# Riverside proposals to be unveiled for consultation

Proposals that could see the river banks by Shipston Bridge transformed into a haven for wildlife and recreation will be unveiled for public consultation on 2nd and 3rd August. The plans are the culmination of months of work led by Shipston Town Council's Heritage and Leisure Projects working group, supported by local landscape architect, Emma Stolwood from Stolwood Architects.

Town councillors were given a sneak preview of the plans at the June meeting, which cover new furniture, attractions and planting. If all goes to plan, on the Bridge Car Park side of the river, the main attraction will be a new viewing platform over the river. The platform would give residents and visitors a much clearer view of the river, with a chance to spot local wildlife both in the water and on the banks.

HALP is also hoping to install a natural willow arch for children to run through as well as a willow seating area and



new picnic benches on that side of the river. Information boards will be added to share information about the river, local wildlife, and flora and fauna.

On the Mill Street side, the team is hoping to replace the current metal crash barrier with a more attractive wooden one. The diseased willow tree will be cut back significantly and turned into a bug hotel and there are plans

for a raised bed to add to the other striking floral displays around the town. The HALP team has also looked at various options for plants that will attract wildlife and provide year-round interest.

The proposals have been developed following careful consultation with a range of experts and take into consideration the potential impact of future flooding. The team is now inviting residents to view the proposals and share their views before the important work of seeking funding begins.

Co-chair of the HALP Working Group, Sheelagh Saunders, said: "We are really excited about the plans to make the most of the river at Shipston Bridge and we'd really like to share where we've got to with local residents. The plans will be on view throughout the two day consultation



the river from Clark House to explain the proposals in detail.

"This is one of the priority projects that arose from the Neighbourhood Plan so it's really important that our community is involved in the next steps and has the opportunity to make this a space we will all want to use. We hope to see as many of you at the open day as possible and look forward to hearing your views."

Alongside the consultation, the working group is seeking a bid writer to support bids for funding - see page 3 for details.

# Shipston Town Council considers options for Children's Centre

Warwickshire County Council has appointed Barnardo's to provide family and children's services at its remaining Children's Centres across the county. WCC has approached Shipston Town Council to explore whether it would be willing to take on the running of the Badger Valley Centre which would enable the town to retain some services for 15 hours per week.

A number of other uses for the building have been put forward to make full use of the space, including providing support for 19-25s with learning difficulties, acting as a maternity hub for Shipston and run the Food Bank from the centre. However, no plans for how these services could be funded have yet been put forward.

The town council is keen to look at ways to retain services at the Children's Centre but there are significant implications in terms of costs and responsibilities which need careful consideration.

Mayor, Dan Scobie, said: "It's clear that we don't want to lose important services that benefit our residents. However, we have limited resources – both financial and staffing - to take on such a significant and long term responsibility which a larger authority may be better placed to run. We will consider all the options in detail, and continue to drive for the retention of services."

# Fingers crossed for good weather - it's time for Fish'n'Frolics!

Shipston's three day annual angling festival is back this month - now in its 7th year!

The Great Duck Race fundraising pre-event on 14th July at Shipston Bridge, will see 200 ducks set sail, with proceeds going to Shipston First Responders and Fish'n' Frolics Festival.

The main event is the Fish'n'Frolics Festival from 26th-28th July where anglers can fish for three days. Juniors and anyone else can learn how to fish with expert tuition and learn more about the sport and welfare of the rivers and surrounding areas.

The Frolics start at 5pm on Friday with live music from various bands including Clarksville, and Texan Peacocks. Alongside the angling, Saturday will see stalls, an outside bar, street food, and activities throughout the day followed by music from 5pm, featuring headline band, Adrian Styles. For the first time, Sunday will focus on sports for all - see page 6 for details.

Entrance to Fish'n'Frolics is free and everyone is welcome. Organiser, Stuart Fleming, said: "This is a community event put on by Shipston Angling Club to encourage more juniors into the sport or any other type of outdoor activity. This year, thanks to investment made possible from previous Fish'n'Frolics events, and with the help of Shipston Town Council, The Angling Trust and The Environment Agency, we have opened up the river Stour at the Sports Club so that everyone can enjoy the beauty of the river."

# **Hot topics**

**Giant hogweed:** Jo Barker has spotted giant hogweed on the river bank and will notify Stratford District Council to request removal.

**Green energy:** The Town Clerk will look into possible green energy at New Clark House through a community-based scheme. The first step is most likely to be an energy audit.

**Wool fair:** Fay Ivens led the congratulations to all those involved in the Wool Fair Weekend which was echoed by all councillors. Marianne Westwood recorded thanks to Mike Ashley and Dick Burge for their work in preparing the pop up photographic exhibition at Clark House which opened for the first time during the Wool Fair.

**Portabello delay:** Jo Barker was sorry to report further delays to the works although the work has now been commissioned - see page 14 for more details.

# **Campaigning for Shipston**

Planning - major application on our borders: John Dinnie alerted councillors to proposals to install three poultry sheds in nearby Barcheston, each of which would house 50,000 chicks. This would result in a changeover every 2-3 months when each shed would be emptied, cleaned and refilled, leading to approximately 60 lorries passing over Shipston bridge in the space of a few days.

Barcheston & Willington Parish Council has objected, as has Highways but town councillors were encouraged to consider responding to applications like this with the potential to significantly impact the town.

**Health services:** Marianne Westwood and John Dinnie both attended the recent Patient Participation Group meeting which included an update on plans for a new medical centre. South

Warwickshire NHS Foundation Trust has put forward a plan for incorporating a medical centre on its site but needs the backing of the Clinical Commissioning Group that is responsible for commissioning - or buying - healthcare services for the community. The town council was encourage

for the community. The town council was encouraged to get involved to support efforts to progress the project with the South Warwickshire CCG.


Party time: Sheelagh Saunders reminded councillors that next year will see the 75th anniversary of VE Day. The bank holiday Monday will be moved to Friday 8th May, with Saturday 9th expected to be the day for community celebrations. The town council would be keen to support a local event and would be interested to hear from community groups or residents that may be interested in taking the lead. Please contact the Town Clerk in the first instance.

**New approach to planning:** Paul Tesh and John Dinnie have developed a new way to manage planning applications to make it easier for councillors to view and contribute to applications. Terms of reference for the new Planning Committee are being finalised.

The Planning Working Group is keen to finalise the Town Design Statement and consider a new Housing Needs Survey – these will be brought to a future council meeting for discussion.

Heritage and Leisure: Following the report from Emma Stolwood (see page 1) the town council agreed to spend up to £1500 on professional fees for a structural engineer to design a viewing platform. Councillors also agreed in principle that money previously identified for a footbridge could be reallocated to the riverside project (subject to an agreed project plan) as there is no realistic prospect of a footbridge being feasible in the foreseeable future.

# What's the point of 'Bootpoint'?

Every Friday evening sees a small team from St Edmund's and Stour Valley Baptist Churches rocking up to Mill Street car park armed with flasks of hot chocolate, cheese sandwiches and cakes. But it isn't some sort of church social event. Instead it is part of the churches' response to the needs of young people in the town. The team goes there to talk with and listen to the growing numbers of young people who feel they have nowhere else to go.

The project started last July as a trial over the summer holidays but such has been its popularity it continued through the winter months and is fast approaching its first anniversary. So if you see a car pulling into Mill Street car park around 7.15pm and unloading flasks and sandwiches – that's what they are up to!

Those who go have found it very humbling that young people would want to chat and share their challenges and joys. The volunteers are seeking to support ideas that the young people have come up with and explore how they can possibly be made a reality in Shipston, such as a boxing club and a covered shelter. They are also hoping, as Christian communities, that this simple act helps young people, who often feel without value or worth, to know that the churches are caring and listening to their voices.

Daniel Pulham from Stour Valley Baptist Church, said: "We trust that our small contribution adds to the jigsaw of support for Shipston's young people."

# Proud of My Town: Shipston Fallen

# T4/242655 Corporal JAMES BRADLEY

Born on the 10th March 1883 James was the third son of James and Fanny Bradley of Husbandman's End, and was baptised in St Edmunds on the 29th July 1883.

On the 11th October 1886 James enrolled in the Infants School, moving up to the Boys School on the 15th July 1889. It is not recorded when he left education but it would probably have been in early March of 1896, just before his thirteenth birthday.

By the time of the 1901 census James was working in a dairy. In the summer of 1908 James married Frances Miriam Arthur who was born in Honington in late 1885. At the time of James' death Frances lived in Elm Terrace, Shipston, Worcs.

Given his age, 36 when he died in 1919, it is assumed that James was called up

slightly later in the war and his death certificate records his job as being a cashier at the Post Office.

James served with the 241st Company of the Royal Army Service Corps, which was No. 40 Horse Transport Reserve Park, formed in February 1915, and based at home throughout the war. The T4 element of his service number confirms that he would have worked with horses. The job of a Reserve Park was to maintain sufficient supplies to support an infantry division with rations for 2 days.

From his death certificate it appears that James died from cancer in his tibia that had also spread to other areas of his body. He died on the 10th July 1919.

The death certificate also records that his residence was in Tredington. James is buried in Colchester Cemetery, remembered on the Town Memorial.





## **Shipston U3A Open Meeting**

### T.S. Eliot and Cotswold Gardens




Graham Pearson, Volunteer Archivist at Hidcote Manor garden gave an interesting talk to the Shipston-on-Stour U3A at its meeting on Tuesday 28th May 2019 when he described a journey of discovery that started in 2016.

A talk to a group of Stanford University Alumni at Hidcote in September 2016 led to an invitation to visit Burnt Norton - and then Graham discovered letters written by T.S. Eliot who had visited the Rev and Mrs Carroll Perkins from Boston, Massachusetts, when they rented Stamford House in Chipping Campden for the summers between 1934 and 1939. These letters showed how much T.S. Eliot enjoyed his stays at Stamford House on at least thirteen occasions.

Graham then discovered that Mrs Edith Carroll Perkins was a keen gardener and took hand coloured photographs of gardens that she had visited in England which she asked T.S. Eliot to give to the Royal Horticultural Society in 1948. Graham showed some of her slides of gardens in Chipping Campden and at Hidcote. This led Graham to find that the Garden Club of America had made a pilgrimage to England in 1929. He shared descriptions of their visits to gardens in the Cotswolds and finished with nine black and white photographs taken at Hidcote on Thursday 13th June 1929.

the Cholertons have cleared of weeds and rubbish and established a wildlife reserve. Where the tracks once ran is now a pleasant walk through woodland, alive with flowering plants, bird song and butterflies. Three ponds have been created which help attract wildlife of all kinds from grass snakes

Jean showed photographs of moths and butterflies which are attracted to the site and the meeting was amazed at the wide variety. Some very rare species have become regular visitors by the simple method of making sure that what they like to eat is available. This has meant they have attracted species such as rare local moth, the Waved Black Moth, and very rare butterflies Adonis Blue and Chalkhill Blue. The Cholertons are hoping to make their site a protected site and eventually an SSSI - Site of Special Scientific Interest – because of the large number and variety of the insects which live at the bottom of their garden.

The meeting continued after teabreak with WI business. Shipston WI had taken part in the wedding flowers exhibition at St. Edmunds Church during the recent Wool Fair. The exhibit (a wedding cake and flowers all made of paper) had been much admired. It was beautiful and showed enormous skill.

The next meeting will be on 3rd July at 7.00pm when Maggie Wood will be talking about Warwickshire Smocks.

And now with a greater national emphasis on "wellbeing", the local authority, tasked with supporting public health initiatives involving smoking, diet, exercise, mental health and social isolation, may add yet a further set of acronyms to confuse us.

What then is our role as "Friends...."? Perhaps we now need to consider what we want from our local health and care service, what defines it and what it needs to look like in the second quarter of the C21st. The League intends to offer an opportunity in Shipston and its surrounding villages after the summer to do just that.

## **Shipston Music Society**

The name of the composer, Gustav Holst, probably brings to mind his renowned Planets Suite, widely used in films and adverts, and Angela Applegate of the Holst Birthplace Trust gave a wonderful talk all about his life and connections with the area.

The Holst family originated from Sweden, Latvia and Russia, moving to England in the early 1800s. The young Gustav was not a healthy child, suffering from poor eyesight, a weak chest, and neuritis in his right hand which gave him great pain. Despite this, he was encouraged to learn the piano, and later the trombone. Apparently at times the pain was so great in his writing hand, that he often composed with a pencil tied to his finger – an astonishing example of perseverance.

Holst began composing whilst at Cheltenham Grammar School and became organist and choirmaster at Wyck Rissington, before moving on to the Royal Academy of Music where he relied on a loan from friends for his first year's fees. During this period of his life he was very poor, became a vegetarian, and walked everywhere.

Holst was unable to take part in WW1 because of his eyesight but during this time he wrote his most famous work, the Planets Suite, which was premiered in 1918. It has been enduringly popular, and Holst himself adapted Jupiter into the hymn I Vow to Thee My Country (1920).

The talk was liberally illustrated with excerpts from Holst's music some of which were new to the audience. Holst was a workaholic – not only did he compose, but he taught and performed professionally. He lectured overseas and was very much in demand. He was never strong, however, and died of heart failure at the age of 59.

# **Shipston Medical Centre**

### Be skin aware this summer

With summer around the corner it's important for all of us to be skin aware. Moles are small coloured spots on the skin, most people have them and they are usually nothing to worry about unless they change size, shape or colour.

It's very normal for babies to be born with moles and for new moles to appear especially in children and teenagers. Also you may notice that moles fade or disappear as you get older and that during pregnancies moles can get slightly darker; however it's really important to see your GP if you notice a change in a mole.

New or existing moles should be checked out if you notice any of the following:

- · a change in shape
- · if it looks uneven
- a change in colour, gets darker or has more than two colours
- · itching, crusting, flaking or bleeding
- gets larger or more raised from the skin.

These changes can happen over weeks or months. This is sometimes a sign of melanoma, a type of skin cancer. If your GP thinks it is a melanoma, you'll be referred to a specialist in hospital and you will have an appointment within two weeks.

UV light from the sun can increase the chance of a mole becoming cancerous. If you have lots of moles you need to be extra careful in the sun. It is important to

check your moles regularly for any changes.



There are some Shipston Medical Centre things you can do to protect your moles from sun damage specially during hot weather. Do stay in the shade between 11am and 3pm when sunlight is strongest, cover your skin with clothes, wear a hat and sunglasses if you have moles on your face and regularly apply a high factor sunscreen (minimum SPF15) and apply again after swimming. Also don't be tempted to use sunlamps or sunbeds because they use UV light.

More information can be gained about sun, UV light and cancer from the Cancer UK Website.
