Treasure trove of artefacts unearthed in Shipston



A team from Archaeology Warwickshire has unearthed 2000 year old finds in Shipston, dating back to the late Iron Age and early Roman period.

The treasure trove of artefacts was discovered on the Taylor Wimpey development site on the Campden Road. A mixture of pottery, coins, lead weights and decorative clips have been identified. The finds included Samian pottery – a type of finely decorated tableware imported from France and Spain. Another significant find was the well-preserved skeleton of a horse, alongside what are believed to be cattle bones probably buried for religious reasons in a ceremonial manner.

Early indications suggest that some of the finds belong to a settlement of the Dobunni – an Iron Age tribe known to have lived across what is now Gloucestershire and the southern part of Warwickshire. The Dobunni are thought to have been early adopters of the Roman lifestyle after the invasion of 43AD. According to Stuart Palmer, Principal Archaeologist at Archaeology Warwickshire, the settlement at Shipston is of considerable interest as it was in use both before and after the invasion and it will be possible to study what the impact of the invasion might have been on the local population.

The dig was funded by Taylor Wimpey as part of its predevelopment work on the site. The investigation began with a detailed geophysical survey and trial trenching to identify the most likely areas of interest. Topsoil was removed from the site, to expose the pits and ditches that indicate where the settlement was. Anne Wallace, Sales and Marketing Director for Taylor Wimpey Midlands said: "Archaeology Warwickshire have made some fascinating discoveries during the archaeological works on the site of our Herdwick Fold development. We are pleased to have been able to donate the artefacts to the local museum so that residents of Shipston-on-Stour can learn more about the history of the area."

The artefacts discovered have been removed from the site to be cleaned and dated ready to be deposited in a museum.

Deputy Mayor, Dan Scobie, requested that the finds were returned to Shipston where they can be displayed for local residents to enjoy.

Dan Scobie said "On behalf of the town council, I would like to thank Archaeology Warwickshire and Taylor Wimpey for inviting us to view some of the finds in situ and for supporting our efforts to return the artefacts to Shipston. We hope to be able to arrange for them to be displayed in the Shipston Museum in the future."

News from Shipston Town Council's June meeting

Hot topics:

Road closures: Councillors expressed concerns about the impact of road closures on other parts of town. Darlingscote Road was becoming much busier with the Campden Road closure in place, meaning there would be more traffic going past the High School.

Wool Fair congratulations: Fay Ivens led the congratulations to the Wool Fair Committee for another successful event. Councillors also wished the Shipston Proms every success with its forthcoming 20th anniversary programme.

Breast screening service: Complaints have been raised by local residents after they had to go to Morrisons supermarket to access breast screening services because the Ellen Badger Hospital couldn't accommodate the service. Jackie Warner reported that some residents had said they wouldn't attend as a result. Councillors are keen to ensure the screening comes to Shipston in future.

Bus service frustration: Buses continue to be a cause of frustration, both in terms of reduced services and confusing signage. It was reported that three people have had to give up jobs in Stratford due to a lack of public transport. Councillor Jo Barker explained that low use meant some services were not commercially viable. Suggestions were raised about a car pool/car sharing service that could be promoted locally. See the County Council column on page 14 for more details.

Protecting trees: Shipston Town Councillors voted to oppose an application to fell a large tree within the conservation area as there were no clear grounds for its removal.

Campaigning for Shipston:

Citizens Advice service reduction: The Citizens Advice service provided at the town council's office has been reduced, with appointments now only being offered to those aged over 55. Deputy Mayor, Dan Scobie, questioned the legitimacy of such a policy. Jo Barker will look into why the changes have been made given the service is part funded by all councils, specifically to provide outreach services in local areas. Details of the new service can be found on page 7.

Preventing flooding: A local resident from Oldbutt Road has reported that the culvert recently cleared out by Lawns2Mow is now blocked again. The Town Clerk will contact Crest Nicholson to investigate possible next steps to alleviate the problem.



South Lynn House - application repeat:

Churchill Retirement Living has submitted another identical planning application for South Lynn House, while its previous application proceeds to inquiry. The new application is the same as the previous one. According to a report in the Stratford Herald, the developer has stated that the new application has been submitted in the hope of avoiding appeal and securing planning approval in July. Shipston Town Council has resubmitted strong objections in line with previous concerns.

Bench request: Micro pub, Thirst Edition, has applied for permission to have permanent benches installed outside its property. STC has invited the owner to the next Planning Working Group to outline his plans for the business as there are concerns that this proposal would have a negative effect on residents. Concerns have already been raised about smoke going into the flat above the pub from those smoking outside and it is feared permanent benches could exacerbate this issue.

Town Council business:

GDPR policy: The town council has developed a new General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) policy to ensure personal data is handled in accordance with the new guidelines. The Communications Working Group will review the draft document prior to its adoption.

Face-lift for New Clark House: The Painting of New Clark House has been completed. Quotes are now being sought for help in tidying up the rest of the outside and cleaning the window sills.

Scam alert - don't get caught out

Warwickshire County Council Trading Standards is warning residents to be on the look out for sophisticated scams. Whilst fraudsters are still using amateurish mass marketed scams such as poorly put together 'Lotto Winner' and 'Nigerian' letters or emails, some are turning to more elaborate cons to target specific individuals and companies.

More elaborate scams include copycat websites designed to look like official websites to encourage people to part with personal information and make payments which go to the wrong account. Some have been caught out having received a call offering to 'fix' a problem with their computer, while others have fallen victim to demands for payment from people masquerading as HMRC or other government bodies.

Dr David Williams, who led the fundraising campaign, said: "We have been overwhelmed by the generosity of local residents who put in so much effort to support these great causes. I would like to thank everyone who took part in the

challenge, including the many businesses who sponsored or gave raffle donations, the Rugby Club for generously hosting our after party, and all those involved in organising the challenge."

Camels to entertain Kids-on-the Green

A 19-year-old student from Idlicote is heading to London to support children affected by the Grenfell Fire.

Nineteen-year-old, Daisy Fossett is taking a herd of camels to the North Kensington Youth Festival to entertain children affected by the Grenfell Tower disaster. Daisy comes from a well-known circus family who own a herd of racing camels. Daisy will present a show explaining the camels' origin, African heritage and the traditional work they do in desert countries like Morocco and Tunisia.

The opportunity arose after The Fossetts met Zoe Le Vack, the founder of Kids-on-the-Green - an emergency response project originally set up on the morning after the fire which broke out in the early hours of June 14th. Her vision was to transport the children affected by the disaster to a calmer, green space. In the past 12 months the project has thrived thanks to many more volunteers, community members, other charities, and latterly the local authority.

Daisy Fossett said: "I'm privileged to be part of it helping Kids-on-the-Green and looking forward to engaging with the children in the community and showing them the camels.

We've trained them to react well and safely around kids."

Zoe LeVack said: "The trauma of Grenfell is still raw. Families who turned to Kids-on-the-Green have been in shock; they've been angry, but they should be able to smile and laugh. The presence of Daisy Fossett and her camels from South Warwickshire on June 30th will be a part of that."

variety of places including the largest British Military cemetery Tyne Cott and Langemarck, a German cemetery. Many students were able to visit relatives' graves as well as a grave holding great significance for four former Brailes Primary students. J.E Phipps was



the grandfather of their former teacher's husband who has never been able to travel to the site. The students placed crosses on behalf of the family at his graveside. On our third day we travelled to France and visited the Somme. The first stop here was the Lochnagar Crater, one of the largest man made holes on earth caused by a mine. We followed the route that casualties would have taken either on stretcher or on foot allowing students to understand the movement of casualties during the war. We

spent our final day in the Arras area investigating the underground tunnel system used to move troops closer to the front line. As part of the tour two students were selected to lay a wreath on behalf of the school during the Menin Gate ceremony that takes place every evening.

More than just photographs, the exhibits shown by Adrian James with his talk "Four Seasons and



a Festival" were works of art. The gardens we were shown, which are all open to the public, were Anglesey Abbey, Cambridge (Winter), John's Garden, Kinswinford (Spring), RHS Rosemore, Devon (Summer) and Batsford Arboretum (Autumn).

Starting with winter, when many people have cut everything down so there is nothing to look at, Mr. James showed how, at this bleak time of the year, there can be the most dramatic striking scenes. Examples included patterns of bare branches, coloured barks, berries and evergreens, such as the Winter Walk of paths winding between the trunks of paper birch. In spring, the rush of new life produces ever-changing pictures of beauty, and, in summer, luxuriant contrasts and complements of different colours, heights, sizes and textures. Always there should be a focal point to draw the eye in a direction to complete the picture, and yet to wonder also what is beyond. Batsford Arboretum is near enough to Shipston for most of the audience to have visited, maybe in spring or summer, but perhaps not in autumn when many of the splendid and rare trees can be seen at their best, as shown with striking colours.

The climax of the evening were the pictures of the grounds at the RHS Wisley lit up at night for a special occasion.

Why I Joined the Legion from Mike Wells, Branch Treasurer

I haven't served in the Forces and my joining the Royal British Legion resulted from the research that I did into the men on the Shipston on Stour War Memorials. That research eventually became the book Shipston Remembers. The project was an offshoot from some family history research that had been prompted by my daughter Chloe, who was at Primary School at the time. We'd always gone to the Remembrance Sunday parade and service, but she came home from School one day at Remembrance-tide and asked if our family had anyone who had been killed in either of the wars. A dig around in the family tree showed that we did, which prompted researching their military service and

then that of those family members who had returned safely. Once completed I was looking for a new project and wondered about the men on the War Memorial in Church Street. I popped along to see the guys at the Museum and enquired if any research had already been done. They said it hadn't, but they thought it was an excellent project that they'd not had the time to do and would I like some help. That help included linking me in to the Shipston RBL branch, which I joined as I strongly support its two main objectives, furthering remembrance and welfare. Shipston Remembers was published in 2009 with all proceeds going to the Poppy Appeal.

240033 Lance Serjeant REGINALD LANGLEY

Born on 13th September 1892 Reginald was the youngest son of Harry and Mary E Langley of Uttoxeter Old Road, Derby, and was the younger brother of John Harry Langley who was killed on 29th April 1917.

On 29th October 1900 John and his younger brother Reginald were enrolled into the Shipston Boys School, having just arrived in the town. The School Register notes that the lads' father is a Hotel Proprietor and that they are living at the Bell Inn. The Register also notes that their previous

schooling took place in Solihull. In 1901 the census confirms their address as being the Bell Hotel, Sheep Street, Shipston-on-Stour, Worcestershire. John left school on 27th February 1907 when he was fourteen and a half.

Reginald was listed in the Evesham Journal of the 26th September 1914, as being with the 1st/5th Battalion Gloucestershire Regiment and it is assumed that Reginald had served with them before the war and was called up when the Battalion mobilized in August 1914. Like Sidney Batchelor, Reginald went to France with the 1st/5th Battalion on the 29th March 1915 and the two men fought alongside each other throughout the war. On the 19th July 1916 B Company were told to take Point 79 and, in trying, suffered heavy casualties, as they did when they tried again on the 20th. They tried again a third time on the 21st and reached their objective, but with no cover had to withdraw. Incredibly they tried again on the 23rd and the Regimental History records that as soon as they set off out of their trenches the enemy "met them with murderous machine gun and rifle fire" and casualties were again heavy.

At this point they were withdrawn but they were back in the front line by the 16th August, when they undertook another failed attack, this time losing over 100 men killed or wounded.

They were back again on the 27th August, when they lost another 100 men in another raid.

For the next 11 months the Battalion were lightly used until late July 1917 on the Ypres Salient, where they were to take part in the Battle of Passchendaele. The Battalion took the lead in the centre at Langemarck and encountered the Germans' new defensive invention, concrete 'pill boxes'. Attacking early on the 16th August they initially made good progress but were held up by machine gun fire from pill boxes. When they were relieved the following day they had lost 217 men. On the 27th August the Battalion took part in an attack where they lost a further 344 men.

After such heavy losses they were not used in any attacks again until the 4th October, when an attack was launched in conditions described as 'beastly' and barely 300-yards of progress were made. The war diary records casualties as being 'light', but 131 men and officers were lost. On the 11th October they marched out to camp and within a couple of weeks the Division was ordered to Italy to assist in resisting an Austro-Hungarian offensive in the Julian Alps.

The Evesham Journal of the 13th July 1918 reports, in a piece next to the one reporting the death of Sidney Batchelor, the following:


Corpl Fitter F C Beachus, in a letter from the Italian front to his parents at Shipston, states that Pte Reginald Langley, recently of the Bell Hotel, Shipston was missing and either a prisoner or killed. He was a Territorial when the war broke out, belonging to the Shipston section of the Gloucesters and has seen considerable service in France and Italy. Corpl Beachus states that he received this news directly he returned to his battery after a month in hospital, suffering from an accident and an attack of influenza.


Reginald is buried in Egna Communal Cemetery, North of Lake Garda in Italy. He is remembered on both the Town and Council School Memorials.

We have now settled into the new Civic Year at WCC and I have continued to do all things children and education. Yesterday we recommended, and should get, some funding to help develop the



new Dimensions Tool. Huh? What's she on about now? This is a new app developed by health professionals as part of the contract to provide CAHMS. So children and young people can use it (with their families, at school or with a GP etc) to identify their potential mental health or SEN needs. The main point of this is to give early intervention opportunities so that those with eg low mood can find the sort of help they may need, early and in a non-threatening form. That's the theory!

Those of you still with me - would you do me (and all our future users) a huge favour? Google (or any other search engine!) Dimensions Tool and see what you find. Then you might like to test the tool and let me know what you think. Any of us can have mental health issues - and many of us will know others - for whom early intervention would have made a radical difference in their lives. Most mental health problems have begun by the age of 14.

I hope you will help out as an informal Shipston User Group of the Dimensions Tool. We could make a serious difference to the tool and in the way it develops and of course helping out is never a bad thing for any of us.

Please do let me know what you think and get in touch.

Next month I hope to have a proper update about buses. I know that people are now unable to get to Stratford to work as a result of timetable changes and with our MP Nadhim Zahawi and County Council leader Izzi Seccombe we are talking to the bus companies. I am also exploring car pooling and ring and ride schemes. We will try to find a solution - probably a very Shipston one - helping ourselves!

Cervical Screening

Over recent years we have seen the rates of women coming for their cervical screening (or smear test) drop a little. Cervical screening is NOT a test to find cancer. It is a screening test to detect changes to the cells of the cervix, which are called cervical abnormalities or precancer. Cervical screening helps to save 5000 lives each year.

Across the whole of the UK women are invited for cervical screening between the ages of 25 and 64. Women aged 25–49 are invited every three years and women aged 50–64 are invited every five years. Women may be invited for screening up to 6 months before the age of eligibility (ie. at 24 years and 6 months old).

Patients eligible for screening are often anxious about the procedure. Our nurses have a lot of experience in administering the test and will be happy to talk about it and will help make the experience as easy as possible.


