym facilities, taking away our only indoor shooting range suitable for competition training, we saw a rapid decline. We managed to continue our outdoor shooting practices, even though setting out our targets over five metres apart meant that we took up a fair amount of the field, but we were still shooting! It wasn't easy to keep going, but we persevered, kept the faith,

Fast forward to 2022, our membership figures started to climb slowly again. We had also attracted some interest from Help 4 Heroes, who enquired about taster and beginner's sessions. We also had several up and coming Junior and a few Senior novices who were showing promise, so we looked for suitable competitions to give them a challenge, not easy with so many other clubs pulling back or even folding!

Our chance came on 11th November when our little team of novice archers set off to Warwick University to take part in the Warwick Open Novices Tournament. They were facing students and other archery beginners from many colleges and universities from all over the Midlands and beyond, together with a couple of teams from other local archery clubs - so no pressure then! The tournament required them to shoot 60 arrows, at a 60cm target, over 18m away. We had a village hall to practice in that was only 12m long!

Despite their nervousness and lack of experience, they all stepped up to the mark. Although shooting against much older opponents, they practically cleared up in the medals, coming away with three gold medals, four silver and a bronze! Not only did they medal in their individual bow types, but they also came second in the team competition. Astronomical Society News

The Stratford upon Avon Astronomical Society meet every 1st and 3rd Tuesdays at 8pm (doors open at 7.30pm) at Alderminster Village Hall. Everyone is



welcome, especially beginners and those wanting to learn more. The first Tuesday is a club night. In January that will be on 2nd January and the speaker on the third Tuesday, which is 16th January, is due to be Professor Lionel Wilson from Lancaster University, with a talk called 'Eruptions on Io: a guide to ancient eruptions on the Moon - and Earth' Please note that the speakers usually start quite promptly at 8pm.

Each month one of our members offers pointers to what to look for in the sky during the coming weeks.

On January 3rd at 00.38am, the Earth will be at Perihelion. This means it will be at its closest point to the sun in its yearly orbit. It will be 91.4 million miles from the sun, compared to 94.5 million miles at Aphelion (the furthest point) on 5th July 2024 and 93million miles on average. Thus, the Earth's orbit is elliptical not circular. The sun appears to be 3.5 per cent bigger in January than July. Please don't try and compare the sizes without appropriate eye protection, as it can cause permanent eye damage. Does this make it a 'Super Sun', as the press go on about 'Super Moons'?

So why is it not warmer in January than July in the UK? The Earth's tilt causes seasons and has a greater effect on the temperatures of the various regions of the planet. Also countries such as Australia are warmer than us because their latitude is closer to the equator than ours. The Perihelion might have marginal effect, but is greatly outweighed by these factors.

Club nights offer more information on what to look out for each month and if it is clear we do some observing just outside the Village Hall, so please join us. There is no charge initially to come along and find out more, but if you do want to become a member then the fee is JUST £15 A YEAR and it's free if you are in full time education.
