## End of an era for firefighters

Shipston Fire Station has concluded its on-call operations. On 31<sup>st</sup> December, the station's final four on-call firefighters honourably returned their alerting equipment and kit, marking the end of an era of dedicated service to the community which has run continuously with an on-call retained fire crew since 1948. Chris Townsend, the now former Watch Manager, recalls his time in service.

'Throughout my time in the service, I've attended numerous incidents and had the privilege of working alongside many dedicated crew members, each leaving their mark as they came and went. I hold many fond memories of the experiences shared and the camaraderie built over the years. Following a promotion in 2016 to Crew Manager, I was later honoured to take on the role of Watch Manager at Shipston in 2019, a position that brought both pride and challenges, particularly around recruitment. Balancing over 80 hours of weekly cover with a full-time job is demanding, especially during periods of high operational activity. This level of commitment, while a testament to dedication, had understandably impacted overall staffing levels and ultimately contributed to the decision to close on-call operations at Shipston.'

Shipston Fire Station will remain on Telegraph Street and is due to be operated as a Resilience Station. This means it may be crewed during busy periods of high demand but will no longer be responding to primary incidents, such as road traffic collisions or building fires, as the initial attending unit. Going forward, emergency cover for the Shipston area will be provided by Stratford-upon-Avon and Wellesbourne fire stations.

'I'd like to extend my sincere thanks to the community of Shipston and the surrounding villages for the unwavering support you've shown over the years,' says Chris. 'Whether engaging with us at community fetes, or simply offering a warm drink during incidents, your kindness has never gone unnoticed. As this chapter comes to a close, I will truly miss serving our town, a role I've been proud to hold for over 17 years.'

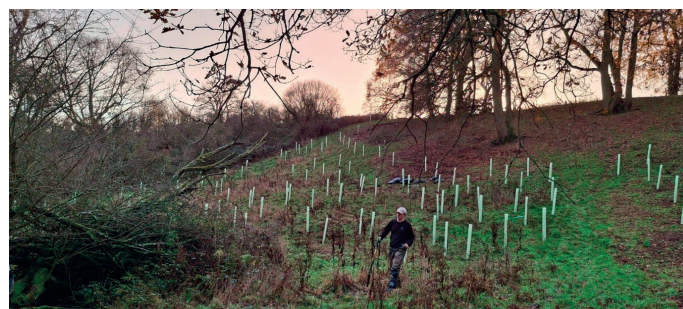

## SAFAG seeking volunteers

Could you spare a little time during the week to help Shipston and Area Flood Action Group? The group has 860 interventions (leaky dams, ponds, bunds, wetlands) installed upstream of Shipston. These work to slow the flow of water, and they need periodic visits to check their condition, and to determine if repairs or upgrades are required.



No specific skills are required, but there will be some field walking, so sturdy footwear and appropriate clothing is recommended. For safety reasons, there is a minimum of two in any inspection team, with at least one being experienced and available to provide guidance.

You'll get the satisfaction of knowing that your efforts will help mitigate the flooding risks to Shipston and the other downstream communities.

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## Mayor's column

Hello Shipston,

January has been a very wet and quiet affair as far as mayoral duties go, although as I write we have just returned from a very nice thanksgiving service at St Mary's Catholic Church in Warwick with a cohort of mayors from across the region.



So, as we move into February, I will talk about some of the positive things that are going on. First and foremost, I want to congratulate Emily, who has recently passed her FILCA qualification to become the responsible Finance Officer (RFO) for the town council. In addition to this, after months of hard work, she and her colleague Debbie have also been promoted to a joint Town Clerk position, and they will now both study for their CILCA qualifications. They are already a strong team, bringing their knowledge and experience to the council to help support our town and community.

January has seen the introduction of a new Town Council website. It is big, bright and colourful, with plenty of information available to assist the local community with their enquiries. Please take a look. It will continue to evolve as more information is uploaded to it but here you can find calendar event dates, minutes of meetings and so much more.

In addition, I will be introducing and presenting a Mayor's Community award which recognises an individual or a group that has produced a project or initiative for the benefit of our community. If you have any ideas for anyone who may be deserving of this recognition, then we would be happy to hear from you. All councillors will be in attendance, and we always enjoy the opportunity to meet and talk with members of our community and answer any questions that may be raised. Please join us. Your views and input can help the council to shape the way we support you and our town.

In other news, as the weather starts to improve, we look forward to seeing groundworks commence at the Hub for the new youth club so that the younger people in our town have a more permanent venue for the future.

In Shipston and around Warwickshire, Councils and communities continue to fight and resist the onslaught of planning applications across the region. Proposed development sites like Fell Mill Meadow are causing grave concern for the potential impact on infrastructure, flooding, the environment and the character of

our town. Shipston Council will continue to monitor and resist such excessive planning proposals and will keep the community updated as more information becomes available.

Finally, I want to recognise those brave fire and rescue men and women of Shipston fire station who have served the town and surrounding communities from their site in Telegraph Street since it opened in May 1956. The fire station is now rebranded as a surge station, meaning that on-call crews are no longer required to work there. Consequently, our local volunteer crew has been disbanded, and cover is now provided from Stratford, Wellesbourne or Bidford. You may have already read Watch Commander Chris Townsend's reflections on the front page of this issue. Thank you to Chris and all firefighters who have served our community over the years. I know our town and surrounding villages will miss the comforting presence of such a loyal and dedicated team of local heroes.

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## Notes from Shipston Town Council's January meeting

### Planning

The application for new signage to change the Lazy Pug to the White Horse was considered, with no representation agreed. It was noted that Taylor Wimpey has submitted an application for Hanson Avenue: at the time of the meeting, it was not yet available to view. At Shoulderway Lane, Warwickshire Highways has asked the developer for more information by 26<sup>th</sup> January. The planning application for Fell Mill is yet to be submitted. Stratford District Council has issued comments, which the developer must address, requesting a 'scoping opinion' to determine what information is needed for an environmental statement.

### Finance

Council agreed to the appointment of a new internal auditor, and for the appointment of solicitors to advise on leases. The increase of the community grant award to Stour Valley Lions from £750 to £1,000 for 2026/7 was approved. It was agreed that the precept demand can be increased by 10%.

### Local Nature Action Plan

Council agreed to the statement which binds it to adopt a Local Nature Action Plan. This is a requirement for all councils and is an adjunct to Shipston Town Council's biodiversity policy.

### Parking

Council is to object to a proposal by Warwickshire County Council to implement on-street parking charges. This has not yet been agreed by WCC and will be discussed at its budget meeting in February.

### Grit bins

Residents on the new estates wanting grit bins need to ask the developers to provide them. Cllr Passingham has reminded the developers of their duty of care.

**Business**

Cllr Howarth is meeting Shipston businesses and will remind them that they can have a regular slot at Council meetings. In addition, he has suggested that the Rural Economic Hub can use council chambers for communications.

**Assets**

The guttering work on the Twin Chapels has been completed satisfactorily. A committee meeting of the Youth Club building will be held. Ground work on the Hub is progressing.

**Events**

Cllr M Kelly has investigated the cost of barriers and found that the cost of buying outright is prohibitively expensive, but rental is a possibility. She will look into other options.

**Trees**

Cllr Passingham has a list of all the Tree Protection Orders in Shipston and told council that more TPOs could be made. A map of current TPOs will be circulated.

**County Council**

Cllr Barker reported that cold weather payments have been made this season. A recruitment drive is under way for childminders and reablement assistants. The Voice of Warwickshire is looking for more people to join the panel. Warwickshire Health and Wellbeing Board will respond to the Beds4Badger’s request to be added to the agenda.



**Town Clerk double**

Shipston Town Council now has two (job-sharing) Town Clerks. Emily Booth and Debbie Hardiman, who have been acting clerks for most of 2025, officially took over the role in January.

Local Nature Action Plan

Shipston Town Council has recognised the importance of taking steps to address the ecological crisis affecting our world and has drawn up a plan to help us take steps to tackle the decline of biodiversity in Shipston. This council-led plan is not a one-off, but a first step towards a town-wide action plan owned and drafted by the community and involving the residents of our town.



Green areas of Shipston owned or leased by the Town Council are where we have the highest level of influence, followed by areas controlled by Stratford District Council or Warwickshire County Council. Other stakeholders include schools, sports clubs, businesses, churches and residents.

Ideas which could be used to increase biodiversity might include wildflowers in the grass verges, hedgehog corridors on housing estates, nest boxes for birds and bats, cutting back on light pollution, planting pollinator-friendly flowers or litter-picking. Helping nature

The circular walk across Shipston Town Council's wildlife site at Cornmill Meadows (opposite the cemetery on the London Road), and then to Willington and Barcheston, is proving popular. This winter we've had the existing hedge laid so that it doesn't develop into a line of trees. This traditional skill has been used to maintain hedges to contain livestock, but it also creates green growth near the ground and that habitat is good for insects and animals. We've had help from Severn Rivers Trust to dig a scrape (a shallow pond) that will increase the wetland, again encouraging different plants and animals. Dog-walkers, please do not allow your dog to go in the pond, as that will put off creatures trying to settle there.

This spring, look out for the Community Orchard coming into blossom and wildflowers blooming along the pathway and in the meadow. Last year we saw a great variety of butterflies and birds, so it's becoming a haven for them. Take a quiet moment on one of the seats the Council has installed and listen to the rich variety of wildlife that Shipston has to offer.

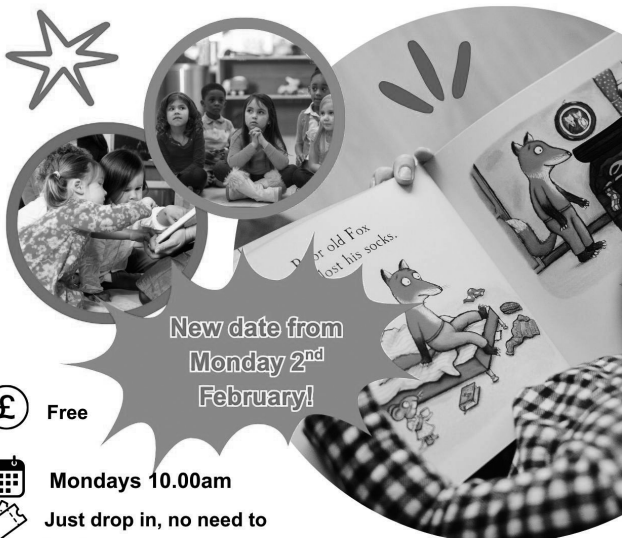

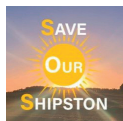
## Protecting Shipston's future: together!

In this month's update, SOS Save Our Shipston, the campaign to stop unsustainable development, says it has great news and not so good news.



The great news is:

- ✓ Our campaign has raised over £40,000 so far to fund planning consultants and legal support to defend the proposed unsustainable development of up to 1,150 houses at Fell Mill. The expertise they provide is already paying off in the form of substantial response to the developer's inadequate and inaccurate scoping document. The case officer at Stratford Council has added his robust response to the developers. All responses can be seen at Stratford Council e-planning website (quote Scope/00044).
- ✓ We have a new information and fundraising leaflet out which is being distributed through Shipston and affected villages by us volunteers.
- ✓ Our social media is hitting the spot. The Facebook page got 179,637 views in a single month and has 1,194 following; Instagram has 302 followers and TikTok 1,349 likes and 313 followers. Reels (videos) seem the most popular receiving 26,000 views! And we now have over 300 people on our mailing list.

The not-so-good news is that Taylor Wimpey has submitted its planning application for 110 houses at Hanson Avenue. Anyone wanting support in having their views heard can get information on our website and through our social media.

At time of going to print, there is no news on the other planning applications that were submitted

in 2025. Stratford Council has been inundated, so progress is understandably slow. We also have no news about when the application will be submitted for the Fell Mill site.

Witness of War

News from the Ukrainian frontline came to Shipston from activist, humanitarian and poet Iryna Starovoyt at an event on 3<sup>rd</sup> January. This was Iryna's second interview here at the Townsend Hall and she said how pleased she was to be among her Shipston friends again.



Despite the short notice – communication and travel with Ukraine is challenging – and bad weather, 30 people came to hear about life there. Over

£200 was also generously raised for Children of Heroes: those who have lost parents due to the war.

Iryna told us of her friend, Victoria Amelina, a war crimes researcher and the chronicler of extraordinary women like herself who have joined the resistance. She tragically lost her life due to a Russian missile before she could finish her book *Looking at Women Looking at War*. It has a foreword from Margaret Atwood and has been described as destined to be a classic, with a poet's powerful look at the courage of resistance.

A particularly poignant moment for the audience was when Iryna read: 'There are experiences and gestures that a writer's imagination could never invent. Do you know why modern Ukrainians in big cities, when going to bed, put dog food in one pocket of their pyjamas and flower seeds in the other?'

The first is so that search and rescue dogs can sniff them out faster if they're still alive but unconscious under the rubble – the quicker they can locate a person in distress, the better the chances of clearing the ruins in time to save someone. The second is in case they don't survive. Then they can at least leave some trace at the site of their murder in this unpunished terror, by letting their favourite flowers sprout and bloom there.

This emphasised not only the bravery of Ukrainian people, but their hope and inspiration – a point Iryna emphasised. She thanked everybody involved in the event, saying, 'I keep very fond and vivid memories: they are still so fresh and touching.'



The empty chair next to Iryna is a PEN International tradition to symbolise a writer who could not be present because of being imprisoned, detained or disappeared.

## Shipston Primary School

Throughout January we have been creating memorable moments as the children embark on their new topics of learning. These included welcoming a real life explorer and taking part in a night walk after school hours.

### A 'cool' encounter

Year 6 were honoured to welcome real-life Arctic explorer Simon to the classroom for a day of frost-bitten facts and incredible tales of endurance.



He began by showing us how people have to dress when they visit the Arctic and Antarctic in order to keep warm. Firstly, they wear thick coats, with goggles and of course, gloves. If their coats are too thick, their sweat would freeze. They also wear boots and hats.

After break, Simon the explorer amazed Year 6 with his incredible knowledge of polar wildlife. He made our minds blossom with new learning about Arctic and Antarctic creatures. He taught us about eight Arctic and Antarctic animals and four that live elsewhere. The eight Arctic and Antarctica animals are: narwhals, orcas, walruses, arctic foxes, polar bears, beluga whales, emperor penguins and arctic wolves. Did you know that orcas are actually a type of dolphin? The other four animals were: snow leopards, king cobras, piranhas and mountain lions. Afterwards we used our imaginations to design animals that might have lived millions of years ago. We then wrote a fact file describing our animals. It made our imaginations run wild!

Year 6 very much enjoyed the morning and couldn't wait for the afternoon to begin.

After lunch Year 6 were presented with some gruesome stories, pictures of frostbite and information about the dangers of the Arctic and Antarctic. Crevasses are extremely dangerous because you can't see them! They're deep drops covered in a thin layer of ice. Nearly impossible to avoid. Ever heard of frostbite? Simon the explorer had it on his ears once. They're mere scars now, but could have been a lot more serious. If frostbite is not treated quickly after being infected, the area where it is could have to be amputated. This only scratches the surface of the dangers of the Arctic. Thank you for sharing your experience with us, Simon.

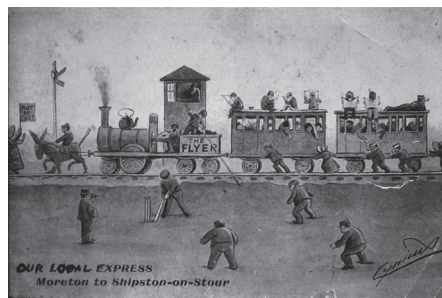

## Stratford-upon-Avon Astronomical Society

The speaker at 8pm on Tuesday 17<sup>th</sup> February 2026 will be Professor Susanne Schwenzer from the Open University, with a talk called Thirteen years and counting: curiosity at Gale Crater, Mars. Please note that the speakers start promptly at 8pm.



The Society meets every first and third Tuesday at 8pm (doors open at 7.30pm) at Alderminster Village Hall. Everyone is welcome, especially beginners and those wanting to learn more. The first Tuesday is a club night.

*Member Adrian Wakeham tells us about the planets this month.*

A big issue for observing is clouds and a nearly full moon: bright moonlight will drown out the stars and planets. The best time to observe the night sky is when the moon is at first or last quarter or less.

This month on Monday 16<sup>th</sup>, Saturn and Neptune are in conjunction, with each other. (Visually, they are within a degree of each other.) They are to be found in the west at sunset, below the square of Pegasus. Saturn is yellowy brown in colour and with binoculars, the rings might be visible. In the same field of view, Neptune will be visible, although not easy to see and you really need a telescope, as it might be Titan, Saturn's largest moon.

Jupiter will be at its closest to Earth in February and will be high and bright, making this one of the best times to observe the gas giant and its moons. As Mercury continues to rise above the western horizon, it will join Venus in conjunction. Venus is really easy to spot, being the exceptionally bright 'star' in the west. This will happen on Friday 27<sup>th</sup> February, and on the next day, seven of the eight planets will be visible as well as a virtually full moon.

Saturn, Neptune, Venus and Mercury will be close to the western horizon shortly after sunset and will disappear below the horizon within 90 minutes. If you head east, you'll find the Pleiades or Seven Sisters cluster, in which you can see a number of the stars, but with binoculars you will see many, many more. Then slightly south of the Pleiades you will see a green 'star'. This is the planet Uranus.

Continue east and just below Gemini's Castor and Pollux, will be another bright 'star'. This is Jupiter. With binoculars you should see some of the 4 Galilean moons and with a telescope you should be able to make out the bands and the great red spot. The planet missing out on the party is Mars – at the moment, it is pretty much behind the sun.

The sun did come out and there are more murmurations of starlings – what a noise – indicating that spring is closer than we think! Yippee for spring! I am not pleased that elections in so many places have been postponed for a second year (again, not here). I only started using all these tools when I was a reasonably fully functioning adult. I have asked the question a lot about the effect that screentime, social media and gaming have on younger people. Our Director of Public Health's report this year, 'Growing up Online' which you can reach by scanning this QR code,  is on this very issue (have a look at the WCC website)! WCC will be spreading the message more broadly via social media (irony not lost here) on ways to handle the pressures as individuals and families. Interestingly, there is growing evidence of the effect on the neuroplasticity of young brains of the level of usage of screens. The genie is out of the bottle, but I really wonder whether in 20 years time we will look back and wonder what we were at? I am pleased that a cross-party consensus is forming. I don't like the word ban but on the other hand, we don't let under 16s drink, smoke or drive, so perhaps we need to take a more parental approach to them on this?

I think we've got to the end of this ridiculous eight months of unprecedented planning applications in Shipston. If they all went through, Shipston would grow by 64%. I'm not just being optimistic to say that 1,700 houses aren't going to be built in Shipston in the next 20 years. I'm being realistic. The building industry only builds houses if they're going to make a profit. Stagnant house prices, and a shortage in building materials and skilled workers, make the government's promise to build a million houses in the next four years look like a pipedream. But we still have to deal with each application as they come in front of the planning committee, and we are all rightly anxious about the cumulative impact of multiple developments. 'Cumulative impact' is a valid planning argument especially when it comes to sewage, transport, and landscape.

There is a need in Shipston for more quality social housing and more affordable housing, but 10s, not 100s. There is a group looking into the viability of setting up a Community Land Trust in Shipston. A trust set up properly can borrow money to buy land and give the decision-making power to the community, whether it is for workspace, or houses available to rent. Anyone interested or who has some expertise in this area, do get in touch. I am a QUIMBY, (Quality in my back yard), not a NIMBY (Not in my back yard). We will continue to battle for this.

We are worried about WCC's plans to impose paid on-street parking in Shipston. The administration should be doing all they can to support our amazing town centre independent businesses, not imposing barriers for them. We will be inviting their Highways portfolio holder to come and see how Shipston works, and what effect paid on-street parking would have on our unique town centre.

The Rural Enterprise Hub is a great resource for local businesses, providing free practical business support. It is hosting its first drop-in session at New Clark House on 10<sup>th</sup> March from 10am to 2pm. This is for all businesses in Shipston and the surrounding area, whether you're already established, or if you're in the planning stages of starting something new. One of the Hub's 'Business Navigators' will be available for one-to-one information on how the hub can help with workshops, training, funding and mentoring. Whether you've got a new idea, are looking to grow or need to overcome challenges, the Rural Enterprise Hub will be there to help.
