# **Shipston Town Council reflects on a busy 12 months for the town**

Shipston Town Council took a new approach to its Annual Town Meeting in April 2019, which saw the event focus on the town's many highlights across the year.

Annual Town Meetings are a legal requirement of all town councils and provide an opportunity to report on key activities over the past 12 months. Rather than focusing on detailed updates from council working groups, the town council decided to put the community at the heart of the event.

The meeting opened with a show reel of highlights from the last 12 months, featuring some of the town's main events and achievements as well as some of the council services.

For the first time, the town council invited those community groups who have received grants from the council for 2019/20 to accept their cheques and say a few words about their group. As a result, residents heard from over ten groups ranging from sports and music clubs to transport and voluntary first aid services.

The meeting also welcomed back a number of past town mayors who were invited to receive their 'Past Mayor' medals. These medals can be civic worn at events and parades and will recognise the commitment made by individuals for their town.

Mayor, lan Cooper, said: "I have been struck by the warm welcome I have received when representing Shipston at civic

events across the region. That Shipston has such a strong reputation across Warwickshire and beyond is thanks in large part to previous mayors who have represented our community so well. These medals are our way of expressing thanks on behalf of the community for their work to support Shipston. It was an honour to present the medals and a delight to see so many past mayors in attendance."

The meeting, which was held in the Townsend Hall, was well attended by residents, many of whom are directly

involved in clubs and societies in the town.

"I was delighted to see so many people at the Annual Town Meeting. As a town, we have achieved a great deal in the past 12 months and marked many important anniversaries, including the 10th Wool Fair, 20th Proms and 21st Victorian Evening, as well as the largest Remembrance Parade in honour of the 100 year anniversary of WWI. Thanks to the strength of our community, we have much to be proud of and while we continue to face challenges, it is important to reflect on our successes as a town."

# Award for community service presented to dynamic Armstrong duo

The 2019 Shipston Award for community service was presented to Bob and Cath Armstrong at the Annual Town Meeting in April.

Bob and Cath are well known in Shipston for good reason - they work tirelessly to support local events and charities. They were nominated for the award principally because of their long standing commitment to the Shipston Wool Fair which they are heavily involved in every year.

But as Mayor, Ian Cooper, pointed out, this is just one of their many community achievements, which also include setting up and running the popular Tour d'Ilmington cycling fund raiser, many Rotary events and their efforts to tackle Polio which saw them helping out on the ground in India, administering the much needed vaccine to children.

On receiving the award, Bob Armstrong said: "We are overwhelmed to receive this award but must stress that everything we do is as part of a big team effort. Putting on community events is an act of faith and we'd like to thank



the people of Shipston who have given us such support. There is a real community spirit in Shipston and it is a joy and a privilege to live here."

# Spotlight on youth: Shipston's young people share their views

Shipston Town Council's Youth Working Group is made up of the Youth Ambassador and form representatives from the High School. The group met recently to discuss the ideas and concerns raised by High School students and the results of a Youth Feedback survey conducted by the Youth

Focusing on the 11-18 age group, concerns were raised about lack of sports activities, work experience opportunities, public transport and social facilities specifically for young people.



# **Sports**



Young people participate in a wide range of activities ranging from dance and gymnastics to netball, football, karate and boxing. However they feel that most of the holiday activities currently organised in the town are focused on primary school age groups with little provision for older children.

Suggestions put forward included multi-sports activities, summer camps, a youth sports hall, boxing club, gym facilities and more organised activities for this age group.

#### Socialising

Shipston has a wealth of social activities for adults, including specific activities for pensioners, but there is lack of facilities available for young people to spend time meeting up and hanging out together.

Feedback suggests there is a need for dedicated places to meet and socialise without disturbing others, offering warmth and shelter during the colder weather. Access to drinks and snacks such as pop-up coffee or milkshake bars would be welcome.

#### Work and travel

Those keen to work during their spare time feel there are few opportunities for work-experience appropriate for their age group. They would like to see local businesses engaging with young people to offer vacancies for part-time work, particularly at the weekends, but also for work-experience during school holidays.

Cost and frequency of buses is an issue for 16-18 year olds getting to school and it was suggested that ideally transport could be provided free for students to age 18 with perhaps Shipston Link helping to provide some of the services.



The report from the Youth Working Group also raised concerns that the anti-social behaviour of a few individuals risks tarring the reputation of young people as a whole. This is seen as a threat to the youth outside of this group who themselves want to feel safe in

Mayor, lan Cooper, said: "Our young residents have a lot to offer and I'm delighted that the council is now receiving direct feedback from them. We have noted the ideas and concerns and look forward to tackling some of these issues in the coming months."

# News from Shipston Town Council's April meeting

# Hot topics:

Church repairs: The wall at St Edmund's church has been repaired and trees pollarded in front of the church.

Medical centre update: The Medical Centre will be holding a patient meeting on 22 May which will include an update on the future site of the centre. See ad on page 14.

Five minutes of fame?: The Antiques Roadshow is coming to Compton Verney on July 2nd and is free to attend.

Oldbutt Road: The boundary hedge between the green space on Oldbutt Road and the Crest Nicholson development needs work to improve screening and health of the hedge. Town councillors were reminded that the situation should be monitored to ensure the green space and screening improvements are made, the self closing gate is installed and that flood risk is monitored.

Flood funding: Shipston Area Flood Action Group has successfully secured £30,000 additional funding which should be enough money to finish phase two of the natural flood defence work covering most tributaries to the south of Shipston.

Youth working group: Councillors noted the concerns and issues raised by the Youth Working Group and through the Youth Club survey. Representatives from each age group at the High School attend the working group. A new youth ambassador will be appointed in July and will serve from September to September in line with the academic year.

Planning highlights: An application to create four new dwellings on a site on Glen Close was considered by councillors to be in keeping with the Neighbourhood Plan as a windfall site allowing development within the existing town boundary.

In a separate development, councillors will liaise with the

applicant seeking permission to develop a garage block to see that the current prescriptive right of way remains.

# Campaigning for Shipston:

Sheldon Bosley Hub/Enterprise Centre: Shipston Town Council is to register the Shipston Enterprise Hub as an asset of community value. This will not affect how the building is used but will give the council first refusal on purchase if the building comes up for sale.

Painting the town pink: General Purposes Working Group is to reinstate the pink paint campaign to tackle dog fouling but this time will be leaving a clear 'pick it up' message thanks to a stencil designed to send out a clear instruction to dog owners.

## Town Council business:

Uncontested election: As there were fewer than 13 people nominated to join the town council from May 2019, there will not be a town council election in May. New councillors will be formally welcomed to the council at the next Full Council meeting.

Asset record: Martin Ferrier will capture photographs of all important community assets so there is a clear record.

Planning ahead: The Communications Working Group has established a policy which will guide the council on appropriate protocols in the event of the death of a senior public figure.

Allotment fee increase: Annual allotment fees will be increased from April 2020 by £4 for full plots and £2 for half

Martin Ferrier and Brian Cooper have been on the council for several years and have devoted much of their time to improving the council's understanding of and response to complex planning applications, giving the council a greater voice over planning decisions. They were both involved in the development of the


Neighbourhood Plan.

# Put health checks and screening before your spring cleaning

Warwickshire County Council is encouraging residents to take control of their health by getting any areas of concern or risk checked.

While living a balanced and healthy lifestyle is the best way to stay well for longer, there is no way to completely prevent the risk of developing conditions such as cancer, diabetes or dementia - which is why the council is reminding adult residents to take up GPs' offers of health checks or screening.

Understanding your risk of developing diabetes and making changes to your lifestyle to lower your risk of developing the condition can positively impact your health. A healthy active lifestyle is the first place to start when looking to lower your risk, however, there is plenty of support to find out more about how to understand your risk and making changes.

Screenings for cervical, breast and bowel cancer are routinely offered to adults by the NHS, while everyone between ages 40 and 75 is encouraged to take up a free health check from their GP every five years. Health checks are designed to spot early signs of stroke, kidney disease, heart disease, type 2 diabetes or dementia.

When people become eligible (usually based on their age), they will receive a letter inviting them to attend or book a screening or health check. If there are no additional concerns, patients don't need to go for a screening or health check until they are invited. However, if there are symptoms or family history of a condition, it is recommended that people to talk to their GP about getting tested sooner.



# T. S.ELIOT AND COTSWOLD GARDENS

Talk given by Graham Pearson, Volunteer Archivist, Hidcote Manor Garden

In 2002-3, Graham began researching Lawrence Johnston and how Hidcote Manor Garden was created from 1907 onwards. Graham and his wife transcribed diaries of Lawrence Johnston from the 1920s & 30s which lit the flame. He has subsequently visited libraries and archives in the British Isles, France and the United States to seek new information about Lawrence, his family and his gardens. This talk will focus on new research carried out in the last couple of years which has linked T. S. Eliot's visits to the Cotswolds to the discovery of fascinating old slides of Cotswolds gardens in the 1920s & 30s.

The Town Band and other local performers will also ensure there will be live music to enjoy throughout the day.

Last but by no means least, the Wool Fair's local shepherd will be back with his trusty dog by his side to tell you all about the life of a shepherd and to answer any questions you may have. 

# **Drugs Action Shipston**

The tragic effects of drugs and alcohol misuse continue to affect our community and DASH strives to be a small part



of helping our young people avoid getting involved with substance misuse. This can be done anonymously via Crime Stoppers or a simple phone call to the local police. Details will be taken confidentially. For the police, the more information they have the better evidence they can form to interview suspects for further enquiries or ultimately make arrests.

We want our community to be as safe as possible and as drug free as it can be. It is only by working together that this can be achieved.

# **Music Society**

The March meeting of the Shipston Music Society featured cellist Tom Pickles, a graduate of the Royal Birmingham Conservatoire with accompanist Charles Matthews. During his time at the Conservatoire Tom was the winner of several prizes and awards and since then has performed in venues around the country.



From the first notes of Frank Bridge's "Four Short Pieces" one was captivated by the deep, sonorous tone quality of Tom's playing. The "Sonata no 2" by Francis Routh (present-day composer) is a powerful work displaying the wide compass of the cello and possible dynamic range. This was played with feeling and a real understanding of the music. At the end of the month Tom will perform it again at a concert with Francis Routh present. Then followed Sonata in D minor by Debussy and, after the interval, "Threnos" by John Tavener with its slow, elegiac opening featuring adjacent notes sounding together – one of Tavener's "thumb prints". Tom gave us a wonderful performance of it.

The programme ended with "Sonata in F, op.5" by Beethoven in which the final movement, Rondo, is marked Allego vivace. It was certainly played with great panache and skill by both performers and the superb synchronisation of Charles with his soloist in the extremely fast scale passages left us all breathless. After rapturous applause Tom returned and brought us "down to earth" with an encore of unaccompanied Bach to conclude a memorable evening of music for cello and piano by composers from the early 19th century to the present day.

# ATale Of Two Cities - In Concert!

Stour Singers, directed by Richard Emms, will be presenting a concert reflecting two cities (Venice and London) and two centuries in their concert at St. Edmund's Church in Shipston on Saturday evening 11th May, at 7.30.pm.

Handel composed the Foundling Hospital Anthem in 1749, in support of Thomas Coram's Foundling Hospital. Handel not only wrote this anthem for a benefit concert, but he also donated an organ (a musical one!) to the hospital and gave an annual performance of Messiah in the chapel there for the last nine years of his life.

Some 50 years earlier, Venice's "red priest", Vivaldi, composed his 'Dixit Dominus' for soloists, double-choir and double orchestra, with the two choirs echoing and blending voices, combining with solo arias and the double orchestra.

Then, a century before Handel wrote the Foundling Hospital Anthem, Monteverdi - Maestro di Capella in Venice's St. Mark's Cathedral - composed his beautiful 'Beatus Vir', where the melody passes back and forth across the voices of the choir, to delightful effect.

Together with a solo performance of Handel's 'The Trumpet Shall Sound', from 'Messiah', these are the treats in store for the audience in St. Edmund's Church, with soloists Susannah Fairbairn (soprano), Cathy Bell (mezzo), Tom Raskin (tenor), Julian Debreuil (bass-baritone), and the Queen's Park Sinfonia.

# **Shipston Primary School**

#### **Manor Adventure**

Children from Shipston, Brailes and Acorns enjoyed a residential trip to Manor Adventure in Powys, Wales recently. The children experienced wonderful activities bathed in beautiful sunshine! Over the three davs, children were always active



in nine physically and mentally demanding challenges such as the zip wire, abseiling, climbing, archery and an obstacle course.

The children also learned how to canoe and kayak on the lake. The staff and Head Teacher were very proud of the pupils as they were a pleasure to take away and they challenged themselves in every activity, often surprising themselves with their hidden abilities, collaboration skills and determination to overcome their fears.

#### Science Week

For Science Week, we investigated which paper aeroplane design could fly the furthest and win the battle of the air between the R.A.F. and the Luftwaffe, linking in with our current topic 'A Child's War'.

To ensure it was a fair test we used the same thickness and size of paper, the person who launched it and the number of throws. The only variable we changed was the design of the paper plane - Spitfire (darter), Lancaster Bomber (glider), Messerschmitt (swooper) and Junker (drifter). In my group, the Spitfire flew the furthest (8m), whilst the Lancaster Bomber flew the shortest distance (3m). Our predictions were wrong because we thought the plane with the largest wing span (surface area) would glide the furthest, even though they had wing flaps which caused some drag. However, we learnt that the more aero-dynamic (arrow shape) the design of the plane the further it flew because the air resistance was less.

# **Shipston Medical Centre** Let us know if you can't make it!

Shipston Medical centre would like to thank all the patients who attend their booked appointments on time each week. On average 94.5% of patients attended their appointments in March 2019. Where patients did not attend booked appointments 82 of these were with a GP, 57 with a nurse and 36 with a health care assistant.

We recognise that sometimes people's situations change quickly and it is not always possible to let us know when you can't attend. However, if you can let us know it enables us to offer the

appointment to someone else - if we had been able to do so for the missed appointments with a GP we would have had over 2 more days of appointments to offer.

Appointments can be cancelled via telephone or online for those patients who have signed up to online services.

We are often advised when patients miss appointments with services. The top two most missed are physiotherapy and diabetic retinopathy (eye screening). Over 40 appointments with physiotherapy were missed in the first quarter of the year. Physiotherapy can make a massive difference to pain and recovery for those suffering with

musculoskeletal problems. If you need to cancel an appointment they can be reached on 01926 608068.



problem relatively common associated with diabetes is loss of vision, and therefore all diabetics are offered retinopathy screening annually so any deterioration is picked up in the early stages and steps can be taken to prevent this worsening. Retinopathy appointments can be changed to a more convenient time. Tel. 0333 4567670.
