The Shipston Food Festival brought a market-day buzz to Shipston town centre in September. Organised by the Stour Valley Lions, the event was a resounding success, with around 30 stalls providing quality food and drink for the hundreds of visitors who attended across the day.



Trading was brisk, from the time of opening by our Town Crier Marion Lowe and Councillor Jo Barker, to the drawing of the raffle. Some stalls even sold out before the end, and the occasional warm shower failed to diminish the festival mood!

Around £4,500 was raised which will be donated to local good causes, and thanks to the generosity of the people of Shipston, the £522 from the targeted bucket collection will go straight to the Lions Club of Morocco to support victims of the recent Moroccan earthquake.

The Food Festival couldn't have happened without help from a number of supporters. The Stour Valley Lions would like to thank Stratford-on-Avon District Council for the Covid Recovery Grant which enabled them to get started on the seven-month planning process; local businesses who

News from Shipston Town Council's September meeting

Mayo Road Trust

A meeting of the Mayo Road Trust (all Councillors are members) will soon be organised to agree a policy on leases and approve a programme of improvement works to be completed following a consultation with Rugby Club.

Arthur Ivens

Councillors observed that former Town Councillor Arthur Ivens had recently died, noting the invaluable support he had provided to former Town Councillor and Mayor Faye Ivens during her tenure on the authority.

Cornmill Meadows

New signage and a bin will soon be installed at Cornmill Meadows and the official opening will take place on 14th October. Additional spraying to complete the treatment of creeping thistle is required.

Hanson Track

It has been identified that the dog waste bin at the bottom of the Hanson Track is not immediately obvious and that a small sign has been affixed to the gate to alert users. The Town Clerk will create a larger replacement laminated sign for installation.

Shipston Museum

Councillors noted that the town museum has seen encouraging attendance figures since opening on 5th August, with typically 25-30 visitors appearing during the three hour window the museum is open on Saturdays and Sundays. There is a significant number of people interested in becoming a member or volunteering at the museum.

Benches

The bench at the Pound (junction of Darlingscote Road and Sheep Street) has been removed due to its deteriorating condition. The family that sponsored the original bench is being offered the opportunity to sponsor a replacement should they wish.

Letters to heaven

Shipston Home Nursing is exploring the possibility of installing a postbox for "Letters to Heaven" at the Gyratory Garden and will be discussing the idea with the Lions and RBL.

Highway resurfacing

A Warwickshire County Council Highways Engineer recently visited New Street to inspect the road surface and works are now scheduled for April 2024; 100mm of tarmac will be removed and replaced with resurfacing material. The works are expected to take a week to complete and a one-way system will be in operation, while 25mm of surface dressing will also be applied to Stratford Road next year.

Water testing

The first of a series of weekly tests of water from the River Stour took place on 11th September. This testing regime will monitor the presence of contaminants in the water.

Carbon Emissions Reduction Fund

Stratford District Council is launching a Carbon Emissions Reduction Fund which may be able to support energy surveys at New Clark House and the Hub.

Shipston Police Safer Neighbourhood Team

PC Sid Hammond informed the meeting that a second part-time PCSO was now working as part of the team and that a mental health triage vehicle, with an onboard nurse, is now serving the south of the county. There has been an increased number of burglaries at the allotments, with people targeting the contents of sheds – Sid said that he would attempt to source some free shed alarms for allotment holders. A "trigger plan" is being developed for use when there is an increased risk of unauthorised encampments.

Ellen Badger Hospital

Stratford District Councill will soon be considering a motion expressing support for beds to be included in the redeveloped Ellen Badger Hospital and calling on Warwickshire County Council to refer the matter to the Secretary of State for Health if the decision to omit beds is not reversed. The Integrated Care Board has refused to publish the bed review documentation and it is expected that South Warwickshire University NHS Foundation Trust will take nine months to compile their business case for a hospital without beds before a 12-week public consultation can take place. A variation order for the planning application is being delayed by discussions about how the medical centre might be accommodated onsite and it was noted that there could be grounds for planning enforcement action in the interim.

Cecil Sandford

Councillors heard an appeal for Cecil Sandford's motorsport legacy to be commemorated in the town. See article on page 8.

Allotment policies

Two allotment holders requested that the Council reconsider its stance on collective composting and the burning of waste, suggesting that a small amount of burning should be permitted at certain times of the day. Councillors were willing to consider permitting collective composting after the receipt of a management plan, however, they were unconvinced by arguments about burning and asked allotment holders to provide detail of materials that cannot be composted so that they can consider alternative disposal mechanisms.

Flood mitigation

The Environment and Flood Action Working Group will be meeting with the Environment Agency and Warwickshire County Council in October to discuss the latest modelling and potential flood mitigation measures.

Town maps and alleyway plaques

The new town maps are in the process of being installed around the town and positive feedback has been received from residents about the new design. Meanwhile, the alleyway plaques have now been ordered and are expected to be delivered within six weeks.

Bandstand

It was noted that the active travel plans currently being developed could create space for a bandstand in the town square if a one-way system or pedestrianisation was introduced in future following consultations.

Queens Avenue play equipment

Lawns2Mow will attempt to repair the damaged equipment as a quote for refurbishment by the manufacturer was very expensive.

Sports Club

A grant from Howdens will allow for the Sports Club kitchen to be refurbished.

Hub changing rooms

Councillors resolved to accept an anticipated funding agreement from Stratford District Council to provide match funding from the Shared Prosperity Fund for the installation of proper changing facilities at the Hub.

So if you have any questions or concerns about your health or mobility, please come along and speak to the expert.

The Warm Hub is located at the Scout Hut, New St, Shipston-on-Stour CV36 4EW and runs each Thursday from 10am-12 noon. Alongside tea and coffee and a social space, each week we aim to have a workshop or organisation there to help with your health and wellbeing. The focus on the first Thursday will be on digital health, so if you have any questions relating to technology, someone will be on hand to help. On the second Thursday, there is a cooking group where you can cook with Wendy. Places are limited so come early as it's on a first-come-first-served basis. Lastly, on the fourth Thursday, Shipston Home Nurses are kind enough to come and offer soup and bereavement support.

We are also very lucky to have Kate Henderson from Coventry and Warwickshire CDA who will be running a workshop on 26th October focused on money matters. There will be three workshops in total, and if you are able to attend all three, CWCDA are offering you a £25 Argos voucher.

We would love to see some new faces to the hub. It is available for all and is an amazing community initiative and a fun sociable atmosphere. We look forward to seeing you there.

According to SWFT the gift of £635,000 from the League of Friends was conditional upon land adjacent to the Ellen Badger Hospital being purchased by the trust and developed "such that it is used for buildings which enhance the health and well-being services available to the population of Shipston-on-Stour and its surrounding areas." Not having beds in Shipston, forcing patients to be treated at Leamington Spa, is a bad solution. Beds in Leamington are a serious obstacle. It's miles away with extremely poor public transport from Shipston - not everyone has a car - for relatives and friends to visit. It makes visits much more difficult and probably less frequent. Being visited regularly is part of enhancing patients' health/healing process.

If SWFT knew that the plan was not to have beds in Shipston then this material fact should have been declared to the League of Friends before accepting the donation. What did SWFT know when they accepted the gift? SWFT cannot call it a hospital as that has beds. A breach of Advertising Standards Authority code of practice? Or is there a hidden hand of government to use Ellen Badger 'Hospital' to bump up its new hospitals pledge? Accordingly, surely the adjacent land must be used for beds in Shipston to meet the spirit of the condition?

Shipston Museum

History in your hands

"The idea behind our museum handling room," said Trustee Chair Bekky Hillman, "is

to make history exciting for children. I don't believe museums with everything in cabinets can do that." She explained that children love the hands-on experience of touching history and thinking about how old the object that they are holding actually is.

Feedback from visitors shows that it is not only children who enjoy first-hand experience of the mostly medieval and post medieval things in the collection. These are things that archaeological units discard at archiving stage because most museums don't take post-medieval items or animal bone. "In fact, children seem to love the animal remains the most," says Bekky. "They like working out which animal it is and what part it is from."

Items include some pottery pieces that can be put back together like a 3D puzzle, such as an old blacking jar and feathered slipware platter. There are also pens and paper so the kids can draw what they see.

Of course, most museum items need to be protected from damage but the move towards a more open and inclusive environment brings a greater awareness of the object and has a real impact on understanding. Some of the items come from the medieval pottery found near Long Compton during the first Shipston & District Local History Society dig in 1966 and others more recently from the pre-building excavations which found a first-century Roman homestead on the Campden Road.

Holding these objects brings powerful connections across time and culture. As Britain's most famous natural historian David Attenborough said when picking up one of the earliest man-made 1.6-million-year-old chopping tools: "Grasping this I can feel what it really was like to be out on the African savannas hunting for a meal."

The Trustees would like to thank the many visitors who have come through the Museum doors in the two months since its opening and look forward to seeing them when it opens again Easter 2024 after the Winter closure later in the year.

Cecil's amazing track record

Winner of two World Championships and two Isle of Man TT races between 1952 and 1957, Shipston resident Cecil Sandford is one of Britain's greatest motorcycle racers.



Born in Blockley in 1928, Cecil trained as a carpenter. After showing great ability in motorcycle scrambling and grass track racing, he moved on to road racing, riding an MV Velocette supplied by his future father-in-law, Shipston motorcycle dealer Arthur Taylor.

In 1950, Cecil rode for the factory AJS Team before joining the Italian MV Agusta Team in 1952, when he immediately won the Isle of Man TT and the World Championship for 125cc motorcycles, scoring the first-ever win for Agusta, which went on to become the most successful manufacturer in Motorcycle Grand Prix racing.

Cecil repeated his TT and World Championship double in 1957 on a 250cc Mondial. He then retired from the sport at the end of that year.

He then joined Arthur Taylor's motorcycle business, marrying Arthur's daughter, Pat. He also returned to his original craft of carpentry, making beautiful furniture. Now aged 95, he has lived in Shipston for most of his life and the town is proud to count him among its residents. No wonder many now feel it is time for his achievements to be commemorated in town.

Can you help your local Food Bank?

Demand at Shipston Food Bank, which operates out of St Edmund's Church on Saturday mornings between 10:30 and 12 noon, continues to increase. The average number of food parcels handed out each week is more than two and a half times



higher than the same period last year. We are currently feeding up to 90 adults and children every week.

The resources we have available to meet this growing demand are diminishing, however. Donations of food in the collection boxes in the two Co-ops and Tesco, and in the boxes in the church porch, have fallen dramatically during this year. That means we are having to buy more and more of the food that we distribute: the amount that we need to spend on top-up supplies has almost tripled in the past six months. It is currently averaging nearly £700 per week, but our regular income of donations from individuals and local businesses has remained fairly static at around £550 per month. We are rapidly eroding the financial reserves that we managed to build up over the past three years.

Thanks to a welcome grant from Stratford District Council, we were able to provide packed lunch bags for the schoolage children of our customers throughout the summer holidays; and the proceeds from the 'Plot to Plate' event held a few months ago, which have generously been donated to the Food Bank, together with gifts of food which we anticipate receiving from local school and church Harvest Festivals, should help to keep us going over the next few

The demand for food parcels seems unlikely to reduce to any great extent in the foreseeable future, and so if we are to be able to carry on supporting our local families who find themselves in food poverty, we need to increase our resources significantly. Can you help us?

- . Could you drop a few basic food items into one of our collection boxes every week?
- . Could you make an occasional or regular monetary donation to the Food Bank?
- . Could you join a team of shoppers, so that we can purchase food from a budget supermarket in a nearby town and so reduce our costs?



Stour Concert Brass


Stour Concert Brass completed their summer programme with their regular visit to Tysoe show. The event was absolutely packed and parking was at a premium with the available park full and cars

Shipston-on-Stour Women's Institute

Shipston's Women's Institute met on Wednesday, 6th September after the summer break. Members were both educated and entertained by Peter Cowley who spoke about the first female racing driver – Dorothy Levitt, an amazing woman whose life and achievements should be more widely known.

Dorothy, born in 1882, was taught to drive by Napier & Son in Lambeth, London where she started as a typist. She was apprenticed to learn car mechanics, and began to enter motorcar races which were then in their infancy. Dorothy was always beautifully attired in the fashions of the day with just a long overall to protect her clothes from the dust and dirt

Dorothy always loved speed. She rode horses astride and fast and drove from Glasgow to London non-stop. She entered into European races – Paris to Rouen, Paris to Amsterdam – and did well also at motorboat racing, setting a waterspeed record driving a Napier boat but the accolade went to Selwyn Edge, her boss, because women were not

permitted to drive boats. Ostensibly she was a passenger! She went on to win four motorboat races in 1903.

1904,'05,'06, '07 and '08 were all years of winning major British and European races. She was called the Fastest Girl on Earth'. She drove from London to Liverpool and back in two days accompanied by her dog, a small hand mirror (with which to view traffic coming from behind), and a loaded Colt pistol.

Hers was a memorable and exciting life: she taught Queen Alexandra to drive and was fined – twice as much as her male equivalents – for speeding in Hyde Park. She wrote a book aimed at women drivers and took up flying later in life! A truly remarkable woman who was able to overcome the social obstacles of her day and make an interesting and rewarding life for herself, Dorothy Levitt died in May 1922.

The Treasurer made her report to year end 31st August and was able to state the finances are healthy. Astronomical Society News

The Stratford upon Avon Astronomical Society meet every 1st and 3rd Tuesdays at 8pm at Alderminster Village Hall. Everyone is welcome, the first Tuesday is a Club Night, in October

that will be on 3rd October and the speaker on 17th October is Professor Robin Jeffries from Keele University, with a talk called 'Gaia, the billion-star mapping machine.'

Each month one of our members offers pointers on what to look for in the sky during the coming weeks.

The Aurora Borealis (The Northern Lights)

Back in the spring, you may have heard of the Northern Lights being sighted over Warwickshire. You may have even seen them yourself. This was due to the sun approaching Solar Maximum, and so it is more active with sun spots and solar flares. This makes the solar wind stronger and when it interacts with Earth's magnetic field it is forced to the polar regions. There it reacts with the nitrogen and oxygen molecules, causing 'curtains' of colour - red and green in particular. They flow and shimmer and are an amazing sight. They normally appear just below the Arctic Circle but at times of strong solar activity they are forced further south and can be visible in the United Kingdom. The aurora is measured by the Kp-Index - derived from the German Planetarische Kennziffer meaning Planetary Index. The index scale runs from 0 to 9, the higher the index the further South the aurora are likely to be seen.

Club nights offer more information on what to look out for each month and if it is clear we do some observing just outside the Village Hall, so please join us. There is no charge initially to come along and find out more, but if you do want to become a member then the fee is just £15 a year and it's free if you are in full time education. I regard myself as a pragmatist. When facts change I change my mind. So I am rather cheered that an outbreak of common sense is happening in how we approach Net Zero. In the UK we have met targets faster than many other countries. So why not slow down a little in our plans - to allow our bank balances to catch up? We bought a new house with air source heat pumps and we added solar panels. My husband has an electric car and I have a hybrid. But there are stumbling blocks with the technology. There are not enough chargers nationwide and they break down with remarkable regularity! We also have the issue of needing greater infrastructure for the 2000 or so EV chargers coming to Warwickshire (from a £3.295m government grant) on street and in car parks. I am lobbying hard for Telegraph Street and West Street car parks in Shipston.

If you have an oil fired boiler and can't afford to replace it? Rest easier that you will not need to, common sense has won. Some properties will never be suitable. Maybe further in the future with different technology? It is technological solutions like carbon capture, regenerative farming practice and small modular nuclear reactors - fusion is also coming - which will reap the biggest benefits for us. By 2050 we will be there - but not at the cost of bankrupting us while other countries catch up.

On a related issue, when we look at improving the centre of Shipston, the overwhelming message I get is let's look at oneway circulation and some wider pavements for our developing café culture. But to stay a vibrant shopping hub, people need to park, nip into a shop or pick up a heavy item in the course of their daily grind.

I am grateful to so many of you for your support while I've been out of commission for the last couple of months. Simple kindness is much appreciated. Surgeries will be restarting in October. Call me for an appointment or ring any time.

With the increasing number of electric cars on the road there has been a demand for more public electric vehicle charge points in Shipston. The Town Council has been investigating charge points for some time but there have been two problems funding and finding suitable spaces.



The County Council has now been allocated £3.295m from the Local Electric Vehicle Infrastructure. This could deliver 2,000 charging sockets at both on-street and in car park locations throughout Warwickshire. As soon as the new funding was announced we put in a claim for some in Shipston.

The fund is aimed mainly to help residents who have to park on the road such as those who live in streets in the middle of town. If you have a need for a public EV charge point or if you have any suggestions for good places to site them, let me know. The more demand we can show the more likely we are to get some of the funding for Shipston.

I was recently approached by Dr Ian Wood, a retired doctor from Stratford, who started a Sporting Memories Club there a few months ago. He was very enthusiastic about the benefits of the club for older people with memory loss and wants to help start one in Shipston. Sporting Memories is a charity and social enterprise that helps older people to reminisce, replay and reconnect through the power of sport and physical activity. It was launched in 2011 and supports a wide range of people aged 50-plus, including those living with dementia, living with depression or facing isolation and loneliness to improve their mental and physical wellbeing through regular club sessions, situated within local communities across the country. 




