New acts for us were the dance-oriented FAZFunk (think a fusion of Red Hot Chilli Peppers and Daft Punk), who had people bopping at the White Bear, and Jack Reach and the Shaders who played a very popular cover set at the Lazy Pug, including songs by Van Morrison and Oasis. Not new to The George, but new to the Proms were The Artichokes, a charismatic twosome who

sound like four, playing their version of rock classics. The Dropouts from Moreton in Marsh were a band we hadn't seen before, and they delivered a very confident and loud set of classic rock songs at The Coach and Horses. I hope we see them all again.

The Shipston Proms Open Mic Night on Saturday evening at The George Inn in Lower Brailes was packed out with both performers and an eager audience. There was a great deal of talent on show and a particular highlight included a set from 16-year-old Josh Rowley, playing guitar and using a loop pedal to create his backings, followed by music on his newly learnt 5 string banjo. Definitely someone to watch out for in the future!

On Sunday afternoon, the sun persisted and under the brightly coloured marquee of The Gate Inn in Upper Brailes, highly respected musician and composer Jon Brindley entertained the very appreciative crowd with his fiddle, guitar and accordion. He played his unique interpretations of songs that have moved him, including the tear wrenching Woody Guthrie's Mexican Lament 'The Deportee'. The George Inn in Brailes hosted the Patsy Gamble Jazz Trio on Sunday afternoon - Patsy from Stroud, is one of the finest saxophone players in the UK and delivered an inspirational programme of jazz standards with James Agg on double bass, and Tristan Watson on guitar. Back in Shipston, the Peas played again in the packed garden of the Black Horse, while singer and songwriter Greg Brice held court from a truck outside the Thirst Edition to a very appreciative crowd.

All venues, acts and audiences contributed to a very lively and community-spirited weekend. I met our former babysitter Kelly in the Lazy Pug, the first time I had seen her in 27 years!

We thank everyone who got involved to make the weekend such a success and look forward to welcoming you all when we return to a full Proms next year.

News from Shipston Town Council's September meeting

Youth Ambassador The council intends to appoint a Youth Ambassador to improve representation for young people. They will also help liaise with relevant local groups and bodies, including schools, the youth group and churches.

Ellen Badger Concern was raised over rumours in the local media ahead of the conclusion of the bed review. Cllr Barker urged those present to be patient and wait for the result of this activity before assuming the worst.

Shipston Area Flood Action Group The group continues to face challenges acquiring materials for planned works. Stratford-on-Avon District Council have confirmed that a grant, funded from Community Infrastructure Levy payments, can be deferred to next year. Councillors approved funding for a new pond scheme and expenditure for the winter repairs programme.

20mph Zone Paul Kelly from Stour Valley Environment and Climate Action Group spoke during the Open Forum session, urging the council to support a 20mph speed limit throughout the town to reduce the environmental impact of vehicles and improve safety for cyclists and pedestrians. Stour Valley Lions Legacy David Squires used the Open Forum session to inform Councillors that the Lions had received a very generous legacy on the condition that the funds be used to support older people in the town. Potential ideas include a new sensory garden near the allotments or a "Men's Shed". Both proposed ideas will be discussed in further detail at a future meeting.

Sports Club Barrier A height barrier to prevent unauthorised vehicular access will be installed shortly.

Playground Maintenance Works are now underway around the town. Councillors resolved that the Queens Avenue climbing frame should be removed as soon as possible for public safety.

Alleyway Signage Property owners are being consulted about the plans to install naming signage for the alleyways throughout the town. The signs are intended to help visitors navigate when given directions.

Lawns2Mow Contract Councillors agreed to request a sixmonth extension of the existing contract to ensure that the contract retendering process could be conducted properly.

New Clark House Refurbishment plans are being finalised to improve working conditions and create a more welcoming environment for visiting members of the public.

Strategic Plan The Mayor and Deputy Mayor are working on a proposal for a strategic plan for the council which will be presented soon. This will include a review of the existing working groups and committees, and mechanisms to ensure that and Councillors are not at risk of burnout.

Jubilee Celebrations General Purposes Working Group will take responsibility for the organisation of celebrations for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee next year.

Charlie Cuthbert

The Shipston on Stour Branch of the Royal British Legion is sad to announce that its senior member, Charlie Cuthbert, passed away peacefully on Sunday 29th August.

Charlie joined the Brailes branch of the Royal British Legion in 1946, at the age of 26 on realising the number of veterans

that would need support following the end of WW2. He had joined the Warwickshire Yeomanry in 1936 and, when war broke out, served as a tank driver with 10th Royal Hussars in the 8th Armoured Division in North Africa – the famous Desert Rats – and fought at



the Battle of El Alamein in 1942. In 1945, he went on to join the 16th/5th Queen's Royal Lancers, and was posted to Allied-occupied Austria at the end of the war.

Last November saw Charlie celebrate his 100th birthday, receiving a card from Her Majesty The Queen, and being made a real fuss of by family and the staff at Low Furlong.

The thoughts of the Branch and its members are with Charlie's family and friends at this sad time.

Residents who live in or near Shipston find the speed, weight and volume of traffic on the A3400 and the other main roads unacceptable. It has become detrimental to the health and wellbeing of residents.



BACK TO SCHOOL

We spent the first staff training day focusing on curriculum development and priorities across our three schools for the year. The second training day focused on Thrive, a dynamic, developmental and trauma-sensitive approach to meeting the emotional and social needs of children.

We've been excited and delighted to welcome children back to school for the 2021-22 academic year. We are all desperately hoping for an uninterrupted year but coronavirus is still with us so we have contingency plans in place in our response to single cases, clusters and outbreaks of COVID-19. We are continuing to utilise our outdoor spaces, keep school well ventilated and we will continue with our cautious approach to the start of term by only having essential visitors to school and not proceeding with full school assemblies.

Children are no longer in class bubbles and can currently mix with friends from other classes at playtimes and lunchtimes. Another aspect of returning to normal is a full school meals menu and eating in the hall and not classrooms (thank goodness!).



We have the same brilliant cook and team as in previous years but welcome Miquill as our new catering service provider. The new menus have been incredibly popular with both children and staff so far; food is more attractively presented, portions are more appropriately sized and there are lots more clean plates!

School Council will be meeting with the head cook regularly to give constructive feedback for consideration in the design of future menus.

SOW, GROW AND FARM

Swans and Herons classes in Year 5 visited the allotments on Tuesday 7th September as part of their memorable moment in the Year 5 topic Sow, Grow and Farm. ORACY

Building on our work on vocabulary and relationships, a key focus this year is oracy. With verbal communication being such an essential human need, articulacy is a crucial skill for human development. The ability to speak eloquently, articulate ideas and thoughts, influence through talking, collaborate with peers, and have the confidence to express your views are vital skills that support success in learning and life in general. Our focus is on embedding oracy (learning to talk and learning through talk) by in all aspects of the school's culture and weaving it throughout the curriculum to support progress and achievement.

GLOBAL COMPETENCIES FOR DEEP LEARNING

Global Competencies are the skills and attitudes that students need to be successful in the 21st century. With rapid changes in the opportunities in the world today, it is essential to prepare our children for the future by making them more confident and self-directed learners. The intent behind focussing on the 6Cs Global Competencies is to move educational experiences towards creating and using new knowledge in the world, aligning with the latter two stages of our Engage, Develop, Innovate, Express curriculum pedagogy: children can use and apply the knowledge they have learnt in the Develop stage in their innovate challenge and how they showcase their learning.

Shipston High School

Shipston High School has seen two exciting phases of new building in recent years, reminding us that as the school grows in popularity the site needs to develop to enable a contemporary and secure learning environment for the children of Shipston on Stour and surrounding communities. Our first duty is to the many students who attend the school, ensuring that they are safe, content and receiving a good quality education. Providing daily pastoral care and an effective academic programme for young people is the core of our work for the community.

We are delighted to be planning further site improvement, focussed on community safety. The school has secured funding from the Department for Education (DFE) for two improvement projects. DFE funding of this sort requires schools to submit bids for projects, and there is a limited level of funding nationally, so we are pleased that the DFE have recognised the importance of this work.

One project will enhance

fire protection in the original school building, now over sixty years old. New internal fire doors and a new alarm system will ensure that our already secure fire protection remains up to date.

A second project will improve boundary security for the school, providing perimeter fencing and access gates. The school is

daily host to over 600 children and staff, and the improved boundary will provide reassuring security during the day and after hours. Gates will allow legitimate visitors easy access whilst reducing the

risk of unauthorised access to the site. It can only be reassuring that children are more secure during their school day, and the school buildings and fields are secured against potential intrusion. Children deserve to conduct their learning in as safe an environment as possible, and we are grateful to the

DFE for facilitating this essential safeguarding work.

Shipston High School increasingly oversubscribed. As the local area thrives and expands with new housing, the pressure on good schools increases. We are in the early stages of working with the local authority to enable more students to attend and further improve the built environment. As with previous expansion, we will retain the ethos and quality of education that makes the school so special whilst providing the muchneeded places for future students.

All of this investment is a real vote of confidence in the school and the

wider community of Shipston on Stour. We are proud of the core work we do with children of the area, academically and pastorally, and look forward to sharing more information on future development soon.

Update on the community hospital inpatient review

South Warwickshire NHS Foundation Trust (SWFT) are currently undertaking a review of the inpatient beds at the community hospitals: Ellen Badger and the Nicol Unit at Stratford Hospital.



SWFT told us:

"The focus of this review is to ensure we are providing the services that meet the health and care needs of the people of south Warwickshire, both now and in years to come. The first stage of the review has been exploring previous, current, and future use of the community hospital beds. We have been working with Healthwatch Warwickshire to gather the views of previous and potential patients regarding the inpatient services. We are very grateful to Healthwatch and everyone who took their time to share their views and experiences."

We were asked to gather and analyse the views of past and potential patients about their experience, or hypothetical needs in relation to community bed provision in South Warwickshire.

We heard from over 500 people, and the feedback received was largely positive. It is clear that the community beds provision is a highly valued service. Some people told us that they felt it was an appropriate way to transition between an acute stay in hospital and returning home. Others told us how they valued being close to home, and family and friends so that they could visit; and the benefits of the smaller nature of community hospitals as opposed to larger hospitals which can be hard to navigate your way around.

On 18th September, Jonny Watkinson from Shipston took on the National Three Peaks Challenge, to raise money for Shipston Home Nursing. He walked the highest mountains in Scotland (Ben Nevis), England (Scafell Pike) and Wales (Snowdon), one after another within 24 hours (including travel).

The challenge took 23 hours, 24 minutes and Jonny took 50K steps, covering 23 miles, and a total ascent of 10K metres.

Describing the adventure, Jonny said: "We walked Scafell Pike in pitch black, in the worst conditions the hiking company have seen so far this year! It was the toughest physical challenge I've ever faced, but certainly one of the most satisfying! I'm really pleased to have completed it for Shipston Home Nursing and the team."

Rebecca Mawle, Head of Fundraising for Shipston Home Nursing, said: "Individual fundraisers like Jonny help us to continue to provide our nursing services to families who need us. A huge thank you to Jonny from all of us – he is a fundraising hero!"

Jonny has a Justgiving fundraising page and so far has raised $\mathfrak{L}756$ towards his $\mathfrak{L}1,000$ target. Shipston Medical Centre

Why isn't general practice like it used to be?

In the past, to see a GP all you had to do was ask. Now when you ring, a receptionist may ask you about your problem. You may be offered a phone call from a GP or help from a different professional. Many people think, "But I just want to see a GP!"

Here is the background to the problem. Patients are living longer, with more medical problems and many more medications. The complexity of General Practice has vastly increased. But the number of GPs has declined. General Practice was overwhelmed for years before the pandemic added further strain.

One solution was to introduce new roles, such as Nurse Practitioners, Pharmacists and Physios. These professionals are highly skilled and knowledgeable in the areas they specialise. The GP's particular role is to manage patients with complex or multiple medical problems and to support the team.

When will GPs start seeing people face to face?

Contrary to common belief, GPs have continued to work face to face throughout the pandemic. We triage patients to a face-to-face appointment where we judge that the benefits outweigh the risks to the patient, to other vulnerable patients who need to come into the surgery and to medical centre colleagues. Clearly physical examination is required a faceto-face appointment is needed, but there is much care that can be provided via the telephone and this can also be more convenient for patients. Going forward the amount of face-to-face appointments will continue to reflect the risks of COVID transmission. We are hopeful that both will improve.

All of our staff continue to wear masks at work and to socially distance where possible. We are very mindful that coronavirus could transmit easily through our team and to our patients, leaving us unable to provide a service due to staff absence and or exposing vulnerable people to a virus that could cause them significant ill health or death. This is why measures to control risk are important. Coronavirus has meant that we have experienced more staff absences than usual, i.e. where people have a reason to go for a PCR test they cannot come into work until a negative test result has

Most patients and health professionals prefer face to face appointments. At times they are needed medically and to build the relationship between patient and clinician. Many surgeries increased their use of telephones and the internet during the pandemic. At times this can be effective and safe and also save time. If we want to provide quality care in an underfunded General Practice, we are forced to make uncomfortable changes. To help cope with the pressures, we will need to balance the preference for faceto-face working with the efficiency of the alternatives.

Whilst appearing less visible, general practice is actually delivering more appointments than ever.

Achieving what's expected of General Practice, with the workforce we have is incredibly challenging. We continue to care deeply for our patients and want to help ensure that everyone still gets the care that they need.

A response to the letter from Mr Langrish

NHS primary care services are continually evolving to meet the ever-changing health needs of communities and accompanying shifts in working patterns are reflective of society as a whole. Many people, whether they work in healthcare or other sectors, now choose to work part-time so that they can juggle other responsibilities such as childcare or simply out of a wish to have a greater work-life balance, for example, Dr Williams has worked less than full time for a number of years. It is disappointing that Mr Langrish has, without any evidence, expressed a negative opinion toward some of the fantastic new members of our team who will be making an invaluable contribution to the care we provide.

We feel incredibly fortunate to have been able to recruit three high calibre GPs at a time when practices both locally and nationally are struggling to fill vacancies. A recent survey by the British Medical Association (July 2021) identified that over half of GP respondents were suffering from anxiety, stress, burnout, emotional distress or another mental health condition, with 1 in 10 looking to leave the profession. Our new team members will help to significantly increase our clinical capacity to our highest ever level, and by embracing more flexible working arrangements for all of our staff, we strive to be a forward thinking employer to both retain the highest quality staff and also prevent burnout, thereby safeguarding the future of the service.

We understand that the delays to medical procedures caused by the pandemic are extremely frustrating and we, like everyone in the NHS, are working extremely hard to ensure that everyone gets the care they need. The ethos that has been within the fabric of Shipston Medical Centre for decades, will remain unchanged: Community focus, clinical excellence, compassion and dedication.

District Council update

In an address in 1867, John Stuart Mill said that 'bad men need nothing more to compass their ends, than that good men should look on and do nothing'. Whilst I wouldn't wish to be thought of as one of Mill's bad men, now is the time for all the good men and women of Shipston to make their views known about the proposed merger of Stratford District



Council (SDC) and Warwick District Council (WDC). The consultation exercise now underway runs until 24th October. For details of how you can have your say, please visit the SDC website at: https://www.stratford.gov.uk/news/press.cfm/current/1/item/137628

In a nutshell, this proposal is being driven primarily by two factors. The first is finance. Both SDC and WDC are faced with the need to make very significant savings in their expenditure. By merging, they stand a chance of making those savings; without merging, the task will be that much more difficult. It would almost certainly involve a reduction in their ability to provide their residents with the current range of services. The second factor is the nature of local democracy. Warwickshire County Council has already submitted a proposal to the Government for the creation of a single, countywide, unitary council. This would mean that both SDC and WDC would be abolished and their functions all undertaken by WCC. The alternative would be the creation of two unitary councils, one for north Warwickshire and one for south Warwickshire. The merging of SDC and WDC would provide the basis for a unitary South Warwickshire Council that maintained local government as local as possible.

If SDC's Council is to vote in favour of the merger when it is debated on 13th December, it will find it difficult to decide to go ahead without evidence that the merger has strong support from the District's residents. That is why I urge you to have your say and make your contribution by completing the questionnaire before 24 October so that you can play your part in shaping the future of local government in South Warwickshire.

There is a second consultation exercise underway, this one concerning proposals from the Local Government Boundary Commission for England - see the following for details: https://www.stratford.gov.uk/council-democracy/the-local-government-boundary-review.cfm

The Commission is seeking residents' views on its proposal which, as far as Shipston are concerned, would abolish the present North and South Shipston wards as single-member wards. They would be replaced by a single ward of 'Shipston' but with two members who would each represent the whole ward. The parish of Tredington would be stripped from North Shipston and added to the parish of Ettington to the north together with Stretton-on-Fosse that currently forms part of Shipston South. This would form a new ward of 'Tredington'.

As a matter of policy, SDC very strongly favours one member, one ward and is opposed to multi-member wards. Equally, I am opposed to the proposal to remove from the Shipston wards the villages that surround the town and for which Shipston provides a focal point. I am equally opposed to the creation of an artificial ward of Stretton-on-Fosse, Tredington and Ettington where there is little if any, day to day connection or relationship between them.

The Commission's proposals are open for comment or counterproposals until 8th November. As with the merger consultation exercise, I hope as many residents who have the stamina will make their views known.


