VE Day 75 commemorations

Restrictions on public gatherings due to the coronavirus pandemic meant that long awaited plans to mark the 75th anniversary of VE Day on 8th May with a series of street parties had to be altered at short notice. Fortunately, the whole community, determined not to let the sacrifices of the wartime generation be forgotten, hosted a town-wide stay at home street party. There was a fantastic demonstration of community spirit as people sat in their front gardens, enjoying the sunshine and chatting to their neighbours, with many also decorating their houses to mark the occasion.

At the break of dawn, Dan Scobie, then Mayor of Shipston, Sheelagh Saunders, then Deputy Mayor, and David Kernohan, President of the Shipston-on-Stour branch of The Royal British Legion gathered in the Gyratory Garden. They placed bouquets of flowers on the memorial sundial that was erected in 1995 to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the end of the Second World War.

Our Town Clerk, Ali Packer, not yet six months into her new role has embraced these challenges head-on. Having been granted delegated powers she is working remotely from home keeping the operations of the Council going.

It is hard to guess what this year will bring for our town, its institutions, residents and businesses. One thing is certain; that in this period of social isolation individuals will need extra support in times of crisis. For this reason, the charity I have chosen to support is CRUSE Bereavement Care - Coventry and Warwickshire. People who lose a loved one whether through coronavirus or another cause may be cut off from their usual support network, not even able to ask for a hug at what is, at the best of times, a lonely situation. Funerals are limited and may be delayed. Coronavirus bereavement may be particularly traumatic. CRUSE has had a long association with the Medical Centre here in Shipston, offering bereavement counselling sessions. These must for the time being be conducted by phone. They will need extra funds to deal with their inevitable extra workload.

This time last year it became apparent that our footpaths were becoming heavily overgrown and impassable. As fresh air and exercise is so important during this pandemic, I would like to see, socially distanced groups organising a programme to clear and keep clear our paths so that we all can benefit. Would anyone interested please contact the Council so we can get the ball rolling!

Council goes virtual

The Town Council has continued to operate under a scheme of delegation that allows the Clerk to conduct business after consulting with Councillors. However, after several test sessions on Zoom to allow Councillors to experiment with the technology, future council meetings are now planned to be hosted on the platform until physical meetings can resume, allowing for democratic decisions.



The first ever virtual Annual Town Council Meeting in Shipston took place at 7pm 18th May, with Councillors gathering to conduct the election of a new Mayor and Deputy Mayor. Dan Scobie as the outgoing Mayor opened the meeting by

requesting that participants remain on mute until called to speak, and that all contributions should be addressed to Chair the as would be normal procedure. Voting took place through the raising of hands, which were then tallied.

Election of new Mayor and Deputy Mayor

Shipston's new Mayor and Deputy Mayor were elected at the Annual Town Council Meeting on 18th May. The Mayor Making process was somewhat unconventional, being conducted on Zoom, however this important civic event was still able to take place. For example, Councillors voted to receive verbal acceptances of office, with the essential signed paper copies to follow later.

Cllr Sheelagh Saunders was the sole nomination for Mayor and received unanimous support. Dan Scobie, as the outgoing Mayor, then invited the new Mayor to recite the Declaration of Acceptance of Office. Following this he symbolically removed his chains of office, placing them out of shot of his webcam.

Mayor Sheelagh Saunders then addressed the meeting, thanking Dan Scobie for his service as Mayor, praising his frequent willingness to "go above and beyond" and that he had proved to be a "steady hand on the tiller" during the challenges of recent months.

Cllr Ian Cooper was unanimously elected as Deputy Mayor.

Dan Scobie stands down from Town Council

After congratulating Mayor Sheelagh Saunders of her election, Dan Scobie announced that he would be standing down from the Town Council, with effect from the end of the meeting. He said that serving as a Councillor and as Mayor of Shipston had been a "privilege and a joy", however he had made a commitment to his wife to stand down following a personally challenging year, where in addition to his roles as Mayor and Chair of the Rugby Club, he had been very busy professionally.

Mayor Sheelagh Saunders expressed her sadness at this news, stating that this was a "huge loss to the Council" and it would "leave a gaping hole". She said that she understood the need to find a balance between work and personal life and thanked Dan for his service to the Council over many years.

Overcoming the challenges of chemo

Shipston Cycling Club member Pete Cornthwaite, who lives in the town, has begun chronicling his chemotherapy treatment in the club's weekly newsletter. Here is the first instalment of 'Finding Chemo'.

I was diagnosed with aggressive, metastatic (spread to other parts) cancer of the prostate last November and started on a four-month course of chemotherapy in mid-February. As a very fit man who thought this would never happen to me, believe me, it was a big shock!

I was dreading the effects of the chemo, with six bouts every three weeks, and thought that I would be spending a lot of time sitting around tired - but I was wrong! Being fit to start with helps a lot with coping both mentally and physically, and to aid my recovery I was determined to keep as fit as possible throughout my treatment. So regular bike rides and the occasional run have been a big part of my routine.

Chemo works by knocking off the rapidly multiplying cancer cells but the drug cannot distinguish between the cancer cells and normal healthy cells with a high turnover, so the latter get hit as well. These latter cells are hair (slows growth and falls out), skin (small cuts don't heal - annoying with little finger cuts), gut lining (I won't go there), but more importantly bone marrow, which produces both red and white blood cells. The latter cells are reduced which makes the immune system less effective, so I am extra careful of social distancing as infection through something like coronavirus would probably see me six feet under! reduction in the number of red blood cells is the most important for me as a cyclist as my oxygencarrying capacity is reduced.

Four to nine days after the chemo is given is the time the body's natural cells are affected. You feel very tired and lethargic and exercise is really hard work. After that time recovery starts slowly and after 21 days you are feeling pretty good - just in time for the next dose! However, the doses are cumulative so having had my fourth dose recently, the effect is really noticeable with my haemoglobin reduced by up to 15%, meaning I have to walk up the occasional really steep hill before the recovery period kicks in (very frustrating). However, despite all the drawbacks, I try and exercise at least every alternate day and so far, I have been managing between 80 -120 miles a week on the bike and two shortish runs per week, albeit a lot slower than usual but the mental benefit has been enormous.

The message to take away is don't be deterred by what you might have heard about chemo. If you are fit to begin with and you are prepared to work hard to maintain some fitness during treatment then it makes life more enjoyable and should pay off in the long term - I'll let you know!

Chris Sands, founder of the Totally Locally movement, said: "These are strange times. And this is great, because the High Street we have when this is all over will be a direct reflection of how people have shopped over the lockdown time."

Weekly cyber church proves a hit



Stour Valley Baptist Church in Shipston has been broadcasting its Sunday service for a couple of months. 'Live at Eleven' has been introduced to replace regular

services at Shipston High School made impossible by the coronavirus pandemic restrrictions.

The Church was delighted to find more people tuning in 'live' than they used to have in the congregation. Approximately 100 people watch the 40-minute service live, and many others opt to watch the recordings. As many of the 'views' will represent couples and families watching together, that probably means that more than 200 people are participating each week.

Daniel Pulham, Pastor, said: "The feedback has been great! Even though we are all watching in our own homes, there's been a tangible sense of being together! The technology has just about worked, in a Heath Robinson sort of way – apart from our VE Day Special, when just about everything that could go wrong did! But that's technology for you!

"It's just really moving that so many are seeking in this time and choosing to tune in to what we are putting together. I suspect we will be broadcasting like this even when we are back in the school meeting as 'normal! We now have a whole new online congregation!"

VACANCY IN THE OFFICE OF TOWN COUNCILLOR FOR THE SHIPSTON SOUTH WARD

NOTICE is hereby given, in accordance with Section 87(2) of the Local Government Act 1972 that a vacancy exists in the office of Town Councillor for the Shipston South Ward of the Town of Shipston-on-Stour, by reason of the resignation of Councillor Dan Scobie on the 18th day of May 2020.

Any ten local government electors for the Town may require an election to be held to fill the said vacancy. To do this, they must send a written request to the Chief Executive, Stratford-on-Avon District Council, Elizabeth House, Church Street, Stratford-upon-Avon, which must reach him not later than 16th day of June 2020. No set form of words is necessary.

If such a request is received by the Chief Executive, an election will be held. If no request is received, the vacancy will be filled in due course by co-option by the remaining members of the Town Council.



Fire and Rescue Service launch bedtime fire safety stories

Warwickshire Fire and Rescue Service are encouraging young children to learn about fire safety in a fun and engaging way through a new online video bedtime story activity programme (https://www.warwickshire.gov.uk/fire-safety/fire-safety-education-programme/2).

The books, read by members of the service, including the Chief Fire Officer, Kieran Amos, are from the Ellie the Fire Dog series. These stories, produced by West Midlands Fire Service, help children learn about how to make a 999 call, the importance of having smoke alarms in your home and what the role of a firefighter entails. Each fun story incorporates important safety messages for the children to learn and there is an accompanying activity to help

develop their understanding further.



Gemma Childs, Warwickshire Fire and Rescue Services, Community Fire Safety Officer, said: "The stories are really engaging and have been produced specifically to support the learning of young children, to better understand how to keep themselves safe from fire, learning when and how to make a 999 call, learning about smoke alarms and the importance of not playing with fire."

Outpatients, Hospital, Diagnostics and part of the GP Practice would be located on the ground floor, accessible via a shared area providing reception. waiting, café and facilities to support general Health &

Inpatients, the remainder of the GP practice as well as meeting areas would be on the first floor, with the remaining staff accommodation and storage distributed across the second and third floors. Learning provision onsite


We continue to host a small number of students at school. as directed by government guidelines. These young people have also had to get used to a different sort of day in school, and have worked really successfully in building

GCSE grade awards

As mentioned last month, Year 11 students will not be taking their examinations as usual. Many readers will know families with young people in this unique position, and we recognise the frustration of Year 11 students who wanted to have a chance to demonstrate their knowledge and skills in their exams. They have worked with real commitment during their time at Shipston and are naturally disappointed not to have their final weeks at school.

The government has worked with Ofqual, the national body responsible for examinations, and devised a system to award GCSE grades to all pupils. Shipston High School will work with exam boards to support the awarding of fair and objective grades to our students. It is the exam boards who will decide the final grade awarded, not the school. I look forward to the results being published in August, and for our young people to then begin the next phase of their education, training or employment.

Community spirit continues

The school community may be physically distanced, but has proved itself proud and resilient. We have all been reminded of the importance of patience, kindness and understanding during this experience, and as a community we will maintain these values when the world is able to come together again.

District Council Update

How the world has changed since my last contribution appeared in the April issue. The coronavirus pandemic has left virtually no part of the globe untouched. I hope this contribution finds the good people of Shipston in sound health and bright spirits. Few could have imagined the profound impact the pandemic would have on the way millions of people are able to live their lives, both in the short term and in the longer term. It has been impressive



to see how the people of Shipston have rallied round to support one another in so many tangible ways to look after those who are vulnerable, sheltered or who have other specific needs.

To their great credit, the staff of the District Council have also gone the extra mile. The overwhelming majority have been working at home since late March maintaining normal service levels. The Revenue and Benefits team has succeeded in paying out more than £26m to support over 2,122 local businesses within the District. Together with Warwickshire County Council and other partners, the District Council has operated a Community Hub providing essential deliveries to the most vulnerable in the District. The refuse collection service has continued to operate normally despite an increase of 20% in the tonnage collected. Thanks to all their efforts, it has been business pretty much as usual.

The local economy, driven as it is by manufacturing, tourism, hospitality and the arts, is likely to be the fourth hardest hit district in the UK measured by Gross Value Added. Like many businesses and individuals, the pandemic has also had a severe effect on the Council's finances, notably its income. It is estimated that the Council's income in the first half of the financial year will be lower by at least £8m. So far the Government has provided grants to the Council of just over £1.3m. Without further support, the Council faces some very difficult decisions over the coming months.

I hope that by the time residents read this piece the lockdown has begun to unwind, those who have been furloughed have been able to go back to work, that home schooling has become a thing of the past for many and that families are able to get back together in a tangible way. It all can't come too soon.
