My diary is looking busy. I am looking forward to seeing many of you during the forthcoming Remembrance Day commemorations.

News from Shipston Town Council's October meeting

Allotments

Council approved the installation of a new perimeter fence and gate at New Street allotments.

General works

Council to create list of approved contractors for small works.

Dog waste and paths

Laminated signs are now up on Hanson Track and vegetation trimmed back to make the bin more visible. The hedge at Hanson Avenue has been trimmed to make the path more usable.

Cornmill Meadows

Hilary Kelly and volunteers carried out a litter pick in advance of the official opening on 14 October, collecting four bags of rubbish in less than an hour.

Highways

Leaks on Darlingscote Road have been reported to Highways.

Policies and website

A working group will carry out a review to ensure all the latest versions of policy documents are available, and that all information on the Council website is up to date.

Energy efficiency

A recommendation to obtain energy certificates for the Hub and Social Club will be passed to the Finance Working Group.

Shipston Police Safer Neighbourhood Team

PC Mark Lucas will be replacing Sid Hammond in the community team. A Speedwatch will be set up for London Road and Stratford Road.

Ellen Badger Hospital

Councillor Dinnie is waiting for a reply to questions he posed to the Integrated Care Board in July.

Educational grants

Richard Taylor reported that there had been 17 successful applicants for grants from Shipston Educational Charity available to help students aged 16-25 with further and higher education, together totalling £1,420.

Angelas Meadow

The planning committee and the GPWG are to discuss the play equipment and its placement within the existing play area offered by Orbit Housing under the S106 agreement from the Chapel View development.

Rivers

Council agreed to buying three testing kits to test water quality in the Stour for a minimum period of a year, maximum five years. Data will be fed back to a group monitoring the wider area. The river level at Stour Bridge will also be measured.

Bandstand

Councillors have been exploring the possibility of having a bandstand in the town square with Shipston Town Band, if active travel plans allow space following consultations.

Trees on Hawthorn Way

The environment working group will make recommendations about a proposal to allow the felling of an ash tree with the planting of smaller trees.

High School extension

The planning committee is to review a proposed extension at the High School.

Riverside

Council approved a scheme of improvements at Riverside, involving lifting crowns and felling dead trees—leaving the roots in place to secure the bank—along with the planting of a new hedge and grassing of picnic area, and the creation of a low level hedge around the car park.

Visit Local website

Council agreed to host a new Visit Local website.

Shipston in Bloom

This will be the penultimate season for the current volunteers who help to make our town blossom throughout the spring and summer. The hard-working team plants bulbs and plants supplied by the Council. By the time you read this the Poppy Appeal will have been running for a few days so if you've already purchased your poppy then thank you for your support.

Collectors have been at the crux of the Poppy Appeal since 1921 and this year they will again be in our community to collect donations that help RBL continue its vital work. In Shipston we enjoy great support from our volunteers, from shops and businesses hosting static collections, from local community groups and from those who contribute. I really hope that this will continue during this year's appeal.

The Shipston Branch of the RBL appreciate our loyal collectors and certainly don't take their support for granted. In addition to street and static collections, Shipston is one of very few towns left where a house-to-house collection takes place. I am really so grateful to all of our collectors, whatever they do and however they contribute, as without their continued involvement, our community collection would quite simply not take place.

If your collector hasn't been yet, then please do look out for them and give them a warm welcome when they call.

New for 2023

Available from this year is a new poppy made from a blend of renewable fibres from responsible sources which can be recycled in ordinary paper recycling collections.

Hundreds of possibilities were explored during the design process. Paper was chosen over complicated bio-based plastics to create a single-material solution that can be easily recycled. Fifty percent of the raw material used has been recovered from waste used in the production of coffee cups.

The plastic-free poppy will initially be available alongside remaining stocks of the current poppy to avoid waste of poppies already produced. It can be fastened with a pin or inserted into a buttonhole.

Poppies containing single-use plastic can be returned to Sainsbury's stores for recycling after the Poppy Appeal.

We also are now able to offer a smaller size of wreath should you prefer.

I will personally look forward to seeing many of you during this year's appeal and thank you in advance for your support.

A Story of Cornmill Meadows

During a recent stroll down Meadows Way, the access path to Cornmill Meadows, I spotted in the distance a small dark figure in the middle of the path. As I got nearer it became clear it was a young cat, just sitting and watching me approach. Drawing level, I was treated to an affectionate rub along my legs; I responded with an appropriate tickle behind the ear, and we parted good friends.

Continuing my walk, I reflected that nearby houses were probably home to many such pets who would quite naturally roam the meadows, especially at night. The problem is Cornmill Meadows is a designated wildlife site and in season there are likely to be ground nesting birds, field mice, voles amongst others, all of which fall prey to cats.

The Mammal Society estimate that cats in the UK kill around 92 million prey items during spring and summer, of which around 27 million are birds. I appreciate it is in the nature of cats to hunt, and they will roam over wide areas. Here I must congratulate the owner of my newfound feline friend – this cat was wearing a collar with a small bell around its neck! The RSPA recommends that the collar should be correctly fitted and should have a quick release mechanism to allow the cat to free itself, should it become snagged. There are also commercially available sonic collars which are designed to alert the potential prey of the cat's presence.

So, a plea to all cat owners, and in particular those residing in Angelas Meadow, Brewers Hill and Haddons Field Please give a thought to your wildlife neighbours in Cornmill Meadows and in all open spaces around the town, give them a sporting chance to escape a sudden disastrous end from your cat's claws – fit that bell!





Bird migration

Why do birds undertake journeys of sometimes thousands of miles each year. How do they survive and arrive accurately at their destination? Dr Tim Sellar, a retired zoologist now living in Ilmington, treated Shipston Probus members to the latest research into the extraordinary world of bird migration

Most of us probably think of long-distance journeys such as the the one made by willow warbler, a tiny bird weighing just a few grams, that flies 4,300 miles one way to sub—Saharan Africa. In contrast, the dipper, named after its habit of bobbing movement, lives off insects and larvae found in upland streams, but streams can freeze in winter hence the dipper migrates to lower levels, maybe just a few hundred away metres, to find its food.

How do we know birds migrate? The first record of a bird ringed in England and picked up in Natal, South Africa, was on 27th December 1911. It was believed to have flown 6,000 miles in eighteen months, and is now known to have travelled 18,000 miles! In addition to ringing, scientists now use tiny transmitters which record the exact routes and timing. It is estimated that 5,000 million birds migrate from Europe to Africa each year, with different species taking different routes. Even within species, groups may follow distinctive patterns of movement. Not all travel from north to south: starlings fly east to west, from Russia and Scandinavia to the UK in winter. Some birds, for example the cuckoo, take different routes each year. Why this should be is a matter for further research.

We may be familiar with those special birds that stay with us all year, notably the robin, but all may not be as it seems! It is now known that some robins fly off to Ireland for the winter and may be replaced by continental cousins, so the winter robin in your garden could be from France!

What are the reasons for migration? It is chiefly availability of food as the seasons change. In Africa there is around 12 hours of dark and 12 of light. By travelling north in the spring birds take advantage of not only the bloom of food supplies but the extended hours in which to feed. Finding suitable nesting sites to bring up the next generation is important.

Young gannets may travel further than the adults to grab the most advantageous positions. The great shearwater breeds on isolated islands in the South Atlantic and is one of the few birds to migrate from south to north in search of its food; squid and fish.

How do these animals manage to navigate huge distances, often returning to the exact same nesting site each year? It is believed they make use of landmarks such as lakes and mountains and adjust their flight to the changing position of the sun. But all birds fly at least partly at night, and experiments have shown the pole star is their guide. Some may use a magnetic sense of direction and other subtle environmental factors – the smell and sounds of land or sea. Changes in atmospheric pressure indicate weather change and can delay migration. Many adult birds fly off leaving their young to follow, presumably aided by inherited genetic information, but it is not fully known how they manage.

Dogs for Good

Ann Prosser and Marilyn Chalmers from Dogs for Good, a local charity based in Banbury, gave a presentation to Shipston Probus together with star of the show Ash, a yellow labrador who displayed all the patience and calm performance skills of a veteran actor.

We may be very familiar with dogs who accompany those with visual impairment or rescue dogs of various types. Less familiar may be the numerous 'assistance dogs' that provide essential help for those with disability. One in five of us have a disability of some kind, not always apparent to the casual observer; many live alone and isolated. Approximately 11% of children in the UK have some level of disability most commonly learning, emotional and sensory/speech issues.

An assistance dog is trained to aid anyone with a disability be it physical or mental; they can perform specific tasks related to their owner's disability, helping them gain confidence and independence. Dropping your specs or phone while in a wheelchair can be a problem. An assistance dog can retrieve them, similarly they may open doors, especially the 'press button' type out of reach to the wheelchair-bound. Having difficulty getting your socks, jacket, trousers or gloves off? No problem, amply demonstrated by Ash who deftly pulled off Marilyn's gloves without touching her fingers! He was also reputedly capable of retrieving clothes from the washing machine! Other dogs are trained to raise a medical alert or simply remind when it is time to take medication; yet others can act as a calming influence on children with emotional difficulties or adults with dementia.

The breeds most suited for these roles are the labrador, retriever and cockapoo. At least two years of training is needed from the puppy stage, always based on 'fun' for the dog, and always involving a reward for appropriate behaviour. Ash was rewarded with a 'treat' after each demonstration – so much so members queried the quantity of food consumed but were assured this is taken into account at mealtimes. Despite intense interest in a treat, Ash was so well trained that he would not touch a biscuit placed on his paw until given permission and would never 'steal' food.

The demand for these wonderful helpers is great but of course all this comes at a cost: initial purchase and extensive training adds up to thousands of pounds. Interested in helping or learning more? Go to Dogs for Good | For making life possible | Assistance dogs & more .

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Astronomical Society News

The Stratford upon Avon Astronomical Society meets every 1st and 3rd Tuesdays at 8pm (doors open at 7.30pm) at Alderminster Village Hall. Everyone is welcome, especially



beginners and those wanting to learn more. The first Tuesday is a Club Night. In November that will be on 7th November and the speaker on 21st November is due to be lan Muirhead from the University of Manchester, with a talk called 'Megaconstellations, Starlink, space junk and the night sky.' Please note that the speakers usually start quite promptly at 8pm.

Each month one of our members offer pointers to what to look for in the sky during the coming weeks.

Satellites

Firstly, the biggest, oldest, and the only natural satellite of the Earth, is the moon, which we have mentioned in previous notes.

People are surprised when they are told you can see manmade satellites with just your own eyes, but you can. They will look like 'stars' moving across the sky at a constant speed. They can fade, as they move into the Earth's shadow. Most travel in a west to east direction, but some will appear to go south to north.

The brightest by far is the International Space Station (ISS). Its passes are easy to predict on apps like Heavens Above. Occasionally, you will see a second satellite preceding or following it. These are Dragon Capsules, service modules taking or removing equipment or crew from the ISS.

Another thing you can occasionally see are the skytrains of the Starlink – lines of satellites following one another. There can be dozens of these in a row.

The best time to see them is an hour or two after sunset. You might be surprised how many you can see.

Club nights offer more information on what to look out for each month and if it is clear, we do some observing just outside the Village Hall, so please join us. There is no charge initially to come along and find out more, but if you do want to become a member then the fee is just $\mathfrak{L}15$ a year and it's free if you are in full-time education. - You own or privately rent your home


