Shipston Town Council agrees marginal increase in precept

Shipston Town Council has agreed a marginal increase of £500 in its precept for the next financial year. The overall precept has increased from £243,000 to £243,500. However, thanks to an increase of just over 43 in the number of households contributing towards Council Tax, the average amount being charged to Band D homes will remain at £107.93 per annum.

Shipston Town Council's precept is just one element of Council Tax, which also includes charges from Warwickshire County Council, Stratford District Council and the Police and Crime Commissioner.

Town councillors have to plan sufficient funding to support the needs of the local community and meet its statutory responsibilities, while ensuring the burden on residents remains as low as possible. This has been made more challenging this year with the removal of the Council Tax Reduction Grant – a grant from central government towards the local parish precept. Last year this grant contributed $\mathfrak{L}4,260$ to town council funds but will reduce to $\mathfrak{L}0$ for the 2020/21 financial year.

Mayor, Dan Scobie, said: "Thanks to the diligent work of our Finance Working Group, we have been able to minimise the precept increase such that residents will pay the same amount as last year. This is despite setting aside funds for some exciting projects for the town as well as maintaining our commitments to support local community groups."



The other authorities in receipt of Council Tax are responsible for setting their own precepts. As such, overall Council Tax bills are expected to rise for Shipston residents from April 2020.

Community grants announced for 2020/21

Shipston Town Council has agreed to award grants totalling £21,050 to support community groups and charities over the next financial year. This is an overall increase of £1,000 compared with last year.

The grants are designed to support a wide variety of local initiatives and this year's recipients include:

- Shipston in Bloom for the provision of flower displays in Shipston
- Shipston Wool Fair to fund new and innovative attractions
- Shipston Cricket Club to provide a non- turf practice facility
- Shipston Community First Responders to help cover the response vehicle running costs, response equipment and public access defibrillator costs
- Townsend Hall to fund facilities for a portable wheelchair lift to enable disabled access to the stage
- Shipston Proms contribution towards the staging of the 2020 Proms (pictured)
- Shipston Tennis Club to resurface the practice court with all-weather tiger turf and new fencing
- VASA to support the recruitment and training of volunteer drivers and office volunteers, Sit & Get Fit, and core costs for the first year of The Caring Kind
- Shipston Youth Club to continue funding existing staff
- Shipston Churches Holiday Club covering the running costs of the holiday club
- Town Band to fund instrument mutes and equipment upgrades

- Shipston Sports Bowls Club towards a new sprinkler system for green watering
- Citizens Advice South Warwickshire a contribution to CASW's outreach service

In addition, the council has put aside nearly £40,000 towards identified Shipston projects, including support for the new Shipston Museum and the riverside amenity project which was identified in the Neighbourhood Plan.

Mayor, Dan Scobie, said: "Supporting our community groups and voluntary organisations is one of the tasks we most enjoy as a town council. We are really pleased to be in a position to increase our grant funding this year and look forward to seeing the community benefit from these investments."



Mayor's column

There really is something that everyone in the town can contribute, and I think we can be rightly proud that so many people do.


A special church service will also be held on Sunday 10th May – keep an eye out for more details in the next few weeks.




Last call for Shipston Award nominees

Stratford District Council recently consulted the public on its Climate Change Adaptation & Mitigation Supplementary Planning Document which looks at the planning process for future developments regarding climate change. It is based on five principles:

- Increasing accessibility
- Improving energy efficiency in buildings
- Adapting to higher temperatures
- Mitigating flood risk
- Mitigating biodiversity loss

In reviewing the paper, Shipston Town Council will also consider what it could do to support climate change action. This could include improving the energy efficiency of town council buildings, encouraging the district council to provide an electric car charging strategy for Shipston, or looking into providing ways to encourage more cycling in the town.

The town council could also use the SDC proposals to support environmentally-friendly conditions on new developments.

The council's Planning Committee will consider the consultation response in the first instance, as well as how best to begin developing ideas for the town council's own climate change initiatives.

News from Shipston Town Council's February meeting

Hot topics

Cemetery potholes: Due to the lengthy delay in finding the right materials, the town council is now looking at a temporary fix for the potholes at the cemetery.

Fitness equipment installed: New adult fitness equipment has been installed at the Sports Club and is free for residents to use.

Annual allotment meeting: The allotment-holders meeting is due to take place on 26th March at New Clark House.

Tree replacement: The dead trees in Railway Crescent have been removed and the General Purposes Working Group is now considering replacements.

Celebrating local good causes: Ronnie Murphy congratulated Shipston Rotary on its successful awards evening which highlighted the range of local charities and good causes in and around the town.

A proud birthday: Councillors congratulated Fay Ivens on the ninth anniversary of the launch of the Proud of My Town litter picking group – see article on page 5.

Campaigning for Shipston

Tackling poverty in Shipston: Councillors were concerned to hear that according to official statistics, 17.5% children in central and west Shipston are living in poverty compared to the average county figure of 11.5%. This highlights the importance of initiatives such as the Children's Centre and food banks in supporting those in need. The council is keen to look at other initiatives to help address child poverty in the town.

Planning concerns: John Dinnie highlighted that proposals to

erect chicken sheds in Barcheston are due to return. Although not in the Shipston parish, the sheds are likely to house over 150,000 chickens, resulting in an increase in traffic to bring the birds in and out of the sheds. Shipston Town

Council will consider the proposals when they come through the planning process.

Voluntary transport: VASA's bookings scheme has been rehoused at the Ellen Badger Hospital. The team is keen to encourage more people to join as drivers, with a view to ultimately offering a lift sharing scheme.

Town council business:

Planning committee roles: The first meeting of the new STC Planning Committee was held in January. Paul Tesh has been elected as chair of the committee, with Gerry Kelly as vice chair.

Shipston Forum: The council has not received any expressions of interest to cover all elements of the Shipston Forum. However, KMS Litho and Busybiz have both confirmed they are keen to continue providing the design, print and content coordination roles they currently fulfil. A new company has come forward to cover the editing and writing. Following a meeting with all parties, the Comms Group will come back to full council in March with full costings based on the three organisations working together.

Town council website: Redwax has been appointed to provide the town council website for a further three years. This will include a refresh of the website as well as ongoing maintenance.

Shipston welcomes new town councillor

Shipston Town Council has co-opted Peter Cowley as a new councillor, filling the one remaining vacancy on the council.

Peter moved into Shipston in December 2019, moving from Southport in Merseyside to be close to family. He spotted the advert in the Forum looking for new councillors and decided to put his name forward.

Although this is Peter's first experience as a councillor, he is no stranger to local government, having worked as a lawyer for Sefton Metropolitan Borough Council for many

years. "Although I'm new to Shipston, I'm keen to contribute to the town and my experience of working in local government means I'm able to offer up to date knowledge, particularly around legal matters."

Peter intends to get involved in the Planning Committee but is also keen to support the Heritage and Leisure Projects Working Group. Having previously been a trustee of a charitable museum, art gallery and library, Peter is keen to maintain his interest in local history projects and bring his experience to bear.

Peter enjoys spending time with his two – soon to be three – grandchildren and in his spare time, is a speed sports enthusiast and lover of music. Peter has also joined Shipston Rotary and is looking forward to supporting local charitable initiatives.

Take part in the 'Save Our Swifts' survey

Following the successful 'Save Our Swifts' event held in October last year by the Stour Valley Wildlife Action Group (SVWAG), Shipston is to aim to become a 'swift centre' for the Stour Valley. This will include putting



up nesting boxes to encourage the birds to flock to the town in greater numbers in the future.

For the best chance of success, it is important to establish where the swifts are currently nesting. This will help to decide where new nest boxes should go, as well as providing a baseline against which to compare the town's progress in increasing the swift population.

A local swift survey is planned for early summer (May-June) with a view to allocating willing volunteers a small patch of Shipston to monitor close to where they live. SVWAG is now calling on residents to come forward to join the survey.

SVWAG Chairman, Richard Gray, said: "It was great to see so much interest and enthusiasm for helping our local swifts at our event last year. We hope to see lots of residents taking part in our swift survey and supporting our aim to become a local swift centre".

Making Mike Ashley's dream come true

When Shipston-on-Stour museum opens on 10 April 2020 in the Old Clark House, West Street, it will fulfil the long-held dream of well-known Shipstonian Mike Ashley who sadly died last August.

Some years ago the old Shipston museum closed down and it was due to Mike's foresight that he saved the artefacts there, making a temporary place for them in his own home museum. The Ashley tradition is carried on by his daughters: Rebecca Ashley and Justine Taylor. Rebecca explains: "Our father asked us both to keep the connection and we have kept that promise by becoming Museum Trustees".

Justine adds: "He was a true Shipstonian - he knew about the local families and their stories, with his special interest in photography he also had a large collection of old photographs".

Mike believed it is important to understand the town's history, preserve its traditions today with events like the Wool Fair and also to share those stories widely within the community. Mike especially wanted young people to be involved and to bring the past alive for all.

His daughters explain: "His idea was to have a museum for the local people - by the local people". In some ways it is the end of an era - we have lost Mike's irreplaceable personal knowledge of so much local history but he has left a wonderful legacy for us embodied in our new Museum. It is heartening to know that Mike knew of the plans and had been closely involved in the development of his vision of a reborn local museum.

Now it is your opportunity to be part of Shipston's local history. The Shipston and District Local History Society is inviting local businesses to become Patrons and local people to become Founder Members of the new Shipston Museum (£10 individual and £15 for couples). Also welcome will be volunteers to

greet visitors at the museum or help with admin tasks such as cataloguing.

The initiative was originally launched by Councillor Fay Ivens in 2011 in a bid to keep Shipston looking good for the enjoyment of residents and visitors alike. Since then, a regular band of litter pickers meet almost every month to give the town a once over and target litter hotspots.





Fay Ivens said: "When we first started the litter picks, we used to easily fill several bags. These days, thanks to Lawns2Mow, we find that there is less litter to collect in the town centre and so we focus on the out of the way areas."

As well as a core team of regulars, many residents including some children – have joined in at various times to support the litter picks, which take place on the first Saturday of the month, weather permitting. "We're always keen to see new faces. All equipment is provided and we finish with coffee and biscuits. If you'd like to do your bit for the town, please consider coming along" Fay added.

Solo fostering helps young people return to living in a family environment following a stay in residential care. Solo fostering can also prevent young people from staying in residential care by finding Warwickshire foster carers so they are close to their family and friends.

Due to their background, the needs of these young people may be higher. That's why solo foster carers are asked to care for one young person at a time and have access to 24/7 support from a social worker or out of hours support through WCC's emergency duty team along with ongoing support from a psychologist.

Warwickshire County Council solo foster carers are paid an annual salary of over £2,000 per month, plus additional allowances and 2 weeks of paid annual leave, as well as access to specialist training and development.

Working towards a wonderful Wool Fair





It's great to have an opportunity to raise some money for this incredible organisation which totally relies on fundraising. The actual rowing bit, if I'm honest, is a long-held ambition inspired by reading Jerome K Jerome's classic book, Three Men in A Boat, when I was a boy at a school where I think I spent more time on the Thames than I did in a classroom. I hope to bring some skill to the mission - we'll see!"

The men will be taking an original Thames camping skiff and plan to camp on board. The boat has an easily erectable canvas cover which can be used for shelter from the sun and rain during the day. At night, it converts the craft into a floating tent. It will enable the three rowers to experience nature and river life up close and is featured in Three Men in a Boat.

Jonathan Davies said: "It will be worth every drop of sweat, every blister, every strained muscle to help our very own local hospice at home charity, who support so many people at the hardest time of their lives. I'm comforted by our skipper's meticulous planning - he's promised a suitable watering hole round every bend of the river!"

David Williams, who is a GP at Shipston Medical Centre, said: "As a local GP, I often have the privilege of witnessing the amazing work of Shipston Home Nursing and I see how they enable people to have as good a quality of life in their final months, weeks and days as possible. the only way to survive for those unable to find a job.

One of the ships was the Lady Penrhynn and David Clark spotted the original diary kept by the Assistant Surgeon on this ship for sale on ebay. He bought the priceless book for a little over £1 and it gives a vivid account of the voyage and its hazards.

Life in that strange land where they were put ashore was hard and several of these 8 women died young but two lived to a good age, becoming respected citizens. Australians that are proven descendants of convicts who had survived so much hardship, are now proud of their ancestry.

Youth Speaks



Women's Institute. Louise got into millinery (millinery for women, hatters make hats for men) almost by accident. She did an Arts Degree followed by a brief apprenticeship with a milliner and now teaches her craft, passing on her skills and knowledge.

Louise showed how she uses blocks to shape and mould the hat - she prefers to work in felt because it is so malleable, but also uses straw, fur and various fabrics. Some of the blocks she uses are quite old her favourite dates from the 1940s. As there are only three block makers still working in the UK, this is a dying craft. Louise uses feathers, sequins, beads and artificial flowers for decoration depending on the style, there is a lot of hand sewing involved. The aim is that no stitches show - this is the magic of a handmade hat.

"The right hat at the right time will lift the spirits" is Louise's maxim. Interestingly, Louise makes quite a lot of men's hats. They appreciate the practicality and enhancement of a good hat.

Don't get tricked by rogue traders

Warwickshire County Council Trading Standards is warning residents to beware of rogue

traders taking advantage of damaged roofs, fences and fallen trees after the recent storms.

Rogue traders can appear both charming and extremely plausible on the doorstep, but their work is of a poor quality and sometimes they will take money for materials and simply disappear. They may quote low prices, but they will soon demand more money and very often the work they claim needs doing is completely unnecessary.


Trading Standards are also warning residents to beware of rogue roofers going door to door, falsely claiming to work for 'the council'. Residents have reported receiving knocks on their doors from rogue traders saying their chimneys were on the verge of collapsing if something was not done.

Top tips to avoid rogue traders

- Don't buy from unexpected doorstep callers
- Go on recommendation and use traders that family or friends have been happy with. If that's not possible, consider using a Trading Standards vetted and approved trader. Visit: www.warwickshire.gov.uk/approvedtraders
- If your home has experienced structural damage you need a qualified surveyor to tell you what the actual damage is, never rely on the word of a builder alone

P3 is a charity that aims to support and guide people who face housing or tenancy related issues. We also provide guidance





The thing which really gets me up in the morning though is being able to make a real difference in people's lives - particularly the vulnerable and forgotten.



Statistics can leave us cold, but one number this week has actually chilled me. In Shipston 17.5% of our children are living in poverty compared to a countywide figure of 11.5%. I'm sure many of you reading this will have personal experience of this.

I am actually pleased to have a statistic to use when colleagues in other parts of our District claim that their ward is the most needy. Stop right there. Shipston is hurting. So I shall not apologise for the need to support CAMHS, the Youth Club, Foodbank and myriad other services for the young or vulnerable. That is where my heart and my head are at.

I help out a bit with the Foodbank, but I know that the increasing needs we are seeing are not going to end soon, so if you want to volunteer - get in touch. There are lots of things that our town can do for itself and looking after each other comes top of my list.

The rollout of Universal Credit has slowed down again and will inevitably mean that people are without benefits as they change over. Please don't go hungry - give me a ring, any time - and let me and others help."

Health Screening

The NHS offers screening for many different types of conditions, such as cervical cancer, aortic aneurysm, bowel cancer and breast cancer. With all of these conditions early detection always significantly increases the likelihood that less invasive treatment is required, and this is also likely to be more successful. Screening saves lives!

Why Bother?

If you are invited for screening do make every effort to attend. Screening targets those types of people most at risk of the disease area being screened for, and can really make a difference to the small minority who do develop these conditions.

Bowel Cancer Screening

This is aimed at people aged 60-74 who will be sent a letter and then a week later a screening kit through the post

every two years. Those over the age of 74 can request kits by calling 0800 707 6060. Sadly bowel cancer affects one in 20 people and is the third most common cancer. Whilst taking a stool sample and sending it back may not be a very pleasant thing to do, it really can make a difference - screening reduces the risk of dying from bowel cancer by 16%.

Aortic Aneurysm Screening

This is offered to gentlemen in their 65th year, although older gentlemen can refer themselves for screening by calling 01788 663428. There are around 6,000 deaths each year in England and Wales from ruptured abdominal aortic aneurysm, with about 4% of the male population aged 65-74 having an aneurysm.

Cervical Screening

Cervical screening can help prevent cancer. All women aged 25 to 64 will routinely be invited by letter. Currently

we are seeing a trend whereby fewer women aged 25-49 are for screening. We



understand it can be daunting, but it is worth it! If you are anxious about being screened ask to speak with one of our nurses and they will talk with you about the process.

Breast Screening

About 1 in 8 women in the UK are diagnosed with breast cancer during their lifetime. If it's detected early, treatment is more successful and there's a good chance of recovery. Breast screening is offered to women aged 50 to their 71st birthday. Whilst currently screening is not available in Shipston, eligible women will be offered appointments in Stratford or elsewhere. Please attend or rearrange to a different location or venue for a date that is more convenient.


