Shipston Museum set to move to new venue thanks to local enthusiasm

Shipston Museum is set to move to a new venue thanks to the combined efforts of the Shipston on Stour and District Local History Society, Shipston Town Council and the Ashley family.

Shipston Town Council has agreed to lease Old Clark House to the History Society at a peppercorn rent, subject to a formal lease being agreed. Old Clark House has already been hosting a photographic exhibition - a project championed by the town council's Heritage, Amenity and Leisure Projects (HALP) Working Group. This new arrangement will see the exhibition expand to encompass all the treasures collected by the History Society since it formed in the 1960s.

Shipston has benefited from a museum since the 1970s, thanks in large part to the generosity of the late Mike Ashley and



his family who have provided a venue to house the growing collection of artefacts from the local area over the last 20 years. Mike and fellow historian, Dick Burge, regularly opened the museum to the public and passed on the stories accompanying many of the museums' exhibits.

Moving to a new venue will allow the museum to grow and be more accessible to residents and visitors. The photographic exhibition has already attracted people from far and wide – including a lady from America who was here on her honeymoon! The new venue will be led by the History Society, with support from the HALP working group and volunteers.

Bekky Hillman, local archaeologist and Director of the Shipston on Stour and District Local History Society, said: "I'm absolutely thrilled to have the town council's support in giving Shipston Museum a new home. The History Society has collected a vast array of interesting artefacts that tell a fascinating story about Shipston's past and it's wonderful that more residents and tourists will soon be able to enjoy these exhibits."

Mayor, Dan Scobie, said: "As a local



council, we are really proud to be able to invest in preserving our town's history by giving Shipston's History Society the opportunity to carry on the fantastic work started by Mike Ashley and Dick Burge. There are legalities that need to be completed but we are looking forward to seeing Shipston Museum open its new doors as soon as possible."

The new museum venue will be open to visitors as soon as practically possible. In the meantime, the photographic exhibition will continue to be open at Old Clark House, West Street, on Thursdays and Fridays from 1-4pm and Saturdays from 11am-4pm.

Shipston aims to become a 'Healthy Town'

The Town Council has endorsed proposals to seek 'Healthy Town' status for Shipston.

According to Healthy Bicester, 'healthy towns' "involve individual residents, workplaces and employers, schools and nurseries, clubs, associations, volunteers and health and care services who are all working together to enable and support people to live healthier lives and to promote their wellbeing".

While national efforts to create healthy new towns are focusing on ten 'demonstrator sites' Bryan Stoten, Chair of the Ellen Badger League of Friends has challenged Shipston to attain the status of a 'healthy town' with the expansion of the hospital, including a wellness hub, and location of the new medical centre on the site being at the heart of the initiative.

A number of community groups and associations have already come together to set up the Stour Partnership Against Social Isolation and Loneliness (SPASIL), including Rotary, the Lions, SCAN, the League of Friends, Shipston Medical Centre as well as Warwickshire County Council and Stratford District Council.

The next step is to expand SPASIL into a Health and Wellbeing Partnership (HWP), which will allow a wide range of community groups to get involved. The new HWP will develop a health and wellbeing strategy, taking into account the emerging priorities arising from current plans and consultations.

Don't be tricked by health lottery scam, warns WCC

Bogus 'Health Lottery UK' letters are being delivered locally according to Warwickshire County Council's Trading Standards Service.

Trading Standards Officers have received complaints from concerned residents about a scam 'health' related lottery letter, falsely claiming that the recipient has won £420,000. The letter claims that the recipient has been randomly chosen by computer from an NHS database and asks the recipient to phone a 'Dr Ruben Sanders' to claim their prize. The letter is addressed 'Bank St. Canary Wharf London' and is signed 'Dr D. Hoff'.

Action Fraud has issued some useful advice on protecting yourself against lottery fraud

- Never respond to any such communication. If you haven't entered a lottery then you can't have won it.
- Any request for a fee payment is a good indication that someone is trying to defraud you.



- Never, ever disclose your bank details or pay fees in advance.
- Be suspicious of addresses such as @hotmail.com or @yahoo.com or numbers beginning with 07 because these are free to get hold of.
- If they ask you to keep your win a secret it's likely to be a fraud.
- Many fraudulent lotteries have bad spelling and grammar.

The genuine Health Lottery (https://www.healthlottery.co.uk/) is aware of these scam letters and has alerted Action Fraud.

News from Shipston Town Council's October meeting

Hot topics

Graffiti on the rise: Councillors expressed concern about the rise in graffiti in the town. The police are aware of who is responsible and are dealing with the issue but councillors agreed to act swiftly to report any further sightings. Warwickshire County Council is looking at how to remove the graffiti from Shipston Bridge.

Police changes: PC Craig Purcell has left Shipston's Safer Neighbourhood Team to join the Rural Crime Team. Councillors thanked Craig for the excellent work he has done in and around Shipston. Councillors were also pleased to welcome PC Sid Hammond, who has taken over from Craig.

Youth working group update: Progress is finally being made regarding CCTV at the Skate Park, thanks in large part to Adrian Ramskill and Rotary.

New location for Youth Club: The Youth Club is now meeting at the Sports Club rather than the High School due to damage to an underground pipe which meant the previous building was no longer suitable.

Overgrown paths: Peter Cox reported a problem with overgrown vegetation in Orchard Close and it is unclear whether Orbit or Highways are responsible for the area. The Town Clerk will follow up.

Green bin recycling: Ian Cooper raised concerns about the potential impact of district council plans to start charging for collecting garden waste. In his view, this could lead to a reduction in recycling and increase in fly tipping. However, district councillor, Trevor Harvey, pointed out that the service was not a statutory responsibility and that the district council is anticipating a significant increase in recycling costs when it comes to retender contracts in two years' time. The district council consultation is open until 19 November via: stratford. gov.uk/gardenwasteconsultation.

New defibrillators: A defibrillator will be installed at Shipston Rugby Club by Shipston Community First Responders. Another defibrillator is also due to be installed at New Clark House.

Lighting issue resolved: Complaints raised about the impact of lighting at the new nursing home on neighbouring properties have been resolved thanks to action being taken by those on site to tackle the problem.

Councillors endorsed the objectives of the healthy town partnership and supported the setting up of Stour Valley Health and Wellbeing Partnership.

John Dinnie and Marianne Westwood have both been elected to represent the town council on the new partnership.

Securing s106 money: Paul Tesh and Ian Cooper have been working on tracing back s106 money promised and received following recent developments. The work is ongoing and designed to ensure the town council does receive all the local contributions agreed with developers.

Hanson Track improvements: Councillors congratulated Marilyn Chalmers on the work she has led to improve Hanson Track. More help is needed to continue improving the footpath for residents but it is already much more useable than previously.

Town council business:

Recycling bins: Local resident, Julie Pardoe, has purchased new recycling bins to enable the town to recycle a number of materials not currently included in kerb-side recycling. The new bins are installed at St Edmund's Church. The Finance Working Group will look at preparing a recommendation for the town council to cover the cost of the bins which is just under £80.

Housing Needs Survey: Tenders are coming in in response to the council's request for bids to undertake a new Housing Needs Survey. The submissions will be assessed at the next Planning Working Group.

Tree survey: Shipston Town Council has agreed to appoint Tree Tech to carry out an inspection of approximately 400 trees in the town.

Playground repairs: Repairs to the London Road play area will be delayed until November to make sure children can access the area during half term.

Welcome to Gerry Kelly: Councillors formally welcomed Gerry Kelly to the town council for his first meeting. One of Gerry's first tasks will be reviewing the emergency plan and flood response plan for the town.

Gerry was presented with his councillor medal by Mayor, Dan Scobie (picture below).

The nursing services are managed through a team of Registered General Nurses specialising in palliative care, and Health Care Assistants. The Charity cares for the patient and their family in their own homes throughout the period of their illness.



Shipston Area Flood Action Group

SAFAG has completed further works at Whichford which will slow the flow into the main Stour there. We have also now secured further funding which will enable us to complete work right around the catchment above Shipston.

Flood Authority and consent from about 10 landowners/farmers has now been secured for further substantial works around the Sibfords on both sides of the river upstream of Cherington and Stourton as well as another upstream tributary from Brailes area. Works on these schemes began in October and should be complete by the end of November.

Plans are in development for Long Compton in conjunction with the flood group there. The first scheme, on a tributary of the Nethercote Brook which feeds into the Stour at Mitford Bridge, should also be completed by end of November, with further works due next spring.

All of these works combined with those undertaken last year on Kneebrook, Paddlebrook and Pigbrook (already showing signs of benefit) will help slow the flow into Shipston and the downstream villages and help protect homes and businesses throughout.

We are also working with WCC and Brailes Flood Group on a scheme for Sutton Brook, a major watercourse feeding the Stour at Stourton but this will require separate funding which WCC has in hand. Finally, we are developing a monitoring programme to generate evidence to aid future natural flood management works and groups.

Huge thanks are due to all flood group members for the huge amount of work they are putting into this project, as well as council staff and all the landowners and farmers who have given support without which we would have been unable to achieve anything. Thanks also go to local company, Storm Geomatics, which is providing technical help where needed.

Shipston on Stour Probus

Shipston on Stour Probus attended the first meeting, along with others, to co-ordinate the commemorations, alongside the British Legion, of the 75th anniversary of both VE and VJ day (May 8th / 9th and August 14th / 15th 2020). It is hoped that the Probus club will be able to contribute in some way.

During October we had fascinating talks.

Louise Moorman gave an interesting talk on October 11th on how the school helped its pupils find their future vocation in a 6th form, at college, and in apprenticeships. Many questions were raised especially as so much has changed since the days that Probus members were at school.

On October 25th Dr Timothy Brain spoke on Contemporary Policing issues. He was chief constable of Gloucestershire from 2001 until January 2010, having previously served in Avon and Somerset, Hampshire and West Midlands.

In 2008 Eugene and Margaret Schellenberg went to Africa on holiday. Starting at Dar-es-Salaam they travelled inland for ten bone-shaking hours to



reach the small town of Ifakara. Here they thought they were in the Garden of Eden; fruit was everywhere, and the maize harvest was in, which the people cooked and ate from bowls. So all was well and no-one was hungry.

But they soon found that this only lasted for two months of the year after the rains came. For the other ten months the climate was so hot and dry that nothing would grow and there was hunger, and even starvation. So they decided to set up a bakery and provide bread.

Impressed by how hard the people worked Eugene came to the UK to find suitable equipment. Electricity was rarely available and electronics were badly affected by the climate. He finally found what he needed in the Avery Works Museum in Birmingham. Ovens were built, which from just a few loaves a day soon progressed to a hundred a day and people came many miles from all over Tanzania to buy bread. Those who had no money were given the loaves for free. Currently, over 400 loaves are produced every day using ingredients provided by funds raised by their Charity, the Ifakara Bakery Project, and an old empty building has been converted to a shop.

The next meeting is at 2pm on 26th November.



At our first meeting of the 2019/2020 season we were pleased to welcome young classical guitarist, Michael Matthews, who was seven years old when he began to play the guitar and was immediately "hooked"! By 2018 he had been selected by the Concordia Foundation to perform in London and abroad, and he will shortly make his debut appearance at the Wigmore Hall.



The recital began with John Dowland's "Lachrimae Pavan"; Fantasia No.7 followed by six dance movements from Sonata "L'Infidele" by Silvius Leopold Weiss, a German composer and lutenist. In complete contrast the next composition was "Suite del Recuerdo" by Jose Luis Merlin which brought us into the realms of 20th century music. The six contrasting movements were played with all the rhythmic details and energy required and nimble fingerwork produced harmonics, giving the "Evocacion" an ethereal quality.

After the interval we heard "Nocturnal" by Benjamin Britten and "Sonata" by Joaquin Turina in which Matthew was able to demonstrate his deep understanding of each work and his ability to convey that to his audience.

The final piece was "Serenades of the Unicorn" by Finnish composer Einojuhani Rautavaara, and as the title suggests, was a romp, played with amazing skill and lots of panache to which the audience responded with much enthusiastic applause.

Throughout the recital one was amazed at the truly formidable, technical skill of Michael Matthews and we are very grateful to the Tillett Trust for supporting him in his 2018/2019 recitals around the country. We wish him every success in his career.

District Council Update

The last time I wrote I mentioned Tesco's planning application for a new outlet on the site of Pettiphers Garage. I was particularly concerned about the implications for parking and the lack of a suitable footpath between the Garage and the Telegraph Street Car Park. The application was, nevertheless,



approved. I have suggested to Tesco that, as part of its corporate social responsibility programme, it might like to ensure the safety of the good people of Shipston by meeting the cost of a new footpath. My letter has at least been acknowledged. Watch this space!

We all know what a great place Shipston is to live. This was confirmed recently by information sent to all SDC's councillors - The Index for Multiple Deprivation for England 2019. Of the 326 English local authorities included in the Index, Stratford District ranks 266th i.e. there are 265 other local authority districts with greater levels of multiple deprivation. Of the five districts within Warwickshire, Stratford ranks as the lowest based on elements of social deprivation. Within the 73 areas in Stratford District, Shipston's three areas were ranked as 25th (West & Town Centre), 29th (North) and 71st (South & Furze Hill). In other words, whilst the District as a whole and as well as Shipston are relatively blessed, there are still issues in people's lives that need to be addressed. And that is where Jo Barker and I hope we can make some contribution.




