### **New clinic opens**



Keith Douglas, pictured, was one of the first patients to experience the services at the Ellen Badger Medical Unit (EMBU) when it opened on 5th November. The new day-case medical care service at the Ellen Badger is starting as a six-month pilot scheme and will offer a range of treatments and procedures that up to now many people, like Keith, have had to travel to Warwick to receive. All patients need to be referred to the EMBU by their GP. South Warwickshire University NHS Foundation Trust will be closely monitoring the pilot to assess its effectiveness.

Keith said: 'I was delighted to have my infusion here. I used to have to go to Warwick Hospital, which required setting aside a significant part of my day. Attending my appointment here has shortened my journey and allows me to feel much more relaxed while being cannulated, enabling me to get back to the rest of my day more quickly. I saw some familiar faces and some new ones, all providing a consistently high standard of care.'

### Award for dementia charity

Local community group talkdementia has been awarded The King's Award for Voluntary Service, the highest award a voluntary group can receive in the UK.



Husband and wife team Paul and Heather Dowler founded the group in 2021, drawing on their own experience of caring for a loved one living with dementia, and building on the success of the Wellesbourne Dementia Café started by Heather in January 2016.

There are now six dementia friendly cafes including one in Shipston. With the help of 35 local volunteers, the team works alongside medical professionals, national charities and local organisations to provide practical advice and emotional support to those families and dementia carers living locally.

### Christmas starts here!

### Mayor's column

Hello Shipston and welcome back to my monthly column. There's much to talk about this month, so let's get started. My wife and I attended the civic service for the Mayor of Whitnash, bringing together community leaders, residents and dignitaries for a service celebrating the friendships and community spirit that bring us together.



I hosted my own civic charity event at the Townsend Hall. It was a dinner dance and celebration with The D-Day Darlings putting in a very memorable performance. (see the photos in the centre pages). Thank you to Shipston Sports Club for another spectacular firework display for the town, albeit a slightly wet evening. It is always a great opportunity for the community to come together.

Now for two more sombre notes. The doors have closed for the last time on Lloyds bank. The only replacement is a fortnightly community desk offered at the EBH for local banking advice. This is a big loss to the town, driven by the relentless need by corporations to move to online services, excluding many in our community including the aged and those with mobility concerns. I will attend one of these sessions to fully understand how we will be supported going forward.

November is also the penultimate month for Shipston fire station, established in 1931. Despite considerable opposition from the council and the town, the fire station has been downgraded to an unmanned 'surge station' which will take effect from 31st December. This is a bitter loss to the town. Our station and crew, led by watch commander Chris Townsend provided a central service to our community that not only attended fires but also multiple RTAs and other local incidents. Indeed, my firefighter son James would not have the career he does without having first attended the Young Firefighters that offered so many career opportunities to our young people before it was, itself, closed. Thank you to all Shipston firefighters past and present for the dedication and service that you have given to our town. We will be forever grateful.

Please join me and many others in the town for the annual Christmas lights and Victorian evening on 5<sup>th</sup> December. I wish everyone a very happy and enjoyable festive break whatever you may be doing, and I look forward to speaking with you again in the new year.

## News from Shipston Town Council's November meeting

### **Environment and flood action**

SAFAG reported that funding for flood prevention has been allocated via Severn Rivers Trust, and that this will help to secure the agreement of landowners for future maintenance and flood defence measures such as ponds and wet areas.

Cllr H Kelly reported that a pond and a butterfly bank have been created at Cornmill Meadows. She has also met with two landscapers to progress the improvement of the access path to the Meadows.

### **Planning**

There were no objections to the applications which included internal alterations to the Manor House on Sheep Street, the proposed demolition of an annexe and outbuildings to the rear of the Old Red Lion in Church Street, and the cutting back of a sycamore tree by three metres on Watery Lane.

The Council authorised a budget allocation for the preparation of the next Neighbourhood Plan – a step needed to enable work to commence and any grant applications to be made. So far, four people have expressed interest in being involved as volunteers in the development of the Neighbourhood Plan, (see over).

Cllrs Passingham, Hatch and others attended a meeting about the proposed development at Fell Mill to the east of the town. They have also met with the Stratford District Council planning officer, and with Severn Trent to express concerns about sewage and flooding.

### **General purposes**

Guttering for the Twin Chapels – non-standard for this listed building – has now been ordered. Repair to the churchyard walls at St Edmund's will start early in the new year.

### Youth Club

The new building is in place, and a working group is being put together led by the Youth Club involving the Lions, Rotary, and Town Council, to complete the building work.

### Bank

Cllr Williams reported on the Lloyds Bank closure. He is still concerned about the lack of independence of the assessor for the case and is pursuing this through the FCA. Banking services will be offered at the Ellen Badger on a Tuesday afternoon. Cllr Williams has been told that the Lloyd's cash counting machines could not be made available to the community.

### Roads and footpaths

Funding for improvements to the Campden Road/Darlingscote Road junction are under discussion between the district and county councils. Cllr Barker reported that a new head of highways at the County Council is being positive and responsive, although funding continues to be an issue.

### Blue light report

The police are investigating a spate of burglaries that occurred with the arrival of the darker evenings.

### Our Neighbourhood Plan

Are you interested in helping shape the future of Shipston? Then let Cllr Paul Tesh, the Chair of the Town Council's planning committee know. He is looking for volunteers to help in the creation of a new Neighbourhood Plan. These plans have to be renewed every few years to reflect the needs of communities. Shipston's current plan is valid until 2031 and work needs to start on the next one. Neighbourhood Plans are specific to individual towns and communities, and prospective developers have to take them into account when submitting their applications to Stratford District Council for housing development. Planning is going through a multitude of changes at the moment and having a robust Neighbourhood Plan is important. ### **Recycling insight**

Do you ever wonder what happens to all the mixed recycled material that goes in your blue bin?

Recently, a group of residents had the opportunity to visit Sherbourne Recycling Centre, arranged by Cllr Dave Passingham. A joint partnership of eight West Midland local authorities, including Stratford District Council and Sherbourne Recycling Ltd, this amazing Materials Recycling Facility (MRF) is the most advanced MRF in the UK and uses AI technology to process the dry recycled material from your bin.

Sorting 47.5 tonnes of mixed recyclate with only five human sorters is pretty amazing, but so are the robot sorters – picking out the metals, blowing different plastics three different ways and having a 99% accuracy rate for selling the sorted materials onward, plus all the electric used is from renewable sources makes this plant very sustainable. All materials are recycled in the UK, nothing is sent overseas. It also means that SDC get money back from the high purity recyclate that is sold on.

To keep this high level, please rinse out your cans, bottles and plastic packaging and don't include saucepans and baking trays, shoes or clothes. We did see that someone had included a used nappy!

### Ellen Badger Medical Unit opens

South Warwickshire University NHS Foundation Trust (SWFT) has launched a new six-month pilot service designed to bring day-case medical care closer to people's homes. The Ellen Badger Medical Unit (EBMU) will be closely monitored using patient feedback and clinical data to assess its effectiveness and inform future service provision.

Operating Monday to Friday, 8am to 4pm (closed on bank holidays), EBMU builds on the success of the Medical Day Case Unit (MDCU) at Warwick Hospital. It offers a range of treatments and procedures to provide patient-centred care closer to home. Patients, who will be referred by their GP, have access to many of the same services offered at Warwick's MDCU, including:

Iron infusions, Zoledronic acid infusions, Furosemide infusions, Magnesium infusions

- Blood testing
- Frailty Multi-disciplinary Team (MDT) reviews
- Comprehensive Geriatric Assessments (CGA)
- Biologic infusions
- Intramuscular & subcutaneous injections
- And more, excluding higher-risk procedures requiring access to acute-site escalation.

SWFT commented: 'The launch of the EBMU pilot reflects the Trust's commitment to exploring new ways to provide care locally, guided by patient feedback and evidence, in line with the Trust's objectives and the national NHS 10-Year Plan.'

### **Stour Health and Wellbeing Partnership**

The Bereavement Cafe, held on the first Tuesday of each month, has been well attended. It is an opportunity to sit with like-minded people and be able to share your thoughts and fears. Open to all.

We have been privileged to work with girls throughout the community to offer self defence classes. At present these are being rolled out at the youth club, but we are looking to include the local schools. We are also working with the Carers Trust to understand and better support young carers within the community. There are plans in place for an event in December – if you would like to know more, please speak to your Carers Trust representative who can give you more details.

And lastly, thanks to the continuing support of Thomas Franks Catering, and Shipston Home Nursing, we are able to host another lunch, this time at the Ellen Badger on 11<sup>th</sup> December. If you would like to come along, please pop into the Warm Hub (Ellen Badger Hospital) on either Monday 10-12 noon, or Thursday 10-12 noon and ask to be put on the list.

### Focus on Shipston Business...Blue Bean

Blue Bean Coffee Shop, located in Sheep Street, celebrates 20 years of serving the community this year having survived such challenging times as the banking crisis and covid.

The coffee shop, formerly a bakery, is a family business run by Sharon and Karl Peacock. Sharon's mum Sandra who once owned and ran the bakery business with her husband Robin in the 1970s makes their legendary almond tarts and dozens of mince pies in the run-



up to Christmas. Karl's love of music and film can be seen in the cafe's gallery of pictures and together they provide a very warm and cosy environment to enjoy a coffee and homemade food and cake.

Since opening in 2005, Sharon & Karl have seen a shift away from standard coffees to more demanding flavours and styles. Post covid times – and the town's recent expansion attracting a younger demographic and more people working from home – has

seen its younger customer base demand a more sophisticated drinks offering, so a shift away from a more traditional bakery toward the feel of a more modern coffee shop was needed.

The Blue Bean is a very community-based business focusing on traditional customer service which is based on family values, great prices and a welcoming environment.

It owes its longevity to ensuring it stays relevant to the needs of the community and Sharon and Karl offer their thanks to all the regulars who continue to use The Blue Bean.

In recent years, around 30 people have chosen to stay at home but still enjoy a Christmas meal lovingly prepared and delivered by our wonderful volunteers. It's another way we keep the spirit of connection alive. No one should feel forgotten on Christmas Day.

I want to extend my heartfelt thanks to everyone who has supported Shipston Community Christmas over the years our volunteers, donors, and local community. Your kindness, generosity, and belief in what we do have made all the difference.





### At last – a home for the Youth Club

Shipston Youth Club has been without a home for too long,

shunted from one place to another while the headcount of our youth has steadily increased, writes Tony Booth.

Shipston Town Council and the Youth Club have been working closely together to secure a more permanent solution, and I am delighted to say that a modular building has now been purchased and positioned at The Hub in readiness for extensive internal and external works to now take place.



I'm grateful to our local

charities, the Lions and Rotary for their interest in supporting the project and also to SJ Plank Builders who are offering project support and advice. It is heartwarming to see the community come together in support of the young people of our town. Thanks go to Tony Joint, Daniel Pulham, Ian Cooper and Chris Howarth plus many others for their continued support to see this project through to the end, but special thanks also to David Ford, whose dedication and support for the project has been appreciated by all involved. ### **Probus**

John McCartney sought to enlighten us about a most serious topic, known as PID or PAD (Primary Immune Deficiency, or Primary Antibody Deficiency). Both mean the immune system is deficient or fails to protect our ability to fight infections. Patients suffer repeated debilitating infections which do not respond to antibiotics. Frequent absence from work and repeated visits for medical assessment are needed. The disease is rare, one in 10,000 suffer, with many variations. As a result, help is limited to a very few immunology consultants spread across the country.

Caused by a genetic deficiency, it can skip a generation; there is no cure. A full immunoglobin test is required to diagnose it, as normal blood tests do not help. Treatment takes the form of regular infusions of expensive blood plasma which can manage the condition.

John's wife suffered PID and for years struggled to find a clear diagnosis, information or support. She eventually gave up her job to set up a charity called UKPIPS to raise the profile of PIP/PAD, especially informing GPs, and offer practical help for sufferers. The charity was pivotal in ensuring blood plasma, formerly obtained from the USA, is now sourced in the UK and John showed us how he was able to help, using his experience in motor manufacturing and just-in-time stocking techniques, saving the NHS millions of pounds!

The work of UKPIPS continues, although John's wife has now

retired. Her work was given well-deserved recognition by a meeting with the late Queen Elizabeth II.

### **Stour Valley Stitchers**

Established in 2022, Stour Valley Stitchers originally started as a way for sewing enthusiasts of all abilities and interests to meet and talk about their hobby and to share the highs and lows of sewing. We now also try to tackle the scourge of waste/excess fabrics and to provide a place where sewists can enjoy their hobby with like-minded people. David urged those who have existing EPAs (Enduring Power of Attorney) to have them changed to an LPA because the earlier system of EPAs does not extend to health matters and gave more tips on appointing at least two trustworthy Attorneys who can be relied upon to carry out your wishes in case of incapacity.

### **District Council**

By the time this Forum is published Stratford District Council (SDC) will have voted on its preferred 'devolution' option to submit to the Government. Most Councillors have already declared support for a two-unitary solution, with Stratford combining with Warwick District Council to form a South Warwickshire

combining with Warwick District Council to form a South Warwickshire unitary authority. Rugby, Nuneaton and North Warwickshire Districts would form North Warwickshire unitary authority. Warwickshire County Council has already voted to support a single unitary Warwickshire.

To get this far, the five District Councils commissioned two reports, one on 'Appraising the Options for the Future', from Deloitte and the other from Peopletoo Consultants on the effect of splitting services like Health & Social Care. In a survey, 73% of residents were in favour of Stratford joining a unitary South Warwickshire.

Olivia and I will be voting for two Unitaries. We see as the advantage that decisions will be made closer to our community and that more local services are likely to be more responsive to local need. The experience from other parts of the country which have already gone unitary is that the smaller authorities have been better run.

Olivia and I have been involved in meetings with SDC Sustainability & Recycling Officer Katie Walker and Shipston Health & Wellbeing Partnership to set up a Repair Cafe. The Ellen Badger has been offered as a venue. At first this was thought to be unsuitable because some repairs might cause dust and dirt. However, it was decided that cycle repair, and sharpening type repairs could be carried out under the covered area at the entrance. The sewing and electronics repair would be inside and of course the cafe open. The Repair Cafe is due to open in the New Year. If anyone has repair skills that they would like to offer, please get in touch.

I am a member of the Management of Public Open Spaces Task & Finish Committee at SDC. This was set up to try and sort out the anomalies that have arisen over the last 20 years when developers have been allowed to set up management companies to maintain the estates' open spaces, sewers and roads. Residents on these estates have been charged an extra service charge on top of their Council Tax. Residents claim that they are overcharged, and that the developers do not manage the spaces well. None of the open spaces on new estates in Shipston have had their open spaces approved by SDC. However, we now have a new Enforcement Officer and an Open Spaces Officer who are making the developers bring things up to standard as specified in the Planning Conditions. The aim of the Task and Finish Group is to explore what options are available to the District Council, in relation to privately managed public open spaces, that might secure better outcomes for residents who are affected by poor management of these open spaces. SDC is very keen to hear from residents. If you are affected, please fill in the survey: https://online1.snapsurveys.com/privatemanagementres by Friday 5th December.

Olivia and I were proud to support residents and the Save Our Shipston Campaign to object to all the proposed housing developments around Shipston. We spoke (along with councillors from other parties) at the public meeting of around 250 people in the Townsend Hall. We now have more meetings with SDC Planners and Severn Trent Water to clarify what is happening and hone our objections.
