Election of Mayor for 2022-23

Approval of Policies

Councillors unanimously approved Standing Orders, Financial Regulations and the Terms of Reference for the Planning Committee.

Cllr lan Cooper reflects on his year as Mayor

Following the election of his replacement, outgoing Town Mayor Cllr lan Cooper addressed the meeting, reflecting on his year in office. He noted how it has been a very different experience to when he previously served as Mayor in 2018-19 and that the Council had managed to achieve a great deal during the year, despite restrictions and the need to change working practices, expressing gratitude to the Councillors and community groups for their hard work in delivering an ambitious agenda.

Urging everyone to provide their full support to the newly elected Town Mayor, he emphasised the need for the town to rebuild relationships following the pandemic, ensuring that Shipston would continue to be recognised as an important rural centre.

lan thanked his wife Tina for her service as Mayoress, noting the challenge of balancing full time work with civic commitments and that she had proven to be an excellent ambassador for the town.

He also expressed his gratitude for the work of Helen, the Town Clerk and Diane, the Administration Officer, who had been working hard to help the Council adjust to new regulations and their essential role in the delivery of many projects.

The Townsend Hall was almost filled for the April General Meeting by eager established and new u3a members and



quests for an illustrated lecture about the varied, famous life of George Eliot delivered by David Paterson, ably assisted by his wife, who read passages from Eliot's writings. Probably we were all aware that "George Eliot" was a non de plume for Mary Ann Evans, born 1819 in rural Warwickshire near Nuneaton where her father was employed as the Manager of Arbury Hall Estate. She went to boarding school aged five and joined her father on the estate at 16 as his assistant at a time when Warwickshire was becoming the hub of massive industrial change. George Eliot continuously improved her knowledge and education through the use of an extensive library at Arbury Hall.

Around 1840 she moved to Coventry with her father and continued to constantly widen her social circle with particular care and a close friendship with Charles Bray who encouraged her writing skills. George Eliot did not meet the conventional image of a Victorian woman and rejected her father's efforts to get her married, but she much enjoyed the company of men who were captivated by her wide knowledge rather than her beauty. In her later fame and fortune, she was spitefully described by a correspondent as "an ugly beauty". We understood that George Eliot asked a man to marry her but was coldly spurned by the man concerned which deeply and adversely affected her. In 1850 following the death of her father, George Eliot moved to the Strand, London and stayed with the family of John Chapman, a publisher who again encouraged her writing skills despite many rumours of a romance with him during her stay. By this time in her life, she had a bad social reputation which tarnished the image and standing of men who had business dealings with her.

In due course, she met George Lewes, a married man with whom George Eliot enjoyed an open life together for many years. It is probable that during this relationship, George Lewes encouraged her to write "Middlemarch" which is usually regarded as her greatest novel. He died and George Eliot met another man, John Walter Cross when she was 60 years of age and he was twenty years her junior. They were married in 1879 and went on their honeymoon to Venice. It was reported that John Cross jumped from their bedroom into the Grand Canal for reasons unknown but he survived.

After a life lived to the full in an unconventional manner and a short marriage, George Eliot died in 1880 leaving seven published novels as a testimony of her writing skills.

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






Welcome to another edition of the Little Shipstonians where this month we continue to think about nature and talk ponds! Water provides an essential habitat for wildlife and introducing a pond into your garden or outdoor space will encourage a huge variety of wildlife species into it. From birds and dragonflies to bees and frogs, it's now even more important for us to look after our wildlife. Water sources, like ponds, provide a place for creatures to feed, lay their eggs, obtain shelter and take rest. Below is your guide to creating your very own little pond so why not give it a go! Make sure you ask a grown up to help as you must always be careful when near water.

When you have made your pond and it has had time to establish, why not keep a notepad to record all the creatures that start to live there and those that come to visit every day. Finally, on the next page is a colouring-in activity which shows some of the common flowers that are loved by bees. Bees also like to visit ponds, just make sure they have a little place to land when they come to rest. Shipston-On-Stour Women's Institute



The Wednesday meeting attracted many members to hear a talk on Bumble Bees in Spring by Jo Worthy Jones who has worked for the Wildlife Trust with a particular interest in urban areas.

Jo was looking particularly at the first-to-emerge bumble bee – the Buff Tail – but pointed out that there are 23 species of Bumble Bee and 250 Solitary Bees. The Buff Tail queen is the one we all see in early Spring searching for nectar and somewhere to lay her eggs and found a colony. She has held the male sperm over winter whilst hibernating and once she finds a suitable site, she makes a pollen ball and lays her self-fertilised eggs in it. When the larva become bees, they will be female workers. She continues to lay fertilised eggs and the colony grows. Eventually, she lays sterile eggs which become males who in turn will mate with a queen and then die. All bumblebees die in Autumn except queens who will find somewhere safe to hibernate and the cycle goes on.

Jo emphasised the importance of suitable plants to provide pollen and nectar for insects. Hellebore is very important because it is one of the earliest to flower, crocus, the daisy family, nettles, lungwort, chives – the list goes on. She emphasised the importance of a succession of flowers. Agricultural monoculture is death to insects – the old rotational system provided food until Autumn. Without insects foraging for food there would be no pollination of crops. In some parts of the world insecticides have wiped out pollinators and pollination has to be done by hand. Without insects to pollinate our crops, there would be no crops.

Business continued after tea break. Shipston WI is 100 years old and is planning a celebratory lunch on 22nd October. The Branch will be featured in the Warwickshire WI magazine. A visit to the gardens at Broughton Grange is planned and a Coffee & Craft morning is to be held on 24th May at the Scout Hut in New Street – 10am to 12noon. The meeting voted in favour of the resolution to be discussed at the WI AGM in Liverpool. It is proposed that greater attention be given to women and girls who suffer from ADHD and autism – all too often women and girls go undiagnosed.

The next meeting will be on Wednesday, 1st June when the speaker will be Dalziel Ellis who will be talking about Music, Songs and Stories. Visitors are always welcome to attend – the WI meets at 7pm in the Catholic Church Hall, Darlingscote Road, Shipston.

Want to help Ukrainian Refugees keep their pets with them while acquiring a colourful original painting?

Going on holiday?

When packing for your holiday remember to think about medications - do you have sufficient supply to last? Have you packed all the medications you need? As well as your prescription medication we would encourage you to think about first aid basics, such as paracetamol, indigestion tablets and anti-histamines.

If you find yourself being elsewhere in the UK, and needing medical help, please call us and we will see what we can do to help - we can send prescriptions electronically to a pharmacy near where you are. However, if you are abroad you will need to seek medical care where you are. We cannot offer medical advice to those not in the UK.

Travel vaccinations

If you are thinking ahead to your holidays then Shipston Medical Centre

please consider any vaccinations you may need. The practice does offer a travel health service, we ask that you complete a travel risk assessment form (available from reception) and when you return this we will book you a slot for it to be assessed. Following assessment, our nurse will be able to advise you on vaccinations and book you in for these. Please bear in mind that there can be a wait for a travel risk assessment appointment and thus you need to ensure you leave plenty of time before travelling to use our service. We are unlikely to be able to help if you have less than 8 weeks between returning a risk assessment and your travel date.

District Council update

There were no local elections held in Stratford District Council last month, but there will be an election in the District in May 2023. What's more, the Local Government Boundary Commission (LGBC) has proposed new ward boundaries that will, subject to Parliamentary approval, affect voting



arrangements in Shipston. In 2015 there were 53 councillors. Currently, there are 36 and from 2023 there will be 41.

There are two wards at present in Shipston that elect district councillors – Shipston North and Shipston South. Shipston North includes the northern section of the town together with the five settlements that make up the parish of Tredington. Shipston South includes the southern section of the town together with the parishes of Burmington, Stretton on Fosse and Tidmington.

From next year, the current two Shipston wards will be increased to three wards and with different boundaries. Shipston North (projected 2,516 electors in 2027) will comprise the northern section of the town plus the parish of Barcheston which currently forms part of Ettington Ward. Shipston South (projected 2,629 electors in 2027) will continue to comprise the southern section of the town together with the parishes of Burmington and Tidmington. The third and new ward will be known as Tredington Ward (projected 2,658 electors in 2027). It will consist of the parishes of Stretton on Fosse, Tredington and Ettington which currently form part of Ettington Ward. Both Shipston Town Council and Ettington Parish Council supported my various arguments and evidence against these new arrangements. In coming to its decisions, however, the LGBC demonstrated that its first consideration is always the equality of numbers of electors, to the exclusion of the social, cultural and economic cohesion of local communities and their residents in practice. The new arrangements will mean that where there are two councillors now, there will be three in the future.

May 2023 is now less than a year away. It is not too soon for residents to consider whether they want to seek the nomination of one of the established political parties or to stand next year as an independent candidate. The quality of local government is crucially dependent on the quality of its councillors. Stratford District Council, for example, provides a range of statutory and discretionary services to some 132,000 people. It employs directly some 300 staff, has an annual net expenditure of some £18m and has general reserves of some £9m. Councillors are responsible to their residents for the level and quality of services provided, for establishing the priorities over how resources are allocated and for dealing with the multiplicity of issues that residents can and do raise with them.

Why would you want to consider standing? Because you have some relevant experience of life and of Shipston that you can draw upon? Because you want to represent your fellow residents, to speak and act on their behalf, to resolve issues and to represent their interests? Because you want to accept the challenge of acquiring new knowledge of the many facets of local government and use it to the advantage of the residents you represent?

Although the time commitment involved can be considerable, the opportunity to rise to the challenge in the knowledge that you are working in the individual and collective interests of your residents is rewarding. If you want to find out more, I urge you to make contact with the party of your choice to discuss how you might become involved.
