Exciting plans announced for the Ellen Badger Hospital

Exciting plans have been announced to develop and expand the Ellen Badger Hospital, bringing more services to Shipston.

Plans have been approved by South Warwickshire NHS Foundation Trust (SWFT) to develop a new, enhanced inpatient facility at the hospital. This £500,000 investment will help provide health services for the local community. Work started on the site in January 2018 and is expected to be complete by April 2018.

The refurbishment is the first phase of a longer term development plan for Ellen Badger Hospital. Working in partnership with the League of Friends of Ellen Badger Hospital, SWFT has just purchased a plot of land next to

the hospital, which will allow more services to be delivered locally. To identify what services local residents would benefit from. **SWFT** will be inviting partners and members of the community to share their views and give feedback at dedicated events (to be announced).

The League of Friends is extremely supportive of these plans and has gifted £635,000 to SWFT to support this project.

> time for Ellen Badger Hospital... It is fantastic that we are able to develop the site to improve services for the community of Shipston and surrounding areas."

> Frances French, Chair of the League of Friends, said: "The League are absolutely delighted that SWFT has acquired this land. We are grateful both to John Peart and Percy Lomas whose legacies have made our

contribution to this exciting opportunity possible."

Dr Gilder, Senior Partner at Shipston Medical Centre, said: "We are delighted to hear about the development at the Ellen Badger Hospital. Shipston Medical Centre will be working with South Warwickshire Foundation Trust to help identify services which will benefit our population. We will also continue to seek opportunities for the development of a new Medical Centre".

Town Council News

News from Shipston Town Council's February meeting

Hot topics:

Inaccessible entrance: Marianne Westwood raised concerns that the new doors fitted to the Townsend Hall are very difficult to open for people in mobility scooters and wheelchairs. A grant was awarded to the hall from the town council to make the entrance more accessible. However, the new doors are now too heavy to open without help. This will be raised with the Townsend Hall committee.

Ruined verges: Brian Healey highlighted the damaging impact of parking on verges on Queen's Avenue, which is ruining the grass. The Town Clerk will look into options with Highways, both on Queen's Avenue and the Campden Road.

Memorial policy: The town council has adopted a policy relating to memorial benches, which must be made from approved, hard-wearing materials and installed by the council's contractors. Paul Rathkey suggested the council should also adopt a policy about other memorials. The Town Clerk will look into whether other councils already have policies in place.

Flooding at Oldbutt Road: Martin Ferrier has investigated flooding in Oldbutt Road with help from Phil Wragg.The Town Clerk will contact the developer of the neighbouring site.

Missing green space: A member of the public drew councillors attention to the replacement of a flower bed by Shipston in Bloom with large gravel/hard standing and planters. The resident feels the area by the bus stop on Stratford Road is now bare and the blank wall is an eyesore. Previously the bed had been planted with colourful bulbs and bedding plants. The town council will look into this further.

Gym application: Councillors voted to support an application for a new gym at the Business Village on Tilemans Lane, subject to appropriate parking arrangements.

Campaigning for Shipston:

Supporting Shipston First Responders: Shipston Town Council has awarded a grant of £1,700 to Shipston First Responders, covering 50% of the charity's annual costs. Shipston First Responders is run by trained volunteers who are often first on the scene when there is a medical emergency in Shipston and the local area.

Wish list: Marianne Westwood is putting a list together of potential projects that could be supported with money from the newly introduced Community Infrastructure Levy. The levy replaces section 106 money developers pay to mitigate the impact of new developments. Unlike S106, where projects must be specific, CIL allows for a general sum to be paid which



can then be put towards different community projects. Once Shipston's Neighbourhood Plan is in place, Shipston will receive 25% of CIL money associated with developments in the town.

Trees in the firing line: Orbit Housing has proposed removing a line of trees on London Road, opposite the cemetery, as part of its new housing development. Shipston Town Council objects to the removal of the trees and will raise concerns with the district council.

Coordinating views: The Town Clerk will organise a meeting between Taylor Wimpey, the residents of Oldbutt Road, SAFAG and town councillors to discuss the best approach to the land between Oldbutt Road and the new housing development.

SAFAG plans: Shipston Area Flood Action Group (SAFAG) gave a presentation to councillors to update them on work completed to date and future plans. The group has already completed 80 Natural Flood Measures (NFMs) to 'slow the flow' of water courses feeding the Stour. If funding allows, SAFAG hopes to increase that to 200 NFMs by July 2018.

Town Council business:

New Street car park sign: A new 'P' sign will be purchased for the car park. Discussions are still ongoing regarding possible parking restrictions on the site.

Dog Fouling in Tilemans Lane: The path is cleared every morning, but complaints are still received from primary school parents. General Purposes Working Group will liaise with the headteacher at the primary school to discuss what else could be done.

Grit bin purchase: A new grit bin will be purchased for the top of Tilemans Lane and the town council will request that the road be added to the county's gritting routes following the treacherous conditions on the road this winter.

Neighbourhood Plan team takes a tough stance



Shipston's Neighbourhood Plan team has responded robustly to comments and potential issues raised recently by Stratford District Council. The plan

had already been reviewed by the district prior to being published for public consultation and the team felt it was very unhelpful to have further issues raised while an independent inspection was already taking place.

Despite these issues, progress has been made with the independent inspection and it is hoped that a formal response from the inspector will be forthcoming within the next few weeks.

Provided there are no 'showstoppers' the Neighbourhood Plan team hopes to be in a position to proceed to a public referendum on the plan in the near future.

The World Scout Jamboree is an educational event that brings together thousands of young people from across the globe. The 2019 Jamboree will take place from 22nd July to 2nd August 2019 at the Summit Bechtel Reserve in West Virginia, USA. The UK contingent consists of 4,000 Participants and Unit Leaders – including two Warwickshire Units with 63 scouts and 9 guides. Shipston Scouts, Thomas Taylor and Cameron Collie were selected to take part, along with Rebecca Drew from Explorer Scouts / Young Leaders.

Shipston encouraged to take part in the Long Road to Ghana

A small group of determined volunteers is laying down a challenge for Shipston, surrounding villages and friends in aid of two great causes - Brain Tumour Research and Willing and Abel. In one week in June, the community is being asked to travel 4,000 miles - the equivalent distance of Shipston to Ghana - using human power only!


So why this particular challenge? Forum readers may remember the plight of Ethan Suglo (pictured) from a small village in Ghana who was born with a rare and life threatening condition. At just three years old, Ethan had life-saving and enhancing surgery at the John Radcliffe for a massive abdominal swelling in July 2016, made possible thanks to the enormous generosity of the local community, and the medical team at the hospital. Further surgery is now needed to give Ethan a normal life expectancy. The ambition is to top up what is left from the previous fundraising to cover the cost of Ethan's second surgery, due to take place in June.

Not content with supporting one charity, the 'Long Road to Ghana' campaign is also raising money for Brain Tumour Research. Brain tumours kill more children and adults under the age of 40 than any other cancer - yet just 1% of the national spend on cancer research has been allocated to this devastating disease. Following the tragic loss of a local friend to a brain tumour, and in support of others who are battling this challenging condition, help is needed to fund vital research to tackle this disease.

So how can you help? By getting out, getting active and contributing to the 4,000 mile challenge! Fundraising coordinator, Dr David Williams, said: "We have come up with a challenge that is accessible to all and we hope everyone will get involved. Our aim is for people to walk, run, swim, canoe, row, cycle (static or actual) – or any other

transportation method you can think of - under your own power to clock up the 4000 miles from Shipston to Ethan's home in Akatsi, Ghana. We need cyclists, runners and walkers to cover the land and desert regions, and swimmers and canoeists to navigate The English Channel and the Mediterranean from Gibraltar to Africa.

"We can't guarantee the weather, but invite you to join us in this challenge so

How politics can invade every detail of your personal life was described by Gudrun Berry as she spoke of her childhood growing up in the East German area of Berlin during the Cold War. She vividly remembered the building of the Berlin Wall and watched with her family as it was built higher and higher hiding their view beyond, which contained family and friends whom they could no longer see or contact in any way. Many tried to climb over the barbed wire on the top and were shot by the guards. Prisoners were kept in dreadful conditions to be exchanged for ransom.

Their own lives were ruled by the German guards who seemed to take pleasure in treating them roughly and rudely, making their lives as difficult as possible.




Beethoven's Symphony no 5 is possibly the most well known



Shipston Centre is now a pleasure to use. Thanks are due to the care of the Lawns to Mow team.







Pretty good news for Shipston

Only a 1% increase in the Stratford District Council (SDC) element of Council Tax (subject to formal approval by council)!



at STC when Cllr Saint mentioned this. We all know that the BDUK maps of where you get superfast broadband are not entirely accurate.....in the Town Centre we are getting a new cabinet for High Speed - so I hope this will help us keep and even attract more businesses into our vibrant mix.

Now, prepare for more good news figures. I noticed from the WCC budget that Stratford District is the biggest contributor of all the Districts in the county. We put in about £20m more than the smallest contributor. So - you may see where I am going with this - I am compiling a shopping list based on the requests I have had locally. At the moment it is 8 dropped kerbs (minimum), signage at the Gyratory (already agreed), a contribution towards the next phase of the Childrens' Centre (agreed already). Perhaps some help with scoping the health services we require?

Let me know of your ideas - I have the ammunition to say that it's time the south of the county got some payback for all we put in! I said I wanted to shout loudly for you - I am being heard!

County Council update

Really good news for Warwickshire!

It's all about numbers this month. Productivity (don't yawn - bear with me) is 1.5% higher than the



national average. This is compared to 10 years ago when we were achieving 10% lower than the national average. What a difference in just over a decade - as we have focussed on fixing and building the local economy, getting people into good jobs and creating a vibrant and confident business sector.

This is not the best news, though.....that is that Warwickshire has seen the fastest growth in productivity of ALL local authority areas in the Country at 30.4% between 2009-2016, higher than any other area and nearly double the rate for the UK as a whole (16.5%) and the West Midlands (16.9%). So we know we live somewhere special - but also successful!

There will be an increase in the WCC element of the Council Tax. With thanks to Council Leader, Izzi Seccombe, we have also fought for more money to deliver rural services (we all know it costs more to live in the country) and really importantly for us in Shipston, an increase in our allocation of funds for adult social care.

Oh and two final items - you will see the announcement on the front page of this Forum that the local NHS Trust has acquired land with help from the League of Friends of Shipston Hospitals - we can now begin to think about expanding our local medical services! Fantastic news. We are also far enough down the line with plans at the Childrens' Centre that I can tell you we are going to have Special Educational Needs and Disabilities provision for the area, which we desperately need, together with outreach workers into the community. I am working on stitching together the rest of the offer with volunteers and officers. I have been asked about the Food Bank - as far as I am concerned it will remain at the Childrens' Centre as long as this works for its users. I haven't felt this upbeat in ages!

Appointment reminders by text

Regular users of our service will know that we have been using text messages to remind people of their appointments for some time. Occasionally we also use text messages to let people know they may be eligible for a service, for example vaccination against the flu. 
