Shipston Town Council wishes Forum readers a very Happy New Year

Shipston Forum celebrates 20 years!

January 2020 might be the start of a new decade, but more importantly – it's the Shipston Forum's birthday!

The Shipston Forum was founded by Shipston Town Council in 2000 following suggestions from members of the public. Residents had been keen to understand more about the town council and local activities, leading to a proposal for the town council to produce a newsletter. Initially, then town councillor, Gudrun Berry, took on the challenge of editing the magazine, having previously edited a popular newsletter for military wives. But getting the Forum off the ground was no mean feat.



"As with any new idea, not everyone was keen and we had precious little resource to help us." Gudrun recalls. "What we did have, though, was a Millennium Grant from Stratford District Council which gave us the financial help we needed to get our project started."

The vision for the Forum was clear – to create a community newsletter with a mix of content from the town council, contributions from local clubs and

schools, and input from the county and district councils. While the design has had a few updates over the years, the approach to content remains very similar today. In 2001, the Shipston Forum was Highly Commended in the Village Venture Competition run by Warwickshire Rural Community Council - and it continues to be valued by local residents twenty years on.

When asked what the main issues of the day were back in 2000, Gudrun replied: "Dog fouling kept coming up as an issue". No change there, then! But the need to provide services for young people was also a major priority and continues to be so now.

Producing the Shipston Forum today is a bit easier than it used to be. Whereas Gudrun had to physically cut and paste articles into the right places, we have the benefit of design software that makes laying pages out much easier. One of the biggest challenges in the early days, though, was getting people to submit information, particularly within the deadline. It's fair to say this can still be a challenge today, although we're pleased to say we do receive a lot of useful and timely contributions every month.

Despite enjoying editing the Forum, Gudrun had to hand over the reins when it became too challenging to manage while also being an active member of the town council. "It was very difficult to actively participate in discussions while also taking copious notes for the Forum - and it was also important to avoid any conflict of interest," Gudrun added. Since then the Forum has been edited independently, although the town council still oversees every issue.

Mayor, Dan Scobie, said: "As a Town Council we are extremely proud of the Shipston Forum. The newsletter not only allows us to keep residents informed about council news, but is an essential source of information about the vast array of events, clubs, charities and good deeds that happen around the town. Gudrun should feel especially pleased to see the Forum, which she was so instrumental in launching, reach this 20 year milestone."

Gudrun stepped down as editor when she became Mayor in 2001. Since then, there have been a handful of different editors, all bringing their own style. 2020 will see a new face at the Forum as Catherine Martin hands the baton on to a new editor from April.

Catherine said: "After nearly nine years as editor, I feel it's the right time for me to step down, but I will be sad to say goodbye to the Forum. It's a great publication to work on and I've thoroughly enjoyed getting to know the town and the many different clubs, events and charities that generate so much positive news. I look forward to seeing how the Forum develops - who knows what will be making the news in Shipston in twenty years' time?"

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News from Shipston Town Council's December meeting

Hot topics

Safety first: Shipston Town Council is to begin preparations for an inspection of the memorials at the cemetery to ensure they are safe. The inspection will hopefully take place early in the New Year. The Town Clerk will write to St Edmund's Church to request they confirm that they will undertake a similar check.

No spotlight on New Clark House: Peter White raised concerns about the lack of external lighting at New Clark House. The Town Clerk will look into fixing the lights and repairing the missing 'n' from the front of the building.

Praise for Victorian Evening: Councillors congratulated all those involved in such a successful Victorian Evening, especially Shipston Rotary as organisers.

Cemetery potholes: Peter Cox queried why the pothole at the main entrance of the cemetery hasn't been filled in. The Clerk explained that this requires a different stone to match the entrance and there have been problems at the quarry leading to a delay in supply. The hole will be filled in as soon as the stone is available.

Angels everywhere: Fay Ivens congratulated St Edmund's and local groups for the impressive angels display in the church which is on throughout the festive period (see page 8 for details).

Garden waste changes: Stratford District Council has approved a decision to start charging for green waste collection. Further details will be shared when available.

Tree felling: Following an independent inspection of trees in the town, approximately 25 trees in public spaces will need to be felled within the next month for safety reasons. This

includes the dead and dying trees at Railway Crescent. The town council will consider potential replacements where possible.

Campaigning for Shipston

Support for children and families: John Dinnie alerted councillors to the early help being offered by Warwickshire County Council's Family Information Service. To find out more, call 01926 742274 or email fis@warwickshire.gov.uk. John also shared news that work is ongoing to make more use of the children's centre.

Flooding restricted: District councillor, Trevor Harvey reported that only 22 houses in the district were flooded during the bad weather in November. Local experts believe this is due in large part to the work of SAFAG volunteers and that hundreds of houses may have been affected had the proactive flood management work not been done.

Chapel View entrance: Shipston Town Council has objected to Orbit Homes' application to relax the requirement for a right hand feeder lane into the London Road site prior to people moving in. Orbit has applied to delay the works until 20 homes have been occupied but both the town council and County Highways have objected on the grounds of road safety.

Town council business:

Riverbank progress: Meetings are to be held with local contractors to seek advice about the earthworks needed to improve access to and enjoyment of the riverbank.

Going paperless: The town council is planning to move to an electronic records system which will make records keeping and sharing much more efficient.

It's all change in the Clerk's Office for 2020. Alison Packer has taken on the role of Town Clerk following Georgina's retirement. Alison will be working closely with assistant, Diane Neath, who joined the Town Council in August 2019.

Alison is already well known locally, both as a local business owner and for her creation of the popular 'War on Waste Shipston Area' Facebook page. As a community-minded individual who has lived in the area for over 25 years, when Alison saw the Clerk's post advertised, she jumped at the opportunity to become more involved with the town. "I appreciate the importance of the town council, particularly in supporting local groups and initiatives - working closely with local communities was something I had previously enjoyed during my career in public service and although this is a unique role with plenty to learn, I am looking forward to sharing my experience and supporting the town."

Diane moved to Shipston approximately ten years ago and was immediately struck by the amount of events that take place in the town. "My background is in education so I am used to following policies and procedures and dealing with all sorts of unexpected situations which may arise. In the short time I've been here, I've been

amazed at how much work goes in to running a town council. The work is extremely varied – from administering the Council's finances to liaising with allotment holders and contractors and helping with the organisation of events in the town.

The Clerk's office is also open for public enquiries and a lot of time is spent signposting people to the right places for

Alison added: "I can already see that no two days are the same, and whilst I've no doubt this will be a challenge, I'm delighted to be given the opportunity to follow in Georgina's footsteps and do my best for Shipston."

Fingers crossed for a new world record after the Tapathon smashes its target

There were many toes tapping in Shipston in November for the 2019 World Record Attempt for the largest tap dance class.

Shipston's Townsend Hall was a flurry of activity as 30 enthusiastic dancers from Dance with Dash joined in the 10th anniversary Tapathon organised by the Performers Project in aid of Children in Need. As well as raising funds, the event aims to break the world record for the most tap dancers dancing the same routine, across multiple venues. The current record is 7596 dancers but this year's efforts smashed through that target with 7612 people taking part.

Shipston organiser, Sarah, from Dance with Dash, was delighted with the response. "We all had great fun dancing at The Townsend hall and were joined this year by 27 dancers from Chipping Norton School of dance too. We raised £203

on our cakes stall and in excess of £38,300 was raised by the event across the country, all for Children in Need. We now await news as our record attempt has been submitted for verification."



Top tips on tackling the post-Christmas waste mountain

According to recent reports, the amount of waste we produce over the Christmas period rises by approximately 30%. Here's a few suggestions to help you reduce, reuse and recycle your festive waste.

Making the most of district recycling

Your blue bin is the ideal place for non-glittery Christmas cards and paper, biscuit tins, sweet tubs alongside the normal cardboard, plastic and glass bottles, rinsed tins and foil. If you have more recycling than you can fit in your blue bin, please leave it in a rigid or recyclable box next to your bin for collection.

If you've received lots of cards with glitter that can't be recycled – why not reuse them instead? Cut up Christmas cards can make ideal gift tags next year – saving you money and reducing waste. Bubble wrap, plastic film and bags, ribbons and bows can't be



recycled in your blue bin but most of these items can be reused with a bit of planning and creativity.

Food waste can of course go in your green bin – and if you have a garden, vegetable matter is ideal for making compost.

If you have a real Christmas tree, the district council will collect it free of charge with your green waste. Trees over 1.5m (5ft) tall should be cut in half.

Shipston recycling

Thanks to Shipston's own waste scheme in St Edmund's Church, there are lots of other items you can recycle, including Tassimo coffee pods, crisp packets, biscuit and chocolate wrappers which could make a huge difference to how much you send to landfill each year. Please remember that this service is run by volunteers so to make their life easier, follow the instructions about what to recycle in which boxes and only add things that can't already be recycled via your blue and green bins. Most importantly, please thoroughly rinse pet food pouches before recycling so the organisers don't have to deal with any nasty surprises.

Unwanted presents?

As the saying goes, one person's rubbish is another person's treasure and that's certainly true when you look at the success of Shipston's War on Waste Facebook page. If you've received something you don't like this Christmas – or a replacement for something which still has some life left in it – why not offer it via the Shipston War on Waste page, or

New Year's Resolutions – Time to get active?

If you're emerging from the festivities with a new-found enthusiasm to get active or try a new hobby, the Shipston Forum is here to help. Shipston Archers

We introduced archery into the PE curriculum at the High School in 2012, for those pupils who were not achieving their best in sport. It was so successful that we started to need more equipment, so we applied for, and received, a grant from Sport England, through Coventry & Warwickshire Sport. The grant came with a proviso, to allow access to the 14 – 25 year age groups in the local area. We couldn't just rely on the school to provide the facilities, so The Shipston Archers club was formed.

Following a grant from Sport England, our club launched in 2015 (on the 600th anniversary of the Battle of Agincourt!) and runs beginners courses which cover technique, posture, safety and the different styles and aspects of archery. The club now has over 20 current members, aged from 11 to 71. We provide all the equipment for the courses and we also have a number of bow kits for hire or loan. We have also recently sponsored an ex-serviceman to trial for the Invictus Games squad.

We provide archery instruction for all the local schools and we run an annual Primary school tournament each spring. Our next Beginner's Course is planned for May 21st to June 25th next year, subject to takeup, and we will be running another indoor course in August/September.





A 5am alarm call and drive to Shipston, Long Compton and Brailes the following morning proved that a delayed decision was the correct one as the water levels had receded and our schools were open on Friday morning.

Midlands. The winners of that tournament will then play against all of the regional winners in the national final, potentially at Wembley Stadium!

Amusing and often surprising stories of incidents during Peter Mitchell's 60 years in museums entertained members and visitors at the last meeting. THE UNIVERSITY OF THE THIRD AC



Peter's career began when he walked through the Science Museum in London with a job-seeking advert. After a short informal interview, he walked out with a job. Aged just 20 - 45 years younger than the youngest curator – he was to be a "guinea pig" for bringing in younger curators.

One of Peter's tutors was Sir Charles Harvard Gibbs-Smith, a Senior Keeper at the V&A Museum who asked Peter to accompany him to offer help and condolences to the widow of a curator who had died at work. Looking around the house they realised that almost everything, from the flowered Victorian washbasin plumbed-in, to the priceless, 9th century silver figurines on the mantelpiece representing the 13 Apostles of the Greek Orthodox Church, must have come from the museum. Sir Charles gently told her that all the items "borrowed" from the museum would have to be returned, but would be replaced with new. Peter was given the job of refurnishing the whole house and told to give the bill to Sir Charles.

Many distinguished people came Peter's way. For example, he became friends with a man who said he was a tour guide, but also wrote poetry; he proceeded to recite his most recent and yet unpublished poem "Christmas", and Peter discovered he had been talking to John Betjeman.

His career nearly came to an end when he accepted a request from the Bristol Company asking if he could take for the museum the Bristol 188 research aircraft, together with the TSR2. This contravened a secret Prime Ministerial Order by Harold Wilson, who wanted to have Peter held up for treason. Peter had many more stories to share, including that some of his most rewarding experiences were with parties of disabled children, who had hardly ever left the homes where they were cared for, and to whom he was able to open a new world.

Shipston-on-Stour Music Society

At the November meeting of the Shipston Music Society, musician Howard Skempton gave a talk entitled "What makes a composer?" Howard has worked as a composer, accordionist and music publisher. He studied in London with Cornelius Cardew and has won several awards for some of his compositions. He is now a lecturer in composition at the Birmingham Conservatoire. Throughout the evening Howard was assisted by Charles Matthews at the keyboard, playing with his

Howard began by explaining that as a 17 year old, his piano teacher had allowed him to learn whatever he chose, but then things changed when his next teacher presented him with a planned scheme to widen his knowledge and improve his technique! He began to listen to lots of music in a wide variety of styles and became interested in the compositions of John Cage. Immediately he was inspired to start writing his own music in this more modern genre. He experimented with ideas to try to find the necessary harmonic structure and choice of instruments to achieve the desired results.

In 1973 he composed a piece for accordion, later arranging it for the piano. We heard the piano arrangement first before Howard played the original on his accordion – a very interesting listening experience.

The evening ended with extracts from a song cycle based on the poem "Man and Bat" by D. H. Laurence. Composed in 2017 it is scored for baritone soloist with string quartet, double bass and piano and describes the antics which ensued during the man's efforts to persuade the bat to fly out of the room. It was a fitting finale to a fascinating journey from inspired teenager to widely acclaimed composer.

At last we have an idea of what the new Ellen Badger can look like and will do. The architects designing the new hospital and Medical Centre have been chosen and we are excited by the possibilities they have presented.

The cafe will offer a healthy eating menu and a demonstration kitchen to help reverse the obesity epidemic which now threatens to overwhelm the NHS.

It will be at least another half year before the final specification is put out to the developers. That is the time we hope the whole community will say what they want from the "New Badger".

The League will hold other events in the New Year to bring people together with the architects and the NHS managers. We will also now accelerate our own fund raising to ensure the outcome is the very best we can make it. It feels this is going to be a very happy - and healthy - New Year!

District Council Update

A lesson there for SWFT and me to promote staff wellbeing. If the workforce falls over we are not doing anything for the patients either. However, it was good to see the positive achievements at South Warwickshire NHS Foundation Trust recognised by the Care Quality Commission

My other observation is how heavily the NHS relies on overseas nurses and healthcare assistants. We had a briefing about the status of EU nationals, their families and extended family in light of Brexit. In my view the Home Office information was fiendishly complicated. If you are an EU citizen – please consult https://www.the3million.org.uk for advice. SDC are putting on roadshows with councillors to get the message over.

On a different note, I hope you are all pleased with the Portobello? Thanks to WCC for pushing this up the list of works. Now for some rewilding of our verges with seeds from the AONB, tree planting and for all of us to think about our impact on the world around us. Happy New Year Shipston!

Warwickshire libraries launches new e-book and audio book service

Did you know that you can also borrow e-books, audio books and digital newspapers and magazines from Warwickshire Libraries?

Having previously been operating two systems, Warwickshire Libraries is moving to Borrowbox – an app that allows users to borrow eBooks and eAudiobooks for free from their library which is available across most digital devices, including the iPad and Kindle Fire. Borrowbox has been trialled successfully since February and will shortly replace the previous

Overdrive service some library users may be used to.

Borrowbox is expanding all the time and already includes a number of electronic books and audio books. Your library membership also gives you access to lots of digital magazines and newspapers for you to download and read at your leisure.

South Warwickshire NHS Foundation Trust (SWFT), which operates the Ellen Badger Hospital and Warwick Hospital, has been rated as an 'Outstanding' provider. This rating is the highest awarded by the Care Quality Commission (CQC), the independent regulator of health and adult social care in England.

The Trust is the only hospital trust of its kind in the West Midlands region, and one of only 10 nationally, to receive an 'Outstanding' rating.

The rating follows inspections of a number of clinical services across the organisation's acute hospital and community services. In addition, the CQC carried out 'Well Led' and 'Use of Resources' inspections. All areas inspected were given 'outstanding' ratings. Examples of outstanding practice were identified across many of

the Trust's services and the inspectors were extremely complimentary in their observations of the culture of the organisation.
