Shipston Town Council seeks bids for grants to support the community

Shipston Town Council's annual community grants scheme is now open for bids for the next financial year – April 2020 to March 2021.

The community grant scheme is one of the most rewarding aspects of the council's work. The council sets aside money every year to directly support local initiatives undertaken by voluntary groups and charities which benefit residents. Last year saw a total of £20,500 awarded to support a wide range of projects from community events to lifesaving services.

The grant scheme is open to any voluntary group or charity based in Shipston or actively working in the town. Bids must relate to specific projects, such as a purchase of new equipment or support

for an event, rather than general funds. Typically, individual grants range from £250 to £2,000, although in some cases, awards may be higher.

Mayor, Dan Scobie, said: "Community grants are a great way of supporting the many and varied projects and services available in the town. Wherever possible, we are keen to support projects that benefit a wide group of residents to make best use of public funds, but we do consider niche projects as well, particularly when it's to do with supporting some of the more vulnerable members of our community."

Grants in action

Improving access to the river bank

Shipston Town Council contributed funds to help pay for work being done by the Sports and Social club and

Angling Club on riverbank. the The grant has helped make it possible for people with disabilities to the access river and enjoy fishing. The new platform was



officially opened as part of the Fish n Frolics festival in July.

Keeping people moving

The Town Council has supported both the voluntary drivers scheme through VASA and Shipston Link, both of which provide transport for those in need, particularly to help residents get to medical appointments and shops.

Lifesaving support

Through its grant scheme, Shipston Town Council funds the ongoing costs of the Shipston Community First Response vehicle, including insurance, road tax and maintenance. This funding helps ensure the voluntary first aiders

can reach people throughout the town quickly when there's an emergency.

Proms party

Grant funding has also been awarded for the Last Night of the Proms, recognising that it is such an important event for the town, and an opportunity for everyone to come together and enjoy music free of charge.

Blooming marvellous

Every year, the council funds the flowers planted by Shipston in Bloom which make such a positive visual impact throughout the town.

Grants have also been used to support maintenance projects and new equipment for the Townsend Hall, invest in the Youth Club outreach programme and Xfest, support Citizens Advice services and help pay for repairs to the Town Band hall.

"Unfortunately we can't fund every bid, and often we are not able to give as much money as groups would ideally like. However, we consider every bid carefully and aim to support as many and as diverse a range of projects as we can", the Mayor concluded.

Shipston residents take action to reduce waste

Shipston is now benefitting from extra recycling schemes and a packaging-free pop up shop thanks to the enterprising efforts of local resident, Julie Pardoe.

EcoWeigh will be based at St Edmund's Church and will stock a range of refillable products including dried store cupboard essentials, cleaning products, beauty and body products. Simply bring along your own containers. For details of dates and times, visit www.facebook.com/theecoweighshop.

St Edmund's is also hosting extra recycling options for residents, including crisp, snack and nut packets, crisp tubes (Pringles etc), confectionery and biscuit wrappers, pens, pet food pouches, Tassimo/L'OR pods and outer wrapping, Kenco lids, toothpaste tubes, toothbrushes, baby food pouches and home hygiene products. Please only use this facility for items **not** eligible for your blue bin.

Plastics that can't normally be recycled will be processed by TerraCycle who break it down into beads for use in play equipment etc. Instead of paying for the waste, TerraCycle donate to two nominated charities: League of Friends of the Ellen Badger and Shipston First Responders.

Mayor's column



I've spent a lot of my time recently working on solutions to a problem that's growing in society; the threat of and issues of social isolation and loneliness. It's heartening to see efforts in Shipston starting to tackle this difficult issue.

The causes of these issues can be complex, and the solutions required can also be long-term and difficult to deliver, but the true problem isn't always what we expect. A recent piece of government research said that approximately 10% of the over 70s suffer in this way, but it also said that 20% of 18-24 year olds suffer. There are also voluntary support groups that have folded due to a lack of uptake, and an increasing number of people Squaring that needing help. circle isn't easy.

Often it's the simplest things that can have the greatest impact in tackling these issues, and awareness is one of the most important things. Just being aware of how your friends and neighbours are. Simple conversations can make all the difference, they reinforce community connections which are vital building resilience to isolation and loneliness.

As a Town Council we're looking at making a formal commitment to helping tackle these issues in our community, and that's something I support entirely. How we actually do that we've yet to determine, but there is nothing more important than the wellbeing of vulnerable members of our community – whatever age they are.

Warwickshire Police is encouraging residents to keep in touch with their local Safer Neighbourhood Team.

Warwickshirepolice.co.uk has a page for each SNT giving details on who is in the team, a monthly newsletter and reporting on good news or incidents of note. You can also sign up to alerts via the Community Messaging Service. More features are to be added, including a crime map, giving an overview of crimes in a specific area, down to street level.

Shipston's SNT is active on Twitter, Instagram and Facebook and is a great way to find out what they are doing to tackle crime in and around the town.

Warwickshire Rural Watch is a free scheme to help combat rural crime in Warwickshire. You can sign up to receive incident alerts and news for Shipston and the local area and a c c e s s c r i m e prevention advice and information.

Shipston SNT has an email address unique to them for non-emergency issues and advice - shipston.snt@warwickshire. pnn.police.uk. You should receive a response within 72 hours, although often replies are given sooner.

101 is the national phone number to contact your local police. 101 is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week and is free. However, in an emergency - when someone is in danger, a crime is in progress or a suspect is nearby - always dial **999**.

Understanding how developer contributions work

There are two ways in which developers of new homes or other sites have to contribute towards local services. These are Section 106 funds and the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL)

Section 106 money is money agreed between a developer and the planning authority (Stratford District Council) either for payment of services/facilities or social housing. The funds are specific to that site.

CIL is more like a development tax which is administered centrally by district. Of the fee developers pay, 5% is retained to cover admin costs. The town or

parish where the development lies will receive 25% if, as in Shipston's case, a Neighbourhood Plan is in place (15% if not) which the town is free to decide to spend on whatever projects it chooses.

The remaining 70% is administered by the district and is designed to be spent on strategic improvements to benefit the district as a whole. SDC is waiting until it has accumulated £750,000 before considering where that money will be spent.

Hot topics

New face in New Clark House: Shipston Town Council welcomed new Admin Assistant, Diane Neath, to the council. Diane will be working alongside the Town Clerk.

Sad farewells: Councillors expressed their sorrow and condolences at the loss of both former Mayor Alan Noyce and former councillor, Mike Ashley, whose funerals took place in September. Letters of condolence will be sent to both families.

Copping stone: The long awaited repair of the copping stone at the bridge will be chased again by the Town Clerk. If no progress is made this month, the matter will be taken up by district councillor, Jo Barker.

Promoting transport: Councillors are keen to encourage residents to make use of community transport service, UBUS. For more information, see next month's Forum or contact the UBUS team on 01789 264491.

Town Clerk announces retirement: Georgina Beaumont will be retiring from the council in December after ten years in the post. She will be sorely missed. Recruitment for a new clerk has begun (see advert on page 10).

Hanson Track thanks: John Dinnie recorded thanks to Marilyn Chalmers for organising improvements to Hanson Track, with support from Warwickshire County Council (WCC) (see article on page 4)

Campaigning for Shipston

Investing in VE Day: Shipston Town Council will contribute £1,500 towards VE Day celebrations in the town in May 2020.

Pettiphers Garage development: District Councillor Trevor

Harvey, has written to Tesco and WCC to request they install a footway leading from the garage to Telegraph St car park to enable people to walk safely from the planned store to the car park.



Planning enforcement: Stratford District Council's planning enforcement team are looking into concerns about additional development at the Darlingscote Road/Fosse Way junction.

New footsteps: STC will request that the footsteps encouraging children to cross safely be reinstalled near the primary school after recent works led to them being removed.

Speeding signs: STC will look into the most cost effective way to install additional flashing speed signs to reduce speeding following an increase in the problem reported by Shipston's Speedwatch volunteers.

Town Council business

Car charging stations: Further work is needed to assess the benefits and risks of electric car charging points in the town. All working groups will look into the pros and cons of charging points in Shipston.

Litter & dog bin review: General Purposes Working Group will inspect all the litter and dog bins in the town to check on condition and replacement needs.

Financial updates: The town council agreed a number of recommendations from the Finance Working Group, including the adoption of new Standing Orders, a new risk register and an updated investment strategy.

Warwickshire County Council addresses concerns about Portabello roadworks

The works to install new traffic lights at the Portabello crossroads has been the cause of much frustration, with road users complaining about delays, lack of work on site, light phasing problems and timing issues.

Warwickshire County Council's Highways Department has provided a detailed account of the works to explain the process and progress. The timing of the works is due in part to the complexity – a number of different people and organisations have had to be involved, including landowners and utilities suppliers, and contractors. Preparatory work was completed in June 19 and given the importance of the works, it was agreed to go ahead as quickly as possible.

Regarding evidence of work on site, WCC has reassured councillors that work patterns are affected by a variety of issues such as plant availability, health and safety and contractual arrangements. The compound where the team

is based is away from the road, making it harder to see when people are working. However, the county council is confident that the contractors are working to schedule.



The phased traffic lights respond to traffic movements which means it's less likely to work well if people jump the lights.

County Councillor, Jo Barker, said: "I understand the frustrations with the works but we all know how important it is to get these lights installed to improve safety. Please bear with us while these works are completed – and don't risk your own safety or that of others by jumping the lights."

Standing up for Swifts

Shipston residents have been noticing the decline of swifts nesting in the town, describing the summer sky as being "eerily quiet" without them. The situation is the same across the country with swift numbers having more than halved in the last 20 years.

These fascinating birds have a very unusual lifestyle! Richard Gray, chairman of the Stour Valley Wildlife Action Group (SVWAG) said "They eat on the wing, they sleep on the wing, they mate on the wing, but they nest in our buildings..." and that is where we can make a difference.

Local expert, Chris Mason from Cherwell Swift Conservation, will be coming to talk to SVWAG on 22 October. If you would like to learn more about swifts, how they differ from swallows and house martins, and how we can help them continue to nest in our town for future generations, join the talk (see details on page 16).

Shipston High School has been enjoying the first weeks of the new school year with a real buzz in lessons. Indeed, students have been getting involved with all aspects of school life; new year seven students are actively joining clubs and sports fixtures are well underway. This time of year often

sees pleasant weather, and it is great to see so many students playing supervised matches on our sports fields after school.



Staff have been very impressed with the

manners and commitment of our latest recruits. Moving into Year seven is a big change for young people, and all staff have been pleased with the energy and readiness to learn on display. Students have started secondary school with demonstrable enthusiasm; well done.

In September's column I was able to share initial news on Shipston High School's GCSE results for 2019. I am pleased that students have left the school to move into a range of fulfilling post 16 opportunities, many at local sixth forms, colleges and apprenticeships.

Shipston maintains its consistently strong record in core subjects. In English, 75% of students secured grades between 4 and 9, with 78% in Maths. Top grades have been secured across all subjects, including students with multiple

grades at 7, 8 and 9. Students have achieved grade 9 across the subject range, showing a consistent high performance in a diverse array of subjects.



As important as individual grades achieved is the impressive progress from students, with many exceeding their expected outcomes. 2019 results demonstrate the strong academic focus of Shipston High School. This is also a time to remember the community spirit that supports our young people; students are encouraged and supported by their friends and family along with the school staff. All students should be congratulated. Well done to everyone.

Our thoughts now start to turn towards applications for September 2020. Badgers Eye View

Readers of the Forum will know there's a lot of discussion going on about how we can develop a Healthy Town in Shipston. The League of Friends is looking at how we can help that initiative by providing additional services at the core of a newly revitalised hospital.

We are examining how we can support and fund space and facilities for the enormous number of health related voluntary organisations in the town. We have been asked if there can be support found for health, diet and fitness initiatives and whether services such as weight watchers and similar self help groups may have a place.

Suggestions have been made that we might provide outdoor and indoor exercise equipment, meet the demand for "Exercise on Prescription" from our medical practice, create a meeting space with catering or maintain the hospital's renowned expertise in a community garden.

The central core of the hospital will offer diagnostic services, therapies - speech, physiotherapy, podiatry- and community nursing, (including the palliative care services of SHN) together with outpatient clinics. They will all require a welcoming, modern environment which can take advantage of the site's location and the views from all its aspects.

Much of that kind of development will go beyond NHS capacity alone. We will get a new hospital - and hopefully a spacious medical centre - but if we want to build a local health service rather than our current illness service we will need some things which don't just replace current services with shinier ones. All ideas will be welcome.


Happy 100th birthday to local war veteran, Harold Pleasance

I seem to be majoring on Highways - again!

The Portabello is a pretty large project. I couldn't believe the size of the hole containing water pipes as I peered in. I can't be alone in being



amazed at the amount of work needed for a set of traffic lights.

I have been speaking to the engineers over the summer - trying to stay on top of the red light issue in particular. I am told that running the lights at red causes glitches in the timing of the lights basically by scrambling the electronics (apologies to anyone who could describe this more technically).

We worked hard to get this black spot sorted - please bear with it - we don't want accidents now, as we reach a point where we finish the project & prevent future tragedies at the crossroads.

Dropped kerbs- we decided that putting a map in the Forum would not be helpful so here's a summary of where we are thinking of installing kerbs having been out in a buggy. Existing dropped kerbs will have heights checked & sorted. A dropped kerb at the corner of Horsefair - as requested. Dropped kerbs from the south of town out of the housing estates to the London Road and some areas made more accessible to those with limited sight. Please let me know what you want to see in the town centre and please, if you drive, don't park in front of dropped kerbs!
