# Shipston Town Council hears plans for the Ellen Badger Hospital

Shipston Town Council welcomed Sophie Gilkes. Director of Development at South Warwickshire NHS Foundation Trust (SWFT), to its August meeting to hear the latest plans for the Ellen Badger Hospital. Ms Gilkes explained that there has never been a better time to develop the EBH. The NHS Long Term Plan, which sets out the strategy for the NHS over the next ten years, focuses on providing more care for people within their communities and delivering services which help keep people well - preventing illness as well as treating it. This means strengthening the services at the EBH is in line with national policy.

In addition, a review of GP surgery buildings and capacity undertaken by NHS South Warwickshire Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG), the local body responsible for planning and funding different health care services locally (including GP services), identified Shipston Medical Centre (SMC)as a priority site. SMC has confirmed that the EBH is its preferred site for a new medical centre.

SWFT and SMC are now working together on proposals for expanding the EBH, making use of the new land which was recently acquired next to the hospital. They are looking at what services are needed now, as well as the anticipated needs in the future so that best use is made of the site in the short and long term. This was the approach taken when developing Stratford Hospital three years ago, which

focuses on preventative care.

The two organisations are developing a joint business case which will be considered by the CCG later in the year and will need to consider various issues, including what benefits the project will offer for patients and local people and whether it represents good value for NHS money.

Sallie Green, former Matron at the EBH is the clinical lead for the project and has been looking at different sites and models of care. The intention is to retain existing services and work with partners and voluntary groups to add new provision such as mental health services, although nothing has been decided yet.

Ms Gilkes also made clear that the minor injuries unit would not be returning. Under new NHS policy, urgent treatment centres are replacing minor injuries units and must see a certain number of patients to be viable. The plan is to create an Urgent Care Centre in Stratford.

The expanded EBH site does have its challenges, including flooding. However, a feasibility study has assessed the limitations and confirmed that the site can accommodate all the activities SWFT is likely to put forward. The next step is to appoint an architect to develop designs



which will hopefully be ready to share with SWFT, partners and the Patient Participation Group in mid-October. The business cases, which will set out what is being proposed and how it would be funded, are due to be completed by the end of the year.

The SWFT presentation followed a recent update from the League of Friends of the EBH and precedes a public event later this month. The event, on 17th September, takes place at the Townsend Hall and will include speakers from SWFT, Shipston Medical Centre, Warwickshire County Council and the League of Friends. # Shipston Town Council pays tribute to former Mayor, Alan Noyce

Everyone at Shipston Town Council was saddened to learn of the death of Alan Noyce early in the morning of 19th August.

Alan had a charismatic personality and was an active member of the town council for more than a dozen years, serving as Mayor for three terms in 2007, 2008 and 2009.

Alan worked tirelessly to improve the overall wellbeing of the town; he introduced the working party system, which has successfully spread the workload between all councillors. Alan had a common sense approach and was a true ambassador for the town, raising the profile of Shipston all over Warwickshire and further afield.

Alan's late wife Angela, who had been Mayor in 2004 and 2006, died of an illness very suddenly in 2009, two days before she was due to become Mayor. Alan stepped in to the breach to serve his

third successive term.

Alan remarried in October 2012 to his wife Pat and resigned from the town council in 2014.

He was highly regarded throughout the town, and will be missed. Our thoughts are with his wife Pat, and all his family at this difficult time.



# Riverside proposals receive warm welcome at public event

There was a good turnout at the public awareness event which gave residents the chance to see the proposals for enhancing the riverside area to make more of the green space,

Feedback was extremely positive, with many commenting on the benefits of being able to make better use of the area, particularly families.

Some concerns were raised, mainly to do with risk of vandalism and the danger to pedestrians when crossing the bridge.

The Heritage and Leisure Projects Working Group will take on all the feedback and look at how the proposals could be improved. For example, through the installation of CCTV and lighting to reduce the risk of vandalism. The Town Council will also put forward suggestions to Highways regarding protecting pedestrians.

A few questions have been raised about the potential cost of the scheme, while others expressed support for investing in a scheme which promotes green space.

Alongside the riverside information was the photographic exhibition showing images from Shipston over the years. The exhibition proved extremely popular and the HALP team is currently working on finding more dates when the exhibition will be open. Details will be printed in future issues of the Forum.

# **News from Shipston Town Council's August meeting**

# **Hot topics**

**Feedback works:** Peter White thanked the Town Clerk for actioning the hedge trimming at Parsons Close which is now much better.

**Happy children:** Fay Ivens reported on another successful Children's Club held at the start of the summer holidays and run by the joint churches.

Parking payment confusion: Ronnie Murphy raised concerns about both parking machines being out of order in the Telegraph Street car park, leaving shoppers concerned about whether they may receive a fine. District Councillor, Trevor Harvey warned that the vandalised machine is unlikely to be replaced until mid September but will chase up the repair to the other machine.

**Speeding concerns:** Peter Cox is going to arrange a meeting with Shipston Community Speed Watch to understand what they do, how they work and what statistics they have about speeding in Shipston.

**Blackpool in Shipston?:** Complaints have been received about the lighting at the new Care Home on Tilemans Lane, with some saying it is lit up 'like Blackpool illuminations'. Environmental Health is looking into the issue which will hopefully be resolved soon.

A safer crossing: Some residents have suggested that a prioritisation traffic management scheme be introduced on the bridge alongside a reinforcement of the pedestrian walkway. The Town Clerk will to write to Highways for input.

Site allocation consultation: Stratford District Council is currently consulting residents and other stakeholders on its site allocations plan. The plan needs to identify 3,000 dwelling spaces which could be used if there were a failure in the current six year housing supply. The chances of the sites being called up are low and the plan doesn't affect directly affect Shipston's as the town's Neighbourhood Plan already identifies reserve sites. However neighbouring parishes such as Tredington and Newbold will be more directly affected.

# **Campaigning for Shipston**

electric charging points – funding is being offered by BP to install electric charging points in car parks. This could be a good attraction – giving people another reason to call into Shipston. However, there are different sorts of charging points and connections so it would need careful consideration to make sure any units would be fit for purpose and able to support as wide a number of people as well. STC will ask the district council to look into this as it has responsibility for car parks.

**Pettipher's planning application:** Paul Tesh will be attending the Planning Committee meeting to object to the planning application.

**Developer contributions:** Trevor Harvey has arranged for STC to receive a twice yearly update about section 106 and Community Infrastructure Levy funds due to come to Shipston. The first report has already identified a large discrepancy between the amount STC had expected to receive from one developer and what has been allocated which could impact future projects. The town council will clarify the situation with the district council planning team.

## **Town Council business**

**New councillors:** One candidate has expressed interest in joining the council but was unable to attend the August meeting for interview which is now likely to take place in September. There are two vacancies for co-option. Please contact the Town Clerk to express interest.

Full steam ahead for playground maintenance: After a considerable amount of research and effort, the General Purposes Working Group has agreed a way forward on play ground maintenance which will see new surfaces applied where needed which are softer, more durable and more cost effective. The green gym equipment at the Sports Club will be replaced rather than repaired as repair would be almost the same price. Ronnie Murphy congratulated GPWG for the time and effort that has gone into getting the right result for playground maintenance.


Over the next three academic years, the award will be presented annually to the most outstanding Warwickshire secondary school that:

# War on waste builds momentum on Facebook

A new community effort is helping to reduce waste in Shipston by encouraging people to share items for reuse and recycling.

Shipston's War on Waste Facebook Group was set up by Alison Packer after she was inspired by a similar page elsewhere. The group had grown to 600 members in just a few weeks, and is a mixture of tips on reuse and recycling as well as posts about unwanted items which are readily snapped up by other members instead of ending up in landfill.

The group has a great community feel to it and almost a circular recycling theme. For example, one member (person A) gave away something to person B - person C received something from person B and person C gave something to person A - full circle! In this particular case, a blender, bed and bird bath were the items in question!

Founder, Alison Packer, said: "The group is all about helping each other, as well as the wider recycling theme - give away rather than throw away. After all, 'one man's rubbish is another man's treasure'".



# A Badger's Eye



The new Public Health Green Paper published at the end of July marks another attempt to address unequal life chances. This report gives some examples of such inequality pointing out that a woman with the poorest 10% of income has nineteen years less healthy life than a woman from the richest 10%. As Public Health England says, "that is not OK".

The Green Paper talks about encouraging healthier life choices - especially for the poorest and most vulnerable - and certainly individual behaviours do have an important part to play in shaping our health. But the Green Paper admits - drawing on Canadian Research - that half of the factors determining health are outside any one individual's control. The house you live in, the road you live by, the education you get, the income you earn and the job you do have far greater effect.

That is why we invited Warwickshire's Public Health Department to meet us at the end of July to show us how we can shape the kind of healthy environment and health promoting services a new hospital development can provide.

They will be at the "Health Summit" on **17th September at the Townsend Hall** to listen to our views about what we need to make Shipston a "Healthy Town".

If you want to shape what the new development will provide and hear how we can create a health supporting town then come. This is the time to influence the kind of health service, locally, which can maintain a healthy and long life for yourself and everyone else.

## **Age Concern Grants**

Age Concern Shipston on Stour & District can offer grants of up to £100 to fund identified needs of residents in the Shipston area. Grants will be made for needs identified in order to make life easier and more enjoyable or to alleviate specific problems.

If you have a requirement we invite you to complete an application form which will be considered by the Trustees. Copies of the application form and terms and conditions can be downloaded from www.shipstononline.org or collected from New Clark House.

Certain criteria must be met in order for a grant to be made:

#### To be eligible for a grant, residents must:

- 1. Live permanently within 7 miles of St Edmund's church (Shipston parish church).
- 2. Live either in their own home, in a care home or sheltered accommodation.
- 3. Be over the age of 70 on the day that a grant request is made.
- 4. Be in receipt of a state benefit other than basic state pension (evidence may be requested).
- 5. Have readily available funds of less than £5,000

### What grants can be used for:

- Mobility improvements in the home.
- 2. One-off travel to improve quality of life.
- 3. Pet care.
- 4. Appliances or personal mobility devices.
- 5. Any other reasons at the Trustees' discretion.

### Size and frequency of grant:

- 1. Grants will be limited to a maximum of £100 per application.
- 2. Residents will be eligible for one grant in each twelve month period.
- 3. Grants will be considered where they fully fund a specific need or where they provide only a portion of funds for a need. In the latter case proof of full funding may be required before a grant is made.

# **District Council Update**

At the time of writing, I'm preparing to attend the Planning Committee meeting where the Pettipher's Garage planning application will be discussed - by the time you read this, the outcome will likely be known.

The Pettiphers Garage site is owned by Tesco. It has become something of an eyesore. Some residents look forward to having the option of shopping at a Tesco outlet locally. Equally, others feel that Shipston doesn't need another supermarket type store, or that a Tesco outlet doesn't sit easily alongside the range of independent stores that contribute so much to Shipston's appeal. 'Need' for this type of store, however, is not a relevant basis for an objection under planning legislation.

My concerns are the potential implications this development is likely to have on traffic flows, roadside parking and road safety. The Garage site sits in Shipston's only residents' parking permit area. There is space on the designated areas of Church Street, Telegraph Street and Sheep Street to park 73 cars. Warwickshire County Council has already issued 95 permits for use by residents and their visitors.

Drivers who have made a habit of parking on the forecourt currently will be displaced. They will add to the local pressure. Passing drivers who want to drop in for a sandwich or a pint of milk will bring more pressure. The nearest car park is in Telegraph Street, Although Tesco will create a two metre wide footpath around their store, there is nothing in their application to extend that footpath to connect with the car park. The implications for pedestrian safety are obvious and predictable. Let's hope that the Planning Committee has been in listening mode.

If you want to contact me, please do give me a call, send an email, write a letter, collar me at one of the monthly meetings of Shipston Town Council (second Monday) or Tredington Parish Council (first Monday), or drop in to The George on a Thursday morning at Jo's weekly surgery. I'll try to be there.

# **Shipston Medical Centre - Flu Vaccination**

Flu can be a very unpleasant illness causing fever, stuffy nose, dry cough, sore throat, aching muscles and joints, and extreme tiredness. This can often last several days. Some people can also get a very high fever, sometimes without the usual flu symptoms, and may need to go to hospital for treatment. Complications of flu can be severe and potentially fatal.

Each year we try and vaccinate all patients in those groups considered most at risk of flu or most vulnerable to severe complications if flu is contracted. Those people eligible for a flu vaccination will be contacted by the practice, and will fall into one of the following groups:

all children aged two to ten (but not eleven years or older) on 31 August 2019 - the surgery will vaccinate those aged 2-4 not in school. All other ages should be vaccinated in school and the surgery will be unable to vaccinate these children unless

they are at risk for another reason, such as having a long term condition.

- those aged six months to under 65 years in clinical risk groups respiratory disease: chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) or bronchitis; chronic heart disease; significant chronic kidney chronic liver chronic neurological disease such as Parkinson's disease or motor neurone disease or learning disability; diabetes; splenic dysfunction or asplenia; a weakened immune system due to disease or treatment and those whose body mass index is 40 or above.
- close contacts of immunocompromised individuals
- those aged 65 years and over
- those in long-stay residential care homes

types of vaccine to suit different patient types. Please book an appointment for your flu vaccination so we can order the right vaccine.

If you do not wish to have a flu vaccination then you must have a telephone or face to face conversation with a health professional in order for us to record that you have declined. This is a new requirement from NHS England and this has been put in place to ensure that people have the correct information to make an informed decision.

Vaccination appointments will available from the beginning of October. Invites for flu vaccination will be sent out towards the end of September.


