

Shipston gets set to celebrate the town's 10th Wool Fair

This year marks the 10th Anniversary of the Shipston Wool Fair – an annual celebration linking with the town's history and its importance in medieval times as a livestock town, specifically sheep. In recent years, the Wool Fair has grown from a one day celebration to a full Woolly Weekend and this year will be no different, with events taking place from 26th to 28th May.

Kicking off the Wool Fair weekend will be the Totally Locally Arts and Crafts market on Saturday 26th May. Sheep Street and The Bury will become a treasure trove of handmade and unusual goods, including soaps, ceramics, paintings, wood craft, textiles and up-cycled furniture.

On Sunday, Shipston Rotary is holding a Community Songs of Praise at St Edmunds Church at 3pm followed by tea and homemade cakes.

Bank Holiday Monday (28th) will see the town transformed, as the Wool Fair itself takes place. The jam-packed anniversary programme will see rare breeds paraded in the town, live sheep-shearing, and the opportunity to learn about the traditional crafts of spinning, weaving and knitting.

Retailers, clubs and charities will be lining the streets, offering games, competitions, raffles and retail therapy, much of which will be supporting local good causes. Refreshments will be available, both from stall holders and local cafes and restaurants, while music and dance will be keeping visitors entertained

throughout, so why not come for the day and make the most of this annual event.

Chair of the Wool Fair, Ronnie Murphy, said: "2018 marks a huge milestone for everyone who has worked so

hard to bring the Wool Fair back to Shipston, which is now one of the town's most popular events. We are extremely excited about this year's celebrations and look forward to seeing record numbers of residents and visitors taking part in the fun."

The Shipston Wool Fair was resurrected in 2009 after a lapse of around 150 years. Each year the Wool Fair organisers have introduced new features, including the Shipston Tapestry for the Queen's Jubilee year, and a woollen hat knitted on the day of the Fair from that day's sheep shearing.

It was last year's Wool Fair that introduced the town to 'yarn bombing'. The locally knitted 'yarn bombs' saw everything from lampposts and benches to shrubs and bollards adorned with colourful knitted creations. The positive response from local residents and visitors was overwhelming and yarn bombing will again be an exciting feature in the town.

Town Mayor, Dan Scobie, said: "On behalf of the town, I would like to wish the Wool Fair Committee every success for this year's events and look forward to joining in the celebrations."




From trauma to triumph in 24 hours as community responds to arson attack

Shipston Rugby Club fell victim to a suspected arson attack overnight on 13/14th April. The contents of a shipping container housing all the training equipment for the mini and junior teams was reduced to ashes, leaving the club in desperate need of help.

While police began inquiries, the local community swung straight into action. A 'Go fund me' page was set up by Rugby Club Chairman, Dan Scobie, with the initial aim of raising £3,000 towards replacement kit. Within 24 hours, over £5,000 had been donated by club users, concerned residents and businesses, as well as neighbouring rugby clubs. At the time of going to press, the fund had risen further to over £6,200.

Club Chairman and Town Mayor Dan Scobie, said: "As a club we've been overwhelmed by the

News from Shipston Town Council's April meeting

Hot topics:

Poor pavement: Brian Healey reported concerns about the state of the pavement outside 25 Berry Avenue. County Councillor Jo Barker will follow this up with Highways.

Blooming beauties: Fay Ivens congratulated Shipston in Bloom on the wonderful daffodil displays around the town. For more information on how Shipston in Bloom transforms the town's flowerbeds, see pages 8-9.

Flooded park: Mayo Road play area is still closed due to flooding. It is hoped that the situation will improve once the drainage work at the Rugby Club has been completed.

Cemetery entrance: The General Purposes Working Group is looking at potential improvements to tackle the deep dips that have appeared in the entrance to the cemetery.

New bus service: A new bus service has been launched by Warwickshire County Council in partnership with the Shipston Link to provide a regular Saturday shopping service to Stratford. The service, called the No. 10, starts on 21st April and includes stops at Waitrose, Bridge Street and Maybird Shopping Park.

Tourist office: Marianne Westwood reported that there are plans to host a new tourist information centre at New Clark House temporarily, with voluntary support from Shipston Timebank.

Speeding: A local resident alerted the council to speeding on Old Road which is of particular concern due to the number of elderly and less mobile residents at Stour Court. Jo Barker offered to raise the matter with Highways to see whether a reduced speed limit or other measures could be considered.

Litter and smoke pollution: Councillors were asked by a resident to look into the impact that new business, Thirst Edition, is having on litter and smoke pollution to see whether anything can be done to reduce the risk of smoke entering neighbouring properties and cigarette butts being discarded on the pavement.

Sensory garden vandalism: Dan Scobie shared concerns about recent vandalism at the Sensory Gardens. Local police have increased local patrols in the area and further plans are in progress to address the issue.

Food Bank: Food Bank packs are now being distributed from New Clark House (Mon-Fri 9am-12pm) and St Edmund's Church (Wednesdays 9:30am -12pm).

Campaigning for Shipston:

Planning consultations: Shipston Town Council has responded to consultations affecting Shipston's long term planning future. A map of sites put forward by landowners or developers for consideration for future development can be downloaded from the district council's website.



Flooding: Martin Ferrier visited some of the sites impacted by water run off during the heavy rain, accompanied by Warwickshire flood risk officers. Taylor Wimpey have installed hay bales to filter out silt being washed off their site and affecting Oldbutt Road. However, the culvert became blocked before the bales were in place and Shipston Town Council will be requesting help from the developer to clear it.

Portabello delayed again: Jo Barker reported that work to install traffic lights at the Portabello crossroads has been delayed again. A vital part of the design process – the lighting – has not yet been completed. County Council officers are now working on the designs and it is likely that the work will go ahead in the summer. Jo Barker has requested weekly updates (see county council column on page 14).

Ellen Badger update: A public meeting to talk about plans for the Ellen Badger hospital is due to take place on Tuesday, 1st May, from 6.30pm, at the Townsend Hall on Sheep Street. Places must be booked in advance by calling 0800 085 2471 or e-mailing membership@swft.nhs.uk.

Neighbourhood Plan: In order to fit with the meeting cycle at Stratford District Council, Shipston's Neighbourhood Plan Team is aiming for the public referendum to be held on Thurs 6th September.

Heritage Centre: The Heritage and Leisure Projects Team has been working hard on an application for European Funding to help fund a new heritage centre in Shipston. However, the group has been advised that an application to the Heritage Lottery Fund would be more likely to succeed. This also gives the group more time to develop their bid. Further updates will follow.

Town Council business:

Christmas light saving: Following the switch to LED bulbs last year, the electricity bill for the Christmas lights in 2017/18 is approximately 50% lower than previous years.

Residents invited to attend Shipston's Annual Civic Service

Mayor, Dan Scobie, will be hosting the annual Civic Service at St Edmund's church on Saturday, 13th May at 3pm.

This event is a celebration of the town, and is aimed at members of all faiths and those of none.


The Rotary Cotswold Tour d'Ilmington



Shipston in Bloom

Walking around the town centre of Shipston over the last two months you will have seen a display of spring bulbs and flowers in all manner of different locations and planters. Have you ever wondered who put them there?

We caught up with Chairman of Shipston in Bloom, Simon Welch, to find out more.



"Let me dispel a myth – it was neither the elves nor the fairies!" - Simon revealed that over a period of about ten days late last October a small team of local volunteers descended upon Shipston and planted 8,000 daffodil bulbs, 1,000 tulip bulbs and 600 forget-me-not plants. The planting was designed, planned and executed by Shipston in Bloom – a committee of 10 local residents. They were assisted by half a dozen additional helpers as well as the Rotary Club, the Lions, and last but by no means least the town gardening contractors – Lawns 2 Mow.

Shipston in Bloom exists in order to make the town colourful and attractive throughout most of the year for the benefit of both residents and visitors by creating a spring bulb display and later in the summer, a display of summer bedding plants.

Simon explained that Shipston in Bloom's working year begins in early October when the summer bedding displays have finished and the plants are removed and discarded. The containers and beds are dug over and then planted with the



bulbs and plants that will blossom in the spring. The committee then start the exercise of planning for the summer bedding displays choosing a design, colour scheme and appropriate plants. By the end of December the team is ready to order approximately 4,000 plants.



"For summer 2018, we have gone for a simple, but multi-coloured scheme – trailing begonias in the planters and antirrhinums in the flat beds, with a few structural spot plants – cordylines." Simon revealed.

At the end of April, when the bulbs have finished flowering the hard work really begins. All the bulbs are lifted and the top six inches of spent compost is removed from all the planters and replaced. Slow release fertiliser and water-retaining crystals are added. From the end of May, the bedding plants are planted out and watered in.



"Once we've completed the summer planting, we begin to relax and, along with residents and visitors, enjoy the fruits of our labour. However, keeping the plants sufficiently watered can be a major headache. We rely on rainfall and the tremendous job done by Lawns 2 Mow with their water bowser, but the 88 householder pots have to be watered more regularly." Simon explained.

"Despite the considerable rainfall Shipston experienced on occasions, many householder pots suffered badly through lack of any water. So if you have householder pots outside your house, shop or business, could you PLEASE look at them every two or three days as you go in and out, and if the plants look sad and the compost feels dry – please give them a good water. Thank you in advance!" he added.

By the end of September, the summer display will be fading. October arrives and Shipston in Bloom's annual cycle starts again for another year.

Did you know?

Shipston in Bloom's planting areas include:

84 householder pots (small concrete planters outside the front doors of many town centre houses, shops, pubs and businesses)

44 half-barrels in various groups throughout the town

30 planters of various shapes and sizes (including the large planters in the centre of the gyratory road system, horse troughs, 5-part circular planters and small wall troughs)

8 flat beds

30 hanging baskets

Funding the blooms

Bulbs, plants, compost, fertiliser are paid for indirectly by residents via the Town Council precept (part of the council tax). In addition, the group holds a Grand Raffle at the Victorian Evening to raise funds. Shipston in Bloom also receives a small number of generous donations from some residents. The money raised


(excluding the council grant) is used to fund a replacement programme of planters.

"Next time you see a senior citizen wearing a high-vis tabard labelled Shipston in Bloom, and on their knees grovelling around a flower bed or crouched over a planter, stop for a chat with us, we more than welcome suggestions for improving the town's floral displays." Simon concluded.

Members and friends braved the elements to attend a recital by Margeta Nadvornikova (violin) and Charles Matthews (piano).

Marketa began playing the violin at f i v e years old. At fifteen she studied at the Prague Conservatoire before continuing her training at the

Conservatoire in Birmingham. She is now in her final year before undertaking professional appearances. Charles Matthews has performed extensively as pianist and organist; in 1999 he won 1st prize in the Franz Liszt Organ Interpretation Competition in Budapest. He is organist of St. Catharine's Church in Chipping Camden and is a tutor of piano and organ at the Birmingham Conservatoire.

The recital began with the 1st movement of Mozart's Violin Concerto in G major which immediately demonstrated Marketa's technical skills, particularly in the demanding coda section where she tackled the double and triple stopping with complete assurance. Other pieces included a short organ fugue in Bb major by Johann Baptist Wanhal which provided an interesting contrast to Janacek's Sonata for Violin and Piano which followed.

This exciting and dazzling performance was suitably rewarded by rapturous applause.

Shipston-on-Stour and Area U3A

The contribution made by women in WW2 was told by Ron Galvin of the THE UNIVERSITY OF THE THIRD AG Redditch Military History Society at



the last meeting, and how this changed the view of what was previously a male-dominated society.

On the outbreak of war many powers were created, in the Defence Act and Ministries of Food, Supply and Labour, and after Dunkirk there were great shortages of manpower and equipment. So women had to step into the breech taking over many jobs previously done exclusively by men, including running the factories making everything from armaments to battledress. Factory work was in very hard conditions, with eleven hour shifts, and often dangerous as factories were bombed. Thousands joined the Armed Forces, driving ambulances, working on anti-aircraft guns and other jobs which were considered non-dangerous. But many women were killed, including others in the Fire Service, Civil Defence and Women's Voluntary Service.

The UK was the first modern nation to mobilize women, all those unmarried and not in reserved occupations. A small group of women pilots, delivering the large bomber planes to operational units, were the first women to achieve equal pay with men for the same job.

Shipston WI

The Shipston-on-Stour WI has planned a visit to the Forge Mill Needle Museum in Redditch later in the year, so Paul Betterton's talk about the History of Needlemaking in Redditch was particularly apt.



Needles have been made in Redditch since the 1790s and continued until very recently when, unfortunately, changes in safety legislation meant the 250+ year old industry was no longer viable. The work is labour intensive and was considered unsafe. Now this skilled and valuable business is carried out in China. It takes fifteen basic processes to produce a seemingly simple sewing needle. Redditch exported their needles throughout the world and the range of needles they made is enormous - the longest being 6'6" to sew the studs into a mattress, and the smallest, a 4.7mm needle for eye surgery. The industry was centred in the water driven mill (later steam powered) with much of the finishing done by outworkers in their homes.

The Warwickshire WI Federation is 100 years old and there are various events arranged to celebrate. All WIs in Warwickshire have been given an oak whip to plant in their town/village. The Shipston Branch is trying to think of somewhere suitable to put theirs (suggestions gratefully received).

The next meeting will be 2nd May with Jean Cholerton talking about Our Railway Nature Reserve and its Hidden Gems. As usual, the meeting will be at the Catholic Church Hall, Darlingscote Road, at 7pm. Visitors most welcome.


Royal British Legion Why I joined the Legion

My name is David Kernohan. I was born in Shipston and lived here until I joined the Army after school. In 1991, I was serving in the Gulf War, pre-mobile phones and internet, so our only means of communication was by post. It was a wonderful morale boost to receive letters and parcels from home.

My troop was operating on the Iraqi border and mail delivery was pretty sporadic. One day I received a parcel addressed to me personally and it was from the Shipston Branch of the British Legion - I have no idea how they knew where I was but it was very welcome and a real treat to be reminded that the people of Shipston were thinking about me. The parcel contained useful items - obviously packed by ex-servicemen.

Later that year, I was home from Germany for the Remembrance

Parade. I thanked the Legion for their support and was invited to join the members in The George. The banter soon started as it always does with service veterans and I felt very much at

Second Lieutenant REGINALD CHARLES CHAPPLE

Born on 17th February 1888 Reginald was the son of Charley and Bessie Douglas Chapple of Rydal House, Sheep Street, Shipston-on-Stour. Records show Charley as a Draper. In the September of 1901 Reginald attended the King Edward VI Grammar School in Stratford-upon-Avon, leaving in July 1904.

Prior to the war Reginald served for three years as a Trooper with the Warwickshire Yeomanry, which would have stood him in good stead when he signed up early on in the war. He resigned from the Yeomanry on the 13th April 1913 when he moved from Shipston to Barnstaple in Devon.

Whilst he attested on the 11th December 1915, he was not called up until the 29th February 1916 by which time he had moved to Bournemouth. Initially he returned to Devon serving as a Private in the 3rd/6th (Reserve) Battalion of the Devonshire Regiment based at Barnstaple. In June 1916 he was promoted to Lance Corporal and was promoted again in August 1916 to Corporal. Reginald applied for a Territorial Commission in February 1917, which he received in June.

Reginald's commission was gazetted on the 11th July 1917 and he was assigned to the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry and was posted to Belgium with the 1st/5th DCLI at Ypres. They were involved in actions at Polygon Wood and Passchendaele before the Battalion moved to the Somme in March.

On the 21st March 1918 the Germans launched their Spring Offensive, a massive attack on the Somme designed to break through the British lines and then sweep north to the sea to cut the British Army off.

The 1st/5th DCLI were immediately involved in desperate

268147 Serjeant HUBERT JOHN FISHER M.M.

Born on the 9th March 1897 Hubert, or Tom as he liked to be known, was the son of Gertrude Fisher. On the 18th January 1904 'John Hubert Fisher' joined the Infants School and on the 1st July 1904 moved up from the Infants to the Boys School. These records show their residence as the Union Workhouse in Shipston. Tom left school on 25th February 1910 just two weeks before his fourteenth birthday.

Tom Fisher arrived in France in November 1916 to join the 2nd/7th Battalion Royal Warwickshires. On Monday the 19th November 1917 the war diary reports a trench raid made on the eve of the Battle of Cambrai:

2am A Raid was made on enemy Trenches opposite our Left Front by Captain Bateman MC and two officers and 44 other ranks, and a prisoner was brought back.

The war Diary details the raid in great depth and under the section "Mentions of Gallantry or Good Service of Officers or Other Ranks" notes; "268147 Sgt Fisher. For conspicuous devotion to duty, leading forward his party, pursuing and killing the enemy". The London Gazette of the 23rd February 1918 listed Tom's award of the Military Medal for his part in the raid.

From 11th to 14th April 1918 the war diary describes how the Germans made a pressing attack (the same one Reginald Chapple was killed in, the two men's units fighting not far apart). On the 11th May 1918 the Evesham Journal reported:

Sergt. H J Fisher MM of the Royal Warwick Regiment was killed in action in France on April 14. Sergt Fisher, who was

fighting at St Quentin and Reginald had an eventful day. He was in charge of organising the Transport and it fell to him to get rations up to the Companies fighting at the front. The heavy bombardment had made it impossible to move wagons and so he instead used pack ponies. Setting off at about 4pm he made an attempt to find 'B' Company, but thickening fog made it impossible. On his way back he tried to keep off the tracks, instead moving over open country. While doing this a shell exploded near to him and a huge splinter hit his helmet. Somewhat dazed he is described as carrying on in a "plucky manner". On his return at about 8:30pm he refused to see the Medical Officer but when he eventually did, over a week later, he refused the advised break in Hospital.

On the 26th and 27th March they were again involved in heavy fighting at Rosieres, Reginald was again wounded and again refused to leave. Days later the 1st/5th DCLI had moved north to Merville not far from the Belgian border with France.

At 7.30am on the 12th April 1918 the Germans launched another attack, the British line was penetrated in several places and the Battalion came under heavy machine gun fire from their flanks. Eventually the Battalion had to retire over the Lys Canal. The regimental history reports that they put up 'a splendid fight' but with losses of 17 Officers and 467 other ranks either killed, wounded or missing the cost was very high.

Reginald's body was never recovered and he is commemorated on the Ploegsteert Memorial, near Messines. He is remembered on the Town Memorial, his parents' gravestone and on a Bronze tablet in the King Edward VI Grammar School War Memorial Library in Stratford-upon-Avon.

known to his friends as Tom, was brought up in Shipston House and went to the Navy League, Liscard, Cheshire. When war broke out he was in China and at once joined the Navy and took part in the operations at the Tsing-Tan forts. Afterwards he was put on board HMS Triumph, but owing to some rising in Hong Kong, he was one of a party who were landed to quell the disturbances. In the meantime the Triumph had sailed without him and his mates and was sunk in the Dardanelles. After serving in the



Navy for 12 months, he applied for, and obtained permission to join the army, and in September 1915 he joined the Royal Warwick Regt, and quickly obtained promotion, being made Sergeant before he left for France in November 1916. In November 1917 he was awarded the Military Medal for conspicuous bravery in killing a German machine gun crew, although he himself was badly hit in the thigh by the butt end of a German rifle. Sergt Fisher was 21 years old last March and was much loved by his sorrowing friends.

From the description in the war diary, it is believed that Tom Fisher was killed on the 13th April, although officially recorded as the 14th. His body was not found and he is commemorated on the Ploegsteert Memorial, near Messines, Belgium and is remembered on the Council School and Town Memorials.

District Council update

We all know that the problem with developing piecemeal is the complexity of the process and making sure enough infrastructure is provided. We also know that the infrastructure around us is creaking even before the new housing is completed. I think the only sensible thing to do is to think of settlements where the infrastructure will be put in to match need - from the beginning.

Anyway, I'm off that hobby horse now - and on to others...

The buses have been running to time - but just when I thought we were winning - one of you pointed out that they always do in the holidays. Back to the phones for me!

I am also really worried still about the Orbit problems - please let me know - every day I add another leak/loo/blockage/boiler failure to my list. I am in touch with the Head of Housing at Orbit - I have to say he has been helpful - but the more ammunition I have the more likely we are to get some better and quicker resolutions to these problems. We all know how to bucket a loo through - but are we doing our best for tenants who have to do it for a month before it's fixed? Enough said.

County Council update

I have begged the indulgence of the Forum Editor for a deadline extension so that I could pass on the latest intelligence about the Portabello Traffic lights



scheme. I began to feel I was peddling fake news with my updates as the dates keep changing. Enough is enough! Cllr Izzi Seccombe - Leader of WCC - convened a meeting on 12 April (as I write 3 hours ago...) and solutions have been found.

Firstly, the Coroners Report on the fatal accident in 2014 stated that the junction should be lit. In the previous scheme (which should have started on April 1st.....) there was no lighting. A new engineer looked at this, compared with the Coroners report and did a research project to establish the need for lighting at such a junction. Lighting will have to be provided.

Secondly, the good news is that the lighting design will be finished by the end of next week.

Thirdly, all the councillors who put their delegated budgets into this project are still willing to do so. I desperately want to prevent any future tragedies at the junction so want things started as quickly as possible. This is the engineer's 9th most urgent traffic light project in the County - we can all think of even worse junctions I suspect - we have had to push very hard for this project to be done. And it will be. The adjoining landowners have been really helpful and with the exception of some tree work and the final bit of design - it's ready to go.

But - fourthly, although the project is teetering on the brink of ready - I have found that moving fast will still require a "stress test" of the project and then being put out to tender. Late summer is the best start date at the moment. All I would ask is that those of us who use the Portabello Junction should do so with huge care and should encourage others to do the same.

Our staff may advise you to speak with Prabhjot if you need to talk about your medications or need a medication review. The purpose of such a review is to make sure that all the medications being taken are still appropriate and safe whilst minimising any medication side affects you may experience.
