Notes from Shipston Town Council's December meeting

Flood Action

A new version of the Emergency Advice booklet will be prepared for the website.

Planning

Repair to damage caused to The Horseshoe (a listed building) – no objection. Single storey rear extension to property in Hawthorn Way – no representation. Rebuilding of boundary wall in New Street – no objection. In terms of the many housing applications, Cllr Tesh reported that Warwickshire Highways will be assessing the collective impact of the proposals.

General purposes

The work to repair the guttering on the Twin Chapels is underway.

Finance working group

Council agreed to fund two panels at The Hub. Quotes are being sought for groundworks including power and water connection for the new Youth Club building. Grant applications have been assessed and recommendations made for a total of £12,500.

Local nature action plan

This will be presented to the Council for approval in January.

Councillors' reports

Councillors enjoyed the packed carol service at St Edmund's and the Victorian evening, despite the rain. The Mayor attended the Shipston Lodge and Low Furlong Christmas events.

Mayor's award

The Mayor has launched a new award for a young person who makes a significant contribution to the community.

District Council

Cllr Passingham reported that funds may be available through unused S106 money to improve a section of pavement along Campden Road, if developers can approve an amendment to the S106 contract.

Banking

Cllr Williams is pursuing his complaint to the Financial Conduct Authority about the lack of independence of the assessor appointed through Link to report on the banking situation in the face of the Lloyds Bank closure.

Banking hub

A fortnightly mobile banking service has begun at the Ellen Badger on alternate Tuesdays, 9.30am-3.30pm. In January, the dates will be 13th and 27th. A community banker will be able to help with account queries, both personal and business.

A reminder also from Cllr John Williams that if the cash machine is unavailable in town, it is possible to get up to £50 cashback at the Co-op – you need to purchase only a small item.

A positive year for the museum





Worried about phone scams? Just dial 159

Scammers are becoming increasingly sophisticated, often pretending to be from your bank or the police to panic you into transferring money. If you receive a suspicious call, or if you are ever unsure about who is on the other end of the line, remember the **159** service.

By dialling **159**, you are connected safely and directly to your bank's fraud department. The service is supported by the majority of UK banks (Barclays, Co-operative, First Direct, Halifax, HSBC, Lloyds, Metro Bank, Nationwide, NatWest, Santander, Starling, TSB, and others) and major telephone providers. It is the safest way to verify a call.

How to use it:

- **STOP:** If a caller pressures you or asks for financial details, take a moment.
- **HANG UP:** Do not trust the number on your caller ID. End the call.
- **CALL 159:** Dial 159 to be put through to a secure system that will route you to your bank.

Tip: If possible, call 159 from a different phone (like a mobile) or wait a few minutes after hanging up to ensure the line is fully cleared.

New Year, New You!

Many people set health goals in their New Year resolutions in January and here at Shipston Medical Centre we want to support and help all patients making steps towards a healthy and happy new year!



Shipston Medical Centre

This month we are focusing on **blood pressure**

High blood pressure (also called hypertension) can lead to serious problems like heart attacks or strokes. Lifestyle changes can help you stay healthy. It's important to know what your blood pressure is as many people don't have symptoms of high blood pressure.

You don't have to visit a doctor or nurse in order to check your blood pressure. You can take your readings in the comfort of your own home or visit the practice where we have a machine available in the waiting area at the practice. All patients are welcome to use this machine to monitor their blood pressure and weight and there is no need to book an appointment. If you have a machine at home, please ask the practice for a 7-day blood pressure form which can be printed or sent via text or email to you.

If you do have high blood pressure, focusing on lifestyle changes like reducing salt and alcohol intake, exercising regularly, and eating a healthy, balanced diet may help. If you are overweight, losing weight can be very effective.

Stop smoking	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> 24 Hours: Lungs begin clearing out smoke debris and mucus. 48 Hours: Nicotine leaves the body; sense of taste and smell improve. 1 Year: Risk of coronary heart disease is halved compared to a smoker's. 5 Years: Risk of cancers (mouth, throat, oesophagus, bladder) and stroke significantly decreases. 10 Years: Risk of death from lung cancer drops to about half that of a continuing smoker. 15 Years: Risk of heart attack falls to the same level as someone who has never smoked.
Exercise more often	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Go on a 10-minute walk after meals Pick one day to attend a fitness class online or in-person Park farther away from entrances to stores
Eat healthier	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Eat the protein on your plate first Increase your fibre intake with vegetables and berries Cut back on high-sodium foods, like fast food and cured meats
Lose weight	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Drink plenty of water throughout the day Pick one day a week to exercise, then add more days over time Replace one meal out with a meal at home
Cut back on alcohol	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Replace one beverage with sparkling water or a low sugar, non-alcoholic drink Identify when you want to drink (like after work) and fill that time with another activity, like a new hobby or fitness class

We were pleased to see the announcement by South Warwickshire University Foundation Trust (SWFT) in last month's Shipston Forum. The news of the pilot project to use the Princess Diana 1992 building as the Ellen Badger Medical Case Day Unit providing medical services closer to people's homes is welcome indeed. We hope SWFT's list of treatments, published last month, will be expanded in the future. We also look forward to the meeting in January of the SWFT Chief Executive and the League of Friends of Shipston Hospitals to discuss the operation of the unit and its future development. We fervently hope that these discussions will succeed in getting greater cooperation between SWFT and the community.

The pilot will be successful if it demonstrates the demand for services and provides feedback of the needs for further services. It is essential therefore that wherever possible patients ask that their day-based treatments take place at the Ellen Badger Medical Unit in Shipston if they cannot be conducted in the patient's own home.

This is also true of other medical services provided in the Ellen Badger. For example, Physiotherapy Treatment is available and patients can refer themselves. The Warwick Hospital website says you can self-refer for physio: it advises that patients ask at the GP reception in the Medical Centre and they will tell you how to fill out a form.



You can make a difference. It is important that patients give feedback to SWFT about their treatment and their travel arrangements to wherever they are treated. We have too many people having to travel daily to Stratford, Warwick or Coventry when they could be treated more locally.

Please ask for treatment in Shipston and if this is not possible then ask why not? This information will help us to ask for more services in Shipston.

Thank you all for your continued support. We continue to campaign for extended and improved medical services in the Ellen Badger Hospital and continue to look for opportunities to bring inpatient services closer to our community. We continue to press for greater diagnostic capability especially as it will be required for this Medical Case Day Unit. We would also like to see the Ellen Badger return to its key role of reducing the number of admissions to Acute Hospitals from our community.

Shipston's Repair Café to open in spring

A new repair Café is opening in Shipston this spring, led by a partnership of local organisations committed to supporting the community in a sustainable way, including Stour Health and Wellbeing Partnership, Stratford District Council and SWFT.

Shipston Repair Café will be more than just a project – it's a space that fosters care, connection, and practical solutions. Its goal is to help people keep their goods in use for longer, reducing waste and saving resources. This initiative depends on volunteers like you. But what is a Repair Café?

The idea began in the Netherlands in 2007 and there are now over 2,500 Repair Cafés worldwide. They are free meeting places, all about repairing things together, with tools and materials to help you make repairs you need, on clothes, furniture, electrical appliances, bicycles, crockery, appliances, toys, etc. You'll also find expert volunteers, with repair skills in all kinds of fields.

Bring in your broken items from home. Together with the specialists, you can start making your repairs in the Repair Café. If you have nothing to repair, you can lend a hand or enjoy a cup of tea or coffee.

Why a Repair Café?

We throw away vast amounts of stuff, some of it with almost nothing wrong, which could get a new lease of life after a simple repair. We have forgotten that we can repair things. Finding our repair skills can help us move to a sustainable future in which materials can be reused again and again. Using things for longer reduces the volume of raw materials and energy needed to make new products.

A Repair Café gives people with repair skills the appreciation they deserve and the chance to pass on invaluable practical skills to others. You might see your possessions in a new light, and appreciate their value all over again. Repairing things can be fun and easier than you think!

Campaign to stop over-development



Campaign group **SOS Save Our Shipston** reports on its plans to fight the Fell Mill site development.

Multiple developers have put in, or are about to submit, planning applications in and around Shipston. In the event planning permission is granted, it would mean 1700+ extra houses. The largest site is at Fell Mill with 1,150 houses being proposed just outside the Shipston town boundary in the Barcheston and Honington parishes.

These developments mean many more cars on the road, traffic chaos on the bridge and the one-way circuit, more pressure on parking, schools and GP services and the permanent loss of our precious green spaces and town character.

We have established a campaign group **SOS Save Our Shipston** to fight the Fell Mill site development. It comprises passionate local volunteers and councillors from the town and district and we are calling on like-minded residents from Shipston and surrounding villages to add their support.

Our call to action:

Donate – we have engaged planning consultants, and we have signed up a KC ready to give legal advice as required. We need donations to fund this essential expertise.

Busy year for First Responders

In 2025, Shipston Community First Responders responded to on average 40 emergency 999 calls per month on behalf of West Midlands Ambulance Service and continue to respond within a 10-mile radius of Shipston.

Our aim is to bridge the gap between the 999 call and the Ambulance Service attendance and arrive within the first few minutes of the emergency.



This year our Community Training Volunteers have trained nearly 250 members of the public in hands-only CPR and the use of a defibrillator.

We now operate 63 Community Public Access Defibrillator Cabinets (CPADs) and 45 of those have Major Bleed Kits inside.

Our Community Defibrillator

Coordinators continue to complete regular monthly compliance checks and respond to any public activations to ensure the defibrillators are restocked and ready for the next emergency.

We have several CPADs in Shipston and nearly one in every nearby village.

We would like to thank the local community for the continued support and the kind donations we have received which will help us carry on saving lives in the Shipston area.

We will be recruiting new Community First Responders in the new year in conjunction with West Midlands Ambulance Service and welcome any enquiries regarding joining our scheme. Please contact info@shipstonfirstresponders.org

Museum talk



Shipston Museum continues its winter talks programme on Saturday, 10th January 2026, at Townsend Hall. Rev John Horton will present his compelling book *Behind the Wire: A Prisoner of War in Nazi Germany* and sign copies for attendees.

Rev Horton explains: 'The book is made up from the wartime correspondence of my late parents, Alan and Peggy Horton. They met in late 1939 and were married in November 1940 with spent cartridges from the Battle of Britain falling on the roof of the church.'

The story follows Alan Horton's remarkable wartime journey from Glasgow through the Atlantic, around the Cape of Good Hope to Egypt, and ultimately to Crete where he became one of 12,000 Allied prisoners after the Battle of Crete. He spent nearly four years in prison camps, maintaining correspondence with his wife Peggy throughout his captivity. The Imperial War Museum now holds these letters, which they described as one of the most complete husband-and-wife wartime correspondence collections they have encountered.

Tickets are £5 and available from Richard Harvey on Church Street, through Eventbrite, or at the door. Doors open at 2:15pm for a 2:30pm start.

Looking ahead to 2026, the Museum will feature exhibitions on Roman life in the Stour Valley and the history of Shipston Tramway, which was established 200 years ago. The Museum is also keen to gather personal stories highlighting local people's contributions to Shipston life.

It is open to the public from Saturday 4th April, and then throughout the summer until the end of September. Opening days are Saturdays, Sundays and Bank Holidays.

Between them they gave a detailed and clear explanation of why there were so many developers looking at building in Shipston, stressing that most still had to submit planning applications. They also explained the grounds for valid objections to planning applications: remember, **never** copy and paste a template but always rewrite it in your own words.

There was cautious optimism expressed by Jo Barker who has a good working relationship with the newly appointed head of Highways at WCC and the CEO of Severn Trent, both of whom are proactive and interested.

The AGM followed the talks. The existing committee was reappointed, and I am delighted that we were able to add a new member. The big news was that, when Stratford SCAN was dissolved in April 2024, the members voted to transfer their bank balance to us. We are now £5,000 better off. This money has now arrived in our bank account.

The topic of the next meeting, on Tuesday 13th January, will be a review of the positives of the Ellen Badger. Stratford District Council mobile app

For anyone who hasn't already downloaded the SDC mobile phone app already, most people agree it is very useful. I find the notifications for when to put the bins out the best. It not only tells you when, but which bins to put out. You can also ask it what you can't put in the recycling bin. For instance, you can put crisp packets in but you must put them in loose, not inside another bag. However, coffee pouches or pet food pouches cannot be put in the recycling bin.

Other than recycling, you can also report: abandoned vehicles, dead animals, missed bin collections...or ask for litter bins to be emptied, fly-posting, fly-tipping and graffiti removal, grounds maintenance needed, street cleansing requests and subscribe to the Garden Waste Bin scheme. All things that, for most of us, would be hard to find out about.

The App also raises money for charity. Every time someone searches using the Recycling Info button a donation of 10p is made by Biffa Waste Services to charity. Biffa are the Council's waste and recycling collection contractor. To date over £1,000 has been donated.

Tree Preservation Orders

When discussing a recent planning application, it became apparent that the development might affect a group of trees with Tree Preservation Orders (TPOs) on them. Out of curiosity I asked the Tree Officer at SDC if there were more TPOs in Shipston. She came back with a list of 18 which quite surprised me. There are many fine old trees in Shipston. Mature trees are of value to all of us not just because of their appearance but because they are a fantastic haven for wildlife. TPOs protect trees that are of 'significant visual amenity value to their local environment'. Anyone can ask for a tree or a woodland to have a TPO put on it if you are worried that one might be removed by developers or for any other reasons. If you are in doubt about whether a tree would be eligible for a TPO contact me and I will speak to the Tree Officer.

Electric Vehicle Charge Points

At last, the District Council has approved plans for the installation of electric vehicle charging points in their council-owned carparks. Starting in January they are going out for quotes to do this. At the moment Shipston is scheduled to have four charge points. As an electric car owner I know how important it is when on holiday or visiting another town to have a convenient charging point. When at home it is easier and cheaper to charge at home. Having good charging points will surely help Shipston's tourist and visitor trade in a world where many more people are getting EVs.


