# **Shipston Town Council welcomes new Mayor and Councillors**

The Annual General Meeting of Shipston Town Council saw the election of a new Mayor and Deputy Mayor for the town. It was also the first meeting for the four new councillors elected in May.

Dan Scobie was unanimously elected Mayor for 2019/20 - his second term in the role having previously chaired the council in 2017/18. Sheelagh Saunders was unanimously elected Deputy Mayor.

Stepping down from his Mayoral role, lan Cooper thanked all those who had supported him over the past 12 months.

lan said: "It has been an honour and a privilege to serve Shipston as Mayor. We have a strong and unified council. Although we have our own say and opinions, we act together which stands us in good stead."

Ian Cooper went on to thank fellow



councillors and former mayors for their support and guidance, as well as Rev Sarah Edmonds for her help with town events and ensuring civic dignitaries received a warm welcome.

The Town Clerk and Deputy Town Clerk were presented with flowers as a thank you for their work for the Mayor over the past year (below left).

lan Cooper also recorded thanks to former district and county councillor, Chris Saint, for his hard work and support for Shipston over his many years in office. Chris stood down at the recent elections.

Dan Scobie congratulated lan on a successful year as Mayor, which saw the town council strengthen links with young people in the town.

### Shipston First Responders announced as 2019/20 Mayoral charity

Mayor, Dan Scobie, announced that his charity for the year will be Shipston First Responders (SFR).

SFR help West Midlands Ambulance Service get trained, experienced care to a patient very rapidly. SFR volunteers are based in and around the town and can usually respond to an emergency call within 5 minutes which can be vital considering the town's rural location.

SFR, Tony Booth (pictured) explained that the team is often first on the scene, and has saved lives in cardiac arrest situations. The team aims to provide a service 24 hours, 7 days a week and is always looking for more volunteers.

SFR is funded entirely from donations and grants. All of the people delivering this vital service are volunteers, helping others in their own time, and at their own cost.

Mayor, Dan Scobie, said: "I was surprised to discover that SFR volunteers have to pay for everything out of money they raise or their own pocket. This includes their uniforms, their first aid supplies, and their heart defibrillators. If they use any



equipment on a patient, they have to replace it at their own expense. This year the Town Council will be helping to raise funds to allow SFR to focus on delivering the care they do so well, and have to spend less time thinking about the money."

### **News from Shipston Town Council's May meeting**

The Annual General Meeting was a change from the usual format of meetings. The principal piece of business was the election of the new Mayor and Deputy Mayor.

This was followed by the confirmation of annual statutory documents including the internal audit report, governance statement and accounts statement.

Membership of Working Groups and roles on the various external committees will be reviewed over the next few weeks.

**Planning:** Councillors voted to remove a previous objection to the development of garages at Pittway Avenue following confirmation that the existing path will be retained.

Councillors also withdrew their objection to an extension at Springhill subject to the provision of clear plans indicating there would be no impact on the town boundary.

### Have your say as part of the polling places review

Residents are being asked to have their say on where in Shipston they are able to cast their vote during elections. A consultation has been launched by Stratford-on-Avon District Council as part of a review of polling districts, places and stations for the Stratford-on-Avon constituency.

The District Council is required to carry out such a review every five years to ensure voting arrangements remain up-to-date, convenient and accessible for electors.

David Dalby, Returning Officer for Stratford-on-Avon District Council said: "We want to hear if anyone has concerns or issues with the current venues and, if they have, perhaps suggest more convenient or accessible locations for future elections. It is important that we make sure everyone can exercise their right to vote with ease."

After being nursed back to health by Kyra and Sophie, the two 13 year old girls who run the rescue, he was then cared for in a foster home in Newbold on Stour over winter. He was released back to his home town of Shipston in April.

If you see Dec or one of his friends out in your garden this summer, please help them by:

 Providing a shallow dish of water for them to drink (not milk as they are lactose intolerant)

- Making a small hole in your fence so they can move between gardens without having to go on the road
- Avoid using slug pellets (which are poisonous to them)
  - Not being too tidy! They need dead leaves to root around in

for food and nesting material



The Careers department at Shipston High School is constantly evolving. With recent new guidance from the DfE and a constantly changing labour market it is really important to keep up with all the new requirements. Our extensive careers programme starts as early as Year 7 encouraging students to think about their interests and looking at some of the skills they will need in the future.

Year 9 students undertake Further and Higher Education workshops involving many external organisations including businesses like Taylor Wimpey, Q Hotels and Ricardo Engineering and education providers like Warwick University and Stratford College. A recent highlight was



a visit by Comau, a robotics company who brought two robots with them which students had to control to make them perform various tasks. Our Further and Higher Education Fair for Year 9, 10 and 11 gives students and their parents an opportunity to meet representatives from all of the local colleges, sixth forms and apprenticeship providers.

Timetabled careers sessions enable us to welcome visitors from businesses and further education providers. This year sessions have been led by Stratford College, The National Apprenticeship Service, Stratford School Sixth form, Aberystwyth and Cambridge Universities, Stratford Manor Hotel, and many more. We

encourage ex-students to visit to tell their experiences - this year Sam Hunt gave us a very interesting talk about his career with the Emergency services and James Booth told us how he became a firefighter, also teaching the whole of Year 10 CPR!



Many school trips have taken place this year across all year groups. Recently a group of Year 8 students attended the National Apprenticeship show, while Year 9 took part in a hospitality day at Stratford Manor Hotel. Students showing an interest in Law went to Stratford Girls Grammar school to take part in a Law day. The event was run by lawyers and paralegals and involved a series of workshops followed by a mock trial. Students were given pre reading material to prepare their cases in advance and worked as part of a team to defend or prosecute a given case. It was an exciting and informative event for students keen on critical thinking, debate or a career in law.

As the academic year draws to an end, Year 10 are preparing for their work experience in the first week of July whilst many Year 11 students have signed up to take part in NCS The Challenge during the summer.

We are grateful to everyone who gives their time to come into school to help make our Careers programme interesting and relevant. ### Badger's Eye View

Last week we heard that diabetes is costing 15% of the entire NHS budget. We also know that if current trends continue, that figure will rise to 20% before 2030.

School meals are provided by local staff, shops are responsive to their customers and local facilities, car parks, playing fields and recreation services can offer healthier options. We want the Ellen Badger to be at the heart of such a movement A well-being hub offering a health promoting meeting place, exercise facilities and the group support for wellbeing. That is a vision for a Healthier Shipston.

### **Shipston Music Society**

At a previous meeting of Shipston Music Society Charles Matthews displayed his superb skill as an accompanist. This time we welcomed him back as a solo pianist with "Impressions of Spain".



The programme contained a variety of pieces by Spanish composers and others from France, Poland and England/ Australia. In the opening piece, "Waltz from the Canary Islands" by Saint-Saens, the first spread chord captured immediately the sound and spirit of the flamenco guitar. This then developed guickly into a lively waltz.

"Dances from Seville" by Geoffrey Allen (born 1927), composed in a more 20th century style, provided an interesting contrast. Coincidentally, Geoffrey is a distant relative of Charles Matthews who told us that his relative has written a total of seventeen piano sonatas (when the seventeenth is finished!)

Pieces by Albeniz, Ravel and Diez followed, then "Bolero" by Chopin, a rarely performed work with all the Chopin characteristics of rapid scale passages and lots of decorative features but still conveying the feel of Spanish music. Later we heard "Evening in Granada" by Debussy, a short piece with contrasting sections from fast and furious to slow and languid, a Tour de force accomplished with great technical skill, a real sense of style and a certain amount of panache! After several minutes of loud applause Charles returned and played "Andalucia" by Granados, a fitting encore to an extremely enjoyable evening.

On 20th June, international classical guitarist Craig Ogden will be our guest as part of the Shipston Proms with Clare Bradshaw, mezzo soprano, at St Edmund's Church, 7.30pm. Everyone welcome.

### **Shipston U3A Open Meeting**

The Townsend Hall rang to the familiar cry of "Oyez, Oyez" as our very own Marion Lowe appeared in her traditional costume as the Town Crier of Shipston on Stour, together with the loud clang of her bell.

Marion fascinated her audience with a wide-ranging talk on the history of Town Criers and how she took up the role. She won a competition for the part of Town Crier about 10 years ago and spoke of Bill Hudson who had served as the Town Crier for many years previously. What to wear for the role was an immediate problem and Marion made many enquiries before settling upon both a traditional yet modern long red coat and waistcoat above a skirt. Marion showed us her coat and remarked upon its weight.

Our Town Crier is a well known and popular figure at annual events such as the Wool Fair, Victorian Evening and the Civic Service. She explained that Criers have always acted as National Communicators since the Norman Conquest of 1066 and are protected by Royal Charter from hinderance in the performance of their duties. Marion often takes part in competitions with other Town Criers and stressed that she can hold her own in volume but it is accuracy in repeating announcements which wins the day. All messages end with the words "God Save the Queen" to emphasise the Royal connection with a Town Crier.

Marion's undoubted enthusiasm shone through her talk, and as she answered many questions. We are very fortunate to have a Shipston Town Crier and long may she continue to flourish in this role.


Letter from Ron Lang

It seems a while since I went to Warwick! We have a Full Council meeting coming up in a week of lots of Annual parish and town council meetings.



I have been asked to serve on the Adult Care Overview and Scrutiny Committee. The issues relating to adult care are extremely relevant to Shipston, where we know that our provision for older adults will need to improve over the years.

There is also a synergy here with the Cabinet job I have at Stratford District Council. Many of the issues raised on the doorstep during the District Council election were ones better addressed with this hat on – so Highways are about to get very bored with me!

There is another £35,000 of delegated budget available this year - this is the fund allocated for highways projects which councillors want to pursue directly on behalf of their constituents. In Shipston's case, this funding will help with requests for even more dropped kerbs and in starting to work on plans for signage (some is already on the way). Potentially a bit of reorganisation in the centre of Shipston may be covered too.
